

Truck Accident Closes Interstate 80



On Sunday, March 10, at 4:19 p.m. a 2011 International Pro Star truck tractor driven by Danny E. Hill, 60, of Salem Ohio. was pulling a trailer, as it traveled east on Interstate 80. For



unknown reasons the truck traveled through the fast lane guard rail down the center median/embankment, over the underpass of Interstate 80 and White Deer Pike. The truck struck a concrete culvert, several trees and a guard rail before coming to rest prior to the White Deer Pike.

Hill was transported to Evangelical Community Hospital, in Lewisburg, for treatment. He reported that he was having chest pains and was subsequently admitted to the hospital.

The tractor trailer sustained extensive damage from the crash and was towed by Minuteman Towing. North Ridge Group Inc., an environmental contractor, responded to the scene for clean up since the truck was leaking diesel fuel.

Assisting on the scene were the White Deer Fire and EMS, Warrior Run EMS, Minuteman Towing, North Ridge Group Inc., Windstream and PennDot. The crash remains under investigation.

PLUC to offer Parent/Child Workshop


The Public Library for Union County will be hosting 'A... B...C... Play with Me,' a five-week parent/child workshop for children ages 14-40 months and their parents.

Brad Keselowski didn't lead a lot of laps, but he passed Kyle Busch for third late in the race.

'We needed a little more speed," said Keselowski. "When I lost spots on the track, the guys in the pits helped me out. We didn't have the fastest car in practice, or during the race, but it turned out pretty good."

Kyle Busch raced back from a pit road speeding penalty to finish fourth.

'All in all, it was a great race," said Busch. "Our short speed was good, but we just needed to pick up more speed on the longer runs.

Carl Edwards finished fifth, followed by Jimmie Johnson, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Martin Truex, Kevin Harvick, and Paul Menard. Danica Patrick finished 33rd, six laps down.

Sam Hornish Jr. drove an absolutely dominant car to victory Saturday afternoon, streaking away from Kyle Busch during a seven-lap dash to the finish in the Nationwide race at Las Vegas Motor Speedway

The win was Hornish's second in NASCAR's Nationwide Series and his first since Nov. 12, 2011 at Phoenix. It was the first Las Vegas victory for Penske Racing in any NASCAR series.

The Penske organization also collected its first victory after switching from Dodge to Ford between seasons.

Busch rolled across the finish line in second, 1.1 seconds behind Hornish. Brian Vickers ran third, followed by Trevor Bavne and Elliott Sadler. Bayne recovered from an early brush with the wall to post the fourth-place result.

Austin Dillon, Regan Smith, Alex Bowman, Brian Scott, and Travis Pastrana were the remaining top-10.

NASCAR has gone too far in attempting to manage its image. The organization assessed Denny Hamlin \$25,000 for bashing the new Gen 6 car. "The short of the long of it is I believe I was severely disre-spected by NASCAR by getting fined," Hamlin said. "I believe that the simple fact of us not even having a conversation about this issue before I was hit with a fine has something to say about our relationship. What I said was one sentence taken completely out of context.

Hamlin said he will not pay the fine.

Most drivers will tell you that we constantly have sponsors and NASCAR's best interest in mind when speaking," he continued. "On the other hand I am a person that worked very hard from the bottom to get where I am today and someone telling me that I cannot give my one hundred percent honest opinion really bothers me.

'I feel as if today NASCAR lost one of its biggest supporters. So in the end there are no winners. I said today I would not pay the fine. I stand by that and will go through the process of appealing. Trust me; this is not about the money. It's much deeper. I will now shift my focus on giving FedEx and my team what they deserve this weekend, a win."

The irony of this is that what Hamlin said about the new car and

the racing last week at Phoenix wasn't all that harsh. But because Hamlin didn't choose his words correctly, or dared to compare the new car to the old one, he was called out and made the poster boy for free speech.

Tony Stewart pretty much summed up the NASCAR organization back in 2002, when he said, "It's NASCAR's way or the highway.'

Hamlin is determined to fight back, and fans and competitors are rallying behind him.

Fining Hamlin, or anyone for stating their opinion in a reasonable manner is going to come back and bite NASCAR.

