Early Morning Crash Leaves One Dead, Two Critically Injured

On Saturday, January 7, at approximately 2:15 a.m., a 1999 Mercury Cougar, driven by Christopher Adam Wirth, 21, of Hartleton, was traveling south, at a high rate of speed, on SR 235, approximately 1/10 of a mile north of Palmen Road, Hartley Township, Union County. As Wirth failed to negotiate a left hand curve in the roadway, he lost control of the vehicle and slid through the opposing northbound lane of SR 235 and left the roadway southeast, impacting into several trees. Wirth and passen-

ger Allison Renee Vonneida, 21, of Hartleton, were ejected from the vehicle, while Dedree Elizabeth Cronin, 21, of Hartleton, remained inside.

Vonneida was pronounced dead at the scene by Union County Coroner Wanda Walters. Wirth and Cronin were transported via Life Flight to Geisinger Medical Center, in Danville, for treatment of their severe injuries.

The accident remains under investigation at this time. Assisting at the scene was Mifflinburg Fire and Ambulance.

PACFI Donates \$1000 To "Save Chris Transplant Fund"



Mifflinburg resident Chris Giesige has Cystic Fibrosis (CF) and her doctors at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC) told her it was time to consider a lung transplant. In early December, Giesige was rushed to UPMC due to a collapsed lung and a pulmonary embolism. Doctors were able to stop the bleeding and, after an evaluation, she was recommended for a lung transplant.

"I'm ready for the transplant," Giesige said. The petite, 36 year-old woman is on oxygen about 60-70% of the time. She's a fighter who has already beaten the odds with CF. She wasn't expected to live beyond the age of two years. Her transplant is expected to cost about \$600,000, and the uninsured costs will amount to about \$120,000.

"We hope Chris is able to get her transplant soon," Pennsylvania Cystic Fibrosis, Inc. (PACFI) President Betty Hollenbach said. PACFI donated \$1000 to kick off the "Save

Chris Transplant Fund" and the organization encourages others to donate.

CF is the most common fatal genetic disease of children and young adults. It primarily affects the lungs and digestive systems, and CF takes a life every 24 hours. It is characterized by the body's secretion of a thick, sticky mucous that clogs the respiratory system leading to frequent infections.

"A local Menonite Church did a sandwich fundraiser that raised \$3000 for her to help pay expenses," Carl Reeder said. Giesige has been befriended by the Menonite community, and Reeder is a friend who is helping with the fundraisers.

For the fifth year Kelsey's Dream, led by Kylie Kuhns of Mifflinburg, was able to provide gifts for 38 local needy children. The children in the family from Lewistown suffer from neurofibromatosis, a disease that causes tumors to grow anywhere there are nerve endings. The three children have undergone chemotherapy to control the disease and have many visits to different hospitals.

The Salvation Army provides Kelsey's Dream with information about the children that need help in the local area. Kylie and volunteers prepare the tags and set up a Christmas

Tree at Art of Living Design Studio in Mifflinburg. They then invite the community to select a child to purchase gifts for. "We had a phenomenal response from the community again this year. I was worried because of the economy and people loosing jobs in our area, but the support surprised us," Kylie said.

Kelsey's Dream funds and purchases the gifts for the remaining tags, and focuses on the family from Lewistown. "All children deserve a nice Christmas. I take the family from Lewistown to heart and make sure they have a special Christmas. I know what all the trips back and forth to hospitals are like, by growing up with my sister, Kelsey and I just want to always make sure they have a special Christmas" Kylie said. Ten Killed in New Year's Holiday Crashes

Ten people were killed and 172 others were injured in the 552 crashes investigated by Pennsylvania State Police during the four-day New Year's holiday driving period, Commissioner Frank Noonan announced today.

"Although the number of fatalities decreased by one compared to last year's holiday driving period, the number of child safety seat violations and DUI arrests increased," Noonan said.

From Dec. 30, 2011 through Jan. 2, 2012, State Police investigated a total of 552 crashes. Of those crashes, 79 were alcohol-related and involved two fatalities. Also, six of the 10 people who died in crashes were not wearing seat belts.

Troopers made 285 arrests

for driving under the influence and issued 3,408 speeding citations during the holiday period. State Police also cited 379 individuals for failure to wear seat belts and issued citations to 51 drivers for failing to restrain children properly in child safety seats.

During last year's four-day New Year's holiday driving period, 11 people were killed and 220 others were injured in 693 crashes investigated by State Police.

The crash numbers cover only those incidents investigated by State Police and do not include statistics on crashes to which other law-enforcement agencies responded.

