## New Events for Union **County Historical Society**

New events have just been planned for the Union County Historical Society's 18th-Century farm property. Rural Heritage Days will move to Saturday, July 12th in 2014 and will be held the second Saturday of July thereafter. The activities of "Children's Day" like the well-loved games, animal exhibits, corn dolly making, and pony rides, will be added to next year's Saturday agenda.

The Rural Heritage Day theme for 2014 will be "Learning' and will highlight apprenticeships; the traditions of passing down information by word of mouth and example; one-room school education and early academies; Chautauqua tent gatherings that came to the area and fairs; early Sunday school organizations as well as major institutions of learning such as New Berlin's Union Seminary and Central College. The "Learning" theme will be carried out in many ways at Rural Heritage Days including an exhibit at the Dale/Engle/Walker House in the summer and fall months of 2014. One factor in making the date change is that many of Rural Heritage Days student interns are called back to pre-fall school programs and are having a harder time participating in the popular mid-August event, according to event chair, Deb Wehr.

The current exhibits at the Dale house include an extensive one on "18th-20th-century water-powered gristmills in Union County" and a special "Bicentennial exhibit on items from the coun-ty's first century." The house is open Sunday afternoons through October. The first tour starts at 2 PM and the last tour at 3:30 PM.

## Origins of Snyder County and the **Bicentennial of Union County**

In 1855, Snyder County was drawn from Union County. This division is the subject of a talk commemorating the bicentennial of Union County by Dr. Donald Housley, Professor Emeritus of History at Susquehanna University and President of the Snyder County Historical Society. The talk is entitled "The Origins of Snyder County in the Political Culture of the 1850s." In the 1850s political life revolved around the Whig and Democratic parties, local newspapers voicing party opinions and direct action measures such as petitions and mass meetings, both of which presented the opinions of voters and swayed elected officials. Each of these influenced the vote for Division of Old Union County which took place in 1855. This vote was initiated by the aspirations of residents in the eastern reaches of Old Union County and shaped by opposition to these aspirations by those in its western sections. A significant influence on this political event was the existence of "southern" and "northern" districts in the County which formed

The Poetry Path was started last year by the Stadler Center for Poetry as a way to showcase modern poetry and make it a part of everyday life. A new section of poetry is opened each August. The Stadler Center Staff also offers group tours of the Poetry Path as well, for those interested.

At around 5:45 PM, Americana/Folk band trio, Red Molly, took the stage at the Weis Center plaza. Attendees enjoyed and spoke highly of the performance. There was also a street festival on South Fourth Street, and the Campus Theatre put on a showing of "Oliver" (An adaption of Charles Dickens classic) for 10 cents for children and 25 cents for adults. Many other events were held over the course of the weekend to continue the celebrations.

The economy is picking up steam in Lewisburg. After all, a college town depends on the college students for its revenue. Now that the students have returned, the businesses and eating establishments are once again thriving.

> Baptism: a rite of washing with water as a sign of religious purification and consecration. Christians use baptism as a sign that they are set apart for God's use. Some people are submerged entirely under water while others have water sprinkled on their heads. Baptism is often described as an outward profession of an inward possession.

> On Sunday, at around 2:30 PM, New Hope Bible Church of Mifflinburg held a baptism service at a cabin in the Millmont area. They used Penn's Creek for the ceremony. Six people were baptized while six others helped with the service by offering prayers and performing the baptisms. The afternoon itself was humid and hot, but the skies were clear, and there was little threat of rain

> Reverend Richard VonNeida, who performed the baptisms. shared with me, "At New Hope, we believe in the sacraments of baptism and communion." A sacrament is a religious ceremony that is used to show an outward and visible sign of inward and spiritual divine grace. "Baptism is really a holy sacrament much like communion. We do it to glorify God. There are a lot of people out there that believe in baptizing babies, but we don't. We believe in dedicating children, but baptism has to be a choice. Some people think that salvation comes through bap tism, but that isn't the case. If you're baptized a sinner, you'll come right back up as a sinner." The Bible says the only way to be saved, forgiven of your sins, and spend an eternity in heaven is to accept Jesus Christ. Jesus said in John 14:6, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." (NIV) The Bible also says in Ephesians 2:8, "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God-"(NIV). According to the Bible, a person can't do anything good enough to be saved they just need to confess their sins to God, ask for forgiveness, and accept Jesus. The Bible says that salvation is a gift.

