Classic Cool and Modern Muscle Fueled This Year's Wheels in the Grove

The sun was shining almost as brightly as the shiny and beautiful cars that lined Market Street in Selinsgrove for this year's Fifth Annual Wheels in the Grove. Held on Thursday, August 7, 2025, and hosted by Selinsgrove Rotary, this event sure brought out the people as it has gained in popularity and attendance each year. Rotarian, Tom Gates, said, "We came up with the idea to host

a car show towards the end of Covid as a fundraiser and to get the community out together. We originally had the idea of having it at the Selinsgrove Speedway, but it was quickly dismissed due to the dust. Then, we discussed closing down Market Street and having it downtown." He further stated that "we started with almost 100 cars the first year, and this year, we have 164."

I meandered down Selinsgrove's main drag checking out all of the vehicles. There was everything from classic Chevy SS muscle cars to sleek, new sports cars, to big pickups to registered antique timepieces. As an auto enthusiast myself, I find this event to continuously be one of my favorite nights of the year in Selinsgrove.

I spoke with Barry Thomas of Northumberland who was showing his 1941 Willy's Coupe which he has owned for about one year. We happened to be driving behind this beauty on the way to the event, and we were fascinated by the clean, smooth, dark red exterior which did not show any imperfections whatsoever. He said, "It's been a dream car of mine." He told me how it took him some time to save up the money, and he went to Connecticut to purchase it. He has done some work underneath it since he bought it, and when I asked how long he spends each week on keeping it clean, he stated, "I work on it almost every day, about fifteen hours a week. I pop the hood, polish it, and polish the wheels, and I buff it all the time

I walked away a fan of Barry Thomas's vehicle and also of his passion for keeping his Willy's Coupe pristine. I had to go back to inquire how he gets in his vehicle since there are no door handles. He told me, "I press a key fob, and the door pops open."

Jackson Sechler, Jr., of Winfield, entered his beautiful 1969 Chevy Corvette in the show, which he purchased brand new when he was sixteen years old for \$13,000. It now has 79,000 miles on it, and he enjoys bringing it out to shows to proudly share its gorgeousness with everyone in attendance. I asked him what shade of red his corvette is, and I found it interesting that he said, "It's a Chevy, but the color of it is called Mazda Red.

Dante Hornberger, of Middleburg, brought two of his vehicles to the show. One was a 2017 Ford Mustang which was a charcoal gray beast with the sleek body style that I like and looked like it probably had a nice growl when started up. It was immaculately kept and just an overall hot car in general. He also brought along his 2006 Ford F-250 Pickup which he has owned for about five years and purchased from his brother. I asked him if he had to pick one, which one of his two would he choose? He said, "The truck. It was my first

newer vehicle, and I like taking it to truck shows in Atlantic City and Carlisle."

I came across a 1946 Chevrolet Rat Rod owned by Jason Mitchell of Mifflinburg. This unique automobile has a custom frame, Chevy cab, a Ford drivetrain, and a whole lot of décor which adds to the feral personality of this vehicle. It has a bear paw, a stick shifter nearly as high as the ceiling's interior but is an automatic, and the widest tires I think I have ever seen at 22 inches wide. I would describe this vehicle's look as bada**, and it seems appropriate with the phrase, "Is there a problem officer?" painted directly above the driver's side door.

There were so many cool vehicles to see. This article would be ten pages long if I told you about each one, so I willtell you about a few more of my favorite noteworthy entries from the show. While I have seen Garrett Gelnett's 1982 Ford Econo-line Van in year's past, this van is just a whole vibe itself. It's decked out with a super cozy looking interior complete with a couch, boombox, framed erotic artwork on the interior wall, and even a disco ball. It is definitely the kind of van you don't want your daughter to get into.

Some of my other favorites were Northumberland resident, Gary's Brandt's white 1965 Ford Mustang with navy blue racing stripes down it, and Dan and Bonnie Aleta of Selinsgrove's 1957 Chevrolet Bel-Air, a true classic car and remarkably pristine engine, interior, and exterior. Pennsylvania antique historic vehicles were brought by Scherry and Travis Moore, of Selinsgrove, who showed their 1952 Studebaker Pickup Truck, and Jeff Bidelspach, of Sunbury, who showed his 1936 Ford Pickup which had a beautiful sea foam green and white custom paint job and a wood planked truck bed. Ronald Kline, of Winfield, displayed his 1951 Chevrolet 3100 truck and boasted a smooth black matte finish exterior. Winfield resident, Dean Wolfgang brought his 1973 glossy white Chevrolet Corvette, and Danielle Koreck, also of Winfield, showed off her hunter green 1960 Buick LeSabre. Harold Reich, of Sunbury, brought his 1932 Chevy Cabriolet Deluxe which was kept in near-perfect condition for being almost one hundred years old. Steve Reed, of Sunbury, brought his classic 1969 Ford Thunderbird. Tracey Miloro, of Selinsgrove, brought her hot pink 1986 Chevrolet Corvette which looked like it was plucked right out of the 80's and put on Market Street. Bradley Cromley, of Lewisburg, impressed with his classic black 1968 Chevrolet Chevelle muscle car.

I could go on because there were just that many awesome cars there. For now, I will tell you that if you didn't make it to this year's Wheels in the Grove, you missed out, because you won't see a better visual sea of the most immaculately kept vehicles in the heart of Selinsgrove any other day of the year. A big thank you goes out to this year's gold sponsors, Selinsgrove Ford, John Fischer, Tom and Anne Gates, Marty Blessing, Isabella's Restaurant, and State Farm Agent Chris Kenawell.







