Head-on Crash Leaves One Dead

A head-on crash on Sunday afternoon left a motorcyclist dead and his passenger critically injured. The accident occurred on Route 204 at Salem Road, in Jackson Township, in Snyder County at 3:40 p.m.

A Buick Lucerne driven by Frederick R. Frost, 79, of Selinsgrove, was traveling north on Route 204 when his vehicle traveled into the oncoming lane of traffic where it struck a Yamaha V-Star motorcycle driven by Cole E. Rice, 46, of Mifflinburg and his passenger Lorrie K. Oberdorf, 41, also of Mifflinburg. Frost was wearing a seatbelt and was not injured. Neither Rice or Oberdorf were wearing helmets. Rice, was pronounced dead at the scene. His passenger Oberdorf, was life flighted to Geisinger Medical Center in Danville for treatment of serious injuries. As of Sunday evening, Oberdorf was listed in critical condition. The investigation continues.

Accident Claims the Life of 21 Year Old Bittner

A 21 year old Mifflinburg man was killed on Wednesday afternoon after he lost control of his vehicle on a wet road.

Shawn Carl Bittner, 21, of Mifflinburg, was traveling east on Walbash Road, west of Tyson Road, in West Buffalo Township at 12:41 p.m. Wednesday afternoon when he lost control of his 1986 Volkswagen Scirocco, on the wet roads. Bittner's vehicle traveled into the path of a 1999 Dodge Dakota driven by Shannon Deanna Long, 30, also of Mifflinburg, which was traveling west on Walbash Road. Long's vehicle struck the passenger side of Bittner's vehicle causing extensive damage.

Long was not injured. Her two juvenile passengers were treated at the scene for minor injuries. Bittner, who was not wearing a seatbelt, was pronounced dead at the scene by Union County Coroner Wanda Walters. Both vehicles were towed from the scene. Mifflinburg EMS assisted on the scene. The crash still remains under investigation.

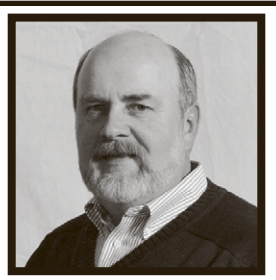

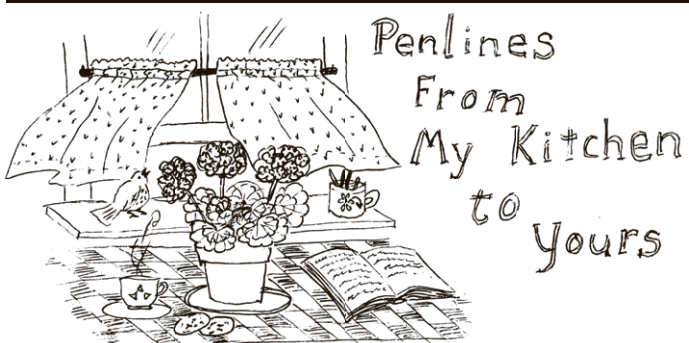

Evangelical Community Health and Wellness Has Record Setting Year

Evangelical Community Hospital's Community Health and Wellness had a record-setting year of providing services to the community, aiding in its mission to promote wellness throughout the Central Susquehanna Valley.

One notable area of service is that of their child safety seat fitting station. Sheila Packer, Director of Community Health and Wellness said, "When parents drive away from our car seat fitting station knowing their seat is properly installed and their child has the protection they need, we know we've just made a difference."

"Evangelical Community Hospital's child passenger safety program is an outstanding resource for the community. They have proven to be exceptional partners to work with in educating parents and families on the importance of properly buckling up children in car seats," said Angela Osterhuber, director of the Pennsylvania Traffic Injury Prevention Project.

Parents are encouraged to make an appointment at Community Health and Wellness at 7095 West Branch Highway, Lewisburg, to have their car seats checked. They are asked to bring the seat, the vehicle in which it is most regularly installed, the vehicle manual and the manual for the car seat.

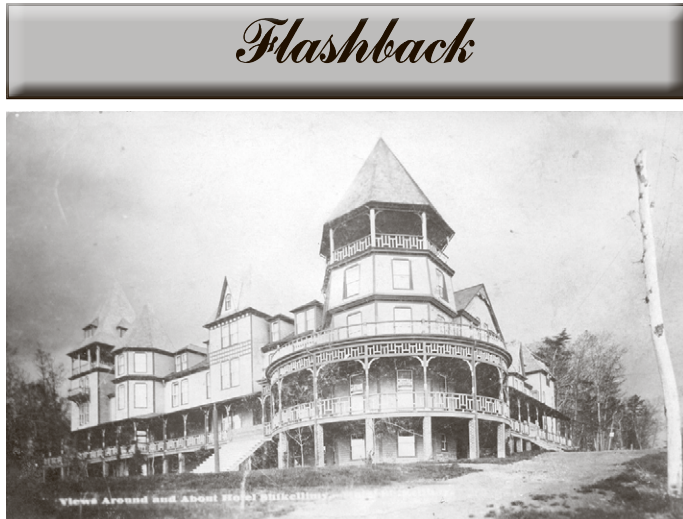

It's "Rowdy" Kyle At The Glen

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y.—Kyle Busch displayed one of his better driving performances on the way to victory in Sunday's Sprint Cup race.

