New Berlin School Maybe Sold to Borough

The Mifflinburg School Board has agreed to sell the New Berlin Elementary School to the New Berlin Borough for \$244,000. The board approved the draft sales agreements for the New Berlin School and the Buffalo Crossroads Elementary School, which is being sold to Buffalo Valley United Methodist Church, who represents local churches, for \$250,000.

New Berlin Borough President Juli Finkbinder stated the signed sales agreement was sent to the school last Friday and that she had also signed a commitment letter with M&T Bank for the municipal loan, a seven year note, for the building. The next step will be for the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development to approve the public debt statement.

The agreements for both schools need to be ratified or signed and the Union County Planning Commission need to be notified that the district is selling the buildings. If all goes according to plan, both sales could be completed by December 31.

The New Berlin building was originally scheduled to be sold to New Story, who bid \$240,000 through Salisbury Management Inc., of Boylston, MA. New Story is a private chain that provides schools for children with educational and behavioral challenges.

The New Berlin Borough is currently focusing on keeping the pipes from freezing over the winter in the building and will continue discussions on what the building will be used for in the future.

"Slave and Free", A Look At Union County's Past



Free African Americans in the Buffalo Valley (1780-1850)" discusses slavery as practiced here.

A third chapter, "A Flight to Freedom" by Sam Alcorn details the personal story of Charles Bell, an escaped slave from Virginia, who lived eventually in Lewisburg and worked at Bucknell University. Chapters by Catherine Hastings include "Not Forgotten: African Americans in Early Union County (1820-1930)" and "The World of Work for African Americans in Early Union County (1850-1930)." A listing of African American burials in the Lewisburg Cemetery is also included. The Dale/Engle/Walker House is open on Sundays from 2-4 PM through October. The book African Americans in Union County: Slave and Free is available for purchase at the House, or at the UCHS office in the county courthouse on S. Second Street in Lewisburg (M-F 8:30 AM-noon and 1-4:30 PM).

African Americans in Union County: Slave and Free, a Union County Historical Society publication, breaks new ground on the county's past, which is reflected directly in the Society's Dale/Engle/Walker House at 1471 Strawberry Road, Lewisburg. The Dale family were one of a few who had slaves in the late 1700s and early 1800s. Slavery is an aspect of our area history that is still little understood. Bruce Teeple's chapter in the book focuses on the earliest period of free and enslaved African Americans, and Jeanette Lasansky's "Slaves and

Re-Creation USA Items Found

Re-Creation USA, Inc. a local gospel, youth performance group that benefits hospitalized veterans was struck by tragedy when thieves broke into their truck and drove off with it and a trailer full of equipment. While performing in San Antonio, Texas, their equipment was stolen, including all lights, sounds, costumes, props, cash and checks. Many personal items of the group were also stolen in the heist.

Police initially offered little comfort, stating that truck stolen of this type are often taken over the border in Mexico and used in drug trafficking. With little hope of recovery the group was forced to cancel shows up to November 3rd. In a happy turn of events, San Antonio police called early Wednesday morning to report that the truck and trailer had been found. Ironically they were found in a parking lot near the VA Medical Center, 2 miles from where it had been stolen.

The group, having still not retrieved the truck and trailer are unsure of any damage or loss of equipment that occurred from the incident. There was however the substantial cost of transporting the group back to Pennsylvania and 2 weeks of lost revenue due to canceled shows. The will also be required to travel back to San Antonio to retrieve the stolen items.

Jay Muller, President of Re-Creation USA, Inc. stated in a press release that if you have donated to Re-Creation, "... thinking you'd be restocking Re-Creation and you'd like to have your donation returned, please let us know." Unreturned donations will be used to offset the expenses that have occurred from the event.

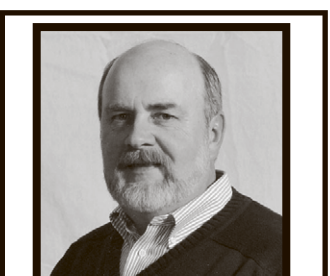

And more interesting information about WW1 from a reader...
"When I was about 10 years old, my mother would go to a neighbor's home to do their laundry once a week. The wife had gone blind and none of the men of the household knew how to do it (or didn't want to know).

"While my mother washed clothes, I would help (maybe hinder) the father. His name was John Hogentogler (1893 to 1976). He had taught in a one-room school and served in the Great War. John had been gassed and shell-shocked and because of that he walked and talked like a drunk. He would go periodically to a Veteran's Hospital for shock treatments and when he came home he would be almost normal for a time. Once, on the way for the treatment, the bus driver, who thought he was drunk, put him off the bus.

