Pennsylvania Wildfire **Prevention Week**

As the days get longer and the weather changes, we are entering the spring wildfire season. This season usually starts in the spring after the snow melts and before the leaves come on the trees. This allows the sun to dry the forest floor. A wildfire is defined as an unwanted fire that burns uncultivated fields, grass, brush or forests. 9 out 10 wildfires are caused by humans and are preventable. The most common leading cause is debris burning. The average number of wildfires in Pennsylvania last spring was reported 605 fires burning approximately 2800 acres. Persons responsible for starting a wildfire can be held responsible for cost involved with suppression and could face criminal charges.

There are several things to consider when burning outdoors. Keep fires small. Clear leaves and debris at least 15 feet away from where you plan to burn. Always keep a water source nearby along with rakes and shovels. Do not to burn on dry or windy days. When possible, burn in a container. Check with your local municipality or fire department for any burning rules and regulations. Remember, only you can prevent wildfires!



Kyle Busch, the winner of Saturday's Nationwide race came from the rear of the field to finish second, after a pit road speed-

"We were just trying to stretch our luck on pit road," said Busch. "The car was tight at the end and I wasn't able to run the lower groove

Brad Keselowski finished third, followed by Kurt Busch, Clint Bowyer, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Ryan Newman, Brian Vickers, Paul Menard, and Jamie McMurray.

Joey Logano's temper got the best of him after an on track incident between him and Denny Hamlin. After the race he went over to where Hamlin was sitting in his parked car and tried to stick his head inside the car. He was restrained by crewmembers, but there were a few tense moments for both drivers.

"I don't mind someone just bumping me, but he practically took me out," said Logano. "We had a really fast car, and I thought we had a chance to win, until we got knocked in the rear.'

What a difference one week

Last week, I wrote about how Denny Hamlin said he was going to stand firm and fight NASCAR's decision to fine him for comments he made after the Phoenix race about the (lack of) passing ability from the Gen 6 cars.

BRISTOL, Tenn.—Kasey Kahne came on strong in the closing the line in his comments, and it was not a punishment he was going to accept, and an appeal was coming. He even said he didn't care if he ended up getting suspended for not paying the fine.

That was last week.

Friday at Bristol, he announced his appeal had been dropped.

The biggest thing is I think that we won in the judge of the people and their opinion I think some of the peers of mine -- at least the ones that have a backbone had the nerve to stick up

for what they know is right and wrong - agreed," said Hamlin "But what was the point in going another week or so. We've got bigger fish to fry than to argue over what I said just for \$25,000 and it's better just to move on and let NASCAR get its credibility back and they're going to do that and I'm going to move on and just focus on a championship.

"Ultimately, I had some conversations with Brian France (NAS-CAR CEO) and we had a lot of the same ideas. And I think that in hindsight I really believe they (NASCAR) overreacted and I believe that they think they overreacted once they thought about it a little bit, but now we're at a point that we're good with each other and we're just going to move on from here.

In essence, pressure from the top forced Hamlin to concede to NASCAR.

And NASCAR now has another "company man."

Despite transitioning to a new car, the early 2013 Cup Series standings bear a remarkable resemblance to the conclusion of 2012 when it was Jimmie Johnson chasing Brad Keselowski.

"I think Brad has shown that he and that team are going to be a familiar face up there (in the standings) week in and week out and year after year," said Johnson.

"We have been able to stay in and around the top spot for the 10 years, 11 years, which is staggering to me that we have had that type of staying power."

That's why it's no shock to Keselowski that Johnson is the driver he's chasing.

He also travels to England and the United States in an effort to promote Ethiopian coffee by eliminating the numerous middlemen.

