Hurricane Sandy Leaves a Path of Destruction in Her Wake

Hurricane Sandy may have made land fall on Monday evening on October 29, 2012, in New Jersey but her path of destruction lead her through our area.

Many residents are cleaning up in the aftermath of the storm. Trees were uprooted and power lines came down leaving many without electricity for several days some have even been told it could take a week until their power is restored. Crews from as far away as Florida, Texas, and Georgia have arrived in our area to help with repairs.

According to PPL Electric Utilities as of Monday, October 29, power was restored to 300 customers in Snyder County with 500 still without power. Those numbers will continue to change as repairs continue. In Union County 1447 customers have had power restored with 1354 currently out of power.

West Buffalo Township in Union County appears to have been hit hard by Sandy. The roof of a barn on Shively Road, near Mifflinburg, blew off while nearly a dozen farm animals were inside. The animals are all unharmed. Dozens of trees were uprooted and power lines were blown down into buildings and roadways by the strong gusting winds that blew over 50 mph at times. Some residents took matters into their own hands and

began cutting fallen trees and removing debris.

In Snyder County, Route 104 near Shade Mountain was closed for several hours as crews removed fallen trees from the roadway. Many homes were without power early on Monday even before the major part of the storm hit our area. Selingsgrove Borough & Beavertown Boroughs declared disaster emergencies in preparation of the storm. Selingsgrove Borough has postponed their trick or treat night (Halloween) until November 3. Schools in both counties were closed Monday and Tuesday due to the storm damage.

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Johnson Gets Seventh Martinsville Win

Two concussions, which he reported on Oct. 7, caused Dale Earnhardt Jr. to miss the Charlotte and Kansas races, and ended his chance at this year's Sprint Cup championship.

But he said his future well-being was more important to him than his love of racing.

"I can understand people's opinions that they would try to push through it or they would ignore it to stay in the car, because I did the same thing in the past," he said. "But you know, some concussions are kind of light and the symptoms are real light and if you don't have another incident, you feel like you can get through it."

"Some concussions are really bad. I don't care how tough you are, when your mind is not working the way it supposed to, it scares the (stuff) out of you. You're not going to think about trophies. You're not going to think about your job. You're going to think about, 'How can I get my brain to working the way it was before?'"

Earnhardt said he will be honest about another concussion if he feels symptoms again. He realizes that if he continues to get concussions, it could mean an early end to his career.

"I don't really think about that too much," he continued. "One thing I can tell you is that I'm going to be honest with myself and with the doctors and do whatever they tell me to do. I want to be able to live a full life and not have any issues down the road, but I feel pretty fortunate to have recovered from this concussion rather quickly. I feel lucky that I made the choices that I did to give myself that opportunity. I just hope that I don't have any more big hits for a while and race for another five to 10 years and have some fun."

Earnhardt said he plans to switch to a more protective type of driving helmet.

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MARTINSVILLE, Vir.—Jimmie Johnson put on a strong late-race run that gave him his seventh Martinsville Cup win, and allowed him to take the Chase points lead from Brad Keselowski.

Johnson was leading the 500-lap race with eight-to-go, when Carl Edwards spun, and slipped up into Dale Earnhardt Jr., causing both cars to hit the outside wall, and bringing out the race's last caution.

There were just five laps left when the green flag was dropped. Kyle Busch was right on Johnson's rear bumper, but he was unable to pull even or make a pass for the lead, and Johnson took the checkered flag for his first Chase victory of the season.

"We have learned from the past that we needed good tires at the finish, and that's what helped us today," said Johnson. "It's not going to be a cakewalk, because Brad (Keselowski) is a very talented driver, but I think we've shown that we're ready to go all the way."

Kyle Busch, Kasey Kahne, Aric Almirola, and Clint Bowyer were the remaining top-5 finishers.

Brad Keselowski, who started 32nd, finished sixth and trails Johnson by two points.

"This team has a tremendous amount of heart," he said. "I know it's going to be a duel all the way to Homestead, and we're ready to fight those three remaining races."

Jeff Gordon, Brian Vickers, Bobby Labonte, and Greg Biffle rounded out the top-10.

One of the biggest losers was Denny Hamlin. First, he was hit with a pit road speeding penalty, which cost him a lap, and then his car developed electrical problems, and had to be pushed to the garage.

He was able to return to the race, but was 33 laps down, and finished 33rd.

