

Rabies is a serious condition State game and agriculture but is common in wild animals. sylvania Game Commission Wildlife Conservation Officer for Union, asks residents not to panic. Not all animals that behave strangely or appear sick have rabies there are many different illnesses that could be the cause. The best thing to do is stay away from the animal and call the game warden who can advise you of a course of action.

Rabies has been around for a long time and the number of cases can vary each year. Rabies can affect any animal but is prevalent in raccoons, foxes, skunks and bats. Anytime a human or a pet comes into contact with one of these animals the wild animal is always tested.

The State Department of Agriculture conducts the rabies tests and usually has the results with in a 24-48 hour period of time. If a rabies infection is suspected, the best thing to do is contact your doctor or veterinarian. Don't wait to start treatment. Rabies is always fatal if left untreated in humans and animals, so the sooner you receive medical treatment it will keep the disease from becoming full blown. The latest treatment for rabies is four shots in two-week intervals which is administered to a muscular part of the body, usually an upper arm

Just remember to keep your pets rabies vaccines up to date and be cautious around wild animals. If you see a wild animal behaving strangely stay away from them and call the game

DEP Issues Air Quality Plan Approval to En-Tire Logistics of Milton

The Department of Environmental Protection announced today it has issued an Air Quality Plan Approval for the En-Tire Logistics of Milton PA LLC cogeneration facility in White Deer Township, Union County.

The En-Tire plant will be authorized to combust a mixture of fuels-which includes natural gas and chipped waste tires-that will produce 7-megawatts of electricity and provide steam to the adjacent National Gypsum facility.

"The department has done a very careful and detailed review of this application during the past 18 months to be sure that all applicable federal and state air quality regulations will be met," DEP North-central Regional Director Marcus Kohl said.

"In some areas, our plan approval application review exceeded state and federal requirements. We responded to more than 200 written comments we received from the public."

DEP provided substantial opportunities for public input throughout its review process. On May 2, it conducted a combined public meeting and hearing in Allenwood that was attended by about 80 citizens, with 25 presenting testimony.

In addition, the department extended its public comment period for the draft Air Quality Plan Approval from the standard 30 days to 75 days at the request of local and state elected officials.

The department plans to hold informational meeting with interested residents in October to discuss the approval process, what the roles of DEP and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) were in the review, and what the issuance of the plan ap-

DEP has determined that the proposed emission levels of air contaminants satisfy Best Available Control Technology (BACT) as well as the agency's Best Available Technology (BAT) requirements. The department also has determined that this facility satisfies all applicable requirements of state and federal air quality regulations, including Maximum Achievable Control Technology (MACT) requirements.

Although not required by state or federal regulations, DEP requested and En-Tire agreed to perform an inhalation risk assessment based on the estimated chronic risks posed by the proposed facility operating at maximum load, as well as two acute exposure scenarios from shortterm emissions.

The assessment included a selection of 35 Compounds of Potential Concern (COPC) that DEP determined would be generated by the combustion of tire-derived fuel. The results of this assessment

proval means. The details of this determined that the levels of risk posed by both chronic and acute exposure to the modeled COPCs do not exceed DEP's inhalation risk assessment standards.

The department, in accordance with regulations, also sent the draft plan approval to EPA for its review, and EPA approved, with comments, DEP's issuance of it.

The En-Tire project includes a combustion unit rated at 185 million BTUs per hour of heat input that incorporates kiln and boiler stages in series. The project also includes the construction of a dry sorbent storage and handling system, a cooling tower, and one aqueous ammonia storage tank. Emissions from the combustion unit will be controlled by a dry scrubber, fabric collector, oxidation catalyst, selective catalytic reduction, and a wet scrubber.

owners of 137 acres of conserved property along Penns Creek near Glen Iron, will be among those honored at the Merrill Linn Conservancy's 25th anniversary party on Saturday, October 19 from 1:00 to 3:30 p.m. at the Campus Theatre in Lewisburg. The event which is free and open to all, will celebrate 25 years of helping landowners in the Central Susquehanna Valley protect the values and qualities they treasure in their land in perpe-

It will also be a springboard for the Conservancy's new Linking Landscapes: Natural Area Networks Initiative, which seeks to protect wildlife biodiversity by maintaining and improving linkage of habitats within landscapes. Reptiland's Clyde Peeling will introduce the initiative with a presentation on the region's native species and how fragmentation of habitats affects wildlife in the Central Susquehanna Valley.

