For today, here is another article from March, 2004... This week I'd like to share a recipe. SCHNITZ UN KNEPP

(Apples and Buttons)

3 pounds ham

1 quart dried apples

- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¹/₄ teaspoon pepper
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 3 tablespoons melted butter Milk enough to make a fairly moist, stiff batter.

Pick over and wash dried apples. Cover with water and let soak overnight or for a number of hours. In the morning, cover ham with cold water and let boil for 3 hours.

Add the apples and water in which they have been soaked and continue to boil for another hour. Add brown sugar.

Make dumplings by sifting together flour, salt, pepper and baking powder. Stir in the beaten egg, milk and shortening.

Drop the batter by spoonfuls into the hot liquid with the ham and apples. Cover kettle tightly and cook dumplings for 15 minutes

Serve piping hot on large platter.

NASCAR SIGNS BIG TV DEAL WITH NBC

The television package that NASCAR signed with NBC means bigger bucks for tracks, teams, and the sanctioning organization.

Will it bring more and better coverage of NASCAR racing to the fans?

NASCAR Chairman Brian France said he did not believe the sport was taking a risk by switching its races from ESPN to a different network

"They have a robust lineup obviously without us and we're going to add to that in a significant way," France said. "From hearing from the leadership throughout the organization, they didn't just want to own sports properties; they wanted to integrate within all their assets.

'They're doing it right now. We don't have to guess about it. We're looking forward to it."

In a 10-year deal, set to run from 2015 through 2024, NBC will broadcast the final 20 Cup events of the season, with seven races on NBC and 13 on NBC Sports Network. The deal gives NBC the Chase for the Sprint Cup, including the championship season finale.

The 10-year deal is worth \$4.4 billion. The old package with

ESPN and TNT was a combined \$2.74 billion over eight years.

With Fox paying \$2.4 billion over its eight-year (2015-2022) contract, the combined worth of NASCAR's two new TV packages is \$6.8 billion.

That's big money considering the deal is split, with 65 percent going to the tracks, 25 percent to the teams and 10 percent to NASCAR.

If you're counting, that's \$4.4 billion for the tracks and \$680

million over eight years just to NASCAR.

In layman's terms, it means each track will receive from 12-15 million dollars per race, depending on how NASCAR pays each track. Tracks with higher TV-ratings get more money

If it seems like NASCAR might be coming up a little short, don't worry. They charge each track a licensing fee, and tack on all kinds of extra charges.

Now, it's understandable why tracks don't have to fill their seats in order to make a profit.

Television is their cash cow.

The new deal, with ESPN and TNT, being replaced wasn't exactly met with universal praise in the television world. Some



New Social Security Service Target of Scammers

Q. I've just learned about the "my Social Security" online service that can help me track my Social Security benefits. I received an email to sign up. Is there anything I should know?

For those who receive benefits or have Medicare, "my Social Security" can help check estimates of your retirement, disability and survivor's benefits, your earnings record, and the estimated Social Security and Medicare taxes you've paid.

However, you should be suspicious of any emails sent to you.

The my Social Security account is a recently released new service for the public, but the agency is not sending emails to generate enrollment. To open one of these personal accounts, citizens should go directly to my Social Security at http://www.ssa.gov/myaccount/. If you receive an email inviting you to join, do not click any links.

Criminals are using "phishing" emails encouraging senior citizens to create an account. Rest assured, any email to information from the Social Security Administration.

Here's how to detect a fraudulent email message:

• Any email coming from Social Security will come from an email address ending in ".gov", although you should not trust the "From" address, since attackers can spoof this address.

 Any email coming from Social Security will not have email addresses associated with private companies such as Yahoo, Hotmail, Gmail, etc.

• Look for poor word choice, phrasing, spelling or extra words that are not needed in the text.

· Links to Social Security websites will always begin with http://www.socialsecurity.gov/ or https://secure.ssa. gov/ (the slash after ".gov" is important). For example, you should not trust a link that looks like this: http://www.socialsecurity.gov.bx.co.rx/setup. If you are suspicious of a link in an email, use your mouse to "hover over" the link to see the web address.