"This day certainly ended in disappointment," said Hamlin. "We had a great car, but when these things happen, you have to suck it up. One of these days it'll be our time and we will capitalize on it."

Hamlin dropped from third to fifth in Chase points, and is now 49 points behind the leader.

HAMLIN WINS MARTINSVILLE TRUCK RACE
Denny Hamlin won Saturday's Martinsville truck race with a late pass around Matt Crafton.

To Crafton, it was a bulldozer tactic.

Regardless of the point of view, Hamlin's pass after a restart with eight laps left allowed him to claim his second victory at the .526-mile short track and his second win in 15 career truck starts.

Irate at Hamlin's use of the front bumper, Crafton had some choice words for the driver of the No. 51 Kyle Busch Motorsports Toyota after the race. With Hamlin parked on pit road, Crafton leaned into the driver's-side window to express his displeasure.

Hamlin's reaction was, "What did he expect? When you're the leader with a few laps to go, you've got to expect it. You can't wreck the guy — that's off-limits — but moving him off and out of the groove, that's standard protocol at this type of race track." Crafton disagreed.

"If you want to call that a pass—that's just moving somebody," Crafton said. "Running in the back of somebody, that doesn't take anything. Anybody can do that. I didn't let the tires come up quite clean enough on the last restart. I do admit that. That's part of it. I didn't get my tires cleaned up, but I did not run into the back of him."

Nelson Piquet, Joey Coulter, Matt Crafton, Scott Riggs, James Buescher, Timothy Peters, Ryan Blaney, Parker Kligerman, and Brian Scott were the remaining top-10 finishers.

Ty Dillon's one-point championship lead evaporated after his No. 3 Chevrolet blew a tire and hit the outside wall on Lap 151. After repeated trips to pit road for repairs, Dillon dropped to 28th, six laps down, and now trails James Buescher by 21 points.

October's Free Talk With The Doc Series Addresses Breast Health

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Evangelical Provides MORE Free Mammograms for Uninsured Women

Despite professional recommendations and public support in favor of regularly scheduled mammography, only about half of US women get annual mammograms. Thanks to a generous grant from the Degenstein Foundation, the Thyra M. Humphreys Center for Breast Health at Evangelical Community Hospital can now provide more free mammograms than it could previously.

Andrea Bertram, Director of the Center for Breast Health, says, "We want every woman to have a mammogram, if not for themselves, for the people in their lives who love them." She states that the most common reasons given for not complying with these recommendations are fear, availability of facilities, and the means to pay.

For those who put off mammograms because of difficult financial situations or because they are under or un-insured, the Degenstein grant along with the Komen Foundation grant extends the number of studies the Center is able to offer women who are financially not able to pay for the screening or follow-up imaging.

Bertam says, "Funding will provide access to several hundred women who may not have been able to follow the national recommendation for an annual screening after the age of 40 or who may have ignored a lump, pain or other problems due to financial circumstances."

The age at which mammographic screening should begin has recently been a subject of debate but The American Cancer Society and the staff of the Thyra M. Humphreys Center for Breast Health at Evangelical Community Hospital continue to recommend that women at average risk of breast cancer begin mammographic screening at the age of 40, and those with a family history of breast cancer to consider getting mammograms earlier than 40.

In previous years, the criteria for free mammograms was restricted, with the new grant funding, the criteria has changed and mammograms are available to more women. Additionally, diagnostic studies often used in conjunction with mammograms are also covered. Women who may have applied in the past and were not able to receive the free screening are encourage to re-apply. The Center also stresses that ALL women should schedule an annual mammogram if they are over 40. For more information on the funding available and convenient mammogram scheduling, call the Thyra M. "We are dedicated to finding solutions that will make annual breast screening a part of every woman's 'must-do' list and are thankful for the generous support that will help many women say 'yes' when asked to schedule a mammogram," says Bertam.

The twenty-two-members of Bucknell's Phi Kappa Psi pledge class gave the Buffalo Valley Rail Trail a boost on Saturday by cutting vines and moving logs along a 6.5 mile stretch of the trail from Meadow Green Road in Mifflinburg to Bull Run Crossroad in East Buffalo Township.

"The guys from Phi Psi did great work out on the trail today," said LARA executive director Katie Davis. "They rescued over 100 trees by freeing them from woody vines, some that were so thick at the base they had to be cut with hand saws. Vines had colonized almost every stand of trees in the central portion of the trail. Left unchecked, they would eventually have killed the host trees."