> Pastor Richard VonNeida continued, "It is a decision that Christians need to make on their own. But what a wonderful choice it is to make! You are dedicating your life to serving God. I've heard of some Christians being afraid of water, and so they won't get baptized. But you don't need to be completely submerged to be baptized. We can just sprinkle water on a person for baptism." Indeed, one person was baptized on Sunday by having the water sprinkled on them instead of being submerged. Reverend VonNeida added, "I love what Galatians 3:27 says, 'for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ.' (NIV) When we are saved and we are baptized in Christ, we are clothed with Christ."

#### **Origin of the PA-German Dialect**

The Pennsylvania-Germans have a language of their own. It may sound odd to some who have the notion that it is but a poor patois that these people employ. Well, hardly. The "dialect" spoken antedates the High German of Martin Luther's day and It was the latter who gave the "High" Gen rangement language definite standing in literature and in commerce. Even before Luther the people of South Germany had a dialect which had then been in local use for many generations. It was in the country bordering on the Rhine from Switzerland to Coblenz that the early émigrés originated, landing eventually in America.

That these people cling to the dialect is not strange. Peoples of all, or most of races, cling to their lore and customs, and while the Pennsylvania-Germans use English with ease, they find themselves often reverting to their mother tongue.

Chonnie: The pick (pig) is out. Quick ve must chase him to da pen pack. You run down dis site of da fence, und I run down da odder. Da pick, he comes pack up. Meppe (perhaps) bose sides of da fence.

The Pennsylvania Germans may revert to their mother tongue, but this can be rather general, for among their numbers there are a large number of Swiss Mennonites, whose early origins are perhaps in some doubt. Also French Huguenots, who are as much at home in the employment of dialect German, as those generally identified as the more or less pure Germans who came here before the Revolution and who helped a great deal to make this country the home of the free-we hope-for all time.

In passing, it may be said with interest to the reader, that of practically all Europeans who came to settle in America in the early days, the Germans alone had no governmental support or backing in colonizing.

Had German authorities given their émigrés some real encouragement in the establishment of communities and enterprise, reporting to Germany, there might have been a different story to American history? As it developed, a Pennsylvania-German's vote decided that the official language in his state should be English! Early German stock and its off-spring far and wide in America have been one of our greatest sustaining influences.

Couldn't get it turning, burned the right rear off and kept battling through that and then we had to go to the rear with about 100 to go and really thought we were in big trouble, but we were able to fight up through there and figured out what our car needed towards the end. We were probably one or two adjustments away from having something for Joey and Kyle.'

The remaining top-10 finishers were: Kurt Busch, Ryan Newman, Jeff Gordon, Juan Montoya, Dale Earnhardt Jr. Kevin Harvick, and Brian Vickers.

While some drivers were able to persevere, bad racing luck and/or engine problems plagued several, including Jimmie Johnson and Brad Keselowski.



## Nursing Home Residents Move To New Home; Dedication Set

Nursing care and rehabilitation residents at Buffalo Valley utheran Village are now living in their new home.

Earlier this month, staff members of the Lewisburg Diakon senior living community—along with transportation and related assistance from staff colleagues from numerous other Diakon senior living centers—relocated 94 residents from the village's old nursing care center to a new health care center, constructed behind and attached to the community's personal care center.

The move of residents went extremely well and was accom plished in just one morning," says Jeanne Oski, vice presiden for Diakon Senior Living Services. Busses from the Buffalo Valley village and a number of other Diakon senior living com munities, as well as an ambulance from a local EMS company transported nursing care and rehabilitation residents the short distance across campus to the recently completed, two-story health care center.

