## Parent Pay More for Well **Trained Babysitters**

Parents say that good babysitters are hard to find, according to a new American Red Cross poll. The poll found that in the past 24 months, 55 percent of parents surveyed decided to stay home because they couldn't find a babysitter. The survey also found that nearly a third (30 percent) of parents rejected a potential babysitter because of safety concerns.

Parents want to entrust their children to babysitters trained in first aid, CPR and childcare skills, and more than 80 percent of parents believe that teenaged babysitters should be paid more if they have these skills. However, eight in 10 parents (83 percent) have looked to adult relatives, while nearly half (48 percent) have relied on adult friends to watch their children.

It can be hard for parents to trust someone to care for their children when they're not at home. It's only natural to want someone who isn't just a loving playmate but who is also trained in what to do during an emergency," said Anne Smith, Communications Specialist. "The Red Cross babysitting courses help teens feel fully prepared to act quickly to aid a child if needed,

The Red Cross babysitting, CPR and first aid courses teach teens how to care for young children and handle emergency situations. The American Red Cross Babysitter's Training course gives youth the knowledge and confidence to care for infants and school-aged children.

A majority of parents believe sitters should be paid more if they are trained to help a child who is choking, recognize potential emergency situations, identify items that could be hazardous to small children, and give first aid for minor cuts and bruises. More than three in four (77 percent) of parents with children younger than 17 feel teenagers should receive some training before they begin babysitting.

About half (51 percent) of Americans rely on unpaid babysitters, and nearly a quarter (24 percent) pay between \$6 and \$10 an hour for someone to watch their children. Ten percent pay between \$11 and \$15 per hour; while four percent pay between \$16 and \$20 per hour, making babysitting a potentially lucrative Adults should also boost their lifesaving skills by enrolling in CPR and First Aid courses. #### June 1, 2012, Union County Times -3 Celebrating 25th Anniversary of Local Rotary Club



The Lewisburg Sunset Rotary Club hosted a program to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the admission of women as members of Rotary during its Monday, May 7, evening meeting held at Puirseil's Irish Pub.

Keynote speaker was Carrie Ryan, CFO and Vice President of Easter Seals of Central Pennsylvania and President of the State College Rotary Club. Easter Seals was founded from an earlier organization, The Crippled Children's Fund which, ironically, was a program of Rotary. Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary served as Easter Seal's first Chairman of the Board. Ryan informed the Rotarians and guests that Easter Seals

Central Pennsylvania currently provides services to more than 2,600 adults and children with physical disabilities and developmental delays, including individuals affected by conditions like autism, cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, spina bifida and traumatic brain injury (TBI).

The club celebrated the skills, dedication, and commitment women bring to their Rotary Clubs around the world and lauded the men who supported the admission of women to Rotary. Antidotal comments were provided by Rotary District 7370 Governor Alice Kissinger, Club President Mary Mahoney-Ferster, President-elect Irene Henninger, Past President Rick E. Wible and Past District Governor Karen Teichman. Rotarians were present from many clubs, traveling from Pottsville and West Snyder County to Lock Haven and Bloomsburg, to attend this

When Rotary International was founded in 1905, membership in the organization was strictly male only. While many clubs around the world had petitioned Rotary International, beginning in the 1950's, to admit women to Rotary, their requests were consistently voted down by Rotary's law-making body, the Council on Legislation. By 1972, as more women began to reach higher positions in their professions more clubs began lobbying for female members.

In 1977, the Rotary Club of Duarte, California, admitted women as members in violation of the Rotary International Constitution and Standard Rotary Club Constitution, and promptly lost their charter. The club filed a lawsuit in 1983, which was resolved on May 4, 1987, when the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously ruled that Rotary clubs could not exclude women from membership based on gender.

Many of the Sunset Rotary Club members remembered those days and the changes that were occurring, not only in Rotary but in many social organizations around the world.

Since the 1987 ruling, women have been welcomed to Rotary and have served as club presidents, District Governors, Assistant Governors, Trustees of The Rotary Foundation, and as members of the Rotary International Board of Directors. Today Rotary has 1.2 million members in 34,000 Rotary Clubs in more than 200 countries. Current statistics show that 198,000 of these members are women.


