Mifflinburg Police Department Awarded Funds for Safety Upgrades

local police have the tools and resources they need to do their jobs safely and efficiently," Sen. Yaw said. "I'm pleased to have secured this funding for Mifflinburg Police Department and I'm proud to support their ongoing efforts to keep the borough and surrounding communities

The award will help the department strengthen public safety and modernize local law enforcement operations. The new technology is designed to improve officer safety and enhance the department's ability to respond quickly and effectively to criminal activity.


The monies were used to purchase four new body cameras and 3 new mobile video recorders (in-car cameras) which are equipped with Automated License Plate Reader software. The systems were purchased from Axon, Inc. which is also the manufacturer of Taser. The cost covers

full service, support and upgrades over the next 10 years.
According to Chief Hackenburg, "The body cameras include features that are more user friendly, allowing police to share footage with prosecutors, have a wider field of view, and have remote viewing, which allows administrators to view officers' body cameras live. Additionally, the system automatically makes all nearby body cameras begin recording if an officer activates their taser.

In addition, the new car cameras, in use since September, are mounted above a police car's dashboard and automatically scan license plates, alerting officers if a vehicle comes back as expired, suspended, uninsured, or wanted/ stolen. This means officers no longer need to manually input plate numbers into their computer.

"This investment has given us valuable tools we use daily to serve our community more effectively, while also enhancing the safety of our officers," said Chief Jeffrey Hackenburg. "We're incredibly grateful to Sen. Yaw for securing this funding and for his continued support of local law enforcement."

Both Bama and A&M will be in the college playoffs which begin December 19th. Signing Day for incoming high school seniors is December 3rd. The bigger issue is the transfer portal which is only open from January 2nd to the 16th. The CFB championship game is 1/19/26.

This is why I believe Louisville's Jeff Brohm or Missouri's Eli Drinkwitz will be Penn State's next coach as I doubt either school will make the playoffs. Penn State will have to replace 55 to 70 players from this year's roster and the portal will be the best way to stay relevant for next year. Many high school seniors have already decommitted their verbal pledge after James Franklin was dismissed. Franklin will also poach players from the roster that still have playing eligibility, wherever he ends up coaching.

Penn State could bite the bullet and write next season off to get one of their two top guys they really want. Don't expect any news until after the playoff teams are announced 12/7.



Deer Crossing Roads More Frequently

With deer becoming increasingly active, and daylightsaving time putting more vehicles on the road during the hours when deer move most, the Pennsylvania Game Commission is advising motorists to slow down and stay

Deer become more active in autumn with the lead-up to their fall breeding season, commonly referred to as the "rut." Around this time, many yearling bucks disperse from the areas they were born, traveling considerable distances to find new ranges. Meanwhile, adult bucks more often are cruising their home ranges in search of does, and might chase the does they encounter.

With daylight-saving time ending Nov. 2, there is increased vehicular traffic around dusk and dawn – the peak hours for deer activity.

All make deer encounters more likely for motorists.

"The months of October, November, and December are when deer are moving around the most, and for longer durations during the day," said Game Commission Executive Director Steve Smith. "We encourage all drivers to practice safe behaviors and be especially mindful of intensified deer movement at this time of year."

Data from around the country indicates Pennsylvania drivers face some of the highest risks of a vehicle collision with a deer or other large animal. A recent report shows Pennsylvania, once again, led the nation in animalcollision insurance claims in the fiscal year 2024-25.

Pennsylvania drivers also face some of the highest chances of a collision with a big-game animal. While the national average for animal collisions is 1-in-139, Pennsylvania drivers, according to the report, more than double that with a 1-in-62 chance. Drivers in only West Virginia, Montana, Wisconsin and Michigan strike biggame animals with greater frequency.

Drivers can reduce their chances of collisions with deer by staying alert and better understanding deer behavior. Just paying close attention while driving on stretches marked with "Deer Crossing" signs can make a differ-

Deer often travel in groups and walk single file. So even if one deer successfully crosses the road in front of a driver, it doesn't mean the threat is over. Another could be right behind it.

