Four Students Involved in Crash on way to SUN Tech





On Friday, September 14, 2012, four Shikellamy students were on their way to SUN Area Technical Institute, in New Berlin when their 2004 Ford Explorer, which was being driven by one of the students, was traveling west on Route 304 at a high rate of

to pass another vehicle, near Arrowhead Road, in Lewis Township, as an oncoming vehicle was traveling east on Route 304. This caused the driver to steer his vehicle back into the westbound lane and lose control causing it to travel off the north berm of



eral times, coming to rest on its roof within the eastbound lane facing north. One teenager and 19 year old Samuel Mull were wearing seatbelts and were moderately injured. Two other passengers, both teenagers, were not wearing their seatbelts and were ejected from the vehicle with both sustaining major injuries. All were taken to Geisinger Medical Center for treatment.

The students have since be identified as Travis Tillett, Justin Miller, Robert Coleman, and Samuel Mull. Miller was treated and released on Friday. Tillett died on Saturday morning due to his injuries. Mull and Coleman remain in fair condition at Geisinger Medical Center, in Danville.

Many students and faculty SUN Tech came upon the scene and had to witness their fellow students as they lay injured on the roadway. Both the Shikellamy School District and SUN Tech had grief counselors on hand to help the students deal with the tragic accident. The Shikellamy School District postponed their football game against Selinsgrove due to the accident. The game was played on Monday evening where players and fans of both teams honored the memory of Tillett and Robert Wayne Hill, who was killed in a Monday morning crash near Kratzerville on Route 204. Hill was 2011 graduate of Selinsgrove High School and SUN Tech. Both coaches agreed postponing Friday's game was the right thing to do in light of the terrible accident that ultimately claimed the life of Tillett and injured three other students. Selinsgrove went on to defeat Shikellamy

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

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Don't Let Flu Sideline You: This Season, "Stay In The Game"

"It's just a lightning bolt." "It's just a busy intersection." These aren't phrases you would hear from parents. But what about "It's just the flu"?

Every parent wants to protect his or her child from dangers like lightning or busy intersections, but other misunderstood risks, like the flu, can be just as

serious and just as preventable. Between 2008 and 2010, for example, less than 20 children in the U.S. were killed by lightning. While these deaths are tragic, in that same time frame, flu claimed the lives of more than 500 U.S. children.

Although the flu is often confused with the common cold, flu symptoms tend to develop quickly (usually one to four days after a person is exposed to the virus) and can be more severe than the normal cough and congestion of a cold In fact, the flu can lead to serious and even fatal complications, particularly in children. Additionally, the types of viruses that cause the flu typically change from one season to the next and immunity from vaccination declines over time That's why a yearly flu vaccine is so important for everyone 6 months of age and older, as recommended by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). It is the single best way to help prevent getting the flu.

"After a mild flu season last year, families may have a false sense of security that the flu isn't so serious," explains Laura Scott, executive director of the national nonprofit Families Fighting Flu. "But for the more than 30 families in the U.S. who lost a child to the flu this past flu season, it was devastating. One death is one too many when there is a vaccine to prevent the disease.

Members of Families Fighting Flu understand this reality all too well. Each has had a child suffer serious medical complications or die due to the flu. Some were high school athletes, hospitalized for weeks battling what started out as just the flu." Others were active school-age kids who died unexpectedly from the flu. Since 2004, the group has been working to educate others about the seriousness of the flu and the importance of annual vaccination.

According to Flor M. Munoz, M.D., M.S., medical adviser to Families Fighting Flu and assistant professor, Department of Pediatrics, Baylor College of Medicine, the flu is a leading cause of hospitalizations for children in the U.S "Getting vaccinated protects" you and your child from the flu and from passing it on, but it may also have added benefits. In pregnant women, for example recent studies suggest that flu protection may be passed from the mom to the unborn child when the mother is vaccinated during pregnancy.' Where to Get Help

Flu vaccines are available in many locations, including doctors' offices, pharmacies, schools and workplaces. The website www.FamiliesFightingFlu.org provides resources about disease prevention, including a flu clinic locator to find the nearest place to get the vaccine and a toolkit to educate people about the importance of flu prevention. As Scott reflects, "It breaks my heart every year to see news headlines about the loss of a child due to flu. These deaths can be prevented, and that's why we're working to raise awareness-an annual flu vaccination is the best defense against a disease that's not 'just the flu' when t happens to you or to someone you love.

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

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# Group Yoga Helps Stroke Survivors With Motor Function, Balance

Q. I suffered a stroke about five months ago, but I'm living on my own again at age 82 with occasional housecleaning help from my daughter, who drives here on most weekends. My doctor said I had done well after I completed my physical therapy, but I wonder if there's something further I can do that will improve my mobility even more.

