





a place where you can wash your hands and avoid coming within 6ft of other people. When you do remove the mask, avoid touching the front of it in case you breathed in infected droplets that could now be there. · Remove and dispose of the paper towel insert.

Place the rest of the mask in soapy water, soak it for two min-

utes, then wash and rinse. Any kind of soap - dish soap, laundry detergent, hand soap - will do. Then wash your hands, and disinfect with bleach or alcohol anything you touched after taking off the mask. Never reuse a mask without washing it first.

 Next time you wear the mask, remember to replace the paper-towel insert. If you have symp-

toms – a stuffy nose, a cough, a fever – stay inside.



Buffalo Valley Rail Trail Remains Open

If you desire a break from home, Union County's Buffalo Valley Rail Trail remains open to the public on which users are encouraged to practice social distancing. Under the Commonwealth's stay at home directive; outdoor recreation including bicycling, walking and hiking is permitted as long as social distancing is maintained. The Centers for Disease Control and the Pennsylvania Department of Health recommend keeping a minimum of six feet from other persons.

While the trail is open, the restrooms at the trailhead parking lots have been closed recently based on the advice of health professionals in an effort to prevent the unintended spread of COVID-19. The Union County Trail Authority regrets this inconvenience, but protecting public health and safety during these unprecedented times is the highest priority, said Union County Trail Authority Chair John Showers. The Trail Authority continues to operate, however remotely,

and notes that their regular April 19th Board Meeting has been canceled. The authority's annual meeting also scheduled for April 19th has been postponed until the summer and has been rescheduled to coincide with the 9:00 AM board meeting on July 16, 2020 at the Union County Government Center. Trail users are asked to report immediate trail mainte-

nance needs or safety concerns via the Buffalo Valley Rail Trail Facebook page or by leaving a message by telephone at 570.524.3878. The authority asks for everyone's patience as it may take longer than normal to respond to maintenance needs under the current circumstances. Due to the public health pandemic and emergency declarations of maintaining the trail will be even more challenging as local contractors the authority relies on may not be available. The authority also asks trail users to carry in and carry out all trash to prevent litter. Community volunteers who keep the trail clean may not be able to attend to the trail during the COVID-19 outbreak.

Mifflinburg Teen Unveils Sidewalk Library



and Mayor David Cooney participate in the Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the Sidewalk Library located at the Mifflinburg Government Services Building at 343 Chestnut Street. With the Covid-19 pandemic closing schools and libraries, 14-

year old Garrett Franck of Mifflinburg began to wonder where people would get their reading materials. It wasn't long before Franck approached his parents and said he wanted to spend some of the money he had put aside for his 4-H projects this year to set up a sidewalk library in Mifflinburg. Franck and his mother, Barbara, started to make phone calls

to find out if permits were needed and where a box could be placed. Franck wanted to set it up the lending library near the Union County Extension Office so he would be able to monitor it when he was going to Teen Council meetings. The county commissioners granted Franck permission to set up his box at the Mifflinburg Government Services Building located at 343 Franck purchased an old newspaper box and refurbished it.

He then recruited a family friend, Cindy Potoeski of Millmont, to help him with the decals he wanted to place on the side of his library. Potoeski taught him how to prep the decals and get the box ready for application. Heritage Printers donated bookplates to put inside the books. Next, he went sorted his books. However, he discovered that he was short on teen and adult reading material. He called upon his friends from the Good Time 4-H Club who generously donated books to his cause. On March 27, 2020, Franck's vision became a reality at a

ribbon cutting ceremony to officially "open" the new library with Union County Commissioner Jeff Reber, Mayor David Cooney, MHRA Executive Director Heidi Criswell and his parents, Joshua and Barbara Franck in attendance. 'The library box says it all. Take a book, Leave a book. You

can take a book you are interested in reading or you can leave a book you want to share with someone else in the community,' explained Franck. "My dream is for there to be books in there for everyone to read from 1 to 100." Franck is already looking to expand his Sidewalk Library

By providing cloth masks that people who are not involved in direct care or not in a health-care area can wear, we preserve our supply of surgical masks and, when needed, N-95-type masks, for direct caregivers. That makes the donation even more important," says William Swanger, spokesperson for Diakon Lutheran Social Ministries, which operates Buffalo Valley Lutheran Village.

Evangelical Community Hospital is also appreciative of the community efforts. "We have truly been touched by the outpouring of support of the Hospital. Every corner of the community has played a part in contributing to our efforts to care for our patients. We have been collaborating with several partners, including members of the Mennonite and Amish community with whom we have a strong relationship, to make homemade masks that will be used to add to our stockpile of supplies for the CO-VID-19 response," stated Kendra Aucker, President and CEO of Evangelical Community Hospital. "Using these handmade masks for patients and staff not involved in direct patient care allows us to conserve our supply of hospital-grade masks for the personnel who require a more intense level of protection."

