## 2012 Ride for the Veterans

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they distributed supplies, donated by area churches and other organizations, to the veterans home, along with \$2,000 that was collected at the event. Ninety riders and passengers returned to the VFW for food, fun and entertainment.

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On Friday, June 8, 2012, Milton Elementary School teacher Edward J. Jackson Jr., was arrested and charged with unlawful contact with a minor - obscene and other sexual materials and performances, and criminal use of communication facility, for allegedly contacting a 15 year old girl, from Union County. The teen is currently 17 years old.

She first met Jackson at a school dance in 2010, where he was the DJ. He was later hired to DJ her 16th birthday party. They communicated through Facebook and text messages about the party. He became friends with her parents and was hired to DJ her sister's birthday party. .

His messages became flirtatious and were being sent every day. They later turned sexual in nature. They used code words and questions to verify it was them when they were texting on the cell phone.

The teen's father discovered this when she inserted her sim card into his phone and it saved all the messages that he later viewed. He later contacted Mifflinburg Police to begin an investigation.

Through the victim's Facebook account, with her families permission, special agent with the Attorney General's Child Predator Unit, Brittney Baughman, who posed as the victim, discovered messages from Jackson about engaging in intercourse. Baughman also reviewed previous text messages and seven photos Jackson sent the victim.

Charges against Jackson are third-class felonies and are each punishable by up to seven years in prison and \$15,000 in fines. He was arraigned before District Judge Leo Armbruster, Lewisburg, and bail was set at \$10,000. He is currently free on \$10,000. His preliminary hearing is scheduled for June 19, 2012.

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

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

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### Cotton Owens Passes Away By Gerald Hodges/the Racing Reporter

Legendary driver and car owner Cotton Owens passed away at age 88, only weeks after being inducted into the NASCAR Hall of Fame. Owens was diagnosed with lung cancer seven years ago at 81. He chose not to treat the cancer aggressively, saying he had led a full life. He was born in Union, SC but lived most of his life in nearby Spartanburg, S.C., where he based his racing operation

In a motorsports career that lasted most of a half-century, Owens won nine Sprint Cup (then Grand National) races as a driver and later built winning cars for other top racers. He and Hall of Fame driver David Pearson teamed to win the Cup championship in 1966. He first raced modifieds on the dirt tracks of the Carolinas and quick-

y built a strong reputation, winning dozens of races in the 1940s and 1950s and becoming known as the "king of the modifieds". Even after moving up to the Grand National series and its higher-profile races, he continued to run in modified events, in part because they typically paid well and he typically was among the favorites wherever he ran. Pearson often has said Owens was a hero of his and one of his inspirations for starting his own driving career

Owens drove in the Cup series from 1950 to 1964, leaving high-level driving at the age of 40. He probably would have driven for several

more seasons, but vision problems that had plagued him since crashes in the 1950s led him to climb out of the driver's seat. Owens had a team in the Cup series through the 1973 season. He scored 38 wins as an owner, enjoying the most success with Pearson,

a fellow Spartanburg resident. In 1970, Buddy Baker drove an Owens-prepared winged Dodge Daytona to a speed of 200.447 miles per hour in a tire test at Talladega Superspeedway, marking the first official NASCAR lap over 200. It was a key achievement Owens later said was as meaningful to him as

After leaving the circuit on a full-time basis, Owens occasionally fielded cars for close friend and country music singer Marty Robbins, who raced sporadically as a hobby.

Owens closed out his racing career in the 1990s where it started – on dirt. His three grandsons had an interest in driving, and he built cars for them to race on dirt at several South Carolina tracks. Even in his 70s, he was able to drive those dirt cars at speed while trying to perfect Owens was named one of NASCAR's 50 greatest drivers in 1998 as

"County committees are a vital link between the farm community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture and provide a voice to landowners, farmers and ranchers so that they have an opportunity for their opinions and ideas to be heard. With better participation in recent years, we have seen an increase in the number of nominations of women and minority candidates. I hope that trend continues.'