The film also includes footage of the New York Board of Trade, a commodity trading floor in New York City, where the 'C" international benchmark price of coffee is set each business day based on supply and demand; and it explores the effects that these international prices have on Ethiopian coffee growers. Other footage was shot at the first Starbucks and the World Barista Championship at the 2005 Specialty Coffee Association of America conference in Seattle; and at a café and the Illy coffee company in Trieste, Italy. These scenes stand in stark contrast to the footage of the impoverished conditions faced by the Ethiopian coffee farmers and their families.

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced at the National Pheasant Fest and Quail Classic that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will conduct a four-week general sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), beginning May 20 and ending on June 14. CRP has a 27-year legacy of protecting the nation's natural resources through voluntary participation, while providing significant economic and environmental benefits to rural communities across the United States. Under Secretary Vilsack's leadership, USDA has enrolled 11.7 million acres in various CRP efforts.

Since the 1980s, the CRP program has established itself as a benchmark in voluntary conservation efforts, providing American producers with assets to address our most critical resource issues," said Vilsack. "Last year, during one of the worst droughts in generations, the CRP proved vital in protecting our most environmentally sensitive lands from erosion. Emergency having and grazing on CRP lands also supplied critical feed and forage for livestock producers due to the drought. And the program continues to bring substantial returns to rural areas, attracting recreation and tourism dollars into local economies while sustaining natural and wildlife habitat for future generations.

Additional sign-ups for continuous CRP programs-such as Highly Erodible Land Initiative and Initiative to Restore Grasslands, Wetlands and Wildlife-will be announced in spring 2013.

Currently, about 27 million acres are enrolled in CRP, which is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion and enhance wildlife habitat. Contracts on 3.3 million acres of CRP are set to expire on Sept. 30, 2013. Producers with expiring contracts or producers with environmentally sensitive land are encouraged to evaluate their options under CRP.

Producers that are accepted in the sign-up can receive costshare assistance to plant long-term, resource-conserving covers and receive an annual rental payment for the length of the contract (10-15 years). Producers also are encouraged to look into CRP's other enrollment opportunities offered on a continuous, non-competitive, sign-up basis and that often provide additional financial assistance. Continuous sign-up dates will be announced at a later date.

Over the past 27 years, farmers, ranchers, conservationists, hunters, fishermen and other outdoor enthusiasts have made CRP one of the largest and most important USDA efforts. CRP continues to make major contributions to national efforts to improve water and air quality, and to prevent soil erosion by protecting the most sensitive areas including those prone to flash flooding and runoff. CRP has also helped increase populations of pheasants, quail, ducks, and rare species, like the sage grouse, the lesser prairie chicken, and other grassland birds. Highlights of CRP include:

CRP has restored more than two million acres of wetlands and two million acres of riparian buffers;

· Each year, CRP keeps more than 600 million pounds of nitrogen and more than 100 million pounds of phosphorous from flowing into our nation's streams, rivers, and lakes.

• CRP provides \$1.8 billion annually to landowners-dollars that make their way into local economies, supporting small businesses and creating jobs; and

• CRP is the largest private lands carbon sequestration program in the country. By placing vulnerable cropland into conservation, CRP sequesters carbon in plants and soil, and reduces both fuel and fertilizer usage. In 2012, CRP resulted in carbon sequestration equal to taking about nine million cars off the road

The Obama Administration is leading a host of federal agencies in the America's Great Outdoors initiative to develop a 21st century conservation agenda and reconnect Americans to the outdoors. At the same time, USDA continues to enroll a record number of acres of private working lands in conservation programs, working with more than 500,000 farmers and ranchers to implement conservation practices that clean the air we breathe, filter the water we drink, and prevent soil erosion. Since 2009, USDA has enrolled more than 50 million acres into the Conservation Stewardship Program to incentivize the most productive, beneficial conservation practices. And USDA's work in the Chesapeake Bay watershed, the Mississippi River Basin, and Gulf of Mexico are among 19 initiatives applying the most effective conservation practices to increase agricultural and environmental returns. USDA science is also helping to focus work in areas to reduce problematic nutrients making it to rivers and streams by as much as 45 percent.

