December 16 Barn Fire in Hartley Township

On December 16, 2025, Mifflinburg Hose Company was dispatched to the 1700 block of Lincoln Chapel Road in Hartley Township for a working barn fire. CSR911 advised Union County West End Fire Chief 703 of a working barn fire, with the owner in the process of removing the livestock from the barn. Engine 7 arrived on scene and pulled handlines for fire suppression. Tower 3 arrived and set up for ventilation operations. Engine 3 moved manpower forward to scene to assist while shuttling water from the fill site. Engine 3-2 established a fill site, while Engine 3-3 assisted on scene. Crews worked on scene for approximately 2 hours before returning available. All livestock were safe and accounted for at the scene.

In addition to Mifflinburg Hose Company and Union County West End, fire units from Middleburg, Beaver Springs, Mt. Pleasant Mills and Centre 18 responded and assisted at the scene. Fire Chiefs from both MHC and Union County West End Fire Company were also at the scene.

I'm going to talk about Big Ten football without ever mentioning that school an hour to the west of us. There are two schools that I cannot figure out how events happened. How has Indiana become the top ranked team this year and have a 24-2 record over the last two years?

All the credit goes to coach Curt Cignetti who came from James Madison two years ago. He went 52-9 in his four years at JMU. Previous to JMU he was head coach at Elon and IUP. Cigs was 14-9 in two years at Elon and 57-13 over six years in his first head coaching stint at IUP. Cignetti was recruiting coordinator for ten years at NC State and Alabama. The man can coach and recruit at all levels.

The first thing he noticed at Indiana was how bad they were up front on both the offensive and defensive lines. With the transfer portal and NIL he addressed this issue first. This was clearly evident when they handled Ohio State up front in the BIG championship game. Cigs brought 13 players with him from JMU and has recruited the portal and high schools for his type of players.

This year's Heisman Trophy winner Fernando Mendoza was a 2-star recruit for Cal. Cignetti saw his potential and brought him in this year to lead the Hoosiers. Cigs brought in another fifteen key transfers for the 2025 season, including offensive lineman Pat Coogan from Notre Dame. The coach knows exactly what he wants and needs and gets it done.

His practices are different from the norm as well. Indiana's football team practices only six hours per week on the field. That is significantly less than the 20-hour maximum, focusing on strategy over physical drills. Cignetti believes in "working smarter, not harder" and "Drill to the point of proficiency and not a second more."

Cignetti has completely turned around the school that has the most losses in the history of college football. The man who was leading the school two weeks ago that has the most wins in the history of college football has plunged Michigan football into chaos.

Sherrone Moore was fired for cause by the university for an inappropriate relationship with a staff member. Moore was later jailed on suspicion of assault, stalking and home invasion.

This isn't a college football story anymore. It's agony in Ann Arbor, a cautionary tale unfolding in real time. These are serious, troubling allegations, far removed from the on-field game and pageantry that defines college football.

This is an article about sports and I'm not going down the road of rumors. The Michigan head coaching position is one of the best in all of football. Michigan has always thought of themselves and their school a notch or three above other schools as far as reputation and elitism. Their recent infractions have brought them down to or below other BIG schools.

Former Michigan coach Jim Harbaugh got out of town to coach the LA Chargers just before the Connor Stalton's sign-stealing penalties came down. Moore was an assistant to Harbaugh at the time and inherited the Michigan head job after Harbaugh. Moore was also found to be complicit with the sign-stealing scandal. Michigan erred two years ago when they handed the job to him on a platter.

Big names are being thrown around as to who the next coach should be. DeBoer from Alabama, Fisch from Washington and Dillingham from Arizona State. Any big name coach would be crazy to jump to Michigan right now. Michigan football has big issues right now and should just name an interim coach for a year. Allow the dust to settle and hire a school president before hiring their next "Michigan Man."

I'm sure Nebraska wouldn't mind if their coach Matt Rhule took the Michigan job. Rhule signed a hefty contract extension around Halloween this year. Rhule has a 1-3 record since that signing and his just completed recruiting ranking was second to last in the BIG. His star quarterback Dylan Raiola just entered the transfer portal.

Injuries in the NFL are a given and will prevent teams from making it to the Super Bowl. There was none bigger than Micah Parsons ACL tear last week. Green Bay had a legitimate chance to win it all not so much now.

The Chiefs never had a good chance but I feel sorry for Patrick Mahomes. No one plays the game harder or with more determination to win than Mahomes. He will be back later next year but the NFL and their fans are going to miss him.

If not this year then when for Josh Allen and the Buffalo Bills. With Mahomes and Burrows out and Lamar Jackson not playing well, Allen and the Bills not getting to the Super Bowl will be a huge disappointment.

Indy QB Philip Rivers did something last Sunday I didn't expect. The 44 year old grandfather who hasn't played in the NFL for five years was able to walk off the field after he played the entire game. He almost led his Colts to victory against a great Seahawk team.