"He talked to me about many experiences, but the only one that stuck with me was about his training for the trench warfare. He told me they wore heavy wool shirts and were trained to go 'over the top' when their Sergeant blew his whistle. Whoever got to any barbed wire first was to raise their rifle in both hands above their heads and dive onto the wire, this held the wire down while the rest of the men coming behind 'ran on top of the downed man' using him as a bridge across the wire (hence the heavy shirts).

"He also told how they would try and round up hogs before a drive over ground they thought was mined. They would drive the hogs ahead of them through the minefield and try to run in their tracks.

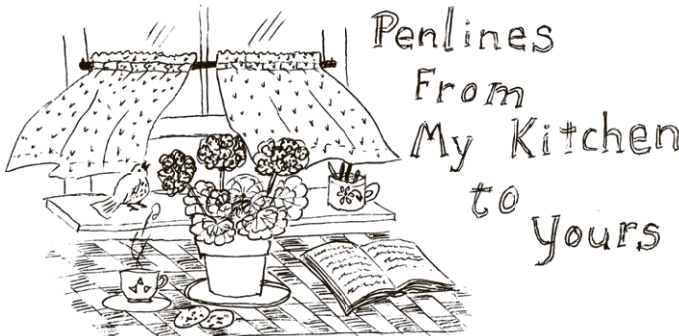
"One time when he arrived in the trenches there was a hand sticking out of the ground in the trench wall. They didn't know if there was a body attached, but all the new men had to shake the hand for good luck (I think he called it Murphy).

"After he was gassed he had to walk to the rear area for treatment. A walking wounded who could see was given a stick with a white cloth to hold up. All the gassed men and other walking wounded would then have their hands hooked into the belt of the man in front of them with the flag bearer in the front. They were told not to let go for any reason, as they would not be fired on while in the white flag line. Anyone not with the flag bearer was fair game.

"Wish I remembered more of what he told me. John was from Millerstown, PA. And I think he taught at Reward, PA. Timeline for his telling me these things would be about 1965."

This was sent by Richard E. Knouse... One of John's sons, Granville, lived in Winfield. It's such an unusual name... Did anyone know him, Granville Hogentogler? If you did or if you can share other WW1 stories, let me know.

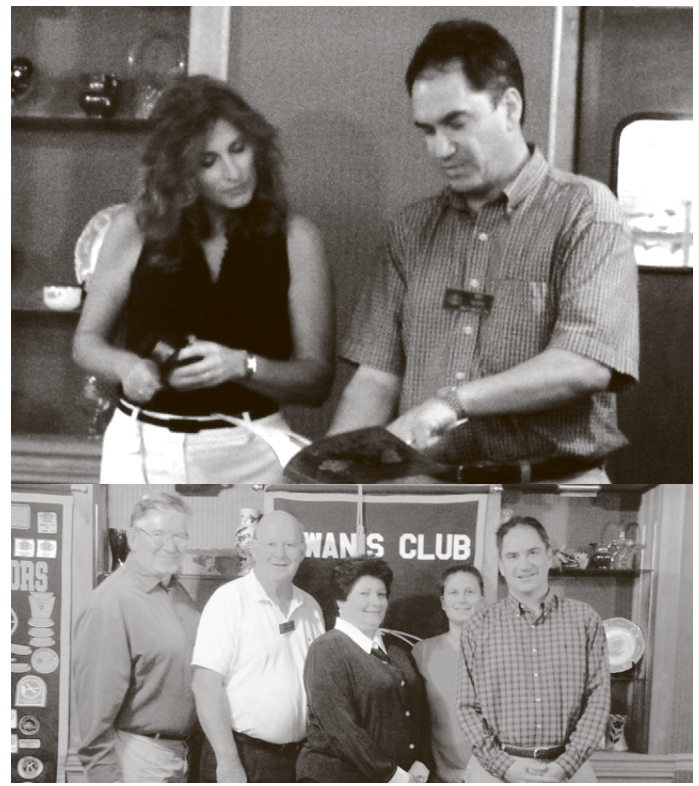

Keselowski Dominates, Bowyer Wins On Fuel

CONCORD, N.C.—Brad Keselowski led the most laps and had the dominant car, but near the end of Saturday night's Sprint Cup Bank of America 500, he had to stop for some fuel.

Clint Bowyer didn't. Bowyer beat Denny Hamlin to the finish line by .417 seconds. Jimmie Johnson, who was also saving fuel, came home third.

Bowyer, who moved from Richard Childress Racing to Michael Waltrip Racing at the beginning of the season, didn't have enough fuel to do the traditional burn-out.

"I want to do a burnout!" Bowyer said. "Am I ever going to get to do a burnout?"

"It makes you almost giddy. It's so much fun to come to the racetrack knowing that you've got cars that are capable of getting the job done. . . Who would have thought in a million years, after making the switch and coming over to a new family, and everything that was new, that we'd be in victory lane three times?"

