Deadly Bus Crash Closes I-80 West



Police are currently investigating a fatal crash involving a charter bus and a tractor trailer. The accident occurred at approximately 1:41 a.m. October 9, 2013, on Interstate 80 (I-80), at mile marker 206, in White Deer Township, in Union County. At this time few details are known.

A woman was killed and 44 others were hurt when the bus slammed into the back of the tractor trailer. The driver of the tractor trailer was not injured.

There were 49 passengers on the bus which was traveling from New York City to Ohio. 44 people were transported to five area hospitals for treatment. Those hospitals include Evangelical Community Hospital, Muncy Valley Hospital, Williamsport Regional Medical Center, Geisinger Medical Center, and Lock Haven Hospital.

Geisinger Medical Center, in Danville, treated 17 patients: four were listed in critical condition; two in serious condition; and 11 in fair condition. Evangelical Community Hospital treated 14 patients.

Interstate 80 remained closed as cleanup began.

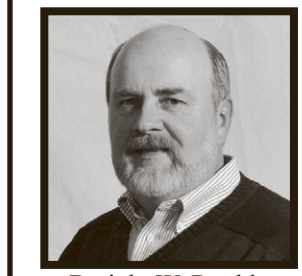

The Union County Farm Bureau held its annual meeting at Christ's United Lutheran Church (4-Bells Church), Millmont on October 7. Levere Hook, Union County Farm Bureau President called the meeting to order, leading a salute to the flag, and introducing Jim Brubaker who gave the invocation. A dinner was served by the members of the church. The business meeting was held with a officers nomination report by Chairman Gary Pflieger. Susan Hauck, Sherry Brouse, and Jason Wolfe were elected as new board members. Gary Pflieger presented a list of resolutions to be considered at the state-wide meeting in November. The following were voted on and approved.

- # We recommend that the state board of directors develop a minimum 5 to 10 minute Agri-clutural lessons to be used at local fairs and community events for the mobile science Ag lab program.
- # At the national level, we recommend that raw milk sales be legal in the U.S., After dairy farms are state inspected
- # At the state level we recommend the uniform construction code 403121 be changed to exempt small businesses, which are less than 2500 square feet or less, and not to exceed an average of 25 vehicle traffic per day.
- # At the local level we recommend only local township residents be allowed to speak at local government meetings, unless qualified as a professional expert.
- # Also at the local level we recommend union county farm bureau research the viability of a local agricultural plaster drop-off location.

Johanna Rohrer, Region 2 Organizational Director, gave a brief presentation on regional farm bureau efforts including the 2014 "Face" Conference to be held at Bucknell University. "Face" is a program designed to orient high school youth about farm bureau and agriculture in Pennsylvania.

Delegates to the Statewide Annual Farm Bureau Conference were also selected by the board. The following will be attending the conference in November: Levere Hook, Jim Brubaker, Matt Temple, Mike Platt, Guy Ulrich, and Harold Fogel.

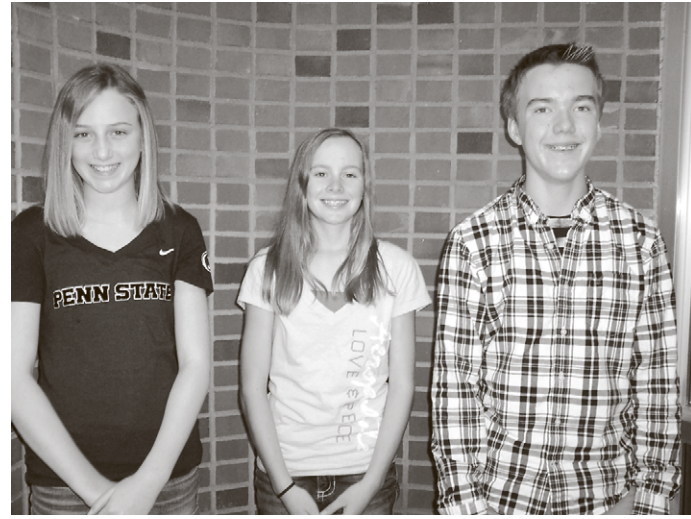

Can Cancer Reduce Alzheimer's Risk?

Q. My 84-year-old mother is being treated for breast cancer. Our family has a history of Alzheimer's disease as well. It will be so difficult if she develops this disease in addition to her other health problems. What will we do?