Dr. and Mrs. Oberheim's Hartley Twp. property includes Penns Creek frontage with a riparian buffer, a large pond, a small wetland and spring-fed stream, open fields and woodlands, all set against breath-taking views of mountain ridges to the south. These diverse habitats provide a home for wide variety of wildlife, including eagles, wild turkeys, blue heron and osprey along with great horned owls, cedar waxwings and kestrels. They share the land with otters, weasels, beavers, deer red and grey foxes, bobcats and bears.

For over 30 years the Oberheim family has hunted, fished canoed and hiked on their land. "I am a hunter, but we only harvest a few turkeys and deer each year. The rest of the animals have a preserve," Carl says. When he attended Penns Creek Ecology Day in August, Čarl was told that wood turtles were endangered. Because their property offers the complex habitat that wood turtles require—soft-bottomed streams, heavily vegetated riparian areas and woodlands, it holds a large population of them. In addition to providing a refuge for migrating and nesting birds and animals, the land also supports wildflowers. including bluets, trout lilies, Virginia blue bells, spring beau-

ties, butterfly weed, wild asters, columbine, wild sunflowers

hepatica, cardinal flowers, jack-in-the-pulpit and joe-pye-weed

"When we first moved to the property in 1982, we didn't know what all was here," Faye says. "But we loved the setting and wildlife habitat." Over time, the Oberheims saw development encroaching. Properties were being chopped into lots for houses and trailers. That is when they decided to take action to protect their land. One option for Pennsylvania residents is the Clean and Green program that bases property taxes on use values rather than fair market values with the aim of protecting farmland, forestland and open spaces. "But that only lasts until someone is willing to pay the back taxes," Carl says. The Oberheims wanted to protect their property permanently and

They called on the Merrill W. Linn Land & Waterways Conservancy to draw up a conservation easement that met all their requirements. They retain ownership and control over the land. but know that when the property passes to their children or is sold, it will still be protected and preserved. The conservatior easement was finalized in 2003

The Merrill W. Linn Land and Waterways Conservancy is a volunteer, nonprofit organization. In addition to the Oberheim property, the Conservancy holds conservation easements in Union, Snyder, upper Northumberland and Lycoming counties protecting over 1,100 acres of land and waterways to date. Public Asked To Complete Public Transportation Survey

As the SEDA-COG Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) prepares to update its public transportation plan, it is surveying area residents about needs and concerns regarding transit service in the MPO's eight counties — Clinton, Columbia, Juniata, Mifflin, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, and Union. The survey is online at www.svy.mk/1eV3ifs, and can also be accessed at the Transportation Planning page on the SE-DA-COG web site — www.seda-cog.org — under transit planning. It is being conducted in conjunction with the MPO in Lycoming County.

'In general," said Jim Saylor, SEDA-COG Transportation Director, "the survey will help us determine unmet needs in the region, information that is critical as we and transit service providers develop strategies to improve public transportation. We need to hear from as many people as possible, whether they use public transportation or not."

Transit service in the 8-county region is generally limited to 'fixed route," such as buses running on established routes and schedules, and "demand responsive," which primarily serves senior citizens and disabled persons. SEDA-COG's survey seeks to determine how people travel, i.e., alone or with others, the type of transit service available to them, and whether or not they use it. Respondents are also asked their reasons for using or not using transit services.

In measuring the importance of public transportation, respondents are asked their primary uses for transit service, e.g., shopping, getting to work or medical appointments, long distance trips, or accessing social services. They are also asked why they may have never used or no longer use public transporta-There are questions regarding conditions which may persuade

individuals to use public transportation. Among these are air quality issues, highway congestion, gas prices, and parking costs. In general the survey should take no more than ten minutes to complete. Ultimately the survey's findings will provide guidance to the

MPO's Public Transit Committee as it updates the Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan. The deadline for individuals to complete the survey is October 16. Saylor said, "The transportation plan is a guide for service

providers as they develop locally driven solutions to fill the unmet needs in the region. We need to remain aware and in touch with those needs so we can continue to give our local providers the support they need in today's tough funding environment."