"With five races left, we're still in contention for a championship our first year together."

Greg Biffle ran fourth, Kyle Busch fifth and Mark Martin sixth, as only six cars finished on the lead lap. Carl Edwards, Kasey Kahne, Joey Logano, and Martin Truex were the remaining top-10 finishers.

"We ran around in circles and were done," Johnson said. "It's a tough way to race, for sure, but I'm happy that as a group and a team, we've figured out how to get better at fuel-mileage racing."

"It's something that we didn't have in our repertoire for a lot of years. So I'm very pleased with the progress we've made, that I've made in the car. My driving style just eats up fuel."

Keselowski ran out of fuel before his final pit stop and finished 11th. He leads Johnson by seven points and third-place Hamlin by 15 at the midpoint of the Chase. Bowyer climbed to fourth in the standings, 28 points back.

Subbing for Dale Earnhardt Jr., who was sidelined by a concussion, Regan Smith turned in a strong performance in the early going of the first race without an Earnhardt since 1979 and the first race without a driver from North Carolina since 1961.

Smith ran as high as ninth and was firmly in the 10th spot when his engine let go on Lap 61, ending his first run for Hendrick Motorsports. Top-12 Chase leaders with five to go: 1. It looks like this year's Chase winner is going to be one of four drivers: Keselowski, Johnson, Hamlin, or Bowyer.

LOGANO CLAIMS EIGHTH NATIONWIDE WIN

Joey Logano topped the field in the final run of Friday night's Dollar General 300 at Charlotte Motor Speedway and won his eighth Nationwide Series race of the season in 18 starts.

Logano beat Kevin Harvick to the finish line by 2.760 seconds to win for the first time at Charlotte and the 17th time in his career. Series leader Elliott Sadler ran third and extended his advantage to 13 points over Ricky Stenhouse Jr., who came home seventh.

Kyle Busch and Denny Hamlin completed the top-five. Austin Dillon, Ricky Stenhouse, Brian Scott, James Buescher, and Michael Annett rounded out the top-10.

DALE JR.'S NIGHTMARE

Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s bid for this year's Cup championship is over. He led the point standings for the first time in eight years, and after a four-season drought, had returned to victory lane. But following the Talladega race, he announced that he had suffered two concussions, and will miss two races.

"It's pretty frustrating," Earnhardt said. "I just enjoy driving cars every weekend. I look forward to being at the race track with (crew chief) Steve (Letarte). So I'm really going to miss that."

What appeared to be a relatively minor crash at Talladega Superspeedway, compounded symptoms from an earlier accident Earnhardt experienced during a tire test at Kansas Speedway on Aug. 29.

Earnhardt was evaluated in the ambulance at Kansas after an impact he said had a force of 40Gs, but he chose not to reveal his concussion symptoms, fearing that he might be pulled from the car with the start of the Chase less than three weeks away.

On Wednesday, Earnhardt was diagnosed with a concussion, and withdrew from the Charlotte and Kansas races.



"The wreck at Kansas was really severe and it surprised me how tough it was to get past that," Earnhardt said. "I remember everything about that accident and everything after that accident, but you know your body and how your mind works, and I knew something was just not quite right."

Earnhardt said the impact at Talladega was less than half of what it was at Kansas, but he was concerned by the proximity of the two concussions.

"I contacted my sister (Kelley Earnhardt Miller), and we talked about seeing a neurosurgeon, and we ended up getting steered toward Dr. Petty," Earnhardt continued. "Met with him (on Tuesday), ran through a couple tests, everything was checking out, and did an MRI. Everything looked good there. But I was really honest with him about how I felt and honest with him about the whole process from Kansas all the way on."

"He spent the night thinking about what we discussed and everything that we did and couldn't clear me to race this weekend. I trust his opinion, so I believe when he tells me I don't need to be in the car and I need to take a couple weeks off that that's what I need to do."

NASCAR vice president of competition Steve O'Donnell said that tracking concussions of drivers is a "subjective call."

"It's something we take a look at week in and week out. So we'll continue to do that."

Doctors staffing NASCAR infield care centers can, but are not required to give drivers a Concussion Reduction Technology test or MRI if a concussion is suspected. Drivers with concussions must receive medical clearance to return to racing. O'Donnell said there have been nine confirmed concussions in NASCAR's three top divisions during the past five years.

"We look at (the cars), candidly, as a rolling laboratory," said O'Donnell. "Each and every event, we try to learn something new and make them as safe as possible, and I would say our race cars are the safest in the world. I think when you look at the concussion history that we've had, that's less than two per year. I don't want to minimize that because any concussion is a cause for concern, and we'd like that number to be zero."

