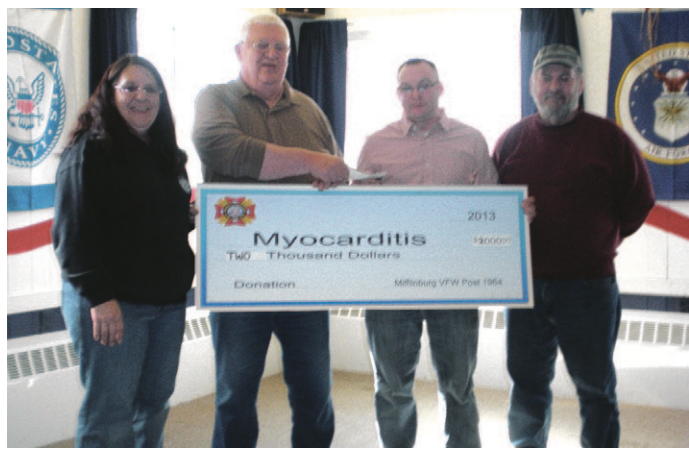

Tom Wagner received \$2,000 for Myocarditis Awareness. Tom's daughter Cathrynne Elizabeth Wagner, who was born September 4, 2009, died on April 29, 2012, at the age of 2 1/2 after becoming ill for three days. She was later diagnosed with myocarditis.

Myocarditis is a disease marked by inflammation and damage of the heart muscle. It usually attacks otherwise healthy people and it is believed that five to twenty percent of all cases of sudden death in young adults is due to myocarditis. There are many causes of myocarditis, including viral infections, autoimmune diseases, environmental toxins, and adverse reaction to medications. The prognosis is variable, but chronic heart failure is the major long term complication. Myocarditis is commonly treated with medications used to treat heart failure. Rest and a low sodium diet are often recommended. Steroids and other medications may also be used to reduce heart inflammation. More rarely, if an abnormal heart rhythm is present, the patient may require a pacemaker or even a defibrillator. Six Piglets Killed as Fire Destroys Barn

Bob heard a loud bang around 11 p.m. Monday evening and ran out of the house to see one of the farm's barns up in flames. By the time the fire trucks reached the scene the barn was destroyed and another barn was burning.

The cause of the fire has yet to be determined. The Sauers have insurance. The total value of the loss is not known at this time.

Klondike Derby: Teamwork and Scout Spirit

Teamwork and Scout spirit filled the brisk winter air at the Boy Scout Klondike Derby held on Saturday, February 9, 2013 at the Buffalo Valley Sportsman's Association grounds in Mifflinburg. The purpose of the event was for scouts to use their brains, put their scouting skills to work in the field, demonstrate Teamwork and Scout Spirit, and of course, have fun on a winter day. For their bravery in the cold, preparedness, and excellence in scouting skills, it's safe to say that all of the scouts who participated in the Klondike Derby were winners!

The Seven Bridges District serves 31 Boy Scout troops in Snyder, Union and Northumberland Counties. Of these 31 troops, approximately 200 youth and adults registered for this year's Seven Bridges District Klondike Derby, for a total of 22 sled patrols. This is the biggest crowd for the district Klondike to date according to Ethel Snook of the Susquehanna Council Advisory Committee. To protect against the cold, all troops are required to have weather hazard training before participating in the event.

The Klondike Derby consisted of 14 stations for scouts to test their skills. They included: First Aid, Map Skills, Fire Building, Flag Pole Building, Sled Race, Thin Ice Rescue, Blind Tent Pitch, .22 Rifle Shoot, Shotgun (Skeet) Shoot, Tomahawk Throw, A-Frame, Nature ID and Hot Isotope. According to Kathy McKibben District Activities Director, awards for first through fourth place were given for each of the fourteen stations by tallying the scores. Individual awards were presented to the patrol with the highest scores in Fire Building, Sled Race, Hot Isotope, and .22 Rifle Shoot.

Chris Berleth, Seven Bridges District Executive, explained that the Klondike is strictly a Boy Scout event. "All that we do at the Klondike Derby promotes the three aims of scouting: character development, personal fitness, and citizenship. This event epitomizes those aims by focusing on youth leadership and the patrol method."

Nine troops braved the cold, windy weather and camped overnight. Colton McCollum enjoyed his first year of camping out at the Klondike, "Because it was an adventure to prepare yourself for winter."

