The jury found Wirth guilty on felony counts of homicide by vehicle, and homicide by vehicle including driving while intoxicated; two felony counts of aggravated assault, one including a DUI; and one felony count of accidental death or injury while not properly licensed.



Many of these are words and terms common to the housewife before the days of modern kitchens and convenience foods!

**<u>BAKING POWDER</u>**---A leavening superior to the previous products. Produced commercially in 1850, it did much to improve the quality and texture of cakes. (What did they use before this??) BARREL -32 1/2 gallons (usually).

BLADDER---- Yes...animal bladders were used to cover crocks of preserves.

**<u>BRANDY PAPER</u>**—Paper saturated with brandy and used to cover preserved fruits.

BRUISE — To crush or to pound.

CAKE—Of all the entries in the old cookbooks, cakes outnumber everything else. This is especially true of those kept by Pennsylvania Dutch housewives, due in part to the lack of dialect words to differentiate between cakes and cookies. It's almost impossible in some cases to tell the difference, even after reading the ingredients

<u>CUP CAKE</u>---A cake called this because measurements were given in cups rather than pounds and ounces. It can also refer to cakes baked in small cups

**DEMIJOHN**---A bottle encased in wicker to prevent breakage. **<u>DIP CAKE</u>**---A coffee cake or one that lends itself to "dipping" or dunking.

**DO.** --- An abbreviated form for ditto.

DRAM, DRAHM---- A unit of measure; 60 grains or 1/8 of an ounce

FLITCH--- A side of bacon.

FROTH---- To heat to boiling or to allow to brown.


**<u>GILL</u>**--- A unit of measure;  $\frac{1}{4}$  pint or  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup. (That's my mother's maiden name! I never knew it was a unit of measure!)

HARTSHORN (Salts) --- Ammonium bicarbonate derived from the horns of deer and other animals, used as a leavening agent. It's no longer used locally, but many European recipes call for it because of its ability to make cookies crisp.

HARTSHORŇ (Shavings) ---- Shavings taken from the horns of animals; they possess a gelatinous quality useful for making jelly. Hartshorn flummery, an early gelatinous dessert, is found in most old cookbooks.

# Rowdy Kyle Busch Owns Texas

FT. WORTH, TEX.---Kyle Busch is on a roll. He won both the Nationwide and Cup races at Texas Motor Speedway this past weekend.

Busch started from the pole position in Saturday night's Cup race and remained in the top-three for most of the race. As the laps wound down, Busch was in second place and steadily chasing down leader Martin Truex Jr., when the caution flag waved at lap 315 of the 334-lap race. With just 19 laps remaining, all the leaders decided to bring their cars down pit road. A quick, fourtire pit stop by his pit crew put Busch back in the top spot for the final restart of the night, and he never looked back, taking the checkered flag.

"It's good, really good," said Busch, "We've had a good start to the season. It feels amazing to keep this roll going. It's so much fun to race with this group. We had a talk over the winter, Dave (Rogers, crew chief) and I had a talk a few weeks ago, and things have kind of jelled – we've been doing really, really good.'

Martin Truex Jr. finished .508 of a second behind Busch in the runner-up spot. His No. 56 Toyota failed the height-stick test and was deemed too low in the front. The car will be taken to NASCAR's research-and-development center in Concord, N.C. for further examination.

We came in with the lead," Truex said. "I still feel like we should have been able to beat him out. I don't know what happened there, but it wasn't even close. I was three (car-lengths) behind, so it wasn't all pit position, it was other things on our end."

Carl Edwards, Greg Biffle and Joey Logano rounded out the top-five. Jimmie Johnson, Aric Almirola, Brian Vickers, Brad Keselowski and Newman comprised the remainder of the top-10.

Edwards looked like he was headed for a long night early in the race. First, his engine began sputtering and then his seat belts came unhooked under caution and he couldn't get them reattached until after the restart. Incredibly, Edwards managed to hook his belts into place after taking the green flag and while racing at about 200 mph. Despite all that, Edwards rallied for an impressive third-place finish.

Trouble started early for the Penske Racing Fords of reigning series champion Brad Keselowski and Joey Logano. NAŠCAR confiscated the rear-end housings of both cars, forcing the teams to make a change before the race.

Keselowski made it to the grid in time for the start, but Logano's car was late presenting itself on pit road and had to start from the

rear. "It is just something that is not in the spirit of the rules," NAS-CAR vice president of competition told the Sporting News in explaining the violation. If penalties are forthcoming, they will be announced next week."

Keselowski remains second in the Cup standings, but he may be in trouble again for lambasting NASCAR with his post-race comments

"I don't have a lot of good things to say right now," Keselowski said. "The things that I've seen over the last seven days have me questioning everything I believe in and I'm not happy about it. I don't have anything positive to say.

'There's so much stuff going on, you guys have no idea — you have no (expletive) idea what's going on. I can tell you there is no team in this garage with the integrity of the 2 team.

"The way we've been treated over the last seven days is absolute shameful. I feel like we've been targeted over the last seven days more than I've ever seen a team targeted in my life. My guys keep their heads on straight and they showcased why they're a winning team and a championship team.

"We're not going to take it. We're not going to be treated this way.'

Good luck Brad. Just remember that Tony Stewart found out several years ago, that, "It's NASCAR's way or the highway."

Two weeks after leading the standings, Dale Earnhardt's team seems to have reversed direction. He was running third when his car lost power, Earnhardt went to pit road instead of switching to the backup battery. He was nabbed for speeding on the pit stop and had to serve a pass-thru penalty. Then, crew chief Steve Letarte had him stop for four tires during the penalty stop, which

# Two Armed Men Rob 12 Susquehanna University Students

A resident of an apartment on the 100 Block of S. Market Street, in Selinsgrove, notified the Selinsgrove Police that two male suspect entered his apartment as he and approximately 11 other students were gathered. One suspect was armed with a pump action shot gun and the other was armed with what may have been a semi-automatic handgun. The suspects commanded the victims to lay on the floor and instructed them to produce their cell phones and wallets which were gathered by the suspects. Both suspects were wearing either ski masks or coverings over their faces which obstructed the view of their nose and mouth. They fled the residence to Market Street and were last seen running east on Bough Street.

Even though the armed robbery occurred off campus, the university executed a lockdown of the campus for several hours.

The first suspect is described as a black male, approximately 18-28 years of age, 6'1" - 6'2" in height, with a medium to muscular build. He was believed to have been wearing dark or a camouflaged shirt/jacket, lighter colored pants and armed with a dark colored metal pump action shotgun. The second suspect is described as a black male, approximately 18-28 years of age, 5'10" - 6' in height, with a medium to slender build. It is believed that he was wearing a dark shirt/jacket or hoodie and green camouflaged pants. He was armed with a dark metal semi automatic handgun.
