

# Report Wild Turkey Flocks Through March 15

The Game Commission is asking for the public's help finding turkey flocks for ongoing research.

Pennsylvanians are encouraged to report the location of any turkey flocks they see across the state. Information is being collected online at <https://pgcforms.pa.gov/TurkeySightingSurvey> now through March 15.

Among other things, visitors to that webpage are asked to provide the date of the sighting, the location and the type of land (public, private or unknown) where birds are seen.

Game Commission crews will assess sites for the potential to trap turkeys. Just like the last six winters, the Game Commission will put leg bands on male turkeys statewide. Turkeys will not be moved; they'll simply be leg-banded and released on site.

Trapping turkeys during winter is part of the Game Commission's ongoing population monitoring.

Hunters who harvest these banded turkeys, or people who find one dead, are asked to report the band number, either by calling toll-free or reporting it online.

"By reporting banded turkeys, hunters provide us with important information on harvest rates for our population model," said Reina Tyl, the Game Commission's wild turkey biologist. "In return, the hunter gets to learn when and approximately where the turkey was banded. If the turkey was banded the first winter after it hatched, we can also provide the hunter with an exact age of the turkey they harvested."

While no turkeys will be fitted with transmitters this winter, as the research projects that were tracking turkeys to get an in-depth look into their survival, productivity and movement are coming to an end, males will continue to be banded in the winter to monitor harvest rates.

Finding birds to trap is key to accomplishing the work. That's where the public comes in. Fortunately, Pennsylvanians have a history of helping in this way.

Tyl said participation in the Winter Turkey Sighting Survey has been extremely useful for locating trappable flocks over the past four winters.

"The public has been so helpful. Some landowners who reported flocks on their property have also helped with monitoring flock activity and have participated in trapping," Tyl said. "We look forward to continuing this collaboration this winter."

THE VIEW FROM HEAR

The Holiday Season tournaments are over and our local schools have flipped the calendar to a new year. Here's a chance to build upon '25 successes or wipe the slate clean and start anew in '26.

The Midd-West girls basketball team (2-6) split their two games in the Montgomery tourney. They handily beat the host 48-32 in the first game behind Izzy Walter's 24 and Emma Wagner's 17 points. They lost 56-21 to Montoursville in the title game where Izzy had eleven points. They fell 60-17 to Shik in league play.

Unlike Montgomery, Hughesville was a rude host in their tourney where Selinsgrove lost 58-11 to the Spartans (6-1). In the consolation game Grove was beaten 52-29 by Milton. Grace Morrone scored a season high 11 for the Seals. Milson was given eighteen free-throws with only one for Selinsgrove.

I'm guessing Grove's offense is perimeter based as they also lost to Jersey Shore 40-29 without attempting a foul shot. Madi Merrell had 12 points. The Grove girls had a great start to the week in beating Juniata 39-37. Merrell poured in 19 points and Maddy Benner had a career high 10. Lake Dent controlled the boards with 15 rebounds. The Seals also shot 11 free-throws! Good job coach.

The Lewisburg girls got off to a fast start 29-5 at halftime to beat Greenwood 39-22. Ava Motto led the way with 12 points and 7 rebounds. They lost to Saint Hubert Catholic in the title game of the Coach Bill Higgins Holiday Classic at Warrior Run. The Dragons got better by beating their cross-county rival Mifflinburg 28-24. Teagan Osunde is healthy again and her double double, 14 and 13 was key. India Walker had six steals.

The Mifflinburg boys team exacted some revenge on Lewisburg as they outscored the Dragons 18-1 in the second quarter on four treys. Chad Martin had 12 and Cheeky Griffith 11. Leon Tucker had 14 and Rebera Jemama 11. Both teams combined to go 19 for 19 from the foul line, a rarity for our local schools.

The Cats lost 40-39 to Loyalsock but got the better of Midd-West 63-37. They clamped down on the Mustangs (2-7) best player by holding Zani Cooley to three points. Griffith led all scorers with 15 points. Chad Martin added 11 and Liam Casilla scored eight off the bench.

Midd-West's Cooley scored 21 points in an 88-39 loss to Mifflin County who knocked down fourteen 3-pointers. Cooley had 14 in a losing effort to Shik 57-45.

Selinsgrove's Xaivier Jackson scored 20 and Jack Piecuch added 10 in a loss to Montoursville 66-50. The Seals hung tough trailing by only three at the half but were outscored by 20 in the second half in losing to Williamsport 65-42. Jackson had 14 points.