Invest In Kids

berland National Bank and a member of the PA Early Learning Investment Commission, and State Rep. Fred Keller, R-85 read the book Gloria and Officer Buckle to the students in the Head Start class at the Susquehanna Discovery Center after a panel discussion on Early Childhood Programs.

High quality early child care and education programs are among the most powerful weapons to prevent crime and violence, lower prison costs, save taxpayers' money, and help children get the right start in life. On Friday, Oct. 12 Fight Crime: Invest in Kids sponsored a roundtable discussion at the Susquehanna Children's Center on the campus of Susquehanna University. Local law enforcement, business leaders, and child care directors were joined by State Representatives Fred Keller and Lynda Schlegel Culver to discuss the value of early childhood education and high quality learning programs.

District Attorney Michael Piecuch told the panel, "Kids who have a poor educational foundation are more likely to make poor decisions and end up in our criminal justice system."

Keri Albright, President & CEO of the Greater Susquehanna United Way, noted, "Government is reactive. We need to be proactive: nurturing, loving, helping, and mentoring. We need to invest early in the lives of children."

Business leader Don Steele, Chairman & CEO of Northumberland National Bank and a member of the PA Early Learning Investment Commission, concurred. By establishing quality early child care and education programs, you help children reach their full potential. You help to develop critical thinking, collaboration, communication skills as well as skills in math and science. Higher educational levels lead to a higher level on the workforce and subsequently a higher earning power.

Piecuch discussed new research indicating that high-quality early care and education in PA can help at-risk children succeed, significantly reduce the likelihood that they will commit crimes, and save taxpayer dollars through reduced prison and other costs.

However, despite research that supports that high quality early education can reduce future corrections costs in PA, spending on corrections and prisons costs far exceeds spending on early education.

Quoting Victor Hugo, "He who opens a school door, closes a prison." Piecuch emphasized the importance of doing more on the front end in terms of character building and making good choices to avoid dealing with delinquency later. Research shows that by investing in high-quality early care programs, Pennsylvania will reap the rewards of increased graduation rates and improved academic performance as well as decreased crime rates and inmate populations.

According to Bruce Clash, State Director of Fight Crime: Invest in Kids Pennsylvania, "By giving at-risk young children high-quality opportunities to learn and build a strong foundation, we increase the likelihood that they will succeed in school and become productive adults." He told the group, "The architecture of the brain is formed by age 5." Opportunities for early child care programs are critical. He states, "It increases the odds of a child reaching his or her potential. There are no do-overs. A child is only 3, 4 or 5 (years old) once."

The Fight Crime: Invest in Kids coalition wants to help make the early learning community stronger. Steele discussed the calendars that are distributed by the United Way to families featuring different activities to build skills for each month. Albright noted the "Nice Never Hurts" program that was created to prevent bullying.

It is vital that funding is restored to Head Start, Pre-K Counts, and the Accountability Block Grants so high-quality early child care and education programs can continue to make a positive impact in PA. Funding of the Keystone Stars is also important as a ranking tool to indicate high-quality child care programs.

Jane Campbell, Executive Director of Snyder Union Mifflin Child Development, was surprised by the number of families in need of child care programs in western Snyder County. She was pleased to announce the partnership between the Pre-K Counts Program and the Middle-West School District. A Pre-K Counts Program has just been created at West Snyder Elementary School. There are sixteen children participating in the full-day service class. She stated, "Legislation is key to provide funding to those who are most affected...those who are just above poverty level." Childcare is not babysitting but rather an investment in the future. It helps to put children on the path of self-sufficiency and self-fulfillment.

Representatives Keller and Culver were recognized for their efforts to ensure that early childhood education programs were level funded in the current school year. State Representative Fred Keller from the 85th District remarked, "It is important to get and keep legislators involved in early child care learning through meetings with the Early Learning Investment Commission."

Lynda Schlegel Culver, State Representative of the 108th District agreed. "Fred and I are already involved. It is getting political people to stay the course and be invested in child care."

Most new legislators come into office with a clean slate and adopt a focus or a cause. In addressing the need for legislative support, Piecuch suggested, "We need to get them early. Mentor the new people with experienced and dedicated people" to the cause of early child care and education.

The Governor and top Administration officials are already beginning to draft the state budget that will be proposed in February. Law enforcement leaders and business officials hope that Governor Corbett will at a minimum maintain current levels of funding, if not increase them slightly, for early care and education programs in next year's budget.

After the panel discussion on the importance of high-quality early care and education, State Representative Fred Keller and Don Steele Chairman and CEO of Northumberland Bank read to children in the Head Start classroom at the Susquehanna Children's Center. State Representative Lynda Schlegel Culver, and DA Michael Piecuch visited a Preschool classroom at the center. Both sets of guests read the Caldecott Medal winning book, Officer Buckle & Gloria. The guests then autographed the books and donated them to the classrooms.
