Shade Mountain Winery Wins Silver at Farm Show

"We are unique because we grow all the grapes for these award-winning wines. These grapes for our wine are all grown here in Snyder County," said Amy Scorsone. "It's a family-owned and operated winery. We are excited to celebrate our 25th Anniversary this year and we are thrilled to receive these silver medal awards."

In the tasting room, Carolyn Zimmerman and her daughters Amy Scorsone and Jenny Nicola greet customers, offer guidance, and pour delicious glasses of their wines. There are over 50 varieties of wine available at Shade Mountain Winery. Patriarch Karl Zimmerman and sons Ben and Bill spend their days in the vines and vats. They make the wines and manage vineyard operations. Even the grandchildren visit the vineyard and are eager to lend a helping hand and learn about the family business.

At Shade Mountain Winery & Vineyard, the family and staff do it all. For them it is a "Labor of Love." They cultivate the vines, harvest the grapes, and produce the final product...wine.

"The whole 'vine to wine' process happens right here at our Middleburg winery and vineyard. We grow the grapes on our 70 acre property," explained Scorcone. "Throughout the year the vines are maintained. Then, in the Fall (September-November) workers are busy picking and processing the grapes. The staff bottles the wine throughout the year, replenishing supplies as needed."

Attuned to customer requests such as ice wine and current trends, the Zimmerman family also taps into their own creativity to infuse their wines with interesting twists such as mint and pineapple. At times, they bring retired wines back into their rotation.

"We are so grateful for all of the local customers who have stopped in to purchase our wines over the past 25 years," said Carolyn Zimmerman. "Our staff is amazing and we never could have gotten this far without them. We are very blessed."

Shade Mountain Winery offers a number of ways to relax and sample an array of their award-winning wines and repertoire. Their Wine Flight features a tasting of 5 wines to sip, savor, and compare. During the summertime months, Sunday Fundays provide guests an opportunity to lounge on the deck enjoying the view of vineyard, sipping wine, listening to great musical entertainment, and munching on food from a local food truck. They can be spotted at various festivals around the area showcasing their wines. Harvest Festival is another popular annual event and a fabulous way to enjoy food, wine, and live music. Throughout the winter months, there are a variety of classes where participants enjoy and activity and a glass of wine.

Agriculture Department Warns Consumers to Discard Contaminated Raw Milk Products

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture warns consumers to immediately discard all Conoco View Dairy raw milk sold in Cumberland, Juniata, Perry, Snyder, and York Counties, or delivered direct to homes or drop-off points in Cumberland, Dauphin, Juniata, and Perry Counties. The Department ran tests after 11 reports of campylobacteriosis illnesses in December and January and confirmed Campylobacter contamination in the dairy's products.

While the source of the bacteria is clear, every specific production date could not be pinpointed. All prod-ucts, including those in consumers' freezers, should be discarded.

Conoco View Dairy raw milk was sold in plastic pints, quart, and gallons, as well as glass quarts. Products were sold at the dairy's retail outlet at 410 Clarks Run Road in Blain, Perry County and the retail locations below. The dairy also delivers their products directly to homes in Dauphin, Perry, and Juniata County and at drop-off points in Harrisburg, Carlisle, Enola, and Mechanicsburg.

People with Campylobacter infections usually have diarrhea which is often bloody, fever, and stomach cramps, and may have nausea and vomiting. Symptoms usually start two to five days after infection and last about one week. Anyone who consumed the milk should consult their physicians if they become ill.

Information about drinking raw milk can be found on the Centers for Disease Control website.

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's food safety inspection services help to ensure that food sold in Pennsylvania is safe. For more information about food area code. safety in Pennsylvania, visit agriculture.pa.gov.

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
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A River Rat's Ramblings: 1955 New Year

It's New Year's Eve, mom and dad are going over to our Uncle George and Aunt Mick's house on West Pine St. Mom had made bologna rollups and wheat chex party mix to take to the party. She also made some for the four of us as the girls were our babysitters for the evening. Dad had bought a case of white birch beer at Keller's when he got a case of Rolling Rock Pony bottles. Dad would say he liked the little bottles because he would work up a thirst going back to the refrigerator for a full one. Mom would always say, "Now Jim don't say that around the kids and don't you boys repeat that to anyone".

Mom and Dad left around 7:30, the card table was set up in the living room ready to play a game called Candyland that one of us got for Christmas. (Remember no T.V. or Cell Phones) All I remember about that New Year's Eve was we had a good party that night. I do remember at one point in the evening Chuck Bowen stopped in, I figured he must really like Birch Beer to walk all the way from West Chestnut St.