Class Visits Rolling Hill Manor Residents



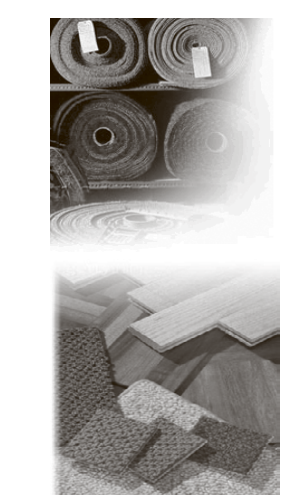

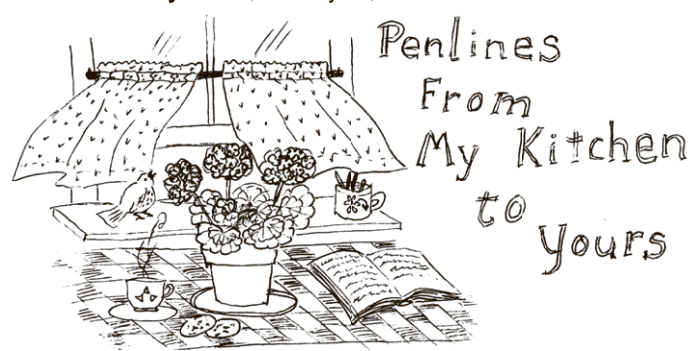

Letters Written During WW1 From Jay A. Rigel to Family and Friends

Letter to: Mrs. Norman Rigel
Date: April 5, 1918
Location: Camp Sherman

Dear Parents and Bro,

I suppose you have been looking for a letter before this. I was disappointed because I did not get a furlough. I had to send the telegram on Friday, now to William.

I was not out of the hospital yet and did not know if I could get a furlough. I am all right again. I was real sick for about two days and could not eat very much. I think I can get a 36-hour pass tomorrow. I will go to Cleveland then. I think I can get a furlough later.

I had a letter from William. He had a good time when he was home. I knew if I did not get a furlough he could be home and enjoy himself.

The weather is cool at present. We had two heavy thunder showers this week.

About 7,000 new recruits came to Camp in the past week. One evening a lot came in and were out in a heavy shower. They were soaked to the skin, not a dry stitch on them.

I was to a picture show every night this week. I bought two new Gillette razors and paid \$1.75 a piece for them. Twelve blades were with them. The same razor and blades would cost \$5.00 to anyone but soldiers. The government sells them here. I sent one to William and will send Norman one. Roy and Charles have one. Each soldier is allowed to buy only one. One of the boys did not want one so I used his name for one. Guess Norman doesn't need it yet.

I got a letter from Carrie yesterday. When I found out I could not get a furlough, I thought I'd better send the telegram so you would know. You kept the turkey until I could be home. But I disappointed you. Well, chicken will be just as good if I can get home later. If I can get a furlough in a month or two it will be warmer. We did not have snow and cold when you wrote that you had it.

Will close for the time.

Letter to: Mr. Norman Rigel
Date: April 11, 1918
Location: Camp Sherman

Dear Parents and all,
I will write a few lines this noon. We have a little snow since yesterday morning and it is melting very fast.

I was to Cleveland on Sunday. I had only 36 hours. I left here at noon Saturday and got to Cleveland at 6 o'clock. I left Cleveland on Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. The boys are real busy. They did not loose any weight. Chas is about as heavy as he ever was. Esther is as skinny as ever. Edna is as fat as ever.

George Ocker and Jay B. are doing all right now. The boys think they will stay.

I had several letters from Wm since he was home. He is not sorry I sent the telegram. Maybe I can get a furlough soon then I will let him know.

I took some of my pictures to Cleveland and will get 6 more soon. I have them ordered. I sent Norman a razor. Let me know if he gets it. I bought two for \$1.75 a piece. The cost \$5.00 a piece any other place.

I have not seen George Gross yet. If he is here in camp, try and get his address then I will look him up. I saw in the Herald that Lester Kauffman left for Camp Meade. Was he studying for a preacher or why did he go to school?

I suppose you (Norman) are busy plowing or are you done? Have you got all the oats sowed?

Father, if you have a notion to come here to camp let me know before you come. I will let you know the best time. I seem to think you will come, but I don't know if I think right or not.

How is Harry Klingler's tractor working? How many young chicks have you, Mother?

I weighed 157 lbs when I was in Cleveland. Most of the last draft have their full uniforms.

Guess the Germans are getting more than they expected. Uncle Sam will take care of them.

News is scarce, so I will close.

The Wood Brothers, the longest continuous operating team in NASCAR will return for the 2012 season with Trevor Bayne as their driver.

Bayne, who delivered the Woods their fifth Daytona 500 triumph in just his second start in the No. 21 Ford Fusion, said he's pleased to be putting any off-season uncertainty behind him.

"I'm excited," he said. "It's a big deal for me. It's what I had hoped for. We're all excited to be back together."

Team co-owner Eddie Wood said he too is happy to have Bayne back behind the wheel of his family's race car.