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is Farmers and rancher may

nominate themselves or others, and organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign the nomination form, FSA-669A. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available online at http://www. fsa.usda.gov/elections. Nomination forms for the 2012 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1, 2012. Elections will take place

While FSA county committees do not approve or deny loans, they make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other agricultural issues. Members serve threeyear terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to 11 members that are elected by eligible producers.

Public Comment: none

Roadmaster Rpt: Removed top soil at Rec Center and hauling fil to make pad for playground equipment donated to Twp by Mifflinburg school district. Replaced the ditch tile and cleaned out the ditch over at ballpark area. Received two complaints that the work for the playground area should have been bid out. J. Snyder felt that the Twp had the knowledge and equipment, so keeping the work in-house was saving taxpayer money. J. Snyder asked both other supervisors if they had any concerns with any of the current garage employees (T. Leitzel, H. Weaver, M. Nogle, Z. Leitzel). S. Buttorff noted that the Roadmaster has always been responsible for the hiring of road/garage employees and that is what he is relied on to do. B. Hosterman had no complaints. Both felt that is part of Roadmaster duties.

J. Snyder had concerns about the various pay levels and that there was a large gap between base rate 8.35 and the next rate of 12.15/ hr. S. Pasteurized is a safe effective technique to kill bacteria without affecting the taste or nutritional value of milk. Milk is pasteurized to ensure we all have a safe and healthy product to drink

Hormone Free - All milk contains trace amounts of hormones. This is a normal part of lactation and reproduction in all mammals.

All milk is antibiotic free as well. Like humans, dairy cows get sick from time to time too. And when they do, a veterinarian will prescribe an antibiotic to help the animal get better. All antibiotics have a withdrawl time that dairy farmers strictly follow. The cow's milk is discarded until they are healthy and their milk is antibiotic free. Additionally, milk goes through one of the most stringent testing processes in the industry to insure that it some of the safest food available on the store shelves.

Bovine somatotropin or bST is a naturally occurring protein hormone in cows. A trace amount of this hormone is present in all milk including organic products. It helps keep the dairy cow healthy and supports milk production. A synthetic version of this hormone known as rbST is also produced as a supplement however; the level never is more than what a cow would

I can't believe a year has come produce naturally so the milk the cow produces is still the same safe, wholesome nutritious product.

Organic milk must meet certain on farm requirements such as no use of antibiotics to treat sick animals, no supplemental hormones and no use of commercial fertilizers. The American Dairy Association says that conventionally produced milk products are just as safe and just as nutritious as organically produced.

The bottom line is MILK IS MILK! Dairy farmers are dedicated to providing the consumer with a safe, high quality product. That commitment starts with their herd because dairy cows must be healthy in order to produce that pure wholesome nutrient rich milk. Over the past year, the girls

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We believe medical professionals are key community members who are obligated to play an active leadership role in shaping public and business policy that impacts on the public's health and safety. Thus, as board members of the Organizations United for the Environment (OUE), we respectfully submit the following questions and issues that are currently impacting on the public's health.

I. The natural gas industry is exempt from a number of federal laws including the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) which establishes standards for controlling hazardous waste, the Safe Water Drinking Act (SWDA), and the Clean Air Act. Our state has not instituted regulations that close these loopholes.

A. The industry, under the mask of proprietary privilege, keeps secret the types, volume, and mixes of chemicals it uses for horizontal hydraulic fracturing, known as fracking. Many of the toxic chemicals used by the industry are carcinogenic, contain endocrine disrupters, and cause serious respiratory problems.

B. The industry uses nondisclosure statements. If a rural resident's well water is contaminated by the industry, before the industry will provide remediation, the resident must sign a non-disclosure statement and, thus, the number of contaminated wells is withheld from the public.

Before emergency room physicians can learn the full nature of the chemical type, quantity, and mix causing a gas industry related injury, they must sign a so called gag order. Thus, there is a delay before they can accurately diagnose the needed treatment. The gag order prevents physicians from sharing this information with other professionals or reporting it in medical

C. We wish to know what level of increase - 10%, 20% - must occur, for example, in asthma, cancer, miscarriage, or reproductive abnormality rates in a township, county,

or area before health organizations and professionals demand an investigation and/or cessation of activities causing the increase.