This is a battle that NASCAR cannot win

Its image is going to be tarnished even more.



SVYC to Perform "From the Stage"

This weekend the Susquehanna Valley Youth Chorale (SVYC) takes to the stage with a selection of some of the best music written for the stage, from oratorio to opera to rock 'n roll. The concert features music by Jacques Offenbach, Ludwig van Beethoven, Harold Arlen, Gioacchino Rossini, RIchard Rodgers, David Brunner, Irving Gordon, Felix Mendelssohn, Andrew Lloyd Webber, and Queen.

The Youth Chorale performs in concert Sunday, March 24, 3 PM, at Zion Lutheran Church, 15 S. 5th St, Sunbury. In the church's superb acoustics and under the direction of Valerie Flamini Caldwell, the Youth Chorale's three levels - Preparatory, Camerata, and Valley Singers - will present "From the Stage?

The Preparatory Chorus, the youngest level of singers, will open the program with music from Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat and feature Jessep Caravella, a Valley Singers member from Danville. Camerata singers will offer distinctively different stage music, performing from the 1846 oratorio Elijah and Spiritual Musick composed in 2010. The latter was "purchased" in an auction by thirteen children's choirs from the US, Canada, and Scotland. Thirteen premieres of this piece occurred on separate stages throughout 2010-2011 in addition to a notable performance by the Children's Honor Choir at the 2011 national conference of the American Choral Directors Association. The quirky text was written in London by Christopher Smart during his confinement for insanity between 1759 and 1763.

The high school Valley Singers perform music from Beethoven's only opera, Fidelio, singing in German. Featured are Angelina Rodkey and Riley Cellitti of Sunbury, David Wolfe of Shamokin, and Timothy Panarese of Middleburg. The Neighbors' Chorus from La Jolie Parfumeuse, a comic opera of 1873, showcases Everett Kopp of Winfield and Kara Heim of Herndon.

One highlight of the concert is Unforgettable, originally made famous by Nat King Cole. This rendition brings together the Youth Chorale and their grandparents and features a duet by SVYC singer Emily Wetzel and her grandfather David Reier. The Preparatory Chorus delights with the Comic Duet for Two Cats related to Rossini's opera, Otello, with a duet by Natalie Mathews of Sunbury and Kylee Noble of Middleburg. The singers then sing of their "favorite things" from The Sound of Music.

Valley Singers reproduce the beautiful sound of the group Celtic Women, as they perform two works which have had worldwide success on the stage and through recordings by this Irish phenomenon. A musical memorial to those who experienced loss as a result of Sandy Hook Elementary tragedy will showcase the Camerata singers, accompanied by the youngest and oldest levels. Historical Society Dinner & Program



The Union County Historical Society Annual Spring Dinner and Program will be held on Thursday, April 11, starting at 6 PM, at the Union County Sportsmen's Club near Weikert

The program, Changes to the Forest Landscape of the West End from 1754-2013, is a narrated visual presentation on the changes that have occurred in the forests of the West End of Union County over the last 250 years.

Presenter Tony Shively is a writer, historian, and publisher of the monthly newsletter The Millmont Times. A lifelong resident of Millmont and a graduate of Mifflinburg High School Tony retired from Pennsylvania House and is currently working for the U.S. Postal Service in Millmont. Tony Shively's interest in local history, particularly the West End of Union County, was handed down to him by his grandfather, Jacob G. Shively. Tony is a past board member of the Union County Historical Society and currently serves on its publications committee. He wrote Heritage Vol. XVIII, The CCC Camps of Union County (1933-1942): Life and Work in the Civilian Conservation Corps

The program, Changes to the Forest Landscape, will touch on topics including the virgin forest that greeted early European settlers who migrated into this section of Pennsylvania; early lumbering practices, products made by coopers, charcoal making and bark peeling; the use of splash dams, log slides, and the arrival of "Yankee" lumbermen from Maine. Shively will examine changes affecting the forest with the arrival of large-scale lumber companies, and the legend of Pardee Engine

Hear about the purchase of large tracts of clear-cut forestland, R. B. Winter's efforts at reforestation, the Civil Conservation Corps' contribution to those efforts, as well as changes occurring in the forests today.
