In a generous act of community support, the Walmart store in Lewisburg recently donated a significant amount of school supplies to local school districts, including the Mifflinburg Area School District.



Learning By Doing

I Got and A and You Failed. Ha, Ha - Grading I never told anyone about this but I had a burning desire to be a pilot of a two passenger Cessna. I got the manual plus every book I could get and memorized all the important stuff. Now I was ready, but the manager of the local airport wouldn't let me rent a plane. He said I had no practical training or experience. You would have flown with me, right?

So, I signed up for a flying class that was completely hands-on; learning by doing so to speak. My instructor taught me to take off, cruise, landing, use of safety features, and dealing with emergencies. I took the performance test and received 100 percent for take-off, cruising, safety, and emergencies, but only 70 percent on landing. This averaged out to a B+ and I was in like Flynn. My instructor said, " nope". She said I failed the

section on landing. I needed to get a 100 percent. There was too much of a chance that I would end up like the picture above. So, she gave me more training and then I got 90 percent on the retest. I failed again; went home; sulked for a week; and then I started a new career in education.

Now what about grading in schools. You are given a homework assignment to write an essay. You turn it in; get it back with a C grade; and then the teacher moves on to the next subject. It goes on like this until you get your report card and it shows a C for language arts.

Now here are two major problems with this. Using the flying example let us say that after your paper was returned, you were assigned to work with another student to review each other's papers. You each helped the other rewrite your papers using the comments your teacher made. After turning in the rewrites the papers are returned and you now have a B.

This is still not good enough so you work alone at home to write a better essay again using the comments given by the teacher. You ask your parents to read it and comment. This time you get an A and are as happy as a clam because this is the first time you ever got an A in language arts.

In the real-world people who write reports, instructional manuals, policies, plans and other documents review their work a number of times and then there is a peer review in some cases. Only when the work is 100 percent correct will it be published. So, the approach used to get an Ain language arts is the same as used to get a flying license or publishing a document.

Now the second problem. How will the parents know why a learner received a C on his or her report card? The grade doesn't tell you anything other than not very good or not very bad. How about if the topic that was taught during the grading period was broken down in specific performances that your child was to master and state whether the achieved, exceeded of fell below the required performance. Here's an example of a breakdown of performance in writing the essay: Use- proper syntax; proper punctuation; correct grammar; correct spelling; expected vocabulary; correct sentences, paragraph and full document structure; complete content.

Now the teacher can indicate on the paper and the report card where the learner exceeded expectation, met expectation or performed below expectation. This approach sometimes referred to as a competency-based approach provides specific information where improvement is needed. Thus, the emphasis shifts from getting a good grade to improving performance to achieve a high standard. As a parent, wouldn't you prefer this type of report card?

In the first seven laps of the feature Dylan settled into fifth place with Rick was right behind him as they raced for the championship, but that all ended on lap eight when a broken drive shaft on Eckert's #0 ended his night getting credited with a 25th place finish. Dylan saw the car towed off the track, and knew if he keeps his nose cleaned the title was his. "There was some good money to win this race for a little while I did try to move up, put after a few laps battled with Dillan Stake was to close for comfort". Dylan decided let's look at the big picture and just finish the race, which he did in sixth place, and the title was his, third of his career with the others coming in 2019-2021. "With Rick out of the race it made things less stressful for sure it was bad for him but we could use some good luck for once, it would have been fun to race it out. If Rick would have not dropped out, I might have tried a bit harder and work my way to the top of the track like I saw Mason Zeigler doing, because most of the rest of us ran the bottom or middle, Zeigler ended up second so it worked for him. I did not have a shot at winning the big money so I decided to stay where I was at and win the points. I did not win a race at Port this year and like getting them but we were consistent all year and that also helped us in winning the points." Noted Dylan.

For the season Yoder had nine top tens and four top five finishes in the point races run. He does have two wins this year one at Lincoln speedway during the Appalachian Speedweek show and the other at a ULMS series race at Outlaw speedway in Dundee N.Y. "The

points pay about what it is to win here \$4,000 so it makes it worthwhile to come here and race every week, and to win a title with driver like Rick Eckert, Hayes Mattern, Kyle Lee, Justin Weaver, my cousin Andrew (who placed fourth in points), Dillan Stake, Trevor Feathers and more it makes it tough to get wins". Dylan drives a XR1 Rocket chassis with a Clements Ford engine under the hood of his #24. "We had the same car and Motor racing all year so that is a good thing for us, that Ford has been a little better for us with time trial races, it helped me with the Speedweek races also it had a bit more power so I had to get use to that when starting the races, so I would not break the car loose on the start." Noted Yoder. Dylan wants to thank his crew and sponsors Strouse Electric, Valley Supply, S&R Repair, Broadband Networks and Ingram fuels, the crew and fans for their support.

In Thursday night action had Drew Young of Beaver Springs winning the 305 features over Ken Duke, Jr of Winfield who was the 305-track title winner at Port by 110-points over Owen Dimm, Zach Rhodes 160 back and Kruz Kepner 205 back in fourth, Port got six of the eight scheduled shows in for the class. The super late model part of the Tusky weekend, Hayes Mattern of Beavertown did place third in the track points 135 back of champ Dylan Yoder, another Middleburg driver Andrew Yoder placed fifth in the final points. Other news from Port Royal for 2025, the Bob Weikert Memorial race will take place on the weekend of May 23-24-25, which will be a Friday, Saturday, and Sunday events, paying \$75,000 to win on Sunday, also the Tuscarora 50 weekend has also been announced for September 4-5-6-, with the final on Saturday paying \$58,000 to win, all these events will be sanctioned by the High Limit racing series. That closes out the 2024 season at Port Royal with the Speed Showcase Weekend that was set for October 17-18-19 has been cancelled, with hopes of holding this event in March of 2025.