D. We wish to know if medical organizations maintain records that identify the frequency and patterns for illnesses or injuries related to the gas industry and to whom do medical organizations report this information. In the last three years, what types of illnesses and injuries have been treated and what is the corporation or company that employed the injured party or was responsible for the illness or injury?

E. Pennsylvania's Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), our state's "environmental cops," by political design is under funded, under- staffed, and unable to provide effective oversight.

F. Thousands of gas pipelines will criss-cross Pennsylvania and are subject to few, if any, regulatory and safety standards.

G. Natural gas activities are putting into jeopardy Pennsylvania's sustainable agriculture, forestry and tourism industries.

H. The natural gas boom has diverted attention and investment from the immediate and long term job creation opportunities and other benefits of renewable sources of energy.

II. We ask for hospitals and medical organizations to question the membership of their board of directors and founda-

A. We ask for disclosure of the members and what their expertise is and the reason for their being on the board. Specifically, we ask if any members are connected to the natural gas industry, and if so, what is the name of their corporation or company.

B. We ask if a tobacco executive is acceptable for membership on the board.

III. We wonder if hospitals and medical organizations accepted donations, gifts, or funds of \$500 or more from individuals or organizations connected to the natural gas industry. If so, we would like to know from which indi-

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ny hospitals and medical organizations have accepted these donations, gifts, or funds, and the amount.

IV. We ask if facilities or professionals employed by healthcare organizations have received grants or funding from the gas industry to conduct work, research, or studies. If so, we ask which corporations or companies provided the funding. Who is doing the work, research or study? What is the topic and what is the amount of the grant or funding?

We worry as more of Pennsylvania's natural treasures are transformed into an industrial wasteland, and especially once the gas boom ends, that our area will be less attractive and, thus, less able to attract and retain professional talent.

We support responsible

development; therefore, we recommend an immediate moratorium on gas industry operations until effective health and safety standards can be implemented.

We believe the voices of area health institutions will be a critical catalyst for the corrective action that needs to occur. We recognize it can come from a CEO, a board or directors, or from groups of health professionals within an institution. We believe such voices are consistent with the highest moral and ethical leadership for any profession and especially for health professionals. Sincerely.

## Specialized Fire Fighting Skills Honed at Crew Training Camp

Once again, wildland firefighters from across Pennsylvania gathered, as they do every year, to train and prepare so that they can respond to wildfires and other natural disaster incidents that occur in Pennsylvania and across the United States. Each year Pennsylvania answers the requests from other states and agencies and sends out qualified personnel in response to wildfires, flood and hurricanes.

In 2011, over 230 men and women participated in out of state

In 2011, over 230 men and women participated in out-of-state assignments as either a member of a traditional 20-person crew, or as an individual that qualifies as a "single resource."

The 2012 Specialized Crew Training Camp began on Friday afternoon, June 1 and ran through noon on Sunday, June 3, at Camp Karoondinha, Boy Scouts of America (Camp K) near Glen Iron, in Union County. The event drew approximately 250 participants from across the state.

Attendees were involved in a variety of classes and many hands-on activities, including training in the use of fire shelters, a piece of personal protection equipment that each firefighter is required to carry when on the fire line. Other classes included: portable pumps and water use, basic and advanced Wildfire Fighter Training. Upon completion of the camp, individuals are qualified to respond to wildland fire assignments through the country.

To properly prepare the firefighters for an out-of-state assignment, the camp was structured much like a western fire camp, requiring participants to "check-in" at the beginning of the weekend, report to an assigned crew or location, sleep in tents, carry bag lunches or MRE's to field trainings and "check-out" or "demobilize" at the end of the weekend.

## SUN Tech Students Teach 5th Graders On Obesity



Three SUN Area Technical Institute students from the Health Professions program, presented a lesson to 5th graders at the Mifflinburg Intermediate School.
