## 25th Annual Christkindl Market

There always seems to be a certain twinkle in the air during this time of year. A certain excitement and joy. Perhaps it's the knowledge of upcoming Christmas celebrations; maybe it's the festive holiday lights; or perhaps it's just the cold weather. Whatever the case, there is no denying that everyone looks a bit more cheerful around the holiday season. Many cannot help but bustle with anticipation as they wait for all of the holiday events and festivities. That is why it is always such a joy to visit Christkindl Market in Mifflinburg. The event is prepared each year by many different volunteer residents, churches, schools, and organizations. This year, the event celebrated its 25th anniversary, and despite the cold temperatures, many ventured on

The Market has been inspired by the nearly 700 year old tradition of the German "Christkindl Market" or "Christ Child Market". It is Mifflinburg's own attempt at a traditional and authentic, outdoor Christmas Market. For three days, Thursday through Saturday, people gather together in Mifflinburg from all over and across the surrounding area's to join in the festivi-

Vendors line the streets as passerby's view each stands goods. Many vendors have lots of food and drinks available, such as: Roasted almonds, turnovers, sticky buns, Christmas cookies, sausages, Hungarian goulash, soups, pork and sauerkraut, pierogi, hot chocolate, coffee, traditional German dishes, and much, much more. Even the pickiest of eaters were guaranteed to find something appealing to their appetites. There were also plenty of arts and crafts being sold as well.

Throughout the three day celebration, many special activities and performances were planned for the public. There was a live Nativity scene, a lantern parade, a juggler, plenty of singing performances, and special dinners. The activities that were planned were all fun and everyone really did look like they were having a wonderful time. As one person shared, "I wait the whole year for the Christmas season, and the Christkindl Market, to come! I love every minute of it! The food, the smells, the people - it's just a whole lot of fun. And I love to be with my loved ones at this time of the year."

But not everyone shared that same Christmas spirit of joy. During the day, UPS drivers complained about Market Street and the surrounding streets being shut off to motor vehicles, making their job of delivering packages to houses all the more difficult. Drivers have been known to give their helpers a dolly and load it up with packages, and then send them down the closed off streets to make the deliveries.

Many also complained about the crowds. One person, who did not wish to be named, commented, "I don't understand why they don't make the streets for this wider. Or, better yet, I don't

## **Farmland Protection** Signup

Applications for the 2014 Union County Ag-Land Preservation Program are being accepted until January 31, 2014. The Ag-Land Preservation Program is a State and County-run program that purchases development rights from landowners in order to protect farmland for future food production and open space preservation. This method of preserving farmland allows landowners to receive compensation for keeping their land in farming. The price paid for these rights is based on the difference between the whole farm-development market value and the farmland market value. For the year 2013 purchase period, easement purchases in Union County ranged from \$1300 to \$1500 per acre. Base prices are determined by a certified appraisal. A locally appointed board of directors guides the program, and establishes the methodology of prioritizing farms and the purchase price of development rights. In order to qualify, farms must be in a duly recorded Ag. Security Area, have at least 50 acres (unless contiguous to other approved preserved land), and meet soil quality parameters as required by state regulations. A farm must have an current erosion and sedimentation or conservation plan, and a manure management or nutrient management plan to apply.

Please be advised, that the Department of Revenue is aware that a company is contacting older Pennsylvanians by mail, offering to prepare Property Tax/Rent Rebate applications for a fee. While it's unfortunate that a company is charging for a service that the government and other agencies provide for free, there appears to be nothing illegal about the offer.

The rebate program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 annually for renters, and half of Social Security income is excluded.

## PA Dutch Life & Culture

Guy Temple continues... "Another thing I liked was to be appointed by the teacher to represent my class along with a girl from our class, to select books from the Lycoming County Bookmobile that came from the Williamsport James V. Brown Library. It came around about every other month and a couple from each class went out to the old Ford van and selected 12 to 15 books to place in the school for your class to read. So again, 16 students selected the books, carried them into the schoolhouse, placed them on the bookshelf and carried the old ones out to the bookmobile.

"Later when I was living in Lewisburg, Union County and was on the library board, we developed a new library for the entire county and one of the things we did was to develop a bookmobile for all the schools, including the 12 to 15 Amish schools. "Another thing I remember was the metal collection during WW2. We had a pile under a large oak tree in the corner of the school yard and so we contacted all the people of the area and asked them to bring any metal they had and put it on the pile. It was usually large, 8 to 10 feet high! The metal was then hauled to recycling places and used for war machines.

"Another thing we did during the war was to pick "Prince's

Pine" that grew in the woods and some fields of the area. It was a small evergreen plant, about 6 to 10 inches high. We would take time on Saturdays and Sundays to pick this in large burlap bags and take it to school. There it was transferred to a place in Williamsport. We were told that it was used to weave into netting for camouflage material for our troops overseas.

One last thought my dad often mentioned. He was in school with another boy from the area who was one or two years older the him. This young man graduated and at that time, a graduate could go to a so-called "Normal School" to become a teacher. His friend went to the Normal School at Muncy that summer and came back as his teacher. He said it was always hard to relate to a teacher who had been a good friend only a short time before! His name was Gratz Bigger. Many years later I had his wife as a teacher.'

Thanks so much, Guy...

Do these stir up any memories you have? In Beaver Springs, we never had a bookmobile, but did each of our six school rooms have a small library? I really only remember the one in the 6th-7th grade room. I can still 'picture' it in my mind. I think I read every book a few times, even though some were very thick! I still love to read.

I'd love to hear from some who have attended the Amish schools

I believe I can remember some WW2 collections we did... am I correct that we collected milk weed pods for their "silk"?? Is "Prince's Pine" what we called "ground pine"?? I don't remember collecting it for the war effort, but I do remember collecting it to use in decorating at Christmas. Dos it still grow in central PA? And is it still used to decorate?

My mother and several relatives also went to the Normal School summer courses. (But they also went to Susquehanna, as it was closer.) The Normal Schools became the PA State Teachers Colleges and are now State Universities. We have one here in town... West Chester University.