The new center features a neighborhood concept, which cre ates a more homelike and less "institutional" aspect. The building consists of five neighborhoods, four residential and one devoted to short-term rehabilitation. Each includes a private country kitchen and common living area. The design is such that even shared suites have enhanced privacy, because the bathroom area separates the two beds. The concept will allow Buffalo Valley staff members to emphasize patient-centered care

The building provides 102 beds of nursing care in a mix of private and shared accommodations, with 22 of the private rooms dedicated to short-term rehabilitation services. The new center also features a state-of-the-art, 1,900-square-foot physical therapy suite to assist residents with rehabilitation.

The former nursing care center, built in 1968, will eventually be demolished for parking.

The new health care center will be dedicated at a 5 to 7 p.m. Sept. 17, event.

They, as part of their freshmen orientation at Susquehanna University, came to volunteer their time on Saturday, August 24 at Penns Creek Adult Resource Center located at 3551 Richard Road in Penns Creek. The students were part of the Susquehanna University: Get Into Volunteer Experiences(SU GIVE) which has become a tradition for a number of years. The students weeded gardens, cleaned chairs, tables, hosed off the porch area, carried many boxes and items out to the shed from one of the rooms in the building, shoveled stones and cleaned up debris of various bushes around the building from trimming.

The Small Business Development Center at Bucknell Univer-sity is one of six in a 14-county area involved in the Operation Disaster Resiliency project, funded by the U.S. Economic Development Administration.

Operation Disaster Resiliency provides the resources for SBDC consultants to advise small firms on business disruption and continuity planning to help them weather natural disasters and other business interruptions.

The project was launched as a result of the damage to businesses in Central and Northeastern Pennsylvania from Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee in August and September of 2011. The two storms dumped more than 15 inches of rain on the area leading to the closing of hundreds of roads, forcing evacuation for thousands of people, and leaving many business owners with varying degrees of damage and millions of dollars in losses.

As a result, more than 94,000 people applied for Federal Emergency Management Agency disaster assistance and more than \$98 million in disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) have been approved.

"EDA's investment is providing invaluable assistance to Pennsylvania businesses, and is an excellent example of the Obama administration's commitment to helping communities rebuild and recover in the wake of natural disasters," said Deputy Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development Matt Erskine

"The resources being made available will help ensure the economic vitality of countless businesses in Pennsylvania and the communities that depend on them.'

Outreach and consulting under this project will be open to any businesses within the 14-county area that was hit the hardest during Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee.

The Bucknell University SBDC will serve clients in Northumberland and Perry counties.

This program is meant to educate small business owners on ways that they can put business disruption and continuity plans in place for the future," said Pennsylvania SBDC State Director Christian Conroy. "One issue that became very apparent when working with many of the companies impacted by the flooding of 2011 was their lack of a redundant back-up of critical business information and a plan to use technology to continue operations independent of their business's physical location," he added.

Education on cloud-based software, mobile-ready strategies and ways to optimize a company's online presence are a key part of the business disruption consulting being offered by the SBDC. Businesses will be able to build web strategies from personalized consulting on search engine optimization (SEO), eCommerce and other ways to bolster their online sales to help supplement their local in-person sales. Business owners will also be encouraged to develop mobile-ready strategies to be able to work remotely and communicate with staff during an emergency situation.

The SBDC is also working to better prepare businesses for future interruptions through the development of business disruption and continuity plans, advice on acquiring capital (before and after a disruption) and helping companies diversify their revenue streams through new markets. Businesses will be advised to explore their growth potential through expanding their sales online, abroad or with the government to encourage customer and supplier variation to better weather future disasters.

Small businesses located in Bradford, Dauphin, Columbia, Lancaster, Lebanon, Luzerne, Lycoming, Northumberland, Perry, Sullivan, Susquehanna, Tioga, York and Wyoming counties are encouraged to contact their local SBDC to find out more about business disruption and continuity planning strategies for their business.