Starting fifth, he didn't take the lead in the 90-lap race until lap 65. During the last 25 laps, he survived four restarts, and fought off six challenges by runner-up Brad Keselowski, and third-place finisher, Martin Truex.

Each time someone tried to pass, Busch raced that much harder. The last restart came with three laps-to-go. When the green flag was given, Busch was gone. The best the other leaders could hope for was to finish second.

"We really had an awesome car," said Busch. "The engine ran great and it was fun to drive. I knew that I had to keep my position, because if someone got out in front of me, it was going to be hard to pass them back."

At the end, Brad Keselowski had the second-fastest car. "My car was really good after five or ten laps," said Keselowski. "But on that last short two-three lap restart, we couldn't quite catch Kyle."

Martin Truex tried several times earlier in the race to get around Kyle, but never succeeded.

"This being a road course, I'd say we held our own," said Truex. "We were good on short runs, but couldn't quite catch Kyle near the end."

Carl Edwards was fourth, followed by Juan Montoya, Clint Bowyer, Joey Logano, Jimmie Johnson, Kurt Busch, and A. J. Allmendinger.

Polesitter Marcos Ambrose, who led the most laps, got bumped into the wall on lap 83 by Max Papis, who was substituting for Tony Stewart. Ambrose finished 31st.

Jeff Gordon spun coming out of a turn on lap 15, and hit the inside fence, heavily damaging his car. He returned to the track but finished 36th.

During lap 80, Kasey Kahne spun, and was then hit by his teammate Dale Earnhardt Jr. The track was blocked and several more cars ran into them.

DRIVER CHASE SCENARIO

Jimmie Johnson has clinched a berth in this year's Chase which begins September 15, after the Richmond race.

Clint Bowyer will make the Chase. The Michael Waltrip Racing cars aren't as fast relative to the competition as they were last year, but that doesn't mean he won't be in the final number.

Kevin Harvick has had a so-so season. He's run well at some tracks, and at others he's bombed. This will be his last year at Richard Childress Racing. He will probably make the Chase, but don't look for him to challenge for the championship.

Carl Edwards and his Roush Fenway Ford team are still searching for the right package with the new Gen-6 car, but Edwards has shown

speed in qualifying, even if he hasn't converted excellent starting spots into quality finishes. But he's running fast enough to qualify for the Chase.

All Dale Earnhardt Jr. needs to grab a Chase spot is have a respectable finish next Sunday at Michigan and the sort of steady, consistent performances in the final four races that have become commonplace for Earnhardt and crew chief Steve Letarte this year.

Jeff Gordon made a statement, two Sunday's ago at Pocono, where he got his runner-up finish the old fashioned way, by earning it. But after his dismal 36th-place finish at the Glen, he needs to have better luck in the final four races if he is to make the 12-driver field.

Kyle Busch always makes a race exciting. Personally, I think his team has experienced more than the average amount of bad luck. If things turn just a little in their favor, like they did at the Glen, he could be on top.

Matt Kenseth started off well, but has slowed down lately. His team is not on an upswing.

Greg Biffle and his Ford team have suffered the same fate as Carl Edwards, mediocre performance. His average finish over the last five races is 18.4. Biffle is between a top-10 guaranteed Chase spot and a Wild Card one.

Kasey Kahne has shown brief moments of speed, and I expect he will make the Chase, but his team hasn't impressed me lately.

To qualify for the Chase on points, Brad Keselowski needs to finish up front over the next four races. Another option for Brad is a win, which could come at any of the next four tracks.

Kurt Busch has driven his car to the limit this year. Collectively, 11 of Busch's 24 NASCAR Sprint Cup wins have come at the last four tracks in NASCAR's regular season, Michigan, Bristol, Atlanta and Richmond. I have to say that Busch is favored to make this year's Chase.

Martin Truex Jr. might be an outsider looking in. His team's cars haven't had the speed of the Hendrick or Stewart-Haas cars of late, and that could affect him.

Ryan Newman's win at the Brickyard was huge. It helped turn a poor season into possibly a great one. He is a driver on the move. Statistically, Richmond is Newman's best track among the five remaining before the Chase. He has 13 top 10s in 23 starts there and may need another to secure a berth in the Chase.