Don't assume that just because others in her family developed this disease that your mother will too. And as far as the cancer goes, some related findings may interest you.

Most kinds of cancer are associated with a significantly decreased risk of Alzheimer's disease, according to a study of 3.5 million veterans reported at the Alzheimer's Association International Conference 2013 in Boston. This study also suggested that chemotherapy treatment for almost all of those cancers conferred an additional decrease in Alzheimer's risk.

Laura Frain, M.D., a geriatrician at VA Boston Healthcare System, and colleagues analyzed the health records of veterans 65 and older who were seen in the VA health care system between 1996 and 2011 and who were free of dementia at the time.

The researchers found that most types of cancer were associated with reduced Alzheimer's risk, ranging from 9 percent to 51 percent. Reduced risk was greatest among survivors of liver cancer (51 percent lower risk), cancer of the pancreas (44 percent), cancer of the esophagus (33 percent), myeloma (26 percent), lung cancer (25 percent) and leukemia (23 percent).

Cancers that did not confer a reduced Alzheimer's risk, or were associated with an increased risk, included melanoma, prostate and colorectal cancers.

The researchers found no association between cancer history and reduced risk of any other typical age-related health issue. In fact, cancer was associated with an increased risk of stroke, osteoarthritis, cataracts and macular degeneration. Most cancer survivors were also at increased risk for non-Alzheimer's dementia.

"Together, these findings indicate that the protective relationship between most cancers and Alzheimer's disease is not simply explained by increased mortality among cancer patients," Frain said. "More research is needed to determine if these results have therapeutic implications for Alzheimer's."

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Older Adults May Need Help to Age in Place

Q. My husband and I raised our family in the middle-class neighborhood of a medium-sized rural town. We still live in the same house and hope to until we die or can no longer stay here without help. We are concerned, though, as crime seems to be cropping up more and more in the neighborhood. We are thinking of moving – especially since we are in our late 70s and it's getting harder to do things around the house, but we don't really want to go. We love our neighborhood. Any suggestions?

Unfortunately, the web of crime has inched into the suburbs of America, according to a recent report. The report concluded that in the U.S., cities are a safer place to live than are the suburbs or rural communities. In addition, seniors in rural areas appear to be more vulnerable to homicide risk.

The new study overturning the common belief that cities are the most dangerous communities in America appears online in the Annals of Emergency Medicine.

Findings from the study conducted by the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania and the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia support prior work showing that overall homicide rates are lower in rural areas than urban areas. This was found to be true in all age groups, except the oldest adults (over 65 years old).

One program that has a proven track record of success is Neighborhood Watch. Why not talk with a few neighbors. If things have changed in your neighborhood and you are concerned, others are likely worried as well.

When you get a group together, talk with your neighborhood city or village council representative as well as your local police or sheriff's department. They should have information about how to start a watch program or can help you get the resources you need.

It's amazing the difference a few neighbors standing together against crime can make in a community.

In the meantime, why not look into a little extra help around the house. There's no reason why you should need to leave home.

Short Exercise Stints Can Benefit Seniors

Q. I love to walk to stay fit, but I can't seem to interest my 89-year-old husband in doing any physical activity, even though he is still fairly mobile. He said that to have any benefit from exercise, you have to "really hit it hard," and he's just not willing to do that. Is there any way I could change his mind?

It can be difficult to convince older adults that there is any benefit to exercise. But interesting new research shows it's the quality not the quantity that counts.

While seniors do need at least 150 minutes (two hours and a half) a week of moderate-intensity aerobic activity, like a brisk walk, it makes no difference how they achieve this goal. A study from Queen's University says a series of smaller efforts during the week is just as beneficial as one big effort.

The research by Ian Janssen and graduate student Janine Clarke studied 2,324 adults from across Canada to determine whether the frequency of physical activity throughout the week is associated with risk factors for diabetes, heart disease and stroke.

Although those in the study ranged from age 18 through 64 – no seniors 65 and older – researchers infer that the study will apply to seniors as it does other adults.

"The findings indicate that it does not matter how adults choose to accumulate their 150 weekly minutes of physical activity," Dr. Janssen said.

"We know 150 minutes each week sounds like a lot of time, but it's not. That's two hours and 30 minutes, about the same amount of time you might spend watching a movie. The good news is that you can spread your activity out during the week, so you don't have to do it all at once."