"It's taken a long time to get to this announcement, but it's good to be back together," Wood said. "We all wanted to do what was best for Ford Motor Company and its young drivers, and to be sure everybody had a place to race."

Bayne, one of the younger drivers in the Sprint Cup Series, was made even more aware of the team's history and heritage and its long-standing relationship with Ford Motor Company when he watched a video on the team's history at the company Christmas party.

"There's no question at all that since the beginning, the Woods and Ford were going to stick with each other," he said. "The Woods are such a great racing family, and it's amazing that they're the only one of the original teams that has survived since the beginning."

Beginning next week, the team will be back at Daytona International Speedway for Preseason Thunder testing and trying to figure a way to adapt to a new rules package and defend their 500 victory.

"It's going to be very different at Daytona," Bayne continued, referring to a rule change that will block off air to the car's radiator and thereby limit the two-car tandem racing that Bayne so quickly adapted to. "It'll be like starting all over again, but that's OK. We'll just go try to do it again."

RUSTY WALLACE RACING CLOSES SHOP
Rusty Wallace Racing has shut down its racing shop as it continues to look for sponsorship for its two car operation.

Drivers Steve Wallace and Michael Annett were expected to compete in the Nationwide Series this season, but now both must find new rides.

"This was a tough decision to make, but it was the prudent one from a number of perspectives," Wallace said in a statement. "While we had several great partners on board for 2012, we just didn't feel like we had enough sponsorship in place to accomplish all of our goals."

"A lot of teams would have run with the level of funding we have now, but we want to ensure that our team has the resources necessary to compete and to improve our operations. I promised myself and my family long ago that if the team wasn't funded to a level with which we were comfortable, we just wouldn't run it. I've worked way too hard to put part of my life savings into a race team."

The organization will keep some of its business staff in place to look for sponsorship programs for Steve and for future seasons.

ALMIROLA GETTING ANOTHER CHANCE
Aric Almirola is one of the few drivers that has gotten another chance in the NASCAR Cup series.

This season he will be sitting behind the wheel of perhaps the most recognizable car in NASCAR history; Richard Petty's No. 43.

Almirola comes to the No. 43 after finishing fourth in the Nationwide Series in the No. 88 of Dale Earnhardt Jr.

"Obviously, it's going to be my first year running full time in Cup, so there will be some growing pains," Almirola said. "I realize that I've got a lot of learning to do. I don't expect to just go out there and win six races and run for the championship, but I do expect to be competitive. I do expect to run really good on

a regular basis." Joe Gibbs gave Almirola a one-shot run in 2007, and later that season he was chosen to partner with Mark Martin on the short-lived Bobby Ginn operation. Teresa Earnhardt added him to her DEI roster in 2008, and when she 'merged' with Chip Ganassi for 2009, Almirola kept the ride for the first seven races. James Finch then picked him up for a few races in 2010; Petty ran him in that year's last five races.

Almirola is the first driver to come out of NASCAR's diversity program and make the top series. His grandparents came to the United States from Cuba in 1966 on the Freedom Flights. They gave the Cuban government everything, including the wedding ring of Almirola's grandmother, to chase the American dream.

"When I was younger, I didn't really appreciate it," Almirola said of his heritage. "I didn't really think it meant anything, but the older I've gotten, and to now pay my own bills and now that I'm married and possibly thinking about having a family, I understand a lot better what they went through when they gave up everything they had ... to create a better life, not only for themselves but for their family."

Petty's No. 43 has made 451 starts without a victory. Since Richard Petty won his last race in 1984, the No. 43 has been to Victory Lane only three times in 855 starts with nine drivers.

It would not only benefit Petty and Almirola, but all of the NASCAR-nation if Almirola could get it back in victory lane.

NASCAR Preseason Thunder, the annual three-day NASCAR Sprint Cup Series test session at Daytona International Speedway in advance of the season-opening Daytona 500, will be held on Jan. 12-14.

All NASCAR Preseason Thunder test sessions begin at 9 am and end at 5 pm, weather permitting. Each includes a lunch break from noon until 1 pm. Race fans can also rev up their new year at the NASCAR Preseason Thunder Fan Fest – the companion event to the January test sessions. Along with watching NASCAR Preseason Thunder track activity from the Sprint FANZONE, fans can enjoy two Fan Fest driver sessions – from 5-9 p.m., on Thursday, Jan. 12 and from 5-7 p.m., on Friday, Jan. 13.

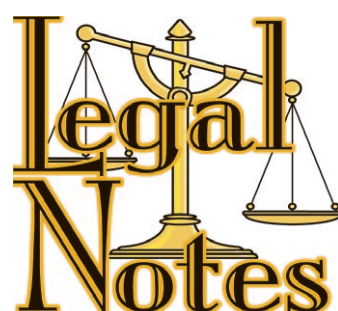