A driver who hits a deer with a vehicle is not required to report the accident to the Game Commission. If the deer dies, only Pennsylvania residents may claim the carcass. To do so, they can call the Game Commission at 1-833-PGC-HUNT or 1-833-PGC-WILD and an agency dispatcher will collect the information needed to pro-

vide a free permit number, which the caller should write down.

A resident must call within 24 hours of taking possession of the deer. A passing Pennsylvania motorist also may claim the deer, if the person whose vehicle hit it doesn't want it.

Those taking possession of road-killed deer also are advised of rules related to Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) that prohibit the removal of high-risk

deer parts - essentially the head and backbone - from any Disease Management Area (DMA) or Established Area (EA). Those parts must be removed before the deer is transported outside a DMA or EA. For maps of these areas, the complete list of high-risk parts and other information on CWD, visit www.pgc.pa.gov.

If a deer is struck by a vehicle, but not killed, drivers are urged to maintain their distance because some deer might recover and move on. However, if a deer does not move on, or poses a public safety risk, drivers are encouraged to report the incident to the Game Commission or another law-enforcement agency. If the deer must be put down, the Game Commission will direct the proper person to

To report a dead deer for removal from state roads, motorists can call the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation at 1-800-FIX-ROAD.



Law Enforcement Highlight Safe Driving Around School Buses through Operation Safe Stop

Participating school districts and law enforcement agencies documented 188 violations near school busses during Operation Safe Stop

Harrisburg, PA - Recently, the Shapiro Administration released the results of Operation Safe Stop, an annual school bus enforcement and education initiative aimed at enhancing school bus safety for students across the Commonwealth by curtailing violations of Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping

Operation Safe Stop is a one-day targeted enforcement and education event where law enforcement officials and participating schools documented drivers violating Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law, emphasizing the frequency of these violations and highlighted the importance of driving safely around students and school buses.

During this year's Operation Safe Stop, participating school districts and law enforcement agencies witnessed 188 violations of the law, up from the 176 reported last year.

"Just one incident of passing a stopped school bus is too many, and this many violations in just one day is unacceptable," said PennDOT Secretary Mike Carroll. "Responsibly sharing the road with students and school buses helps keep all of us safe."

The School Bus Stopping Law requires motorists approaching a school bus with its red lights flashing and stop arm activated to stop at least 10 feet from the bus. Motorists approaching from all directions are required to stop, unless they encounter a school bus stopping on the opposite side of a divided highway clearly separated by a divider, such as a concrete barrier or grassy median. Although there are steep penalties for violat-

ing Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law, they pale in comparison to a tragedy that could occur if either a driver or a student is not paying attention to their surroundings," said Corporal Zeina Black, Permits and Bus Safety Unit Supervisor with the Pennsylvania State Police. "If a driver is stopped by law enforcement and convicted of disobeying Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law - the penalty is a \$250 fine, five points on your driving record and a 60-day license suspension. The fine increases to \$300 if someone is caught by a stop

"Student safety in school zones and at school bus stops is of the utmost importance, requiring the undivided attention of all motorists. Local school districts work hard to identify the safest locations possible for school bus stops and provide training for staff to foster greater safety for all students, said Department of Education Deputy Secretary of Elementary and Secondary Education Amy Lena. "Vehicle operators can contribute greatly to improving the safety of our students by watching for the flashing lights of school buses and always stopping when students are boarding and exiting the

Donald Heiter Community Center Hosts First "Deaf Social"



The Donald Heiter Community Center (DHCC) in Lewisburg recently hosted its inaugural "Deaf Social," a unique, area-first event that welcomed both deaf and hearing participants. The gathering's central and only rule was "no talking." It successfully drew deaf individuals, hearing allies, and students studying American Sign Language (ASL) at local universities.

The event was organized by Penn Garvin (DHCC's first director and longtime community organizer) and Nicole Warnock, a former Bucknell University ASL instructor. Warnock, who is hearing, developed her deep ASL knowledge through early exposure in first grade, a deaf playmate, a supportive high school teacher, and studies at Gallaudet University the nation's premier school for deaf and hard of hearing students.

Bucknell Professor of Psychology Chris Boyatzis has also become involved, having learned ASL with his mother after she became deaf at age 52. Boyatzis previously helped bring two deaf-focused films to Lewisburg's Campus Theater and is now collaborating with Warnock to introduce ASL into local child-