All kinds of mishaps can occur during the Derby and the scouts have to be prepared to cope with those challenges. Zack Snyder of Troop 408 in McClure shook his head and said, "Our sled broke during the sled race and we didn't have any duct tape to fix it." Marshall Wertz explained his troop's dilemma, "We ran into a tree and the front part of our sled chipped."

Guffey remarked, "We teach the boys how to shoot. Most know how to shoot but this is new to some." Paul Brungard noted, "It is going good. You can tell if they have it done it before."

Which event is the best depends on whom you ask. For Kyle Fawver of Troop 490 in Freeburg the .22 Rifle Shoot is the best. "I like to shoot guns. I like the .22 range. I shoot with 4-H and I'm on a Trap Team."

But according to Bobby Sena of Troop 513 in Winfield, it's Fire Building. "It is a fun activity. We beat the other team—the older scouts that taught us how to build fires at Camp K."

When asked his favorite event Elijah Feltman of Middleburg Troop 415 stated, "Shotgun... because we had a competition between the people in the troop, Parker Arbogast won!"

Dominick Abate of Troop 490 enjoyed the thrill of the Tomahawk Throw event.

The Klondike Derby created memories that will last a lifetime and provide interesting stories for the boys to tell their friends. Dustin Stuck of Freeburg Troop 490 commented, "You get to do stuff that you don't do at home."

Aaron Benfer of Winfield Troop 513 commented, "We like to share ideas and skills. I like the outdoors!"

Dawson Aucker of Troop 408 in McClure summed it up saying, "You get to do things with the people in your troop."

"I am at the Blind Tent Pitch Station. It is hilarious." Adult leader Robin Colyer of Troop 419 chuckled, "It is interesting how the boys talk with their hands. But with the blind folds on the other boys can't see."

Jim Boob led the Nature ID event. He has been sharing his knowledge at the Klondike for 20 years. "I did a lot of trapping. I wanted to be able to identify an animal skull if I found it out in the woods. It is more interesting if you are out in the woods walking and can identify the skulls." Boob has a collection of skulls that included bobcat, otter, porcupine, ground hog, skunk and more.

BVSA Volunteer Mike Klingler was impressed with the turnout in spite of the weather. But the Klondike Derby is all about winter survival.

Chris Berleth said, "We are grateful to the Buffalo Valley Sportsman's Association for helping to provide this opportunity for the kids." Kathy McKibben concurred, "They provided expert volunteers in the shooting events, Sled Race, First Aid, and Nature ID. We had use of their facility and guns. They also served us a meal."

"I've been coming to the Klondike for 12 years. The boys always enjoy it, no matter what the weather—cold, snow, or rain." Ed Palmeter of Troop 610 from Watsonstown remarked, "It is a good event and I'm glad they have it. It is like the Boy Scout Winter Olympics. That is the best way to describe it!"

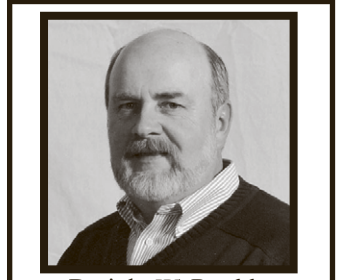

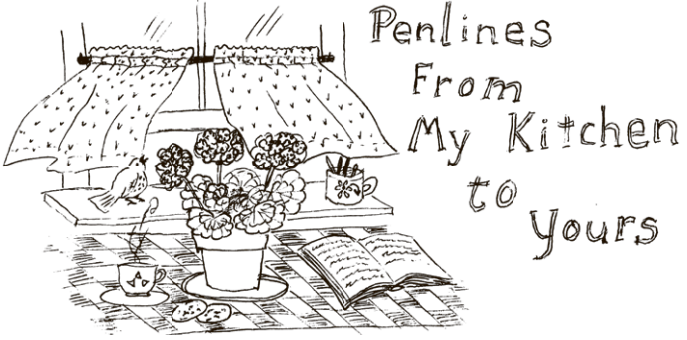

Patrick Claims Daytona Pole, Makes History

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla.—Danica Patrick's time of 196.43 miles per hour during Sunday's qualifying for the Feb. 24, Daytona 500 was the fastest of any driver, and gave her the honor of being the first female to win a Cup pole.

"I'm so proud," she said. "So much attention and detail went into making this pole possible. It speaks volumes about the organization and our potential."

