





LONG POND, Penn.—A lucky combination of a wreck and rain on Sunday at Pocono Raceway, allowed Jeff Gordon to claim his first

Sprint Cup victory of the season.
"Oh man, I can't believe this," said Gordon. "The way our luck has been going this year, we'll take a win any way we can get one. You can't ever give up. This one makes up for all the ones that got away.'

Gordon was sixth during a restart on lap 91. His teammate Jimmie Johnson was the leader, with Matt Kenseth on the outside. The two cars driven by Johnson and Kenseth touched going into turn-1 after a tire on Johnson's No. 48 went down.

"I noticed that something didn't feel right,' said Johnson. "I kept trying to clean the tires off and it got a little better so I just assumed I had trash on my tires, but when I got down into turn one I realized that I had a right-rear (tire) flat. Unfortunate that we lost the lead there and got a couple of cars in the process.

Johnson managed to hold on to his car, but Kenseth's No. 17 hit the outside wall, then came down, and was hit by Denny Hamlin.

This brought out another caution. When the cars were lined up for

Last Year, PASR Volunteered 24,675 Hours and Saved \$527,060



On June 12th the Union Chapter of the Pennsylvania Association of School Retirees presented a mock check to the Union County commissioners at the chapter's monthly breakfast. This check represented the amount of money school retirees saved Union County last year.

PASR partnered with Keystone Research Group to determine how many public school retirees are actively engaged in volunteer activities, the average number of hours they each contribute, and the type of service activities in which they are involved.

The research discovered that, statewide, 63 percent of PASR's members are volunteering in their local communities, with each volunteer contributing, on average, total of 6,600,876 hours volun-

teered. It should come as no surprise

that retired public school employees are some of the most active, involved people in their communities. After all, throughout their professional lives, these individuals were dedicated to helping others. Even though, on the whole, the national trend is that individuals are volunteering less, school retirees are the exception and continue to volunteer in extraordinarily high num-

In fact, the percentage of members who volunteer and the hours served to their communities is astounding when juxtaposed with the Pennsylvania averages documented by the Corporation for National and Community Service. Ac-308.4 hours per year, for a cording to their findings, only

27.4 percent of Pennsylvania residents volunteer, with 35.6 hours per volunteer each year. In comparison, PASR members volunteer at better than two and one half times the state average and contribute eight and a halftimes the state average in tens of hours of service provided annually.

So, how valuable is the service that school retirees contribute to Pennsylvania through volunteerism? According to Independent Sector, a nonprofit, nonpartisan coalition of charities, foundations, and corporate philanthropy programs, the value of volunteering during 2010 in the state was \$21.36 per hour, based on the average hourly wage determined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

With nearly 21,000 members contributing more than six and a half million hours of service to their local communities, the economic value of PASR member volunteer service to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is nearly \$138 million per year.

In Union County alone, PASR members volunteered 24,675 hours, saving their communities \$527,060!

Keller Sponsored Recycling Mandate Relief Signed Into Law

Legislation sponsored by Rep. Fred Keller (R-85th District) to amend the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act has been signed into law.

Under Act 83 of 2012, municipalities must now exclude the number of people residing in any federal or state facility, such as a prison that conducts a facility-wide recycling program administered by the federal or state government, when determining population and eligibility to receive state recycling grants.

Prior to Act 83, state law required municipalities with a population of more than 5,000 people but less than 10,000 people and which has a population density greater than 300 people per square mile, to implement a mandatory curbside recycling program. Total population is determined by the most recent 10year U.S. Census. The procedure used by the U.S. Census Bureau counts the number of residents of any state or federal facility within the municipality as part of that community's population.

"According to the census, nearly one-third of Kelly Township's total
