Hybrid Operating Rooms Benefit Patients

With the opening of its new Surgical and Cardiovascular Expansion in early July 2012, Evangelical Community Hospital will introduce a new hybrid operating room. One of eight new operating rooms located on the second floor of the new facility, the hybrid is larger than the other seven in order to accommodate special imaging technology not found in a standard operating room. It provides the capability for both surgery and endovascular procedures (entering the body through major blood vessels) in one space. This enhances patient care since all necessary procedures can be performed in the hybrid OR, thereby alleviating the need to move the

Hybrid operating rooms are ideal for minimally invasive, image guided and/or catheterbased procedures including treatments for varicose veins, carotid artery blockages, aneurysms, angioplasty, removal of gallstones, and more. In addition, the hybrid OR's design allows for multiple specialists to perform traditional procedures and minimally invasive surgeries on the same patient within one space.

Todd Stefan, MD, FACS, RPVI, of Surgical Specialists at Evangelical Community Hospital serves as Medical Director of the Peripheral Vascular Lab. Stefan says, "A hybrid operating room is a rarity among community hospitals. An operating room that serves both diagnostic and surgical functions in the same location is a plus for our patients, as often this specially equipped space is only avail-

able in larger health systems." Patients - Shorter Stays, Faster Recovery

Most procedures done in a hybrid setting are minimally invasive in nature, with smaller incisions, requiring shorter hospital stays and quicker recovery

can be dramatically reduced if multiple procedures can be accomplished during one surgery, under one act of anesthesia.

Patient's risks are minimized because of less invasive treatment, fewer exposures to anesthesia and because there is no need to move the patient from the operating room to another area for imaging procedures, which can heighten the risk of infection.

"Patients want to have a safe and successful procedure, but they also want to minimize their time away from loved ones as much as possible," said Dr. Stefan. "The Hybrid OR helps us to enhance the care experience by affording us the capability to perform all procedures in one location.'

All of the eight, new operating rooms that will be opened in July enhance the Hospital's ability to recruit new surgical specialists.

'Surgeons want to treat patients with the most advanced equipment and technology. The new ORs will help the Hospital to recruit new and experienced surgeons to the region and provide additional surgical spe-cialties for our patients," said Stefan.





Mayor Judy Wagner remembers getting up early to get the best deals for downtown Lewisburg's annual sidewalk sales. And she wasn't alone. Long before the birth of big box discounters and factory outlets, sidewalk sales in downtown shopping districts were the biggest sales events of the year. Wagner always made point of stopping by the Campus Theatre, because they would sell the original box office movie posters. "The early birds got the bargains," said Wagner. That's a tradition the Lewisburg Downtown Partnership (LDP) hopes to revive this year on Friday June 1, when more than 40 downtown stores will taking their best bargains to the street, with businesses staying open late until at least 8 pm as part of the monthly First Friday

events
"The tricky part of downtown development," says Linda Sterling, Director of the LDP, "is knowing what to let go in the name of progress and what to preserve for the future. We definitely aren't letting go of sidewalk sales." It's a tradition the business community hopes to re-energize and preserve into the future as part of the quintessential downtown Lewisburg shop-

While the nature of retailing has changed drastically over the years, many things remain the same. People love a bargain, and business owners love an opportunity to move out-of-season stock. Joanne Lyons, who along with her husband Bob owned the Lyons Shop in downtown Lewisburg, says "We couldn't eat the stuff that didn't sell, so we put it out front and sold it for next

"One year, Bob lost the buttons on his vest while he was putting out new merchandise," said Joanne Lyons. "People would grab, hide

Robert Donehower's family started W.L. Donehower and Sons business in the 1880's. Many, many years later, Donehower remembers needing to set up cash registers outside on the sidewalk to keep up with the purchases. He says the secret to successful sidewalk sales is uniform cooperation throughout the community. "With everyone working together, it can go over very well," said Donehower. Right into its final years, W.L. Donehower Shoe and Sports, even under new ownership, kept a strong tradition of successful sidewalk sales, so successful in fact they moved behind the building to larger quarters and became known as Back Alley Sales.
"As a new partner in a long-standing retail store, I was faced

with a problem – a lot of back stock in shoes, but not a decent size run in much of anything," said Leslie Marts Velz. "I decided we had to clear out somehow and the beauty of Sidewalk Sales was revealed to me. We organized all those shoes by size, loaded them into cartons so people could serve themselves, and marked them down – many below cost. Many way below cost. And I discovered that, as it turns out, finding the bargain of a lifetime is a lot of fun for people." Velz remembers one couple who organized their vacation time around that sale. Another man made a 3-hour trip every year because he had so much fun

"Though they had no reason to articulate it, people felt the difference between Sidewalk Sales in a small town and the Big Box Retail markdown game," says Velz. 

In conjunction with its summer quilt exhibit, Packwood House Museum will host noted quilt expert Susan Reich on Saturday, July 7. Her program, "Quiltmaking Through the War Years, 1941-1945," will begin at 7pm in Marlow Hall on the River-Woods campus, just north of Lewisburg between Route 15 and the West Branch of the Susquehanna River. The program is free of charge but donations are gladly accepted.

T & D Cats Of The World was the subject of a talk recently at the Millmont West Union Area Lions Club meeting. Funding comes from admission fees, donations, sponsorships of animals. The facility opened in 1990 and has grown considerably since that time. It presently encompasses 35 acres, and is open for visitors every weekend. Visitors travel walkways to see the animals and often are only a few feet from the animals. Now linked to a canal system that reached across the state, Lewisburg grew steadily as local produce, grain, corn, lumber, coal, and other goods were shipped out of town, with goods coming in that were not produced locally. The canal declined in importance after 1869, when Lewisburg was connected to the world by rail-