"I was a little bit nervous. It's all about just getting the shifts right and being smooth, and more than anything, you're trying to hug the line as much as possible, trying to not steer too much. Sometimes the car wants to track up and move up the track a little bit, and you've got to pull it down, but you also don't want to hit the apron. So it's not like you go out there and lock your arms, and it just stays there."

Patrick's qualifying speed was third fastest at Daytona since the introduction of restrictor plates at the 2.5-mile track in 1989. Ken Schrader ran faster laps in time trials in both 1989 and 1990.

Patrick is the 11th consecutive different driver to win the pole for the Daytona 500.

Janet Guthrie held the previous mark for qualifying by a female driver. She started ninth twice in 1977, at Bristol and Talladega.

Jeff Gordon was second at 196.29 mph. "This is big, to be on the front row at Daytona," Gordon said. "It's an accomplishment in itself just because of how many people put so much hard work into it, not just from our team but all the teams that are out here."

"When you have all winter long to prepare, you have the biggest race of the year as your first race, there's a lot of effort that goes into those two laps."

"We're here to win the Daytona 500. Sitting on the front row is a great step towards accomplishing that goal."

"It's great to be a part of history with Danica being on the pole. I think we all know how popular she is, what this will do for our sport. Congratulations to her. Proud to be on there with her."

The two front row starting spots for Sunday's Daytona 500 are set.

The next 30 positions will be decided by placement in the Budweiser Duels, to run on Thursday, February 21. Fifteen positions will be added to the already qualified pole sitter in each Duel race. We now have 32 cars qualified.

The next four positions (33, 34, 35, 36) will go to drivers that didn't make it in through the qualifying Duels, but posted the four fastest speeds in the February 17 qualifier. The next six positions, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42 will be awarded as provisional starts based on 2012 owner points.

Finally, position 43, last on the starting grid, will go to the most recent past champion not yet in the field. If there is not a past champion still not in, that position will be filled by the next driver eligible based on 2012 owner points.

For all races following the Daytona 500, the fastest 36 drivers in qualifying will make the race with six spots based on owner points and one spot reserved for a past champion (and if no past champion, another by owner points). For the next two races, Phoenix and Las Vegas, 2012 owner points will be used.

SATURDAY'S SPRINT UNLIMITED AND ARCA WINNERS
Kevin Harvick in the first event of his final season for Richard Childress Racing won what was dubbed as the "Sprint Somewhat Unlimited" after nearly half the field vanished after a major pileup on lap 15 of the 75-lap race.

Greg Biffle finished second, followed by Joey Logano and Tony Stewart.

John Wes Townley won Saturday's ARCA Re/Max series 200 at Daytona.

Townley won from the pole in what was the 50th annual ARCA Racing Series event at Daytona International Speedway.

"It's one thing to win your first race in ARCA, it's another to win at Daytona," Townley said after the first win in the 31-year history of Venturini Motorsports at Daytona International Speedway.

Kyle Larson, Ricky Ehlrott, Frank Kimmel, and Sean Corr were the remaining top-5.

The next ARCA race will be March 9 at Mobile International Speedway.

CAN DALE JR BOUNCE BACK AT DAYTONA
Dale Jr. is rested and rarin' to go, as he hopes to regain the glory he once had at restrictor plate tracks.

The multirac crash he caused at Daytona in preseason testing could be a good thing. It taught him, and probably everyone else, a little something about what can and can't be done in the new Gen-6 car on a restrictor plate track.

But Earnhardt remains confident this car will race similar to the Gen-4, the one that made him a restrictor-plate star.

From the middle of the 2001 season through the end of 2004, Earnhardt won seven of 14 plate races -- two at Daytona (the 2001 July race after his father's death in the 500 and the 2004 Daytona 500) and five at Talladega.

"I'm really excited and look forward to sort of getting back to that older style of (restrictor) plate racing and I think it will provide a really good Daytona 500," said Earnhardt.



"I struggled with the (COT) car and you couldn't overdrive the car at all, even half a car length into the corner and it would get p'o'ed at you. This car we have today still has a splitter, but I think the rest of the car is definitely a step back toward the old, original car we used to have."

"I think that's going to benefit me in certain areas and in other areas, I'll still have to learn. There will be new things about this car. New things it does that you'll have to tailor yourself to and understand."

"I'm certain that I'll have to have an open mind towards a lot of things about the car that I might not fall in love with, but as a whole the car is really exciting. I'm looking forward to it."

