Feeding the Hungry This Weekend

Over the weekend of November 17-18, members and friends of the Upper Susquehanna Synod will pack and distribute 40,000 meals through the organization Outreach, Inc. (http://www.outreachprogram.org/projects/food-program/). Assembly lines of 10-12 volunteers each will assemble, seal, label, and pack 6-serving packages of a nutritionally-fortified macaroni and cheese dish for the low cost of 25 cents per serving. Boxes packed with this product will be given to local food pantries, shelters, and congregations with food distribution programs around our synod.

Two packing events are being planned. One will be held on Saturday, November 17, at Camp Mount Luther, outside Mifflinburg. That event will run from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The second will be on Sunday afternoon, November 18, at St. John Lutheran Church, Jersey Shore. That event will run from 1:00-5:00 p.m. Both events have sufficient volunteers signed up. Volunteers are asked to also make a \$10-20 contribution (if able) toward the cost of this event.


In both cases, this is an opportunity for hands-on service for youth groups, women's groups, young adults, men's groups, Sunday School classes, and people of all ages, who are all expected to participate this weekend.


We believe that Jesus calls us to do what we can to help feed hungry people. This is a cool way for any kind of group to work together to make a difference in their community. It's a great organization!" Rev. Beth Ann Stone, assistant to the Upper Susquehanna Synod bishop, said.

Following the packing of these meals, they will be distributed to area food pantries and food shelves who distribute food without charge to hungry people. On Saturday and Sunday, volunteers will be crating 93 boxes of meals (each box contains 36 bags, 6 servings/bag). Volunteers can leave the event with filled boxes to deliver to local food shelves.

The synod is still looking for sponsors to help with this project. The cost of these meals (\$10,000 for 40,000 meals, or \$.25/meal) is being shared by event volunteers, sponsoring individuals and congregations, and grants. All donations toward the project go directly to pay for the costs of the food and packing materials. This week I'll share an interesting story from one of our readers, Chet (Chester) Gaugler ... it involves a man from Snyder County who lost his life in WW1... Brewster C Schoch of Selinsgrove. A brief write-up about him tells: 'Sgt. Brewster Cameron Schoch was one of the gallant Americans who, in time of war, made the supreme sacrifice As a member of the 28th Division, he was shipped to France in the spring of 1918. Schoch became Snyder County's first World War I casualty when he was killed in action on July 29th, 1918. Sgt. Schoch is buried in the Aisne-Marne American Military Cemetery. (Does anyone know if his body was later brought back to USA?)

And now from Mr. Gaugler: "This is a true family story and experience lived by my dad, Leon E. Gaugler. It has to do with Brewster C. Schoch who was killed in WWI. 'My dad was a good friend of Brewster's who owned a

Model '97, Winchester pump shotgun. When he decided to

join the army, he also decided to sell the shotgun and oth-

er equipment that went with it. And so it was that my dad bought the entire package... gun, cleaning equipment, plus lubricating oil. This transaction happened about one week before Brewster left for the war. My dad used that gun for hunting and skeet shooting until 1959, when he went into the hospital. He passed that '97 Winchester on to me in 1962 and I, at 91 years of age this

year, passed the entire package, including that marvelous shotgun, on to my younger son, Dean. He lives in Connecticut with his wife and three children.

'We investigated the history of this particular gun and have a considerable printed history which was published by the Winchester Arms Company. A few of the facts are:

World War I –they were used in trench warfare as a sawed (I've read that the enemy opposed America's use of shot-

guns as inhumane! My thought...'You've got to be kidding!!'...Jean) World War 2—they were in some infantry combat training

(as sawed-off), also used by the Army Air Corps in aerial gunnery schools. While traveling in the back of a moving bumpy pickup truck, the men would shoot at moving clay targets which were launched from high and low houses, at various angles and heights. (This was part of my U.S. Army Air Corps cadet training in 1944.) Federal Prison use---they were also used in numerous prisons as riot guns and tower equipment on manned wall security." Very interesting!! Mr. Gaugler was born in 1921 on the Isle

of Que and is a Selinsgrove native but now lives in Bloomsburg. Perhaps some of you know him and his family. Any more comments about the '97 Winchester shotgun? When we lived in San Jose, we visited the Winchester House. Have you been there? What did you think of it? Would love to get more stories from you to share! Jean

2012 Census of Agriculture to be Mailed in December

Starting in December, farmers across Pennsylvania can expect to see 2012 Census of Agriculture forms arriving in their mailboxes.

Conducted every five years by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the census of Agriculture is a complete count of the nation's farms and ranches, and the people who operate them. Participation by agricultural producers is crucial.