The Impact Of COVID-19 Crisis On Small, Local Businesses

The wildfire spread of COVID-19 has impacted every for us to weather this crazy storm! We would not be here aspect of our lives and changed our daily routines from without them and are moved by all the local support we working at home, learning at home, and for some not working at all. The Stay at Home orders and travel for only essential business, food, and doctor visits are designed to flatten the curve. How are our small, local businesses surviving such dramatic and unforeseen changes during this crisis?

Ritter Feeds in Paxtonville is considered a life-sustaining businesses. People still need to feed their animals. The hours of operation are the same as always. The employees are taking precautions to keep customers safe. Employees are practicing social distancing from customers and the protocol of washing and disinfecting. They Lysol the doors and counters throughout the day. They are using hand sanitizer and are not requiring customers to sign credit card receipts. Employees are encouraged to wash their hands frequently.

IGA Central Market in Middleburg is also an essential business and is open for customers. Across the region and nation some products are limited or unavailable because of the stockpiling and demand. Some of the supplies such as toilet paper, bread dough, yeast, pasta, and pasta sauce are limited. Prices of other products have risen when suppliers increase the price. Some Lysol wipes and cleaning products are not currently available.

Delivery trucks are arriving regularly but warehouses are allocating products. "We are never sure what will be delivered or what will be out-of-stock," said one em-

The initial stockpiling and hoarding seems to have subsided. People for the most part are being more moderate. "We are seeing regular customers more often and new customers are stopping to shop. Some are going store-tostore to see what they find," said Chris App.

IGA Central Market is taking precautions to keep both their employees and customers safe. Throughout the day they are disinfecting the shelves, door handles, counters, and carts. The employees are wearing gloves and masks. Plexiglas has been added to the checkout areas. The checkout area is wiped after each customer. The aisles are marked with lines allowing for the 6-foot social distancing between customers. They are trying to open only every other register to allow for more space between customers. After closing, the store is again thoroughly disinfected.

IGA Central Market in Middleburg has adjusted its hours. The store is open from 9 am-6 pm, Monday-Saturday. Closed on Sunday.

Miller Travel Agency in Middleburg has also been impacted by the crisis. Amie Miller reports, "As you probably guessed, the majority of our clients have travelled worldwide prior to and shortly after the outbreak. We made the very difficult decision to discontinue walk in appointments prior to the Governor's order to close the physical office. We are now operating via email only, but we have seen a substantial increase in bookings for 2021. The majority of our clients booked this year have elected to reschedule for next year." Looking on the bright side, Miller notes that people

now realize the benefit of having an agent by their side during these difficult times. "Unlike the big online travel companies who were not able to handle the massive cancellations, we walked each and every client through options and they only needed to call us, not be placed in long ques or ever busy phone numbers. Question: Alice can you please explain why Medicare Part D drug plan coverage is not that great, and what President Trump is doing to help?

Answer: I will try to make some sense out of some of the key points to lower drug costs directly related to Medicare Eligible

Citizens. Most of the proposals fall far short of the goal to lower drug costs. Require drug ads to include the price: One of the ideas is to require drug makers to disclose list prices

in advertisements. Many experts say that they don't think that would have a significant impact on pricing and spending.

Another idea is to give the Medicare Part D insurance plans more flexibility to negotiate discounts on drugs that are still under patent or don't have any competitors. Patents allow the drug makers to recoup the millions of dollars invested for research and development. Over the years, the drug makers have found ways to hold on to the patent protections much longer. Trump said, "our patent system will reward innovation, but it will not be used to protect unfair monopolies." Persuade other countries to pay more:

I think we are all aware that many medications can be obtained cheaper from Canada. One of Trump's key proposals would involve pressuring other countries to raise their prices for prescription medications. In the United States we have the highest costs for prescription drugs. Many foreign countries have negotiated lower prices from the drug companies. It is believed that foreign companies should share in the pricing because the innovation benefits the whole world. It is unclear whether other countries would be willing to raise their prices and in turn lead to drug companies lowering prices in the United States.

President Trump is taking a stab at tackling this complex problem of high drug costs.

However, many of Trump's proposals are light on details and will need action by Congress to become a reality.

For 2020 Medicare Part D enrollees will have the Brand name drugs reduced to a 25% cost share in the "Donut Hole". Let me put that into perspective for you. Humira and Taltz are routinely advertised in the Evening News timeslot. A Medicare Part D enrollee would have a 25% co-pay in the "Donut Hole" of around \$1250 a month. Yes, you read that correctly! The total cost of those Medications each are over \$5000 a month.

Explaining Medicare Part D plans and the related costs is extremely difficult. I always tell our clients to hold on and fasten their seat belts. Sadly, as we all get older, things that should be clear, simple, and less expensive, are just the opposite. Any improvement and positive moves to lower drug costs I believe are more than welcomed by all.