Your desire to try to return to pre-stroke function is amazing, and there might be something new that could help. Group yoga can improve motor function and balance in stroke survivors even if they don't begin yoga until six months or more after the stroke and no longer receive rehabilitative care, according to Indiana University research conducted in Indianapolis. In a small pilot study, researchers tested the potential benefits

of yoga among chronic stroke survivors whose strokes occurred more than six months earlier. The study's yoga classes, taught by a registered yoga therapist, included modified yoga postures, relaxation and meditation. Classes grew more challenging each week. Participants had to be able to stand on their own at the

"For people with chronic stroke, something like yoga in a group environment is cost-effective and appears to improve motor function and balance," said Dr. Arlene Schmid, Ph.D., O.T.R., lead researcher and a rehabilitation research scientist at Roudebush Veterans Administration-Medical Center and Indiana University's Department of Occupational Therapy

Balance problems frequently last long after a person suffers a stroke and are related to greater disability and a higher risk of falls, researchers said. Survivors in the yoga groups also had improved scores for independence and quality of life and were less afraid of falling. The oldest patient in the study was in his

# Researchers Say Seniors May Be Scammed More Often Because of Brain Damage By Joe DeLauter from the Home Instead Senior Care® office

Q. I can't believe Uncle Tom, a retired college economics professor, was the victim of a telephone scam for the second time in 18 months. He's 82 and is able to live alone in his own home, but I've had to spend a lot of time with the police while unraveling the messes. I am very frustrated with Uncle Tom, but I also know he feels bad about it. What can I do? Don't be too hard on Uncle Tom. Senior scams have become

big business. That's why the Home Instead Senior Care® network and the nonprofit National Association of Triads recently launched a public information program to educate families and seniors about protecting themselves from scam artists who are specifically targeting the elderly. The question remains: Why are seniors so prone to being scammed? According to researchers at the University of Iowa, seniors are vulnerable because a specific area of the brain has deteriorated or is damaged. By examining patients with various forms of brain damage, the researchers report they have pinpointed the precise location in the brain, called the ventromedial prefrontal cortex, that controls belief and doubt.

The current study provides the first direct evidence beyond anecdotal reports that damage to the vmPFC (ventromedial prefrontal cortex) increases credulity," researchers said in the paper published in Frontiers in Neuroscience. "This specific deficit may explain why highly intelligent vmPFC patients can fall victim to seemingly obvious fraud schemes.

Apart from being damaged, the ventromedial prefrontal cortex begins to deteriorate as people reach age 60 and older, although the onset and the pace of deterioration varies, said Daniel Tranel, neurology and psychology professor at the University of Iowa and corresponding author on the paper. He said the finding will enable doctors, caregivers and relatives to be more understanding of decision-making by seniors.

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# Eating Egg Yolks Is Nearly as Risky As Smoking, According to Study

Q. My 83-year-old grandfather just returned to his house after suffering a minor heart episode – he doesn't want to call it a "heart attack" – and I noticed he's still eating four eggs a day, two for breakfast and two for supper. I told him I thought people with heart problems were supposed to lay off the eggs. I know Grandpa values his independence. What should I ad-

A recent study seems to back up your argument, while folks in the egg industry obviously disagree with the research that warns against eating too many egg yolks. Talk to your grandfather's doctor about the conclusions of a Canadian researcher who said eating egg yolks accelerates atherosclerosis in a manner similar to smoking cigarettes. His study team surveyed more than 1,200 patients whose average age was 61.5.

Dr. David Spence of Western University in London, Ontario said a regular diet of egg yolks is about two-thirds as bad as smoking when it comes to increased buildup of carotid plaque a risk factor for stroke and heart attack. The researchers found carotid plaque area increased at a

steady pace with age after 40, but it accelerated far more rapidly with pack-years of smoking and years of egg yolk consumption. The study also found those eating three or more yolks a week had significantly more plaque area than those who ate two or Dr. Spence said more research should be done to take in pos-

sible confounders, such as exercise and waist circumference but he stressed that regular consumption of egg yolk should be avoided by people at risk of cardiovascular disease. By contrast, Karen Harvey of Egg Farmers of Canada told the

Toronto Star that the industry doesn't believe the comparison between egg yolks and smoking is valid. "Independent research confirms that dietary cholesterol in eggs has little effect on blood cholesterol levels in adults," Harvey said. "These studies have also looked at people with existing heart disease, and eating an egg a day did not increase their risk for cardiovascular or stroke, either.' Bottom line: Grandpa should consult his doctor. The fact that

he's recovering from "a heart episode" and is trying to live or his own might signal the need for help with tasks such as mea preparation and medication reminders. # West Nile Virus Can Have Severe Consequences for Seniors

Q. My brother-in-law, Roger, lives in a southern state where a relatively high number of West Nile virus cases have been reported. He's 84, lives alone and still walks to the corner market every other day just before sundown to buy something like a box of cereal or a pound of coffee. I'm concerned about him because his area might not get a freeze until late October or early November, and he doesn't seem to take the West Nile threat seriously. If you were in my shoes, what would you do?

It sounds as if Roger could use additional reminders and sup port from family, friends or a professional caregiver. They could run errands for groceries and other things to limit Roger's exposure to the virus-carrying mosquitoes during their prime activity times of dusk and dawn. First, here's additional information about the West Nile virus and this year's troubling developments:

• In most people, West Nile can cause a mild flu-like illness or may cause no symptoms. But people older than 50, particularly those over 65, have the highest risk of severe disease. In some cases, especially among the elderly, West Nile can cause serious neurological diseases such as encephalitis or meningitis. Severe symptoms include neck stiffness, disorientation, coma and paralysis. In this year's incomplete U.S. case count, more than half were severe, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.


 This year's West Nile virus outbreak includes at least 38 states, and the danger will continue until colder weather settles in. "We're in the midst of one of the largest West Nile outbreaks ever seen in the U.S.," said Dr. Lyle Petersen, who oversees the CDC's mosquito-borne illness programs.

 Experts said the mild winter, early spring and hot summer helped stimulate mosquito breeding and the spread of the virus.

· There is no vaccine to protect against West Nile virus, although several companies hope to develop one. The best way to prevent West Nile disease is to avoid mosquito bites. Insect repellents, screens on doors and windows, and wearing long sleeves and pants are some of the recommended strategies.