Results from the Census are used by USDA and other organizations to develop programs and strategies for the agriculture industry. Results will be used in considering future farm programs, transportation and telecommunications infrastructure, rural economic development, conservation programs and new agriculture technologies.

Additionally, Census data is used by companies and cooperatives to determine locations of new agricultural facilities and y lawmakers when determining farm policies and

Čensus questionnaires will be mailed to farm and ranch owners in late December, with forms due back by February 4, 2013. Producers can complete the forms and mail, or through a secure website at www.aqcensus.usda.gov.

Information provided by producers is kept confidential and data is only used for statistical purposes. The Union County Farm Bureau is a voluntary organiza-

tion that works to advance the interests of agriculture and rural communities. It offers numerous benefits and services to its members, and is affiliated with the Pennsylvania Farm Bureau and the American Farm Bureau Federation. Pa. Farm Bureau Produced Shjow Available on Website

A half-hour program, featuring Pennsylvania Farm Bureau members discussing the importance of youth in agriculture is available on PFB's website at www.pfb.corn.

"Voices of Agriculture" tells the story of young people who have pursued, or are considering, careers in agriculture. While they come from different backgrounds, and commodity areas, each of the farmers profiled become interested in agriculture as either youths or young adults The show also touched upon an attempt by the federal De-





Commissioners Began **Historic Tours**

The Union County Bicentennial Co-chairs, Nada Gray of Lewisburg and Union County Commissioner John Showers began a historic tour of sorts on Monday evening, September 10th visiting the Union County Township official Supervisors' meetings in both Buffalo and West Buffalo Townships. These first two stops are part of a 14 stop municipal visit by the Bicentennial Co-chairs to all of Union County's townships and boroughs heralding the upcoming Union County Bicentennial

Greeted in Buffalo Township, Supervisor Chair Joe Wise reminded the duo that "We are all descended from Buffalo." "Buffalo Township that is," Wise continued. Commissioner Showers agreed with the Wise statement adding that according to Linn's Annals at a much earlier point prior to the division of Union County in 1813, all of Union County and parts of Snyder, Centre, Clinton, and Lycoming Counties were part of one Township of Buffalo. Showers also noted that discussions in the state legislature in 1813 referred to all of the lands (both current day Snyder and Union Counties) as the Buffalo Valley.

Supervisor Wise's statement created an opening for Showers and Gray to explain a unique buffalo or bison twist to next year's Union County Bicentennial Celebration. Nada Gray said, "Living, Working, Celebrating is the officially adopted theme for Union County, Pennsylvania 2013 Bicentennial. However, as historians, community leaders, and citizens focused on this milestone anniversary, a consensus developed that 2013 might just finally be the time, once and for all, to resolve a long lingering public controversy: "Did the fabled buffalo (aka bison) actually roam our bucolic valleys?

Commissioner Showers continued, "As the 2013 Union County Bicentennial celebration unfolds, there appears no better time than the present to explore our county's communities, historic sites, mountains, valleys, and streams to meet the people, learn of the places, hear the stories, and decide for you whether

a place of honor is reserved for bison pennsylvaniacus here!
Nada Gray concluded, "No need to sprout whiskers or don a long dress, Bicentennial 2013 is about exploring your county – your backyard. A perfect time to consider all the possibilities... that what might have been and maybe more importantly all that

The Co-chairs ended their municipal calls with an invitation for the township officials and citizens to get involved in the celebration in 2013, and not to miss out on the more than 52 planned events spanning interests from a learned historical lecture on the forested landscape of the West End, to a mock court trial for high school students arguing an actual 1814 Union County court case, to an October bike outing in the scenic White Deer Valley complete with a stop at a neighborhood cider press.

Attention Property Owners in Limestone Township

This notice concerns property owners and residents who conduct business with the public on their property, including businesses within the home. If your business was started prior to UCC (2004) the structure would have needed Labor & Industry Certificate of Occupancy, if it does not have this approval it is an uncertified building. If the business was started after April 2004 it should have had local approval and a Certificate of Occupancy issued by the CKCOG.

As of April 9, 2004 Act 45 of the UCC was enacted.

Act 45 requires the following:

ertified buildings which are under the jurisdiction of local government. Under this section, a construction code official must issue a certificate of occupancy to an uncertified building if it meets the requirements of the latest version of the "International Existing Building Code" or Chapter 34 of the "International Building Code." A construction code official may deny the issuance of a certificate of occupancy only if the official deems that a building is unsafe because of inadequate means of egress, inadequate lighting and ventilation, fire hazards or other dangers to human life or to public welfare.

Certification of all structures in Limestone Township used for business purposes is administered by the Central Keystone Council of Governments (COG). Please contact the Central
