

## Lewisburg Celebrates Music in the Park



### Clinton County Ran the Big Sprint Car Race, Selinsgrove Wrapped up the Late Model Speedweek

at Clinton County Speedway for the \$7,500 top prize on the line. There were twenty-six 410's, three 360's and three 305 drivers in action. None of the 305 drivers were able to qualify, with one 360-sprint driver making the 35-lap feature field. Two sets of time trials were needed to set the field for the heat races. Brock Zearfoss, who had overall fast time at 11.978 and Australian driver, Alex Attard, was fastest in the second group with a time of 12.567. Zearfoss, Billy Dietrich, Lucas Wolfe and Garrett Bard won the four heat races, with Cameron Smith winning the B-main. Garrett Bard, who swept the two 410 special shows in the 2024 season, just did not have it in the feature this time placing fifteenth in the final run down. Billy Dietrich, who for years has supported the 410 shows at Clinton County, scored the feature win over Ryan Smith in the #6 (not the Kreitz #69 he drives at other tracks). Lucas Wolfe was third, Zearfoss and then Logan Rumsey in the top five. Hard Charger went to Derek Hauck, who started the feature in twenty-first and placed seventh in the final finish. Cameron Smith started nineteenth and placed tenth in the final rundown, showing that there was a lot of passing during the 35-lap feature. Jordan Givler, when he was interviewed during the pill draw for the feature, was pushing for Clinton County to be a part of the annual sprint Speedweek quoting Gilver, "We need a few short tracks like Clinton in the mix for one of the ten races". Time will tell if that is going to happen for the 2026 season. Mark Smith has been pushing the same thing noting the call for more shorter tracks, like Clinton, to be placed on the docket. Tyler Reeser who was on top of his game with the 305-sprint years ago and then had the ride in the Sorokach #35, but he walked away from the sport, took a ride in the back-up Jones race #12 for the Clinton race. Reeser was twenty-first in the finishing order. Austin Bishop is now the driver of the #35 and was eleventh in the feature. Lucas Wolfe, who had not raced there in a few years, made the best of it with a third-place finish in the feature. The next 410-sprint is set for Saturday August 9th with the running of

Also on Friday, at Selinsgrove Speedway, there was the rescheduled Appalachian Speedweek final for the super late models. The point title came down to Gregg Satterlee and Trevor Feathers, with Feathers needing Satterlee to have some bad luck for him to be able to overtake Gregg for the points. That did not happen with Satterlee going out and winning the feature event and picking up \$6,000. In fact, Gregg did not stop there! He went out and won the Frank Sagi Tribute race at Hagerstown on Saturday picking up \$5,000, and then on Sunday to win the Jimmy Spence Memorial at Winchester Speedway and another \$6,091 for bonus money. It was a \$21,000 weekend. Getting back to Selinsgrove, again Shaun Jones of Shermansdale PA was the bridesmaid and not the bride. He led for 14 laps in the feature but settled for second place at the end of the 35-lap feature. He was also second to Rick Eckert in a race back in May of this year. Shaun led the most laps that night also. Hayes Mattern, who is always around the top five, was third in the feature, with Eckert and Kyle Lee in the top five. Trevor Feathers, Dylan and then Jim Yoder, Dan Stone and Jeff Rine who was the tracks hard charger coming from 17th to that 10th place finish. The final point total for the top five looked like this: Satterlee 4,265, Trevor Feathers 4,055, Bryan Bernheisel 3,993, Dan Stone 3,919 and Kyle Lee 3,913. A nice field of 32 sprint car driver showed up on Friday night place finish. For the series Satterlee had three wins with others coming at Port Royal, Bridgeport and Selinsgrove Mason Zeigler drove in only two events and won them both at Path Valley and Bedford. Four different drivers set fast times with Satterlee doing it twice along with Trevor Feathers, Mason Zeigler and Justin Weaver. There were fourteen different heat race winners, with Rick Eckert and Feathers each winning two single wins for the other twelve. Only five of the original eight scheduled races were run with Clinton County, Hagerstown and Lincoln all getting rained out.