Did your husband enjoy activity in his younger years? Why not try to interest him in a variation of what he liked to do then? For example, if he had a big garden, put tomato plants and herbs in pots around his garden that he could walk around and care for. It's a start.

KANSAS CITY, Kan.—Kevin Harvick started on the pole in Sunday's Sprint Cup race, led the most laps, and crossed the stripe 2.4-seconds ahead of Kurt Busch.

"These guys did a great job all weekend," said Harvick. "From the first practice I knew we had a great race car. The only times I had problems was when we got stuck in traffic. Then, it was tight. Once I got to the front, I knew nobody was going to catch us."

Kurt Busch, the second-place finisher began the race from the 41st starting position, because his team made changes to his car after qualifying. At one point, he was two laps down, but rallied to finish as the runner-up.

"Well, we had a good race, but I sure wish we could have passed Harvick. "That would have made it a great day."

Jeff Gordon, the third-place finisher had a discussion with Busch after the race ended.

"This was one of our better days," said Gordon. "Restarts are always tough. On that last one I had a little problem with Kurt, about the way he drove me. But it wouldn't be a NASCAR race if there wasn't these little disagreements and discussions."

Joey Logano was fourth, followed by Carl Edwards, Jimmie Johnson, Paul Menard, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Marcos Ambrose, and Aric Almirola.

Kyle Busch had three spinouts, and finished 34th.

Busch had a problem on the very first lap, and had to pit several times under caution for his team to make repairs and adjustments.

During lap 186 of the 267-lap race, Busch was nudged in the left rear quarter panel by Juan Montoya and spun out.

On lap 201 he was bumped from behind. This time he hit the outside wall very hard and was finished for the day.

He dropped from third to fifth in Chase points.

There was a record 15 cautions.

Matt Kenseth won Saturday's Nationwide Series race at Kansas Speedway, but it was Kyle Busch and Brad Keselowski that provided the most entertainment in a wild race that saw 11 caution periods in the 200 lap race.

Kenseth took the lead with 34 laps remaining, and went on to victory by nearly a second ahead of Paul Menard. It was Kenseth's second Nationwide win of the season and 28th of his career.

Keselowski gained the lead on lap 151, but lost it to Kenseth 15 laps later. While Kenseth and Keselowski were running 1-2, Kyle Busch slipped into the third spot. Kenseth was able to pull away, while Keselowski and Busch started battling each other.

Busch tried going under Keselowski several times, but was unable to make the pass. The pair raced bumper to bumper for several laps, with Busch unable to get by.

As the leaders entered turn-2 during lap 187, Busch was right on Keselowski's rear bumper. There was contact between Busch's No. 54 and Keselowski's No. 22, and Keselowski slid into the outside wall.

Kyle Busch continued on.

Keselowski's car would not restart, and he was out of the race. "I got wrecked by a dirty driver," said Keselowski. "There's no other way of putting it. I have raced him really cool over the past year to be respectful and try to repair our relationship."

"He put me in the fence during the Chicago truck race. It's not going to last. I can tell you that. I feel sorry for his guys that are going to have to fix all his stuff."

"Now we're at war."

Kyle Busch said he did not have a plan to wreck Keselowski. "It was hard racing," said Busch. "There were several times I felt a little crowded, but the contact was because I got tight off the turn. I got too tight, got inside and just got too close and spun him out."

"Brad Keselowski knows what dirty drivers are because he's

done it plenty of times. I have yet to wreck a person on purpose."

Paul Menard finished second, followed by Regan Smith, Kyle Busch, Justin Allgaier, Austin Dillon, Parker Kligerman, Brad Sweet, Trevor Bayne, and Elliott Sadler.

NASCAR'S OLDEST DRIVER CALLS IT QUILTS

James Hylton, NASCAR's rookie of the year in 1966 has hung up his driving helmet. At the age of 79 years old, he was the oldest driver to race in each of NASCAR's three highest divisions. Hylton called it a career after Friday night's ARCA Series race at Kansas.

Hylton was one of thirteen children who grew up on a farm and became obsessed with racing. He had no plans, no funds and no backing in racing. All of his experience was on the family farm.

From 1959-63, he prepared cars for Rex White, helping White to the 1960 Grand National title. In 1964-65, Hylton served as crew chief for Ned Jarrett, and Jarrett won the series title in '65.