Emergency Heart Procedure at Evangelical Gives Area Man More Time for Family

Rick Reibsome of Milton has a history of heart attacks having experienced his first a few years ago. In July as he was getting ready for work, he recognized the symptoms - chest pain, shortness of breath, nausea - and knew he had to get to the hospital as soon as possible.

"I knew I needed care and I needed it right away," recalls Reibsome. "I immediately chose Evangelical Community Hospital."

After a brief and thorough assessment in the Emergency Department, he was wheeled the short distance to the Donehower-Eisenhauer Pavilion that houses two cardiac catheterization labs and hosts a team of cardiac care professionals prepared to handle both emergent and non-emergent heart issues.

Within an hour of his arrival at Evangelical, Reibsome was in the catheterization lab where doctors could see his left anterior descending (LAD) coronary artery was completely blocked, which left untreated could result in virtually all of the heart muscle dying. This more severe type of heart attack is called a STEMI, which stands for ST segment elevation myocardial infarction. Reibsome's STEMI was the first emergent procedure performed at Evangelical Community Hospital in the new facil-

Prior to the development of Evangelical's advanced cardiovascular program, Reibsome would have been transferred to a hospital with on-site cardiac surgery, taking away minutes of valuable treatment time and risking more damage to the heart muscle - and possibly his life.

felt like I was drowning as I went into heart failure in the cath lab. Within seconds the doctor had the stent in place and immediately the pain was gone," said Reibsome when he recalls the moment his life could have ended.

Reibsome's experience is an example of vision come to life for Evangelical Community Hospital. The same week of Reibsome's heart attack, the Hospital opened the Donehower-Eisenhauer Pavilion for patient care with an entire floor dedicated to cardiovascular procedures to meet the needs of patients with heart issues. The expertise of the cardiovascular team of professionals, combined with a facility that includes two catheterization labs equipped with the most advanced equipment and technology, allows the Hospital to be prepared to handle both preventative and emergency cardiac cases. In addition, with state-of-the-art imaging technology, physicians and caregivers can see what is happening with the heart and surrounding arteries

In 2010, Evangelical was selected to participate in a prominent national study to determine if heart catheterization procedures could be performed safely at a hospital without on-site cardiac surgery. In order to participate in the study, Evangelical needed to partner with a hospital that offered on-site cardiac surgery Evangelical chose Geisinger Medical Center, a Reuter's Top 100 Heart Hospital that offers open heart surgery. As a result Evangelical was given permission to begin offering vital catheterization services to its patients. Participation in the study was the only way for a hospital in Pennsylvania without on-site heart surgery to provide these vital catheterization services.

In 2012, the national study was completed and the positive patient outcomes proved that it was just as safe to perform interventional heart catheterization procedures at Evangelical and other hospitals without on-site cardiac surgery, as it is at hospitals with on-site cardiac surgery. Evangelical has continued its partnership with Geisinger for the purpose of developing and expanding its cardiac program. As a result, Evangelical has performed over 718 procedures both planned and emergent since


Following Reibsome's catheterization, he enrolled in Evangelical's Cardiac Rehabilitation program. Through careful monitoring by the staff, he was told that he needed more than just cardiac rehab. His cardiologist completed another non-emergent heart catheterization to get his heart to work even more efficiently, and when he returned to rehab, he made consistent progress.

'Through the work with rehab and evaluation of my lifestyle, I knew things had to change. I had to eat better, exercise more, and assess stress in my life. I started working part-time and now I feel well and can enjoy what I could have missed if Evangelical's professionals didn't step in during and after the attack,' said Reibsome. "The cardiac catheterization team worked quickly to open my artery which gave me a second chance and more time with my wife and children.

Evangelical Community Hospital is a non-profit organiza-tion that employs approximately 1,300 people and has more than 170 employed and non-employed physicians on staff. The Hospital is licensed to accommodate 127 overnight patients.