"I worked with this group all day," said BVRT Committee Chair Jim Buck. "In many cases they had to cut their way through thorny brambles just to reach the trunks of the affected trees. We had already done one vine-cutting day back in July focusing mostly on the eastern end of the trail. This time, we started in Mifflinburg and walked all they way back to Lewisburg, cutting every vine in sight. It was a huge accomplishment!"

"Every year the new members of Phi Kappa Psi take on a community service project," said Emerson Davis, a Phi Psi pledge overseeing this year's pledge project. "When we heard that LARA was looking for a large group of volunteers for a work day out on the trail, we thought it sounded like a perfect fit."

Max Hommeyer, Phi Kappa Psi Pledge Class President, added, "Many of us use the trail so we know what a great asset it is for the community, and we're proud to have been able to do something that will be a lasting contribution."

In addition to Davis and Hommeyer, the Phi Kappa Psi volunteers included Liam Jaris, Peter Iwaoka, Tom Rie, Sam Carey, Patrick Wales, Jeff Roba, Alex Cooperstone, Spencer Sherrill, Johncarlo Pecorari, Kubby Tischler, Brandon Gurney, Kevin Keller, Andy Manning, Ben Garner, Ryan Boulrier, Alex Head, Tim Perley, Erik Heinemann, Ben Seketa, and Collin Greene.

In addition to cutting vines, the group also carried logs from inaccessible parts of the trail out to local roads. LARA recently had 40 dead trees and large limbs taken down. Thanks to the Phi Kappa Psi pledges, there are now piles of wood at many easily accessible points where roads intersect the trail. LARA invites the public to come take wood from these roadside piles for free.

"This wood comes mostly from standing dead trees, and it is dry and ready to burn," Buck said, adding that it will need to be cut to length and split before it is ready for use in a fireplace or wood stove. Wood piles can be found where the trail crosses the following roads: Bull Run Crossing, Skunk Hollow Road, Beaver Run Road, Young Road, Hoffa Mill Road, and Fairfield Road.

Survivorship Clinic Encourages Patients to "Get Busy Living"

According to the American Cancer Society, there are more than 2.5 million breast cancer survivors in the United States. Survivors may experience stress or uncertainty about how to adjust to life during or after cancer treatment.

The Thyra M. The Center for Breast Health and our caring staff slowly guide patients back into a 'new normal' by emphasizing to survivors to 'get busy living.'"

The Thyra M Humphreys Center for Breast Health is dedicated to screening every patient and their family members to understand their current level of coping. Depending upon their responses and after identifying concerns, a personalized plan is crafted to their needs. These plans give them the tools they need to reduce the stresses associated with diagnosis including assistance to address financial, emotional, spiritual and other concerns. Plans also outline a variety of community resources designed to promote overall wellness during and after cancer treatment.

Breast Cancer Survivorship Clinics have proven to be successful and add an element of care that benefits patients beyond treatment. With the results from the breast cancer survivorship clinics proving to be helpful for the patient, Evangelical Community Hospital's Committee on Cancer is looking into ways to support survivors of all types of cancers.

Union County Farm Bureau Adopts Policies On Issues

Policy resolutions on issues important to agriculture and rural living were adopted at the Union county Farm Bureau Annual meeting in October. The following policies were adopted and sent on to Pennsylvania Farm Bureau to be considered at the State-wide Annual Farm Bureau meeting in December.

County Policy
#1. We recommend that the Union County Farm Bureau support the development of a pipeline system for the distribution of Natural Gas throughout all 14 municipalities within Union County.

#2. We recommend Union County Farm Bureau work with the Union County Conservation District to serve as an educator and "not" be an environmental enforcer.

State Policy
#3. We recommend there be more reasonable standards for stream cleaning permits.

#4. We recommend Conservation Districts not be compelled by DEP to serve in a regulatory enforcement capacity as a condition to receive state funding.

#5 We recommend when on-site visits to farmers or land owners are requested by DEP the following criteria is to be used.

- 48 hours notice
 - Scheduled appointment made with farmer.
 - No longer than 1 hour.
 - Signed report by farmer and DEP official before leaving the farm site to avoid additional violations being added after initial visit.
 - Bio-security measures must be followed.
- #7. We recommend additional exemptions be made to the uniform construction code to include:
- a. To be erected for the purpose of s small business.
 - b. 2500 square feet or less in size.
 - c. Would not exceed an average of 25 vehicles trips per day.