The MLB Little League Classic has been played every year since 2017 at Historic Bowman Field. This game has been a huge success. What a thrill for the Little Leaguers and their coaches! Watching the pros interact with the young players and slide down the hill at Lamade Stadium makes us all feel like kids again. Baseball has been and always will be a kid's

Did you know that Boog Powell was the first baseball player to play in both the Little League and Major League World Series? Ed Vosberg was the first to play in the Little, College and Major league World Series. He was followed by Jason Varitek and Michael Conforto as the only trio to complete this trifecta. Many of the kids that played in Williamsport will return

home and start football or soccer practice the next day. Others will continue playing baseball in a fall league. It seems more youth, both boys and girls are choosing to specialize in one When is the right time for your kid to play just one sport if

that is their choice? This is probably not as big of an issue in our rural area. Families and kids feel pressure to choose one sport to specialize in. It's very hard to walk into each season of a new sport and compete against kids who have been playing that sport all year. Back when I played a long time ago you walked off the foot-

ball field and onto the wrestling mat or basketball court. Then you and your friends played baseball, tennis or golf. Back then my school didn't have track & field or a soccer team. I believe playing more than just one sport will benefit you

in the long run. You learn mental toughness and dealing with failure in baseball. In basketball the pace is fast and defenders are in your face challenging you. Then there's football, it's hot, you're in pads and you're getting hit. You wake up sore and think there is no way you can

practice that day. Those two-a-day practices teach you toughness and perseverance. My most vivid and cherished memories of high school are those practices twice a day. There are two solutions or realities to all of this. Parents have to figure out if their goal is immediate, short-time results. If

your son or daughter is 11 or 12 years old and maybe not as good as others, they commit to one sport and get good quicker. The question is, is their ceiling at 17 going to be as high as a singular sport teenager than it would have been if they exposed themselves to other sports along the way? I think it is good to

be exposed to different lessons, coaching styles and teammates as often as you can. Are we raising our twelve year old to be a professional athlete or a professional person? Expose your kids to as many different sports and activities as possible at a young age. Teach them how to compete and

the value of failure. Some kids have never experienced failure. I've always said I wanted my kids to start experiencing failure when they still came home to mom and dad instead of later in life. We can help them develop skill sets for dealing with You don't want anyone to lose and you don't want someone

to show up and not care to win. They need a winning approach Some people will do anything to win. Being a 'Michigan

Man' takes on a whole new meaning this week. Add liar, cheater and stealer to those traits. This is a program that used to levitate above the rest of college football with an inflated ego. Their aura was blown up by doing things the right way or 'The Michigan Way' will forever be remembered as a cheat.

Michigan was caught stealing signs by filming opponents' sidelines during games to decode their signals. The program was also found to have engaged in impermissible recruiting and communications. The NCAA penalties for Michigan did not come close to

matching the transgressions. Basically it was nothing more than a \$30M fine which a deep pocketed booster can take care of with the stroke of a pen. There were no wins and scholarships taken away and they still keep their national championship from 2023. Shame on the NCAA.

der three years probation. Two of the eight recruits involved signed on at Fordham and were later deemed ineligible after enrollment. Talk about double standards! The NCAA should be disbanded because of their feckless management.

Who is the only baseball team not to be swept in a series this year? Let's hope Phils starting pitcher Zach Wheeler recovers completely from his blood clot procedure, both for his health and for the Phillies chance to win the World Series. Speaking of recovering from a procedure...Eagle's guard Landon Dickerson showed up with beers to share with his teammates a couple days after having knee surgery.

The Big Ten is talking about expanding the college football

Dale-Engle-Walker House Tour on August 24 at 2 pm



The Dale-Engle-Walker historic site, located at 1471 Strawbridge Road, Lewisburg, PA 17837 will be open for a tour on Sun-day, August 24 at 2 pm. Guide Bill Brobst will discuss the architecture of the house and its history.

The house was built c. 1793 by immigrant Samuel Dale (1741-1804). The Dale family continued owning the farm, while renting it out to tenant farmers, until 1929. The Engles operated a dairy and vegetable farm in the 1930s and '40s. The Walkers updated the house and farm and bequeathed the property to the Union County Historical Society.

This historic site includes the c. 1789 Kantz log cabin, a frontier trading cabin from the Tuscarora Indian Path at Middlecreek, donated to the society and reassembled at the Dale-Engle-Walker site. Also on site is the Engle's milk house and the wagon shed with early farm imple-


July 16, 2025 – Rotary International's July Theme is Maternal and Child's Health Month. Our guests were Ruth Ortiz, who works for Tapestry for Health, Women Infant and Children (WIC) Program since 2006 as a Client Assistant and since 2021 as a Bilingual Community Health worker. She helps clients in their women's health services and the Dental Smiles program. Robin Johnson, who works with Ruth, is a Nutrition Assistant. She has been with the WIC program for 37 years. She works with families to address their needs and well-being. The WIC program is part of the Family Health Council of Central PA. Collectively, the Tapestry of Health WIC Programs serve over 12,000 participants monthly providing: Comprehensive nutrition screening, one-on-one counseling and educational services, breastfeeding education and support, supplemental food vouchers, referrals, and free nutrition information. July 23, 2025 – The Food Hub is a program within the Union-Snyder Community Action Agency. The agency works to provide solutions for food insecurity throughout Union and Snyder Counties. It provides emergency food programs including shelf-stable items, fresh foods, and prepared meals. The Food Hub accepts donations from individuals, organizations, and retail stores which can be redistributed to a network of food programs. Through a partnership with the Miller Center (Lewisburg), it delivers programs with specific targeted purposes providing access to nutritious foods and education to the community. Their programs target kids through adults. In 2024, they served 2,360 households with 14,076 services or 34,633 pounds of food.
