Nine people were killed and belts and issued 107 citations 312 people injured in crashes investigated by the Pennsylvania State Police during the Fourth of July holiday driving

State troopers investigated a total of 845 crashes between July 4 and 8. Of those crashes, 85 were alcohol-related, including four of the fatalities. Seven of those killed were not wearing seat belts.


During the same period, state troopers arrested 432 people for driving under the

"I'm disappointed that so many drivers still get behind the wheel after drinking," State Police Commissioner Frank Noonan said. "And it's clear that far too many people don't buckle up when they travel. The numbers illustrate once again that risky behavior, such as drinking and driving or not wearing a seat belt, can lead to tragic ends."

troopers issued 7,888 speeding citations, cited 773 motorists for failing to wear seat to motorists for not securing children in safety seats.

The number of people killed and injured, as well as the number of crashes, increased over last year's Fourth of July holiday period. Between July 1 and 4, 2011, there were seven fatalities and 303 injuries in the 723 crashes to which troopers responded.

These reports cover only those incidents investigated by State Police and do not include statistics on crashes to which other law-enforcement agencies responded.

State Police Report Nine Killed, 312 Injured Pet Food Recalls & Warnings

Over the past few months, several pet food manufacturer's have recalled dry dog food and released warnings about certain dog treats. These recent events have caused many pet owners to ask what is recalled and what is safe to feed our pets. Many owners, such as myself, consider their pets to be members of their family.

Due to the outbreak of illness, a recall of at least 11 brands of dry dog food manufactured at a Gaston, SC plant operated by Diamond Pet Foods of Meta, MO was issued. The list includes the store brand pet food sold by Costco, Kirkland Signature and Kirkland Signature Domain.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, lab test confirmed that those sick were infected with a rare strain of salmonella infantis, which was only detected after a routine test of dry dog food revealed the con-

Diamond Pet Foods has voluntarily expanded its recall of certain brands of dry dog and cat food manufactured at the facility in SC, between December 9, 2011 and April 7, 2012, because of the potential salmonella contamination. In 2012, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) issued recalls and Safety Alerts for these pet foods. contact with the contaminated food should wash their hands after feeding or handling a pet that has eaten the contaminated food. Discard all remaining food and call your health care provider if you feel ill or call the vet if your pet is exhibiting symptoms of salmonella. The symptoms include diarrhea, fever and abdominal cramping 12 to 72 hours after infection. The illness can last up to week. Most people recover without treatment.

Ride To Benefit Rett Syndrome



"Rett Syndrome...Imagine the symptoms of Autism, Cerebral Palsy. Parkinson's, Epilepsy and Anxiety disorders all wrapped up in one little girl!" taken from Facebook status. Rett Angel's, Monica Bartlett. of New Berlin and Kailey Weaver, of Middelburg live with Rett Syndrome. Their families live with the so-called "Rett Monster" 24/7. They deal with changing, dressing, feeding, seizures, medications, routines, and doctor visits. The families became friends and a support after a mutual contact told them of each other. The families live only on a few short miles from one another.

Rett syndrome (RTT) is a devastating neurological developmental disorder and the most disabling of the autism spectrum disorders that occurs in infancy. Rett syndrome does not care if you are rich and famous or poor and unknown. It is found in all racial and ethnic groups throughout the world. Rett syndrome is an X-linked neurological disorder caused by a mutation of the MECP2 gene on the X chromosome, and identified in 1999, and 1 of only 4 diseases that occurs almost exclusively in girls. Although it is genetic, it is not hereditary. Parents have no idea their infant has this syndrome until between 6-18 months of age. When their daughters unexplainably plateaus in development or suffers a devastating regression, leading to severe lifelong motor apraxia (meaning the will to move is there but the ability to follow through is not) affecting speech, hand use, mobility and even the ability to eat or breathe easily for the rest of her long life. A child is born with Rett syndrome approximately every 2 hours. Characteristic features include loss of speech and purposeful hand use, occurrence of repetitive hand movement, abnormal walking (if they walk), abnormal breathing, and scoliosis, digestive problems, chewing and swallowing problems, and slowing in the rate of head growth. Current treatment for girls with RS includes physical and occupational therapy, speech therapy and medication for seizures. It is the most physically disabling of the autism spectrum disorders. There is no known cure for Rett Syndrome.

In 2008, researchers heralded a major breakthrough by reversing Rett Syndrome in mice models. The work of the IRSF (International Rett Syndrome Foundation) is to accelerate current ground breaking research that is making experts believe that Rett syndrome may be the first neurologic disorder to be reversed at any age, and may be the Rosetta stone to fighting monumental diseases like Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, Autism, and more. In addition, while IRSF funds research grants and important research symposia to bring this Research to Reality, they provide critical support and information to the families supporting their daughters with Rett Syndrome every day. Most of the research funding and family support provided by the foundation comes from fund raisers large and small held by parents and friends. "There is a cure for Rett syndrome. We are nearly there. And we will get to it, if we have the funding. In my own research, I am carrying out a project that is very cutting-edge. Funding from IRSF accelerates research at a pace that cannot be matched by the government." - Dr. Huda Zoghbi, Researcher for Rett Syndrome.

From this year's Rett Syndrome world conference held in New Orleans, Louisiana, there are 4,704 "known" cases in the United States. There are 235 "known" cases in Pennsylvania. The board has approved to go ahead with the second phase of human clinical trials.

Tony Stewart pulled off a victory in Saturday night's Coke Zero Sprint Cup race by making a stunning last-lap pass around Matt Kenseth.

"I wish I could explain it," said Stewart, who has five restrictorplate victories in Sprint Cup, with four coming at Daytona. "The great thing about restrictor-plate racing is that 43 cars all have the same shot at winning the race, but that's also part of what makes it frustrating, too. It's just being at the right place at the right time, and when those last two big wrecks happened, we were in the right spot. We were ahead of them both times."

Stewart took the lead on lap 131 after a multi-car accident in turn four and led for 21 laps before relinquishing the spot to the duo of Matt Kenseth and Greg Biffle on lap 152. When another massive crash set up a two-lap dash to the finish, Stewart regained the lead on the final lap with an impressive drive around Biffle and Kenseth off turn two and down the backstretch.

As Stewart and the leaders approached the finish line, a massive wreck broke out that claimed the cars driven by Jeff Gordon, Clint Bowyer, Kyle Busch, Marcos Ambrose, David Gilliland, David Ragan, Juan Montoya, and Trevor Bayne.

Jeff Burton finished behind Stewart in the runner-up spot as the race ended under caution, while Kenseth, Joey Logano and Ryan Newman rounded out the top-five. Carl Edwards, Kasey Kahne, Brad Keselowski, Michael Waltrip and Bobby Labonte comprised the remainder of the