Hylton got his chance in 1964, making three starts in Jarrett's back-up car. The 30 year old driver grabbed 20 top-5s in 41 starts. He finished second in points behind David Pearson and was the hands-down choice as Rookie of the Year. He ran the whole season with one car and one engine; he never crashed or blew an engine during that period.

His consistency in the point standing between 1966 and 1975 was surpassed by only Richard Petty's average finish of 2.2. Hylton averaged 4.0 easily topping David Pearson, Cale Yarborough and Bobby Allison.

So why isn't James Hylton's name known more these days? Simple, he didn't get enough wins. In 601 starts he had only two wins, Richmond in 1970 and Talladega in 1972.

"If I'd gotten some help, I feel like I could have run with anybody," he said. "If I'd had some financial backing where we could have hired people to let me concentrate on racing, I feel I could have driven with anybody. I'm not too happy with NASCAR for not supporting the independent drivers. Not only me, there were a dozen independent drivers who could have been winners if they'd had some financial help."

"I know it wasn't NASCAR's responsibility to see that everybody's got the best of the best. But I know there were opportunities there, that with a little bit of coaching from NASCAR, they could have shoved a little sponsorship our way, but they never did."

"I have a little resentment there, because I feel like I was left out, not because of a lack of ability or a lack of working myself to death. It was all a financial deal."

Dealing with the Stink Bug Infestation

Chances are that you've probably noticed a new pest increasing its numbers over recent years. The brown marmorated stink bug has received its name from the rancid odor it emits from the thorax when disturbed, threatened, or, yes, killed. The odor it emits is its main defense mechanism. Many curious children have stomped the bug to see if they really would smell. They soon realize the bugs do indeed stink as they cover their faces in disgust and pinch their noses shut.



Stink bugs hail from the family of insects called Pentatomidae, and are about half an inch to an inch in length, green or brown in color, and are either triangular or semi-elliptical in shape. This family of insects is sometimes also referred to as shield bugs because their body does provide a defensive shield against predators. The bug is native to Korea and Taiwan, but was accidentally introduced to U.S. soil, with the first documented specimen being collected in September of 1998 in Allentown, PA. It is an agricultural pest, and since 2010 has become a season long pest in some U.S. orchards. The population has dramatically increased and has now spread across to over 40 states and continues to increase at a rather alarming rate. Some theorize this rapid population growth can be attributed to an unusually warm and early Spring and Summer back in 2010 that allowed the bugs to produce two additional generations. Stink bugs typically had four generations per growing season in Asia, and one after being transported to America, but the warmer climate allowed them to add in two more generations in certain regions. This has allowed the adults to live longer, deposit more eggs, and mature longer to deposit even more eggs. Whatever the cause, chances are you have noticed an increased number of the bugs near your house as of late.

The main problem with stink bugs seems to be that they are attacking orchards around Pennsylvania. The bugs pierce the surface of the fruit to suck out juices while injecting their own saliva. This causes a sort of dimpling on the fruits surface, and a rotting underneath. The fruit cannot be sold due to its appearance, although the infested area is not poisonous to humans. In fact, in some parts of the world, stink bugs are actually considered to be a delicacy. But, in America, the stink bug is also known to attack and harm many plants, such as tomatoes, lima beans, and sweet corn. However, fruit shows the damage much more quickly, so orchard owners need to monitor their plants more carefully. In large numbers, their effects can be devastating.

If you don't own a farm or orchard, odds are the bugs still annoy you. They are unsightly, and if you are anything like me you do not want bugs inside of your house. I've heard many people complaining in the area lately that the bugs seem to be finding their way into the houses. I've heard some people have found as many as ten of the bugs in their house in one day. Some people claim to find even more. This is because the bug hibernates in the winter and invades homes in the Fall, where the temperature does not drop as dramatically. They may hibernate in homes, but the warmth will usually cause them to become active.