The Broncos are in and the Bears should make the playoffs. Chicago has a difficult three game stretch to finish the season and an 85% chance of getting into the playoffs. The Broncos could be the #1 seed in the AFC playoffs and have all their games in Denver. They have won twelve consecutive games in the mile high air.

Your guess is as good as mine for our two PA teams. They both had resounding wins last week against inferior teams. Rodgers and Hurts both played really well. The Eagles are in but I'm not sure they can hang with the LA Rams. Tomlin will keep his consecutive non-losing season streak intact but miss the playoffs.

Our area was well represented on the All-State field hockey team. Lewisburg's Tia Berge, Mifflinburg's Lainey Miller and Selinsgrove's duo of Nora Moyer and Emma Petersen were all named to the first team. The second team had the Cat's Kira Shoemaker and Seal's Bella Furgison and Abby Raymond.

There were also a couple local teams getting their first wins in hoops last week. Middle-West boys followed up losses to Halifax and Montoursville with a 35-26 win over Northumberland Christian. Zani Cooley had 14 points in the win.

The Miff boys lost 58-52 to Mount Carmel. Teams live and die with the three pointer and Mifflinburg kept it close by scoring more than half their points from beyond the arc.

Grove surprised previously undefeated Lewisburg 53-47 behind Mac DeFazio's 19 points and Xavier Jackson's 11. If Grove would have just shot 50% from the foul line they would have won by double digits. Lewisburg rebounded with a 64-62 win over Mifflin County. Nazir Meredith finished with 16 and Rebira Jemama added 14.

The Grove girls (1-5) beat Mifflinburg for their first win of the year 33-21. Madi Merrell had 17 points. They suffered a tough loss to Milton earlier in the week 33-28. Merrell scored 15 in the third quarter alone to briefly put the Seals ahead. Missed foul shots is an epidemic for both Grove hoop teams.

Middle-West girls are still looking for their first win. They fell 26-20 to East Juniata, 51-38 to Halifax and 42-15 to Mifflinburg. Wildcat freshman Avery Reibsome outscored Middle-West on her own with 19 and Brooke Gessner had 11 points.

Career highs in points from Green Dragons Addy Shedleski (19) and Ava Motto (17) weren't enough to hold off Mifflin County in a 50-40 loss.

The Selinsgrove grapplers won an exciting 33-32 dual meet over Montoursville with their big boys finishing strong. Crue Carter won his decision at 215 and Jack Peters pinned at heavyweight for the one point victory. The Grove girls wrestlers lost to Williamsport 49-24.

Lewisburg boys won all the contested matches by pins in beating Shamokin 60-18. Green Dragon Landen Wagner lost in the finals at the Carlisle Classic tourney. He got to the finals after two tech falls and a major decision.

What has happened at some other schools that were revered for their wrestling? Danville and Central Columbia used to be powerhouses, especially Danville. PennDOT Warns Motorists to be Alert for Snow Squalls, and Blowing, Drifting Snow

Montoursville, PA – Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) is reminding motorists to slow down, pay attention and use caution on area roadways, especially during snow squalls or low-visibility conditions that may occur.

Motorists always should be alert for sudden squalls which can strike with little or no warning and quickly cause roads to become snow covered. Heavy squalls also can cause whiteout conditions, virtually eliminating a driver's visibility. Additionally, falling temperatures and blowing and drifting snow can cause icy areas on roadways, including overpasses and bridges. The National Weather Service issues Snow Squall Warnings to alert motorists of potentially hazardous travel. If you receive a Snow Squall Warning, delay travel or exit the highway at the next opportunity.

While avoiding or delaying unnecessary travel during winter storms is the safest choice, PennDOT offers this advice if motorists must travel and encounter snow squalls or blowing or drifting snow:

Slow down gradually and drive at a speed that suits conditions.

Turn on your headlights. If caught in a snow squall, turn on your hazard lights.

Stay in your lane and increase your following distance.

Stay alert, keep looking as far ahead as possible and be patient.

Do not drive distracted; your full attention is required.

Use your defroster and wipers.

Keep windows and mirrors free of snow and ice.

During whiteouts, come to a complete stop only when you can safely pull off the roadway.

Do not stop in the flow of traffic since this could cause a chain-reaction collision.

Do not pass a vehicle moving slowly or speed up to get away from a vehicle that is following too closely.

Always buckle up and never drive impaired.

If a crash occurs due to or during a snow squall and you are involved or stopped due to the crash:

In most cases, you are safer in your vehicle with seat belts fastened.

If possible, drive slowly to the front of the pile-up and get off travel lanes.

If you must leave your car for an emergency, try to wait until it looks safe.

Do not stand outside your vehicle on or near the roadway.