WILL GORDON GET HIS PAYBACK
Practically everyone is wondering if Clint Bowyer will have a payback moment at Daytona and wreck Gordon to retaliate for Gordon intentionally wrecking him in last year's race at Phoenix.

I wouldn't count on it, especially at Daytona. Intentionally wrecking someone on a plate track is a really bad idea, possibly causing a 20-car melee.

Second, Bowyer is a serious title contender and he knows it. Wrecking Gordon to "get even" is not in Bowyer's best interest in the big picture. Things could go wrong and he could end up wrecking himself in the process, and hurt his overall Chase chances.

"A lot of people didn't have us chalked up to make the Chase," said Bowyer. "So to be able to win three races together our first time out and make the Chase -- we proved that wrong -- and go down to the wire in the championship in our first year together -- we were ecstatic! We were happy with that. So I don't see that side of a huge letdown. We were pumped up about it and don't see that second place hangover."

"It was a complete start over from scratch...with a new manufacturer in Toyota, a new organization in MWR, a new sponsor. To be able to share the success we had right off the bat was certainly special. It meant a lot to me. It was an eye-opener -- I think it opened my eyes and a lot of people's eyes to the potential of this race team. If we could come out of the box and have the success we had in the first year together, I really think the sky is the limit this year."

Weekend Racing: There's plenty of NASCAR racing this week. Starting Thursday, there will be two 60-lap exhibition races, called the Budweiser Duels. Friday the trucks will run a 100-lapper, while the Nationwide teams go at it on Saturday. On Sunday, it's the Daytona 500, NASCAR's most prestigious race of the season.

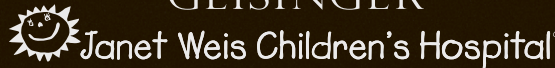

Keller Unveils Declaration of Independence for PA Workers

State Representative Fred Keller (R-85) joined in a Capitol press conference with House members and leading Right to Work advocates from across the Commonwealth to introduce the Pennsylvania Open Workforce Initiative.

Keller's Right to Work legislation (House Bill 52) would prohibit labor organizations from collecting compulsory union dues from state employees.

"One of my constituents was forced to pay in excess of \$600 of compulsory union dues during 2012 in exchange for the fundamental right to work in Pennsylvania," said Keller. "I consider this package of legislation a declaration of independence for Pennsylvania workers that will empower them to decide whether or not to join or financially support a labor union. In other words, they should have the right to decide for themselves whether they want to pay for union membership or spend that money to put food on their table, keep their homes a few degrees warmer during the winter months, or invest in a college education for their children. Making Pennsylvania a Right to Work state is all about giving Pennsylvania workers the right to decide how they spend their hard earned money."

Designed to protect the individual freedoms of Pennsylvania's working citizens and energize the economy by ending the practice of compulsory unionism, other bills comprising the Pennsylvania Open Workforce Initiative are as follows:

- House Bill 50 would make employment no longer conditional upon union membership or paying dues to a union.
- House Bill 51 would prohibit labor unions from collecting compulsory union dues from non-union public school employees.
- House Bill 53 would prohibit labor organizations from collecting compulsory union dues from non-union local government employees.
- House Bill 54 would prohibit private-sector employment from being conditional upon membership or non-membership in a labor organization. Compulsory dues would be prohibited for non-union members.
- House Bill 250 would give public employees the freedom to opt out of their union membership at any time during their contract. Current law only allows employees to terminate their union membership 15 days prior to the expiration of the contract.

"The right to work has always boiled down to the individual freedom to choose," said Keller. "If union representation is such a valuable product, why must employees purchase it through the collection of forced union dues? Pennsylvania workers should have the right to decide how to spend their hard-earned wages."

Bacteria Pollution Found in Union County Creeks

The volunteer board members of the non-profit Buffalo Creek Watershed Alliance (BCWA) of the Merrill W. Linn Land and Waterways Conservancy were surprised at the high levels of bacteria in Union County creeks when the Union County Conservation District (UCCD) shared testing data. Working for ten years for a healthier creek, the alliance never considered that tests would show that Buffalo Creek and Limestone Run had such serious bacterial pollution. The board felt compelled to share the following information with the public to stimulate improvement of water quality in the county.

During the summer of 2009 and 2010, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and area volunteers conducted testing for fecal coliform bacteria in three Union County watersheds: Buffalo Creek, Limestone/ Bull Run and Upper Penns Creek. This testing did not differentiate between human bacteria from sewage treatment plants and septic systems and animal bacteria from farming and wild and domesticated animals.

