

SU Senior Presents "GO" Program To Sunset Rotary

Speakers are asked to "pay it forward" and share the gift of literacy with a child. "The Bus for Us" is the 2013 PA One Book choice of the year.

At a recent meeting of the Lewisburg Sunset Rotary Club, Rachel Taylor, a Senior at SU presented an interesting program on the Susquehanna University "GO" Program, otherwise known as Global Opportunities Program. Rachel explained that SU offers education in a cross-cultural environment. The choice

is up to students whether they stay near to home, or go far away but today's SU student is offered a global opportunity for enriched learning during their

studies at SU. GO programs can be a full semester long or could be short in length, it could be within the United States or globally in South America, Europe, Asia or Australia – just a few of students' favorite spots to visit & study. One of the GO Short programs is SU CASA, an award-winning program that takes students to Costa Rica and Nicaragua to serve congregations, clinics, hospitals, and refugee and immigrant communities. Closer to home is the Hurricane Response Team, which coordinates service trips to the Gulf Coast. This is the program that Rachel participated in. Joining up with 23 other students (including 7 SU football players), they worked with Habitat for Humanity in the still on-going rebuilding of New Orleans. They worked on 3 houses, called shot gun houses because of their construction with open doors in the front and directly to the back, allowing air to flow freely through the small house. Habitat requires that the recipients of houses spend 300 hours on their personal house project. Since most homeowners need to work to afford the housing, they find time between work and construction to squeeze in the required time allotment... and finally have a place to call home! The students laid sod in 102 degree weather and

In a week or two, I'll get back to the information I've gotten about the one and two room schools, but first, here's the description from Lynda E. Smith, of how she (and others, I'm sure!) played Hopscotch...

"When we played Hopscotch: The block diagram would consist of block 1 followed by block 2 directly underneath it and block 3 below 2. Then blocks 4 and five would be adjacent to each other under block 3. Block 6 would be centered under blocks 4 and 5. Then blocks 7 and 8 would be next to each other and under block 6. Then block 9 would be under block 7, and block 10 would be directly under block 8.

You would have to hop on one foot on block 1 and then 2 and then 3. Then you would have to land on blocks 4 and 5 with your left foot on 4 and your right foot on 5. Then back to one foot for block 6, and returning to one foot each on blocks 7 and 8, followed by one foot each on 9 and 10. Then you had to jump off blocks 9 and 10 as you turned 180 degrees to set yourself up to jump back. You had to jump back starting with blocks 9 and 10 simultaneously. When you landed on block 1 with one foot, you had to jump off while turning 180 degrees so you were back to your starting position.

"I was raised by my elderly grandparents and learned a lot of games that I could play by myself. I even invented a "ball game" that I think I made up as I never saw anyone else play it. I'll try to remember the details of "my ball game." As I remember them: I used a solid rubber ball, around the size of a tennis ball. The ball had to be thrown ten times as follows:

1.Throw ball against wall and catch it.

2.Throw ball against wall, leave it bounce once, and catch

3. Throw ball against wall, clap once and catch it.

4. Throw ball up in the air and catch it. 5.Throw ball up in the air, turn around (360 degrees) and

6.Throw ball under leg against the wall and catch it. 7.Throw ball on the ground so that it bounces against the

wall and catch it. 8. Throw ball against wall, leave it bounce twice, and catch

9.Throw the ball against the wall, clap under one leg and then catch ball.

10.Turn your back to wall, throw ball between legs, turn around and catch ball.

"If I failed to catch the ball at any point, I had to start over. I may have confused the sequence in some of the later steps, but I think I got them all there. "And I was quite adept with a yoyo and could "walk the

dog" and make my yoyo go "around the world. When my cousins came to visit me on the farm, we would catch fireflies and play hide and seek. 'I also became very adept at pick-up sticks, jump rope, riding bike, and roller skating. I had a scooter, which was

unlike the"scooters" the kids have today. Today kids don't

play outside enough. They are inside playing video games, so they don't get enough exercise." OK, folks...do tell me the games you remember playing when you "were a kid." Did you play the ones she mentions?

Others also?? What were YOUR rules??

"We really weren't expecting to be handed the lead like that," said Harvick. "I thought that when we ran out of gas earlier, it killed our chance at winning. We had a really fast car, but the cautions seemed to work against us.

"I know it's a long shot to even think about winning the championship, but we've still got a shot.

Kasey Kahne finished second, with Jimmie Johnson third.

Johnson went into the race leading Matt Kenseth by seven points. Kenseth had a dismal day and wound up one lap down in 23rd

position. Johnson's lead is now 28 points over Kenseth and 34 ahead of Harvick. Johnson, who started on the pole, had his own problems. He almost got spun around early in the race after contact with Carl Edwards. He was able to regroup and work his way back to the front.

Going into the race Kenseth was a real contender, but his car never had the speed to run up front. He started 14th and steadily fell back as the race continued. "This was not a good day for us, but we've had an incredible season," said Kenseth. "I'm thankful for all my guys because they've worked so hard, and there's still one race to go."

His team changed spring rubbers, adjusted the shocks and changed tire pressures but nothing helped. "Looking at the lap times, it didn't move the needle at all for what-

ever reason. ... It's like everything we touched went the wrong direc-

tion," crew chief Jason Ratcliff said. Finally, Ratcliff told Kenseth he would stop making adjustments to the car. "He was more referring to track position, that track position was going to be bigger than any change we could make on the car," Kenseth said. "He was right. We were just off and just could never

While it's possible that either Harvick or Kenseth could beat out Johnson in the last race at Homestead, all Johnson has to do to win this