Please note: Members of the public who receive phishing emails should forward them to the U.S. Computer Emergency Readiness Team at phishing-report@us-cert.gov.

To create an account on my Social Security, you must provide some personal information about yourself and give answers to some questions that only you are likely to know. Next, you create a username and password that you will use to access your online account. This process protects you and keeps your personal Social Security information private.

Should you be taking the medications you're taking? If you're 65 or older, that's an important question to ask yourself and your healthcare provider. Why? Because some commonly prescribed medications can actually be harmful for older adults.

As you get older, your body changes. These changes can increase the chances that you might have side effects from certain drugs. For example, your liver or kidneys may not function quite as well as when you were younger, so your body can't process medications in the same way. This can lead to a build-up of the drug in your system, which can increase the risk of side effects such as falls, a drop in blood pressure or heart rate, drowsiness, or confusion.

Many older adults have two or more health problems that require multiple medications and treatments. Because of this, older adults are more likely to experience potentially harmful interactions between their prescriptions. In fact, every year, one in three adults 65 and older has one or more harmful reactions to medications they are taking.

"Older adults and their caregivers need to take an acpromoting this are not coming from the agency, according tive role in managing their medications," says Cathy Alessi, MD, a physician who specializes in the care of older adults and is the president of the American Geriatrics Society (AGS). "They need to ask questions of their doctor, nurse, physician assistant, or pharmacist, and read the information that comes with their medications. All medications have side effects, even those sold over-the-counter. That's why patients should discuss the risks and benefits of any medication with their healthcare provider before deciding which ones are right for them.

> What should you do to lower your odds of having harmful medication side effects or drug interactions? Here are five tips from the American Geriatrics Society:

> 1. Bring a list of all the medications, vitamins, herbal supplements, and over-the-counter drugs you're taking to every medical appointment. The list should include the dosages you take and how often you take them. Be sure your emergency contact person or caregiver has an up-to-date copy of the list.

> 2. If you notice a new health problem or symptom after starting a new medication, you may be having a harmful drug reaction. Tell your healthcare provider right away. If you have a serious reaction, such as difficulty breathing or swelling in your throat, call 911 and go to the emergency room immediately.

> 3. Fill your prescriptions at the same pharmacy and get to know your local pharmacist. Your pharmacist's job is to be aware of all the medications you're taking. Most pharmacies use computer systems that alert the pharmacist to possible drug interactions.

Arthritis Sufferers Can Benefit from Walking

Q. My 81-year-old father's arthritis is so bad he says he doesn't feel like doing anything anymore. I've read that the best remedies for arthritis pain are walking and water therapy. How can I convince him to give this a try, since he lives alone and has no one to motivate him?

According to statistics, your dad has company! Arthritis is among the more common ailments of growing older. In fact, about 12.4 million seniors – 33.6 percent of those age 65 and older - in the U.S. suffer with osteoarthritis, the most common form of arthritis among older people, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). And 50 million Americans live with some form of arthritis.

Early diagnosis and proper management of arthritis can help people with arthritis decrease pain, improve function, decrease and delay disability, and stay productive and active.

Your dad should strive to incorporate these five arthritis solutions into his lifestyle:

- 1) learn self-management strategies,
- 2) be active,
- 3) watch his weight,
- 4) protect his joints, and
- 5) see his doctor.

Despite the known benefits of physical activity to help manage arthritis, adults with arthritis are less active than adults without arthritis, according to the CDC.

Federal guidelines recommend all adults, including adults with arthritis, get at least 150 minutes per week of at least moderate intensity aerobic activity and that they do muscle strengthening exercises at least 2 days per week.

Since your father lives alone, try to help him find a walking partner such as a friend or neighbor who could join him for daily jaunts around the neighborhood. Or he could look into a walking club in the community. Contact a local YMCA or fitness center to inquire about walking clubs. Other seniors have discovered the benefits of water therapy. Check with local hospitals in your area about such programs.