This bacterial testing was done on five different days over two summer months. Data from these tests were calculated in a geometric mean. For an accurate scientific explanation of this process see the 2012 Integrated Report with technical explanations that is available for the public review on DEP's website: http://www.depweb.state.pa.us/portal/server.pt/community/water_quality_standards/10556/integrated_water_quality_report_-_2012/1127203

The DEP, through the Pennsylvania County Conservation Districts, is required by the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to make every effort to reduce bacteria, or "fecal coliforms" in Pennsylvania waterways to below 200 cfu/100 ml (amount of colony forming units per 100 milliliters of stream water).

Test results in 2010 showed that the bacterial count on Buffalo Creek at two different sites upstream at Hoover Road Bridge and downstream at Forest Hill Road Bridge in early summer and late summer was well above the bacterial counts allowed by the EPA of 200. For example, from mid-June to mid-July, the geometric means at the downstream site and upstream site on Buffalo Creek were 891.36 cfu/100 ml and 817.83 cfu/100 ml, respectively. As a result, Buffalo Creek is in the highest "impaired for at least one recreational use" category #5, in other words, "recreational use is not being supported".

In Limestone Run/Bull Run, tested in 2009, the high bacterial numbers gave the Run the same "impaired for recreational use" label at category #5. For example, the upstream results of the geometric means were 363.12 cfu/100 ml for the period of mid-July to early-August and 2,236.89 cfu/100 ml for mid-August to mid-September. At this high level of impairment, DEP is required to reduce bacteria to an average reading below 200 cfu/100ml, the "recreational use" standard. The Union County Conservation District has been developing plans to reduce these high bacterial counts in Buffalo Creek and Limestone Run by working with area polluters in these two watersheds.

Upper Penns Creek in Union County demonstrated much better water quality with lower bacterial numbers. From mid-June to mid-July, the geometric means at the downstream site and upstream site on Upper Penns Creek were 47.61 cfu/100 ml and 21.94 cfu/100 ml, respectively, and so is classified in category #2, "streams with attaining one or more protected uses which includes aquatic life, fish consumption, potable water and recreation.

The greatest difference between Upper Penns Creek, Buffalo Creek and Limestone Run watersheds is the number of farms, the size of population in the watersheds, and the Mifflinburg sewage treatment plant that has undergone significant upgrading recently. Experts advise that with such high levels of fecal coliforms in Buffalo Creek and Limestone Run, drinking the water and swimming are not recommended.

In sum, BCWA hopes that every effort will be made to improve the water quality in the watersheds within Union County by their citizens and the UCCD, including further and more accurate testing in all watersheds.

Future Nurses Given Tips From Healthcare Professionals

At a recent event, nearly 50 future nurses were given a unique perspective on the local healthcare industry by eight human resource representatives.

"We brought together a cross section of employers that represent various healthcare providers for whom our participants may choose to work," said Katherine Vastine, WATCH Project manager.

WATCH (Work Attributes Toward Careers in Health) Project is a federal grant that provides support to individuals as they prepare to enter or advance in a nursing or emergency medical services career.

"It is the goal of the WATCH Project to help our participants and these employers bring the best skilled, dedicated and caring employees into the healthcare field," said Vastine.

Career coordinators are paired with participants to train them with "soft skills" while they're receiving their formal education. The coordinators assist them with developing effective workplace skills like communication and critical thinking.

"There is a constant need for nurses who are dedicated, compassionate individuals who possess a good work ethic," said Joni Bilbay of HCR ManorCare. "And this program is helping to meet that need locally."

Dan McGann of SUN Home Health and Hospice told participants they chose a field with many opportunities.

Representatives from Community Services Group, Family Practice, P.C. Geisinger Health System and Genesis Health Care also presented information about their organizations and discussed current hiring needs. They also addressed the roles of nursing assistants, practical nurses and registered nurses in their businesses.

Keynote speaker Roxie Shrawder of Geisinger Health System gave a presentation on best practices for preparing resumes and participating in interviews.

The WATCH Project is a Health Professions Opportunity Grant awarded by the Administration for Children and Families, U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS) and is administered by the Central Susquehanna Intermediate Unit in Milton. The program is open to residents of Centre, Clinton, Columbia, Lycoming, Mifflin, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, Tioga and Union counties.