Roadways will not be free of snow while precipitation is falling. With freezing temperatures, roads that look wet may actually be icy, and extra caution is needed when approaching bridges and highway ramps where ice can form without warning.

While PennDOT recommends not traveling during winter storms, motorists can check conditions on more than 40,000 roadway miles, including color-coded winter conditions on 2,900 miles, by visiting www.511PA.com. 511PA, which is free and available 24 hours a day, provides traffic delay warnings, weather forecasts, traffic speed information and access to more than 1,200 traffic cameras.

511PA is also available through a smartphone application for iPhone and Android devices, by calling 5-1-1, or by following regional X alerts.

Motorists should always allow plenty of space when driving near plow trucks. Also, for their own safety and the safety of plow operators, motorists should never attempt to pass a truck while it is plowing or spreading winter materials.

PennDOT reminds motorists to pack an emergency kit for their vehicles. A basic kit should include non-perishable food, water, blanket, small shovel and warm clothes. When preparing an emergency kit, motorists should account for special needs of passengers such as baby food, pet supplies or medications and pack accordingly.

Changes at the Rail Trail and Fairground Road Pedestrian Crossing in East Buffalo Township, Union County

East Buffalo Township, PA – Motorists and pedestrians are advised of changes to the pedestrian crossing signals on Fairground Road in East Buffalo Township, Union County.

The automatic sensors have been deactivated and removed on the Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) system due to ongoing concerns with the sensors malfunctioning. The flashing beacons will remain installed at the crossing and pedestrians must press a pole-mounted button to activate the flashing beacons, similar to a traditional crosswalk system.

While the RRFB is not a traffic signal, the system serves as a warning system to approaching motorists to advise them that pedestrians are attempting to cross the road. Pennsylvania law states that motorists must yield to pedestrians within a crosswalk. Pedestrians should also use caution when crossing the road, looking both ways to make sure there are no oncoming vehicles or that all vehicles have stopped before crossing the road. Bicyclists are reminded to adhere to all posted traffic signals and signs at each trail crossing.

Pennsylvania Invests More Than \$6.9 Million to Ensure That 27 Farms, 2,354 Acres of Prime Farmland in 13 Counties Stay Farms Forever

Pennsylvania is investing more than \$6.9 million to purchase development rights for 2,354 acres on 27 farms in 13 counties, protecting them from future residential or commercial development. In 2025, Pennsylvania preserved 167 farms and 14,147 prime acres of farmland across the state, investing more than \$50.1 million. These joint investments by state and local governments ensure that Pennsylvania farmers will have the prime-quality land they need to continue supporting families, communities, and jobs.

"Protecting farmland isn't just about preserving open space; it's about safeguarding the resources that feed and sustain all of us," Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding said. "High-quality farmland is one of Pennsylvania's most valuable economic assets. Through the newly enacted 2025-26 budget, the Shapiro Administration is once again delivering real results for Pennsylvania agriculture, investing to protect our priceless land, water, and soil resources, supporting the next generation of farmers, and funding the innovation and infrastructure that will keep Pennsylvania's farms strong and competitive for decades to come."

Since the Shapiro Administration began, Pennsylvania has invested nearly \$147 million to preserve 499 new farms and 41,628 prime acres of farmland across the state.

Through Pennsylvania's Farmland Preservation Program, the state partners with local governments and nonprofits to purchase development rights to preserve farmland, ensuring a strong future for farming and food security. By selling development rights, farm owners ensure their farms remain in agricultural production and are never sold to developers.

Pennsylvania leads the nation in the number of preserved farms. Since 1988, when voters statewide overwhelmingly supported creating the state's Farmland Preservation Program, Pennsylvania has protected 6,648 farms and 661,035 acres in 58 counties from future development, investing more than \$1.84 billion in state, county, and local funds.

Governor Josh Shapiro recognizes that agriculture is not only part of Pennsylvania's heritage — it's essential to the Commonwealth's economic future. Nearly 49,000 farms contribute \$132.5 billion to Pennsylvania's economy and support almost 600,000 jobs. That's why agriculture is one of five key industries prioritized in the Governor's 10-year Economic Development Strategy — the first of its kind in more than two decades.

Pennsylvania's investments in easement purchases multiply the impact of dollars invested in conservation initiatives, including the Agricultural Conservation Assistance Program (ACAP), which is changing the landscape of rural PA. More than 2,700 Pennsylvania farmers have sought financial and technical support from ACAP to improve their management practices and have a lasting impact not just on their farms but on the entire region's water and soil health. ACAP funding is reaching farmers across Pennsylvania who are eager to invest in the economic and environmental health of their farms.

New Faith Community Wins National Award

MIFFLINBURG, PA—Camp Mount Luther's CaTALYST faith community was recognized as this year's Innovative Program Award winner for Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, a nationwide network of outdoor ministry organizations. CaTALYST launched in September and is a faith community designed and led by young adult volunteers.