Williams Grove still has a number of shows left this season for sprint car fans, starting with this Friday September 13th with the Billy Kimmel Memorial for 410-sprints along with 358-sprints. The special for the 358-sprints has the winner collecting \$3,000 out of a total purse of \$19,000, Hard Charger and Hard Luck awards will be handed out for an extra \$250. Friday September 20th is the Kevin Gobrecht Challenge race for the 410-sprint along with the 358-sprint, September 27th is another two division show with the same two divisions, that all leads up to the National Open for the 410-sprint a WOO series race that pays the winner of the Saturday October 5th race \$75,000 to win.

Clinton County speedway closes out its season this Saturday September 14th with special events for the four-division show. The limited late model class will have time trials to set up the heat races with driver racing for \$1,500 to win. Matt Cochran has three wins, with single wins going to Andrew Yoder, Cody Lear and Ryan Zook. The Pro-Stock class will be racing for \$1,000 to win, with your home track rules applying for this race, same for the four-cylinder class racing for \$500 to win, along with the tracks 270-micro sprints racing for \$600 to win.

Super late models have two races this weekend with a bit of traveling involved, first Friday night September 13 the ULMS race will be held at Outlaw speedway in Dundee N.Y. for \$7,500 to win, Dylan Yoder who the race back in July and plans to be back for this race. Drake Troutman of Hyndman Pa. who has a weekend off from the Lucas Oil series where he is leading the ROY standings will be in the Big Frog Viper Motorsports #58, also Colton Flinner of Allison Park also is planning to be on hand. Saturday night the Freedom Raceway Park in Delevan N.Y. has a unsanctioned race with the winner getting \$5,000 to win. Dylan Cecce and Mike Knight have won features in the super so far this year at Freedom.



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
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


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Donations Provide a Boost for Biology and Technology Classes in Mifflinburg

Box Tree Moth Discovered in Erie: First Pennsylvania Sightings of Invasive Insect Threatening High-Value Ornamental Shrubs Statewide

Harrisburg, PA - The box tree moth, a highly destructive, invasive insect new to North America, was recently discovered for the first time in Pennsylvania in two cemeteries in Erie County. The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture has issued a quarantine to help businesses and homeowners recognize the insect, learn how to control it, and keep it from spreading.

The insect feeds on and destroys boxwoods, which are frequently used as topiaries and hedges and featured in Pennsylvania's public gardens, parks, and conservatories, which are some of the oldest and most popular in the nation.

'This insect does not harm humans or threaten our food supply, said Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding. "It threatens livelihoods in our nursery and landscape industry, as well as the parks and gardens that enrich our communities and feed tourism dollars into our economy. Protecting communities and businesses from economic loss is a top priority of the Shapiro Administration."

Boxwoods are the largest-selling evergreen shrub in the U.S. The destructive box tree moth spreads primarily through shipping and sales of infected boxwoods. The insect had previously been found in Delaware, Massachusetts, Michigan, New York, Ohio, and Ontario, Canada.

Pennsylvania's nursery and landscaping industry generates \$4.1 billion for the state economy annually and is responsible for more than 63,000 jobs. Pennsylvania leads the nation in the number of floriculture businesses - those that produce garden and bedding plants, potted plants, and cut flowers.

Early detection is key to preventing significant damage, loss, and spread of box tree moths. Find information on how to identify and treat the insect, and safely remove and destroy infested materials at agriculture.pa.gov. Homeowners may contact your local PSU Extension office for treatment information.

If you suspect the insect on your boxwoods, please report it to badbug@pa.gov or 1-888-253-7189. Please indicate which life stage was

found, if damage was present, and include photos if possible.

Pennsylvania's quarantine requires plant merchants in Erie County to ensure that boxwood sold in the county stays in the county, unless the business has a compliance agreement with the PA Department of Agriculture. A compliance agreement requires surveying, treatments, and record-keeping for shipments outside the county. To enter a compliance agreement in Erie County, contact the department's regional office at 814-332-6890 to schedule a time to meet with a plant inspector.

Several other states' quarantines require pre-notification to ship to their state. See nationalplantboard.org for other states' requirements.

service projects, helping neighbors in need both near and far. On July 28, Rita Grimes. guest presenter, demonstrated a creative way that members can do their part to reduce their carbon

footprint by turning empty snack wrappers into colorful, functional bags and pouches.

During the presentation, PQG members learned that tons of food packaging are discarded each year. Snack bags for products such as potato chips, are made up of multiple plastic layers, each used for a specific purpose to keep moisture out, to keep grease from migrating to the outside, and to extend shelf life. These bags don't break down over time and are not recyclable in many areas. As a result, tremendous amounts of snack wrappers end up in landfills and oceans adding to an environmental crisis.

Since many grocery stores have eliminated the use of bags to cut down on waste, a handmade bag or pouch is a unique solution. Why not make your own rather than buy a shopping tote? Just begin by collecting empty snack bags!
