Beware Of The "Knockout Game"

that is sweeping the nation has reportedly caused deaths in Missouri, New York, and New Jersey. Perpetrators have dubbed the brutal practice as the "knockout game" in which young people prey upon unsuspecting adults and try to randomly knock out strangers with one punch called the 'one hitter quitter.' If the victim is not knocked out after the initial hit, the participants continue to assault them until they are unconscious or they escape. The trend has gained popularity through social media with accomplices going online boasting about their recent assaults. In many instances, the attacks have been caught on camera and are later posted online.

Cities such as New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Chicago, Hoboken, and Washington D.C. have had knockout attacks which have led to several injuries and deaths.

- On November 23, 2013, the New York Police Department (NYPD) arrested four men for a "knockout" attack of a 24 year old in Brooklyn. In May 2013, a 51 year old man died after being attacked by a group of teens playing the game. Eight similar attacks are being investigated by the NYPD to determine if they are part of the growing trend.
- On November 21, 2013, a police department in Montgomery County Pennsylvania, arrested two suspects in connection with a "knockout game" style attack on a man

A disturbing new "game" who was walking his dog. The 63 year old man observed a man run by him and a second man walking towards him. He was then punched in the mouth, knocking him to the ground. LMTPD is attempting to determine if the latest incident is related to a similar attack that occurred in September 2013.

> • On November 11, 2013, a Cumberland County, Pennsylvania man was the victim of what was believed to be the "knockout game." The man was asked by a youth if he had a cigarette and when he reached into his pocket, he was punched several times by three or four individuals. On November 14, 2013, authorities arrested a 15 year old in connection with the assault.

> It is recommended that you do the following:

- Be vigilant and aware of your surroundings.
- While walking the streets, sidewalks, or other public areas avoid wearing earphones or ear buds, talking on your cellphone or playing with your phone, all of which divert your attention from your surroundings.
- Avoid large groups of teens or young adults and if encountered, attempt to walk away or move to the other side of the street. If you believe you are in immediate danger, call
- Immediately report all criminal activity and suspicious behavior to your local police department for investi-

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



Bayberry Candles for the Holidays

Do you burn bayberry candles at Christmas and/or New Years?? My mother used them at home and I still enjoy them. I've been researching some information about how they came into use in the early days of our country.

The traditions about the use of bayberry candles go back to the earliest settlers of the colonies. In late fall, as the animals were slaughtered, women would begin making candles for the following year. The average home would require approximately 200 - 400 candles to illuminate the home for a year. Animal fat was collected throughout the year but most was accumulated when the animals were butchered.

Candle making was grueling and smelly work. Tallow can become quite foul after a few weeks and it became much worse after several months! So especially in the more affluent homes, the women would make candles from beeswax or bayberry wax, as they had a more fragrant aroma which was far sweeter than anything from an animal.

The early colonists had found that the berry-like fruit of the bayberry bush which grew in the sandy soils along the northeastern coast of America and even around Lake Erie, is crusted with a greenish-white wax. The women would gather bushels of the bayberries from the five to seven foot shrubs and boil them for several hours. This heating process allowed the waxy substance to seep from the berries and because of its natural buoyancy, the wax floated to the top of the kettle. As it cooled, it was skimmed off much the same way we skim beef or chicken fat from cooled broth today. It took approximately 15 pounds of bayberries to render one pound of wax. These bayberry candles burned longer, cleaner and brighter, but because it required so much work to make them, they were often saved for special oc-


Over the years burning them on Christmas and New Year's Eve/night became a tradition. You were to light the candle on the eve of the holiday and allow it to burn completely down to the 'socket.' Colonial folklore states that if you burn a new bayberry candle on Christmas and New Year's eves, you'd have health, wealth and prosperity in the coming year. The old say-

'A bayberry candle burnt to the socket brings health to the home and wealth to the pocket." or "A bayberry candle burnt to the socket brings food to the larder and gold to the pocket." Well, as you've seen, I'm taking a break from the one and two room school discussion this week, but do continue to send in vour comments about them! "When we moved from Bee Branch to Shirley, Arkansas, there wasn't any boys around to play with, just girls. Mother made me a doll on her old treadmill sewing machine, and filled it with straw and rags, so I would have something to play with.

"It might seem funny now, but I had the time of my life playing with that doll, along with my three sisters and the other girls.
