





Bock dag (Baking Day) continued

Some of the favorite spices used in pies were nutmeg, cinnamon and allspice. For sweetening, everybody used soft white and brown sugar and dark "barrel" molasses. Soft sugar and molasses were used as an economic measure. Granulated sugar was offered in the table sugar bowl only when company came for dinner. It was "just for nice' rather than for taste.

As soon as the loaves of bread had been properly placed on the hearth, the pies were carried from the kitchen to the outdoors to be put into the oven. They were put onto pie boards which held five "pieces" at a time. There were two peels, one for bread and one for pies. Both were long handled. The pie peel, being smaller, more nearly fit the size of the pies which were put into the oven on it, one at a time. She made pie shells for the custards and deftly placed them in a level

spot on that egg-shaped hearth. She mixed the custard solution in a

pitcher and then poured it into a pint-sized tin cup. For the transfer of

the liquid to the pie shell, her husband had made her a long pole and sawed a slot into the one end into which she could slip the handle of the cup. It was no small trick to do that pouring so far inside the oven! If she had filled the custard shells before putting them into the oven, she would very likely have spilled some and this would have burned to a crisp with an awful smell that would have tainted the entire baking. After the oven was filled, the mother did a great deal of checking by opening the door. If any part of the "batch" would bake unevenly by getting dark on one side, she pushed it around with the pie peel so it

would bake more uniformly; and as some pieces were finished ahead of others, she removed them. As the pies were removed one by one, she placed them on the pie boards and they were carried into the cellar. There they were placed on boards that lay criss-crossed on top of a large old dough table. If the bread or pie supply got low towards the end of the week, the

housewife would bake short cakes and "flannel" (griddle) cakes or wheat cakes as they were later called. She also made noodles, potpie and filled noodles, and to the special delight of the children—fas-

If the bread got too hard, she put the large, tin washboiler on the kitchen stove with about half an inch of water in the bottom, into which she would set one of her trivets. On this she would place a 16-inch loaf edgewise and steam it soft again, as it leaned against the edge of the boiler to prevent toppling. This made the bread almost fresh. Food was plentiful and nutritious, but in farm life, there must

JACK ROUSH SLOWING DOWN

Jack Roush said in an interview last week with USA TO-DAY Sports, that he was "moving to the sidelines." There aren't so many firsts left for me, but I've not lost

my passion for competition or my desire to operate at the top of my game," Roush said, "I just look forward to enjoying vicariously the success of drivers winning their first race or championship, and the crew chiefs and engineers able to share in those firsts. It's less about me and more about being a parent or a grandparent to them. Roush is the founder and CEO of Roush Fenway Racing

and has a net worth of \$200 million. He earned his money through his company "Roush Enterprises" which covers racing, freelance engineering and the selling of high performance automobiles and car parts and as co-owner of Roush Fenway Racing. Roush was born in Covington, Kentucky and earned

Berea College, and a masters in Scientific Mathematics from Eastern Michigan University. Roush worked at Ford after graduating in 1966, and left in 1970 to pursue his own company. He worked for a year

a Mathematics degree with a bachelors in physics from

at Chrysler before leaving to open his own engineering business, that catered to NHRA, IHRA, and AHRA drag Throughout much of his career Roush offered for sale the parts that he developed for his own team. In 1982, he began

to develop road racing vehicles for Ford. This led to a very successful run in the Trans-Am series and IMSA Camel GT in the 80s and early 90s. In 1988, Roush moved south and founded a NASCAR

Sprint Cup team now called Roush Fenway Racing with driver Mark Martin. On April 20, 2002, Roush almost lost his life when his private plane, went down in a lake in Troy, Alabama.

Roush was underwater and unconscious, suffering from a head concussion, when a retired Marine in a nearby boat, rescued him. On July 27, 2010, Roush crash-landed in his private jet

during an approach to the Oshkosh, Wisconsin Airport in the late afternoon. He walked out of the plane and was taken to a nearby hospital. He suffered a fractured back broken jaw, and lost his left eye as a result.

After a quarter-century of owning stock-car teams that have 314 wins in NASCAR and two championships in its premier series, Roush still works seven days a week

but doesn't set his alarm for dawn anymore. He no longer spends 90 minutes before every race tinkering with each of his cars' carburetors. Until a couple years ago, Roush could always be

spotted with his trademark hat, inspecting all the spark plugs that were to be used in his team's race

"I've gone from wanting to be the mechanic that I hoped everyone else would be to now I'm the pointand-grunt guy," Roush continued. "Hopefully, I'll become less viable before I'm gone. Rett Syndrome: Have you heard of it?



So what is it? Rett syndrome is a neurological disorder that mostly occurs in females. It is a debilitating disorder, which most often strikes previously healthy little girls. It begins to drag their development backwards with lifelong impairments, such as, speech loss, seizures, scoliosis, irregular breathing patterns, and the ability to walk. The girls affected with RS require maximum assistance with even the most basic daily activities. The hallmark sign of Rett syndrome is a near constant repetitive hand move-

ments while awake. Whom does it affect? One in 10,000 girls is born worldwide. This may not seem like that many, but that is more than 6,500 girls born with Rett every year. That is over 17 girls, every single day. From last year's count, there were 4,704 "known" cases in the United States and 235 "known" cases in Pennsylvania. It affects ALL racial and ethnic groups. Rett Syndrome is not hereditary. The cause is a spontaneous genetic mutation, it can occur in any family at any time. Rett almost exclusively affects girls. Boys with Rett Syndrome usually do not survive past a year. Fifty percent of girls will never walk and ninety-nine percent will never speak. However...there is hope

Rett Syndrome was once seen as a degenerative disease, with a gradual. irreversible loss of brain cells. In 1999, Huda Zoghbi discovered mutations in a gene called MECP2 that causes Rett. In 2001, the first genetic animal model was made. In 2007, Rett Syndrome is REVERSED in models in the late stage of the disease, by Professor Adrian Bird. Rett Syndrome is the FIRST children's brain disorder to be reversed in the lab and has the POTENTIAL to be the world's first curable brain disorder.

IRSF (International Rett Syndrome Foundation) is the leading research organization in the world. Its mission is to fund research for treatments and a cure for Rett syndrome while enhancing the overall quality of life for those living with the disease by providing information, programs, and

In 2012, IRSF approved the funding for two Phase 2 clinical trials for Rett Syndrome. IRSF is funding the Phase 2 clinical trial study of Insulin Growth Factor 1 (IGF-1) as a novel treatment of Rett syndrome. The Phase 1 study had been completed and shown that IGF-1 is safe and tolerable. The Phase 2 clinical trial of IGF-1 at Children's Hospital Boston has begun this spring. IRSF is funding the first clinical study in adolescent and adults with Rett Syndrome. This is a Phase 2 clinical trial study of NNZ-2566 (an oral formulation of a modified tripeptide of IGF-1). Now that the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved the Investigational New Drug (IND) application, Neuren Pharmaceuticals and Baylor College of medicine will proceed with the Phase 2 clinical trial to assess the safety and efficacy of NNZ-2566 treatment.

However, IRSF still needs your help! Clinical trials and research costs a lot of money! The family and friends of local Rett Angels, Monica Bartlett, New Berlin, Abbey Kieffer, Coal Township, and Kailey Weaver, Middleburg, are holding the 10th Annual Rett Syndrome Road Tour fundraiser to raise money for a cure!