2 teaspoons chicken bouillion granules

3 teaspoons butter

2 tablespoons all purpose flour 3/4 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

cup cheddar cheese, Shredded

In a large saucepan, combine the cauliflower, carrot, celery, water, and bouillion. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 12-15 minutes or until vegetables are tender (do not drain). In another large saucepan, melt butter. Stir in the flour, salt, and pepper until smooth. Gradually add milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. 



1937 in Mifflinburg and Surrounding Towns Comes Alive Again

Life as lived in 1937 in Mifflinburg and central and western Union County comes alive again for 36 minutes on a new DVD. Back in 1976, James Schwartz, Mifflinburg funeral director, now retired, rescued from the trash four reels of 16mm film as the old Mifflinburg Firehouse was being demolished to make way for the new larger firehouse. Schwartz kept the reels in his home until about 2010, when he offered them to the Union County Historical Society. At that time, Marion Lois Huffines was researching the history of Mifflinburg for her book, Mifflinburg and the West End, published by Arcadia in 2012. The reels contained 36 minutes of raw footage of Mifflinburg and surrounding towns, taken by an unidentified photographer in 1937. Under the sponsorship of the Union County Historical Society, Huffines contracted with McVicar Video Productions to have the film digitized and produced on DVD for sale to the public. She edited the film by reordering the segments more logically and provided subtitles identifying places and locations.

The 1937 film footage opens up a view of everyday life in the towns visited by the photographer. The black and white images are not fancy, not staged, and without sound or technical effects. The photographer traveled around the county, filming daily life and its routine activities. In the film, for example, gas station attendants pump gas while washing windshields and checking oil and water levels. The photographer filmed workers at Kooltext Knitting Mills, Kurtz Overall Factory, and Snook's mills in Mifflinburg, Swengel, and Vicksburg. He shows shop workers and displays in shop windows: Gast & Sons Dry Goods, Edmund Shively's Appliances, and Pete Pursley's General Store and Post Office. Other workers are shown busy too: Ken Erdley delivers milk for Wehr's Dairy, Knepp's Grocery Bus sells peaches at 14 cents per pound and egg noodles for 8 cents, the men at Swengel Mill stack bags of flour in the back of a truck, and hunters with rifles and their hunting dog stand ready to leave outside of Mazeppa Mill. Vehicles line the streets, and 1938 Studebakers are already being advertised.

The photographer visited every school in central and western Union County. He filmed students and teachers at Mifflinburg High School, Hartley Township High School, and Lewis Township High School. He visited every elementary school, preserving for us today the images of students at recess while their teachers watch close by in Swengel, Millmont, Laurelton, Green Grove, White Springs, Pontius, Rand, Creek School, Red Bank School, Forest Hill, Mazeppa, Buffalo Cross Roads, Cowan Grammar and Primary Schools, and Vicksburg. Everyone who was in school in this part of Union County in 1937 is almost surely in the film. Another piece of history was not missed: he filmed the men at the Civil Conservation Corps Camps in Weikert, where one sees Raymond B. Winter, and at Halfway, even

going up to photograph from the lookout.

Still other institutions were not missed: Mifflinburg Bank and Trust, Laurelton State Bank, Strunk Funeral Home, B.T. Lance Monument Works, Brown's Buggy Factory (later Sterling Bros. Throwing Mill), and Herbster's mills at Laurelton and at Laurel Park. Incredibly, the photographer filmed the residents at Laurelton State Village for Feeble-minded Women of Childbearing Age as they moved about the grounds and did their work. And he filmed a fire drill of town-wide proportions as the Mifflinburg fire trucks race to Gardner Gottschall's shop to douse a "fire" and remove a "victim" in an ambulance provided by

Things have changed since 1937, but modern viewers will recognize places and some of the people. The DVD, 1937 Mifflinburg and Western Union County, is on sale at the Union County Historical Society for \$15 plus tax. In March 2010, President Obama signed the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA), into law. While some provisions of the law have already taken effect, many more provisions will be implemented in the coming years. ACA Enrollment begins on Tuesday, October 1, for coverage beginning

Two Bucknell University instructors, Carl Milofsky Ph.D. and Brandn Green Ph.D., recognize that much of the information currently circulating in news reports, on the radio, and on the Internet has been politicized and may be biased.