Hagerstown Speedway had the Frank Sagi Tribute race last Saturday with a top field of 37 super late model drivers on hand. After the win by Satterlee, came Matt Cosner, Trevor Feathers, Rick Eckert and Kyle Hardy. Following them were Andrew Yoder, Kyle Lee, Bryan Bernheisel, Kenny Moreland and Justin Weaver. Alan Sagi puts this deal together each year and it always draws a big field of racers and large crowds of spectators. Three drivers were also honored, Booper Bare, Dave Wilt and car owner Barry Klinedinst during the 8th annual running of this event. Bare was the 1987 Rookie of the year at Hagerstown and placed second in points to Jeff Robinson that year. He also picked up four feature wins. ## SUN Area Technical Institute Honors National SkillsUSA TeamWorks Champions

New Berlin, PA - SUN Area Technical Institute proudly hosted a press conference on July 10, 2025, to honor its TeamWorks team, who earned the Gold Medal at the 2025 National SkillsUSA Championships held in Atlanta, Georgia.

The winning team — Cordell Yoder (Middleburg), Dominic Scott (Mifflinburg), Benjamin Rowan (Selinsgrove), and Ezra Carr (Port Trevorton) performed 36 other teams from across the country, placing 1st out of 37 in this elite, multidisciplinary construction competition.

The students, guided by their advisor Brian Lauver, began their winning journey in January by securing first place at the district competition at The Pennsylvania College of Technology in Williamsport. They continued their winning streak by capturing first place at the Pennsylvania state competition in Hershey this April, before going on to achieve national victory.

SkillsUSA is a national organization focused on developing personal, workplace, and technical skills among students in career and technical education programs at the secondary and post-secondary levels.

'This is a major accomplishment," said Advisor Brian Lauver. "Each of these students had to be highly skilled in their individual trade. They're humble, but their performance speaks volumes."

Throughout the national competition, the team encountered and overcame major challenges.

Cordell Yoder, the team's electrician, noted that he could not begin his electrical work until the second day and initially doubted he would finish in time. However, Ezra Carr, the team's carpenter and leader, reassured that Cordell had time to spare by the end.

Benjamin Rowan, who handled HVAC and plumbing duties, recounted a critical error when drilling for toilet installation, only to discover they had hit a joist due to a platform misalignment. Judges informed the team that they could either stop or attempt a fix — but warned that placing would be unlikely.

Refusing to quit, Carr explained how they quickly reorganized. "We raised the wall framing, and Dom [Dominic Scott] was literally bench-pressing the floor," he said, describing the team's relentless push to recover and finish strong.

Scott, the team's mason, faced another challenge: the competition blueprints included a flaw that made a section of block work structurally unfeasible. After he pointed it out, judges determined no team would be penalized for that design issue.

Lauver, who has served as the school's Carpentry Instructor for the past eight years, praised the students' dedication and preparation: "What these students accomplished in just two eight-hour days is extraordinary. They came in well-trained by their instructors and worked tirelessly." He extended his thanks to Mr. Travis Weaver (HVAC), Mr. Van Reichelderfer (Electrical), and Mr. Ryan Swinehart (Masonry) for their contributions to the students' success. Mr. Lauver also extended his thanks to Mrs. Sarah Krebs and Mr. Jamie Kotarski, SkillsUSA Advisors who assisted in behind the scenes work. Kristy Etzler, SUN Tech's Administrative Director,

commended the team during the press conference: "Not all high school students get the opportunity to spend 6.5 hours a day mastering their trade. What you accomplished in Atlanta has laid a strong foundation for your future. We are all extremely proud of you." Also in attendance were Senator Lynda Culver

and State Representatives David Rowe and Stephanie Borowicz, who presented the team, advisor, and school with official citations.

Senator Culver praised the team's achievement, calling it a proud moment for Central Pennsylvania. Representative Rowe echoed the sentiment, noting, "Businesses in our region tell me they can't find skilled workers like they can here in Čentral PA." Representative Borowicz enthusiastically dubbed the students part of the "Toolbelt Generation," applauding their readiness to meet the demands of the work-



T&D's Cats offers visitors an opportunity to see big cats and other wild animals at a safe distance and learn about the various rescued creatures at the sanctuary. T&D Cats of the World is situated on the family's 35-acre property. Its tree lined paths provide forested areas for many of the animals in the sanctuary. There are only 4 rules when visiting the refuge: no running, no sticks, no stones, no noise. The safety and well-being

It began with housing a cougar and a bobcat. Then the calls continued. Founded in 1990, the family opened the animal sanctuary to the public. The name is derived from Terry Mattive and his late wife Donna.