Heimbach Passes Kauffman Twice For Port Royal 410 Sprint Win

Point leader Blane Heimbach of Selinsgrove had to pass Keith Kauffman not once but twice to drive to his fourth 410 sprint victory of the season at Port Royal Speedway on Saturday night.

Just one week before the oval hosts Keith Kauffman Farewell Tribute night, the 63-year old veteran looked ready to pick up his first win of the season but Heimbach would not be denied for the \$3,000 victory.

In the 20-lap late model feature, Coleby Frye of Dover drove to his third oval win of the year while Logan Wagner battled Alex Schanz for half of the 305 sprint main before securing the lead for good. Tim Krape took his eighth win of the season in the pro stock division. Dylan Cisney and Kauffman started on the front row of the 25-lap 410 sprint main with Kauffman taking the lead when action got going over Cisney and fourth starter Heimbach.

The initial start of the main was yellow flagged when third starter Brian Leppo looped his car in the fourth turn before the first lap could be recorded. Heimbach got around Cisney for second with seven laps away in the feature and drove up to Kauffman for the lead and was able to muscle by and control the ninth lap by a scant .183 second margin before Kauffman bolted back to his inside in the first corner. The move netted Kauffman the point again and he had opened up a little distance between himself and Heimbach when the pace was slowed with 11 down. The restart saw Heimbach quickly go to work and drive to Kauffman's outside exiting the fourth corner to lead lap 12 before the caution flag again unfurled, this time for a two-car tangle in the fourth turn.

Kauffman got to Heimbach's inside

in the first and second turns when action resumed but Heimbach was able to pull him down the backstretch and go back into control solidly entering the third corner. The rest of the distance went non-stop with Heimbach working lapped traffic during the final five circuits of the race to pick up the seventh overall victory of his career at the track while Kauffman settled for second. The Mifflintown driver was going for sprint car win number 130 at Port Royal but instead crossed the line 4.130 seconds behind the winner. Cisney was third followed by Mike Wagner and 19th starter Chad Layton. Heimbach's win allowed him to stretch his advantage over Layton in the point's chase with just six sprint shows left on the championship season. Sixth through 10th went to Bob Bennett, Davey Sammons, Rodney Westhafer, Leppo and Joey Hershey. Heats for the 23-car field went to Curt Stroup, Sammons and Heimbach.

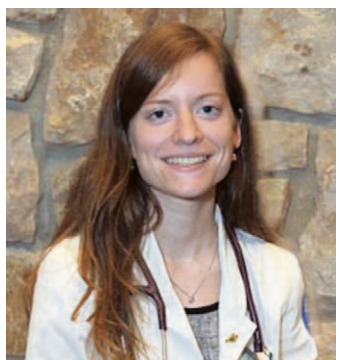
Frye started the late model main in the fifth position and was already up to second when the races first caution flag fell on just the first lap. The restart saw Frye power into the lead and then stay out front despite several cautions that regrouped the field. The point leader with just three races remaining, Terry Naugle took over second spot from Scott Flickinger on the ninth tour but failed to challenge Frye's No. 32 for the win. At total of six caution flags plagued the race including one for a five-car tangle in the first corner at the halfway point. The win was the fifth of Frye's overall career at the oval. After starting 12th, Matt Parks blasted forward to finish third followed by Mitch Hack and Brett Schadel. Naugle too was able to extend his point lead in a quest for the division title over Schadel. Sixth through 10th went to Mike Lupfer, Scott Flickinger, Waylon Wagner, Trent Brenneman and Patrick Bryner. Heats for the 24-car field went to Lupfer, Frye and Patrick Bryner.

Front row starters Alex Schanz and Logan Wagner see-sawed back and forth for the lead for the first 10 laps of the 20-lap 305 sprint main with Schanz being scored the official leader of the sixth loop. But the pair actually exchanged the point back and forth several times throughout the first 10 laps although Wagner crossed the line in control on the other nine circuits.

However after the races only caution flag unfurled with 10 down and 10 to go, Wagner took off and drove to his third win of the year at the track handily over Schanz. The win put him atop the all time Port Royal 305 sprint win list with five to his credit. It was also his ninth win overall on the year. Scott Ellerman rode home third followed by Kody Lehman and Mark Watkins. Heats for the 26-car field went to Schatz, Wagner and Ellerman. Kyle Rapp started on the pole of the 15-lap pro stock main and led the first six laps before Krape took over from his seventh starting position. Once in front, Krape pulled out to a healthy lead only to see Rapp close onto his rear bumper during the final pair of laps. Rapp settled for second however over Dan Berry, Nate Fisher and Derrick Garman. Heats for the 12-car field went to Garman and Krape.
