



## Young Farmers Education Meeting To Be Held

March 30, 2012, Union County Times -3

The Mifflinburg Chapter of Young Farmers will hold an educational meeting on Thursday, April 11, at 7 p.m. at the Carriage Corner Restaurant, Mifflinburg. The program, led by staff from the Union County Conservation District will focus on the new manure management plans required for almost all farmers in Pennsylvania. There will be a meal, brief business meeting and program, cost is \$10.50 and the event is open to the general public. Anyone interested in attending this meeting should call Barry Spangler at 570-966-0406, meeting coordinator, by Monday, April 9, 2012, to reserve a space.

Every farm in Pennsylvania that produces manure or applies manure to the land, regardless of size, is required to have and follow a written manure management plan (MMP). This includes manure spreading on fields from equipment and grazing animals on pastures and in animal concentrated areas, such has barnyards or bare spots in pastures.

Farmers must also complete and maintain records to demonstrate compliance with the MMP. PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has developed a MMP workbook for farmers to use. Once completed, the MMP must be implemented. DEP or other regulatory staff may request to see a MMP when they visit a farm. Failure to follow the MMP is a violation of state, and in some cases, federal law.

A farmer can write their own MMP and can seek assistance from certified nutrient management specialists, certified manure brokers and haulers, and county conservation districts to do so. Farms defined as concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs) and concentrated animal operations (CAOs) are still required to develop a written nutrient management plan (NMP) NMPs for these animal operations are required to follow a more detailed process and must be developed by a certified nutrient management specialist.

The mission of the Young Farmers Association is to educate and promote the environmentally appropriate production marketing, and processing of food, feed and fiber. Specifically the program is designed to assist those in production, agriculture, and agribusiness to become successfully established or to improve their current agricultural status. Also, an educational focus is to improve understanding and communication between the consumer public and the agricultural community regarding common concerns and issues. The motto of the association is "a young farmer is any farmer willing to learn." Meetings are typically held on the second Thursday of the month and include dinner and a program. 

"It's a victory, but we would have liked to have gone the distance," said Stewart. "We had an awesome race car. The guys in the pits did a great job to keep me in front, because all our stops were under green.' Kyle Busch led earlier in the race and finished second.

NASCAR told us before the race that rain might be an issue," said Busch. "I think everyone was driving as hard as they could and trying to stay near the front. It was sunny when the race started, but after it got cloudy and the temperature dropped, our car was a little tight. A second-place finish is not nearly as good as first-place.

Dale Earnhardt Jr. was third.

thought were the greatest races at AMS

Well obviously the 1992 Hooters 500, that's probably first and foremost. The second one, I'll recall our first Camping World Truck Series, and how competitive it was. In fact the first couple of Truck races we had, there were three to four guys coming off the fourth turn going for the win. Those were great.

'One that truly stands out is the 2001 event when Kevin Harvick won. I've been in this business over 30 years, and I've never heard the fans in the stands continue to cheer and express their emotion for that long, once a winner had crossed the finish line. It literally went on for seven or eight minutes without dying down at all. I think it was several things, obviously a new winner, a great photo finish with Kevin just beating Jeff Gordon. But the biggest thing, it was just a rush, a release of emotion for all

the fans. The fact that Dale Earnhardt drove that very car and won that race in a photo finish the year before, his last win here, and being three weeks after his death, it was just an emotional release for everybody. Weekend Racing: The Cup and Truck teams are at Martinsville, the smallest (.526-mile), the shortest track on the NASCAR circuit. The Nationwide teams do not race again until Apr. 13. When Martinsville Speedway first opened, NASCAR was just an

idea. When NASCAR was formed, Martinsville Speedway was a charter member, a membership that endures after more than 60 years. In fact, the historic Virginia half-mile oval is the only track that was on the schedule in the first NASCAR Sprint Cup Series season that still hosts the series today. Martinsville Time Line:

Va., Buck Baker, Bill Blair, and Tim Flock as 4,000 watched. Bill France finishes eighth while one of those sidelined with mechanical problems is 19-year-old Fireball Roberts.

September 25, 1949: NASCAR's "Strictly Stock" division, now the Sprint Cup Series, makes its first appearance at the speedway and Byron wins again in an Oldsmobile 88 with Lee Petty second in a 1949 Plymouth. Seating increased to 10,000.

### Dairy Producers Reminded of MILC Program

The Snyder/Union Farm Service Agency would like to remind dairy producers of some important program eligibility requirements for payment under the Milk Income Loss Contract program (MILC). FSA Snyder/Union County Executive Director Mary Kiel says dairy and feed prices may authorize potential MILC payments, but all dairy producers need to be aware of the program requirements should those conditions arise.

Dairy operators currently enrolled in MILC, need to notify the local county office if there have been any changes to their

If a payment rate is announced, dairy producers enrolled in the MILC program will need to provide the local county office with documentation showing the eligible milk production and commercial milk marketing for the months with a MILC payment rate in effect.

When producers enroll in MILC, a payment start month is selected. This month remains the same through all program years, unless a change is requested by the dairy. Dairy producers are allowed to change their start month an unlimited number of times throughout their enrollment in MILC provided that the changes are requested timely.

MILC program participants are also required to comply with FSA's Adjusted Gross Income requirements each fiscal year. This certification, on a CCC-931, must be completed prior to a payment being disbursed.

New dairies that have not previously participated in the MILC program will need to fill out the CCC-580, Milk Income Loss