The next morning Tim and I sat at the table trying to figure out how old we would be in the year 2000. We needed Mom's help with this, she said, "The year 2000 was 45 years from now." The rest I could figure out, I'd be 53 and Tim would be 51, we'd really be old men. Tim thought there might be space ships and robots to do the work like in the comic books. Tim and I saw Flash Gordon on the movie screen one Saturday afternoon and he did fly in a space ship and shot bad guys with a Ray Gun. Mom wasn't sure that's the way things would be in the year 2000, she was happy the way things were, maybe a machine to do the dishes but she already had four dishwashers.

Mom always made Pork and Sauerkraut with mashed potatoes for New Year's Day dinner. She said it will bring our family good luck for the New Year, but so far my luck wasn't that great because mom choose me to peel the potatoes for supper before I could go out to play. Tim wanted dad to go out with him to build a new sled run, but dad said he wasn't feeling so well and thought it may have been something he ate at the party. Mom said, "It may be the dozen Rolling Rock oysters he had," then Mom laughed, but Dad didn't. I didn't even know that Dad liked oysters!

Just then, Earl knocked at the back door, Tim left him in and then went upstairs to change into play clothes. Mom wished Earl a Happy New Year and then went about doing Mom stuff. I asked Earl if he knew that people in jail only get to eat the potato skins. The warden and the guards get to eat the good part of the potatoes. My Pink Grandpa was a guard at the Lewisburg Pen and he told me some con's peel up to 100 lbs. of potatoes a day just to get enough skins for supper. We were both sure we were never going to jail, I only had to peel five pounds and that took forever.

I went outside to find Earl, John and Tim working on a new sled run with a jump built into it. We carefully added river water to the snow pile and shaped the ramp until it was frozen solid. Earl was the first to go down and he flew off the ramp just as we hoped he would. However, he went one way and his sled another. His landing knocked the wind out of him and he sat out the next run. We all crashed on our first run. In fact, Tim's sled went in the river far enough we had to get our boat pole to hook the rope and pull it out. Before we could try another run John's mom called and it was time to quit. Tim and I watched Earl and John walk down the alley dragging their sleds behind them.

As Tim and I walked in the house Mom was taking the roaster of pork and sauerkraut out of the oven all ready for our good luck supper. Tim and I went upstairs to wash up for supper and came down in time to sit down and say grace. Mom filled our plates at the stove and the girls brought our plates to the table. I asked mom what she did with the potato skins and told her what grandpa said and she said something about not repeating everything my grandpa says. I ate my sauerkraut because I wanted good luck for 1955 and hoped it would be a year for new adventures growing up on the Isle of Que.

Union-Snyder CAA Offers Free Tax Preparation Assistance

Union-Snyder Community Action Agency (CAA) will begin accepting appointments for its 2024 Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program on Tuesday, January 16. This year's free program will begin February 5 and run through April 15, 2024. VITA offers free tax preparation for low-to-moderate income households in Union and Snyder Counties. IRS-certified volunteers will provide basic income tax return preparation with electronic filing for participating individuals.

To qualify for participation in VITA, an individual's annual household income cannot exceed \$60,000 and they must be a resident of Union or Snyder County. VITA is open only to those filing non-itemized tax returns.

The following items are required for the scheduled appointment: a social security card for everyone on the return, all income documents, bank information, and a photo ID for individuals filing the return. Photo IDs are not required for dependents. If filing jointly, both spouses will have to sign the return before it is submitted.

Thompson, Comer Statement on GAO Report On Foreign Ownership of U.S. Farmland

Following the publication of a requested report on foreign ownership and investment in U.S. farmland by the Government Accountability Office (GAO), House Committee on Agriculture Chairman Glenn "GT" Thompson and House Committee on Oversight and Accountability Chairman James Comer issued the following statement:

"Growing foreign ownership of U.S. farmland, particularly by China, poses a direct threat to our food security and national security. Safeguarding our farmland and food supply requires a whole of government approach and we will continue to work with the impacted agencies, related committees, and leadership to continue our robust oversight and to identify legislative vehicles to address the findings of the GAO report."

In October 2022, Chairman Thompson, Chairman Comer, and 128 of their colleagues requested a study regarding foreign investment in U.S. farmland and its impact on national security, trade, and food security.
