



New Berlin Post Office Under Siege


Marlin Maurer stands at the service window at the New Berlin Post Office. "I've lived here 80 years and the post office has always been open. I live here in town and I like the convenience."

The fate of the New Berlin Post Office rests in the hands of the residents. Check Option 1 to keep the post office open and return your survey by October 18. A community meeting will be held on Thursday, Nov. 1 at 7 pm at the New Berlin Fire Company Social Hall.

To close or not to close that is the question that faces the residents of New Berlin as the U.S. Postal Service marks several rural offices in the area for closure. So how much do the residents of New Berlin want to keep their local post office open? Patrons can voice their opinion in survey being distributed in their mailboxes this week. By checking the first option the New Berlin Post Office would remain open with operational hours reduced from eight to six. All other options could close the current post office. At the bottom of the survey is a section in which patrons can express their preferences for window

service hours. Customers are asked to return the survey by October 18. Only one survey per address may be returned. All addresses serviced by the

New Berlin Post Office are encouraged to participate in the survey. It is important that evervone who uses the New Berlin Post Office obtains a survey. This includes box holders as well as home delivery patrons. If you did not receive a survey, request a survey at the post office. These surveys are important and are being used to determine whether the New Berlin Post Office will remain open or not. Please indicate your preference of when the post office should be open if hours are reduced. The Postal Service will discard any sur-



veys that have additional options written on them.

The surveys have already arrived. So grab your pencil and let your voice be heard. To maintain the post office in New Berlin with reduced operational hours check Option 1. Voting any other option could close the current post office! Option 2-close the post office and offer rural delivery to box holders; Option 3- close the post office and open a Village Post Office at a local business; and Option 4- close the post office and encourage box holders to get boxes at another post office.

In a rural setting the Post Office is often the heart of the community. People stop and chat with neighbors as they pick up their mail, purchase stamps, and send out packagcontinued on pg. 8



Eighteenth-Century Architecture is \$0 Joining Fee for New Members a Focus of Tours Every Sunday



Every Sunday through October, house tours are given at the c. 1793 Dale/Engle/Walker House that is owned and operated by the Union County Historical Society. Samuel Dale, who emigrated from Northern Ireland, and first lived in Chester County and New Columbia, had the house built of local limestone in

Visitors go through both the original structure, which was composed of four equally sized rooms that functioned as a dining room and parlor on the first floor and two bedrooms on the second floor, as well as the ell that was added between 1820-1840. The long porch was the last addition, sometime between 1880 and 1905. The house has been restored and preserved.

The original kitchen was in what we would now consider a cellar, directly underneath the dining room. It has a very large hearth that has been fully restored and furnished with cast and forged iron, brass and copper period cooking equipment. There is also early woodenware, clay, and tin ware, all dating from the 1790s-1820s. Visitors see some implements that are not dissimilar to what we use today like skimmers and ladles, while others, like the toaster, bear no resemblance to contemporary

The house has all of its original woodwork intact including the simple but elegant center stairway, chair rails and cabinetwork, and the original quarter-sawn American hickory floors.

Step back in time and see how a farmhouse from 219 years ago was built. Also open to visitors are the wagon shed that is fully furnished with 19th-century farm tools and equipment and vehicles, and the restored milk house.

Tours are every Sunday through October beginning at 2 PM. The last tour starts at 3:30 PM. Directions: from Route 15 in Lewisburg, take Route 192 west for 1.5 miles to Strawbridge Road, turn onto Strawbridge and go 1.5 miles to the site. Signs





see justice done." Richard then began to describe the events leading up to and what happened on June 12, 2012. He stated that he and Herbert Tiebout, 37, of Sunbury, and two unidentified African-American males set out to rob Scott Vonneida, of Millmont and Sampsell, of Mifflinburg. According to Richard, the goal of the robberies was "money and pot", so they were looking for homes of drug dealers to break into so they could steal marijuana and sell it.

wealth" and he replied "Yes,

Amanda Kratzer, 26, of Lewisburg, who was dating Richard at the time, told him about Scott Vonneida, the father of her exboyfriend and Randy Sampsell, the father of her best friend, said both were drug dealers. Richards later found out they were elderly men. Kratzer was charged with conspiracy to commit robbery and burglary but the charge of receiving stole property was dropped on Mon-Richard and Tiebout, who

knew each other from a jail in Greensburg, met in Forest Hill and began to plan the two robberies. Richard said he didn't expect the other two men who joined them on the night of June 12, 2012. He never learned their names but thought their nicknames might be "Rip" and "Cherokee."

The four men went to Vonneida's home first. Vonneida was allegedly beaten severely and at least three of the men stole 10 guns from his gun cabinet, one of the guns was later used to murder Sampsell

After leaving Vonneida's home, they went to the home of Michael Shetterly, 24, of Mifflinburg, where Richard and Krazter had been living. Richard took two guns inside the house along with some marijuana taken from Vonneida's home. Shetterly instructed Richard to place the guns in a back room and gave the marijuana to Kratzer to hold. Once outside the home of Sampsell, Richard stated that one

of the unidentified men had brought one of the guns along with him for what he believed was a scare tactic. Sampsell, who had been sleeping on his recliner chair, was startled by the man pointing a gun at his head. The unknown man told Sampsell not to move but he tried to sit up and the man shot Sampsell in the head. Richard then left the house and got back into the car. The others soon joined him.

About 10 days later, Sampsell's brother William Sampsell found his decomposing body still sitting in the recliner in his Mifflinburg home. As William Sampsell was sworn in to testify at the hearing for Richard and Tiebout, he began to cry. He recalled that Randy wasn't answering his phone and how on June 22, he went to check on him and found the scene of his brother's murder. A sliding glass door was smashed and William could hear

voices which turned out to be the TV, which was had been left on. Randy was sitting in his recliner and watching TV when he was shot in the head when the four men allegedly robbed his home. The curtains were still drawn and the lights were on. William had last spoken to Randy on June 8. Williams stated to Kratzer's attorney Stephen Becker, of Williamsport, that he did not know if his brother smoked pot and that he did not know Kratzer and was not aware that she had dated Randy's son six Richard continued to testify that he asked Shetterly for

'clothes and a ski mask" and that Shetterly asked why he was included. Richard stated that he wanted to keep him out of trouble. Richard also originally wanted to protect Kratzer from the fallout of the crimes since he believed she was pregnant with his child.. However, he changed his mind during the September 11 arraignment, when he realized she was not pregnant. While waiting for the arraignment to begin, Richard asked Kratzer if she was ever pregnant but she did not respond.

Shetterly's attorney Edward J. Rymsza, of Williamsport, asked Richard if he knew that by taking the plea deal he will not get life in prison. Richard stated that "Yes, but he also "wanted justice to be done. An innocent man was killed. I realize what I've done is wrong." Crossland would not comment on why the District Attorney's office offered Richard the deal.

Rymsza, Becker and Tiebout's attorney Steve Buttorff, of Mifflinburg, cross-examined Richards.

Charges against Tiebout were held for court. The charges

include second and third degree murder in Sampsell's death, along with robbery, burglary, assault and various other offenses totaling 13 in all. Shetterly's bail was set at \$25,000. He was charged with re-

ceiving stolen property, namely the two shotguns stolen from Kratzer's charges except one were bound for court. She re-

mains free after posting \$5,000 of \$50,000 bail. Arraignment is set for November 5.