Lewisburg (6-4) ended Mount Carmel's nine game home winning streak with a 66-47 win. Nazir Meredith 25/10 and Leon Tucker's 10/10 double doubles were the difference.

Mifflinburg girls wrestling had two champs at the Matness at the MACC tourney in Williamsport. Aubrey Fluman and Lydia Miller brought gold home for the Lady Cats.

The boys team continued to roll as they went out to Indiana and dominated the Bo Wood wrestling tournament. The Wildcats finished with 208 team points to second place Seneca Valley's 134. Ben Straub, Bradley Wagner and Landon Tucker all took first place in the 21 team field. Seven other Miff wrestlers placed as well.

Midd-West wrestling traveled to Virginia over the holidays to participate in the Battle of the Bridge tourney. Charley Paige went 5-1 and lost in the finals 5-3. The Mustangs finished 22nd in the 58 team field.

Lewisburg (7-1) took second place at the Juniata Duals going 5-1. They lost to the powerhouse that is Montgomery wrestling 60-9. Landon Michaels and Landen Wagner both went 6 and 0 in the tourney.

Bucknell's Myles Takets won the 174lb title at the Mid-

lands wrestling tournament. He became the first Bison since 2010 to claim a Midlands title. Takats is ranked 15th nationally. Bucknell finished an impressive third place as a team just behind Rutgers and Pitt.

Bucknell hired Jeff Behrman as their new football coach. Behrman was head coach at his alma mater, John Carroll, where he had a 29-7 record. He is known as a rebuilder of programs which should serve Bucknell well.

Put your hand in the air if you thought Aaron Rodgers would lead the Pittsburgh Steelers to this year's playoffs. I said at the beginning of the year if Rodgers was the reason coach Mike Tomlin would have his first losing record in twenty years, Aaron's reputation would have taken a big hit.

# Winter Finch Report 2025-26

insect larvae provide an excellent source of food for finches and other bird species during the nesting season, leading to higher numbers of surviving nestlings and thus more pressure to find food.

Purple Finches have been moving south since August in good numbers. Males are a raspberry red and females are strongly brown-streaked with a heavy face pattern. They prefer black oil sunflower seeds at feeders as well as various deciduous seeds. This species nests in Pennsylvania. They can be confused with the more common House Finch; however, House Finches are brick red in the front with brown streaking and females are lightly brown streaked.

A good flight of Pine Siskins is occurring as far south as the mid-Atlantic states, including Pennsylvania. They are brown, usually with heavy streaking and some yellow in the tail and wings. These rather tame birds prefer nyger (thistle) seeds in tube or sock feeders. They also feed on spruce, tamarack, and hemlock. Pine Siskins will nest in Pennsylvania during irruptions.

There is currently a moderate flight of Evening Grosbeaks happening. Birds are being reported in New York, New England, and Pennsylvania. This is that big and colorful finch that many people look forward to seeing. Adult males are yellow and black with a yellow eyebrow and a large white patch on the wing. Females and juvenile birds are mostly gray with black and white wings and a yellowish green tinge on the neck and sides. They are a large finch about 8 inches long. Evening Grosbeaks eat large amounts of black sunflower seeds and prefer platform feeders.

Redpolls seem to be showing a strong flight out of the eastern boreal forest south into New England and New York and could make it into Pennsylvania according to Matt Young of the Finch Research Network. Redpolls are small arctic finches. Both sexes have red caps and black chins. Males also have a pink wash on the breast. At feeders, they consume black oil sunflower and nyger seeds. They also feed in weedy fields and on birch and alder trees.

Matt Young also hinted at another possible species, Pine Grosbeak, which is rare in Pennsylvania, that might show up here. There are currently reports in New York. Males are bright rosy red with black and white wing bars. Females are gray with a yellowish tinged head, breast, and rump, and white wing bars. They about 9 inches long.

Pine Grosbeaks will come to feeders with black sunflower seeds.

Two additional non-finch species are included in this annual finch forecast. One is the very familiar Blue Jay. An above-average flight of jays south is likely. The other is Red-breasted Nuthatch. They have been irrupting south into our area since August. They have bluish gray backs, a black cap, white face with a black stripe through the eye, and an orange-tinged belly. Their call has been described as like a little tin horn. They are found in conifers and also will come to suet feeders.

So, keep your feeders filled, be sure to clean them periodically, and enjoy the bird show.