So the main question is then: How do we get rid of the little buggers? Answer: Not very easily. As one terminator explained to me, "We normally spray surfaces, the bugs crawl through the areas we spray and then they clean themselves and ingest the chemicals, which kill them. The problem with stink bugs is they don't clean themselves often, so it takes much longer to kill them. Even if you directly spray them, they still won't necessarily die because they don't clean themselves. And by the time they do clean themselves, the chemicals could have already washed off." Even spraying the surfaces of fruit won't necessarily work because the bug inserts its proboscis below the surface of the fruit. Thankfully, there are signs of some of our own native species such as wasps and birds adapting to and feeding on their new prey and food source. So, after a bit of further research, I discovered a few ways to deal with the pesky menace:

1. Completely seal up cracks. If you have any cracks or openings in your home, close them off. Don't leave windows open. Don't leave doors open. It's not the easiest solution, but it is the only way to keep the bugs out. They will look to find tiny cracks and enter through into your home. Common entry points are under sidings, windows, door frames, chimneys, and into soffits. So try to seal up any cracks you can find. As an added benefit, your home will be more energy efficient as well.

2. If you find them in your home, don't kill them! They really do stink. Even just handling them or moving them can cause them to release the odor. Even vacuuming them up may cause the vacuum to have an unpleasant odor for a while. Instead, gently pick it up with a tissue and flush it down the toilet or drop it into a cup of soapy water. You can also close it off in a container of some sort and dispose of it. If you let it back outside, chances are it will just fly back and reenter your home from the opening it found before.

Linn Conservancy Celebrates 25th Birthday



The Merrill W. Linn Land & Waterways Conservancy will celebrate its 25th anniversary on Saturday, October 19, from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Campus Theatre in Lewisburg. Reptiland's Clyde Peeling will present a special program on native species in the Central Susquehanna Valley. He will also introduce the Conservancy's new Linking Landscapes Initiative, which seeks to enhance the resilience of natural areas and slow the loss of biodiversity in our region through habitat connectivity. The afternoon event is open to the public—young and old alike.

The celebration begins at 1 p.m. with light refreshments in the Campus Theatre mezzanine where guests can view displays illustrating the conservation successes of the Linn Conservancy and its subsidiary organization, Buffalo Creek Watershed Alliance. Other exhibits will honor landowners who have permanently protected land that provides critical wildlife habitat through conservation easements with the Linn Conservancy.

Live, local species of amphibians, turtles and other reptiles will be on display in the theatre with Mizuki Takahashi and Tristan Stayton from Bucknell University's Biology Department on hand to answer questions. More than 100 school students from elementary through middle schools in the region have submitted posters highlighting the Linking Landscapes theme. These will be on display throughout the theatre.

Presentations will begin at 1:30 p.m. with the introduction of special guests, followed by Mr. Peeling's presentation emphasizing the ecological lessons most crucial to the Conservancy's new initiative. After the presentation, the Conservancy's birthday cake and punch will be served in the theatre mezzanine.

The Linn Conservancy, along with Buffalo Creek Watershed Alliance, will work in partnership with state, county and local governments, conservation groups, land trusts, businesses, community groups, youth groups and individuals to advance the Linking Landscapes initiative. Keller Supports School Property Tax Reform Measure

Rep. Fred Keller (R-85th District) voted to pass House Bill 1189, enabling school districts to assess alternative taxes as a means of reducing or eliminating property taxation.

"Across the Commonwealth, property taxes levied by school boards are putting seniors and working Pennsylvanians out of their homes," lamented Keller. "Educating our children is vitally important, but there is a tremendous injustice occurring when those of America's Greatest Generation are being forced from their homes because they cannot pay their ever-increasing property taxes."

House Bill 1189 will give school districts the ability to eliminate property taxes in favor of implementing an additional earned income tax, mercantile tax or business privilege tax. Revenues generated will be used on a dollar-for-dollar basis to reduce the school district property taxes.

"While school districts and special interests will use catchy phrases to try to deceptively argue in favor of raising taxes, they forget that every dollar collected in taxes is first taken from a fellow Pennsylvanian," said Keller. "Spending decisions are made locally by school boards and directly impact the lives of the taxpayers in their district. Regardless of how taxes are collected, taxpayers will not see true relief until school districts get their spending under control."

The Pennsylvania Partners in the Arts is made possible through a regional partnership between Community Partnerships RC&D and the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts.

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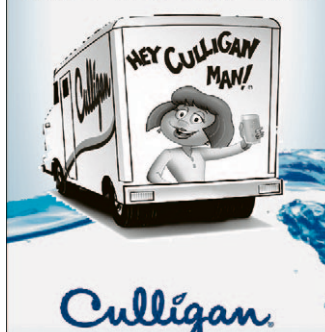


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