Both Jennifer Mattive and her brother, T.J. made the decision to continue working at the wildlife refuge operation after graduating from Penn State. Jennifer earned a degree in Wildlife and Fisheries Science while T.J. obtained a Biology degree. The siblings divide their duties. Jennifer oversees the gift shop, summer tours, and volunteer schedules as well as caring for the smaller mammals. T.J. concentrates on caring for the large cats, primates, and bears, and tending to the enclosures and expansive grounds.

For the Mattive family, T&D Cats of the World is more than a job. It is a passion. A way of life. A calling to care for the neglected, abused, and abandoned animals and to give them a

Nearly 300 abused, mistreated, or unwanted animals call T&D's home, including nearly 30 felines (lions, tigers, cougars, bobcats, and servals). T&D also houses other animals including bears, fox, deer, coyotes, wolves, raccoons, primates, and birds. The animals have a home for life. T&D's does not buy, trade, or sell wildlife.

According to the Mattives, "T&D's strives to provide large enclosures for the animals in our care. You will find tigers cooling off in the pond within their two-acre exercise area, lions lounging in an acre exhibit, and bears wandering about their acre enclosure. Catch a glimpse of the wolves in their acre enclosure or the coyotes playing 'King of the Hill' in their 1/2-acre enclosure. We continue to provide larger and new enclosures for the animals when funds allow. Donations accepted to help defray the cost of materials. Besides providing room to run, T&D's also believes in enriching the animals' lives. As you walk around, you may see balls, tires, ropes, and other items provided for the animals' enjoyment.' The carnivores eat over 10,000 pounds of meat each and

every month! This is equivalent to 10-12 cows! Each lion and each tiger needs 20-40 pounds (and sometimes up to 100 pounds) of meat every day. Farmers donate cows, calves, or horses that have died from natural deaths. Road-killed deer are donated by the PA Game Commission. The carcass diet is more natural, nutritional, and provides enrichment for the animals. However, chicken is also purchased for the animals T&D's is fully licensed by the state and federal governments

to house and exhibit wildlife. Professional animal care is provided by the Mattive family and dedicated veterinarians at the onsite medical building. T&D's is not funded by the government. The care of the ani-

mals is made possible in part by private contributions. 100% donations goes directly to animal care! T&D's has no paid employees, just volunteers. In fact, even the owners do not receive salaries. The public can help by making a donation, Sponsoring An Animal, donating materials, volunteering their T&D's Cats of the World is open 76 days a year from May-

September. Self-guided tours are available on Saturdays and Sundays from 10 am- 6 pm. No admittance after 5 pm. In June, July, and August guided tours are offered on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays at 10 am or 2 pm. Closed Monday and Visitors can enjoy this unique opportunity to observe these

creatures while supporting making a difference in the welfare of these animals. Cash admission only; \$15 for ages 13 and older; \$10 for ages 3-12 and free for children 2 and younger. There is also a small gift shop on the grounds.

T&D's Cats of the World is located between Middleburg and Mifflinburg off of Route 104. Turn onto Troxelville Road, go one mile, the T&D sign is on the left, turn right at sign onto Mountain Road, and continue a half mile, Cats of the World is on the left. Visit tdscats.com for more information.



Members work on service or individual projects and offer quilting advice and help. New participants are welcomed. The members of the Piecemakers Quilt Guild of Susquehanna Val-

ley (PQG) continue to expand their skills and learn new techniques

with special presenters and programs. During the month of June, guest speakers Peggy Dent and Cynthia Kishbaugh of Quilters in Bloom presented "Fabric Collage," a design option that fuses fabric pieces onto Fabric collages are made from many light, medium, and dark pieces of cloth mindfully selected to create a picture. By carefully arranging

these various shades, the designer can show a play of light and shadow on objects, much like a watercolor, oil, or pastel picture. Thread painting and other embellishment techniques can be added to make fabric collages more realistic. Fabric collage lends itself beautifully to abstract design as well. Dent and Kishbaugh shared many examples of their work. There is no

limitation to what an image can become a fabric collage.

## Bridge Closure Advisory West Buffalo Township

Lewisburg, PA: Please be advised that Johnstown Road (T-394) in West Buffalo Township, Union County will have detours in place starting July 28th; 2025 due to a bridge construction project located approximately 650 feet south of the Red Bank Road intersection. The roadway will be closed to through traffic during construction which could last for up to 12 weeks. Motorists should follow the posted detour routes during this time.

The bridge is being replaced as part of a larger multi-municipal bridge improvement program being facilitated by Union County that will replace six locally owned bridges in poor condition within five partnering municipalities. The project is made possible through Multimodal Transportation Fund grants from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation and the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development.
