Union-Snyder County Bar Association Announces Contest

The Union-Snyder County Bar Association has announced details for its 2022 Law Day Essay and Art Contest. Students in grades 7 through 12 are encouraged to enter submissions focused on this year's theme: "Toward A More Perfect Union - The Constitution in Times of Change."

The winners and runners-up will receive cash prizes and will be honored during Law Day courtroom ceremonies at 4 pm in Lewisburg on May 5th, and in Middleburg on May 11th.

Students are expected to address this year's theme by answering questions such as "What does the Constitution mean to you?"; "Why is the Constitution and its Amendments important today?"; and "What amendments or changes do you think should be made to the Constitution?"

The deadline for submissions is 4:00 pm on April 11, 2022. Essay entries must be submitted via email to unionsnydercountybar@gmail.com. Art entries can be submitted to Magisterial District Judge Jeff Rowe's office at the Union County Courthouse or to District Attorney Mike Picuch's office at the Snyder County Courthouse. Cover sheets are required for all entries in order to facilitate blind judging.

Winners and runners-up will be chosen for Snyder County and Union County in each category (essay/art) for each age group. Cash prizes of \$200.00 will go to the First Place winner and \$100.00 to the Second Place winners.

Submissions for the essay contest may include a traditional essay, creative writing or poetry. Students in grades 7 and 8 cannot exceed 500 words, whereas students in grades 9 through 12 cannot exceed 1,000 words.

Submissions for the art contest can include posters, drawings, paintings, collages or photography and must be original (not computer generated). Original art may be any medium: pencil, ink, watercolor, acrylic, oil, charcoal, crayon, chalk, collage or photography. Art submissions may be no larger than 4 feet by 4 feet, and cannot weigh more than 20 pounds.

Feral Cat Issue In New Berlin

The New Berlin Borough Council has recently formed a committee to discuss the feral cat issue in the town. The committee consisting of council members Mike Palermo, Barry Kuhns, and past President Julianne Finkbinder was formed to investigate the efforts to trap, neuter, and return feral cats. One of the main concerns is the open container feeding of stray cats.

"New Berlin Borough Council is not and has never been against the Trap-Neuter-Return program initiated and run by some citizens of the Borough. The Council has been thankful for the work done by these citizens to reduce the feral cat population within the Borough," explained Wendy Cole, legal spokesperson for the New Berlin Council. "The issue presented since the citizens initiated the program is whether these cats, once neutered and released, should continue to be fed with open-food containers which can draw these cats and other animals to a specific site to be fed. Currently, feeding animals with open containers is not permitted per the Borough's animal ordinance."

Cole is referencing Section 3 Paragraph 5 of the ordinance that reads, "Every keeper of any animal shall maintain all feed to be stored and kept in a pest-proof and fly-tight building, box, container, or receptacle."

Alley Cats Allies wrote to the New Berlin Council requesting that the group work to strengthen the Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program rather than implement punitive measures against residents for feeding the community cats.

Sherri Benjo of Pumpkin Paws Feline Rescue is also concerned about the stray cat issue in New Berlin. The purpose of her group is to celebrate feline friends and spread awareness when it comes to local alley cats.

Sherri Benjo and Sharnel Pilko have partnered together to address the feral cat situation in New Berlin. They have been trained in the Trap-Neuter-Return Program. Approximately 80-100 feral cats, primarily in the New Berlin area, have been trapped and neutered with most of them being rehomed by the pair.

"The feral cat situation in New Berlin is pretty much under control but maintenance is the issue," explains Pilko.

Some Borough council members seem to condone starving the feral cats by not feeding them. However, Pilko notes, "If you stop feeding the feral cats, then they will search for food in garbage bins, gardens, bird feeders, and by hunting small wildlife."

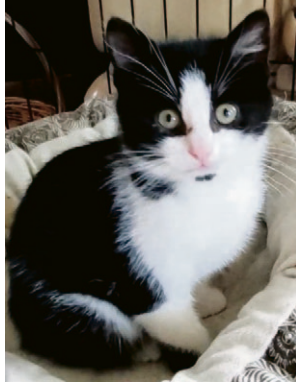
Alley Cat Allies stated in their letter, "While the cats will not disappear under a feeding ban, they will suffer. Title 18 of the Pennsylvania Statutes, Section 5532 Neglect of Animals specifies that 'A person commits an offense if the person fails to provide for the basic needs of each animal to which the person has a duty of care, whether belonging to himself or his otherwise, including...Necessary sustenance and potable water.' For the caregivers who have fed the community cats, stopping such feeding activities could subject them to misdemeanor charges."

Residents wind up in a Catch 22- where they break the law if they feed cats or break the law if they stop feeding cats.

Another thought is to destroy the feral cats through trap and euthanasia. Pilko vehemently opposes that idea. "That will not eliminate the problem. The problem will return with gusto each time cats are dropped off and abandoned. The cycle of unneutered, unsprayed, and non-vaccinated cat colonies will return." Then she adds, "That is why it is so important to do the Trap-Neuter-Return Program with maintenance."

According to Lauren Mack of the Cherished Cats Rescue Alliance, the TNR program breaks the reproductive cycle with the combination of sterilization and adoption can gradually lead to a reduced cat population. Nuisance behaviors such as yowling and fighting are reduced and mating is eliminated. TNR is "cost effective and it stops breeding, greatly reduces nuisance behaviors, and improves the health of the cats."

In April 2021, Bonnie Hamilton, the prior mayor of

New Berlin, revised a section of the animal ordinance. It reads: "Any feral or 'Community Cats' become the responsibility of the person or persons feeding them. That person or persons must have them vaccinated for rabies and have them spayed or neutered. Trap, Neuter and Release Programs typically mark these cats with a clipped ear." There is a differing interpretation of the phrase the cat becomes the responsibility of the feeder.

Many New Berlin residents feel that the program is an asset not only to the cats, but also to the community. The program continues to help stabilize the cat population. Many cats are rehomed and the neutered cats will not reproduce. New cats entering the community should lessen.

All of the cats that have been rehomed as part of the Trap-Neuter-Return Program in New Berlin have also received their rabies shots and been vaccinated. "We are working on the few females and males that have not been neutered yet," says Benjo.

"Two years ago, New Berlin was rampant with unsprayed, unneutered, and unvaccinated feral cats," reports Pilko. "We have been doing this on our own. It is successful. Without the program we would be back to Square One."

"We want all of the council members to truly appreciate our hard work and efforts," added Benjo. "We want them to understand how the Trap-Neuter-Release Program with maintenance of any colony is key to a successful program."

Although some town budgets provide funding for the Trap-Neuter-Return Program, the Borough of New Berlin does not contribute any funding toward the effort.

Cherished Cats Rescue Alliance provides partial funding for spaying, neutering, and vaccines. Founded in 2017, Cherished Cats the group has found homes for upwards of 1,000 cats, primarily through their foster program. According to Sarah Kline, president of Cherished Cats, "We do not have a shelter facility. We've funded the spay/neuter and vaccination of 200-250 cats annually."

Benjo and Pilko provide much of the uncovered funds themselves, donating out-of-pocket to make up the difference for any vet visits. There are additional costs associated with transporting animals, gas, and post-surgical care. They are appreciative of all donations.

Fundraising efforts are essential. On January 29, 2022, Catterina's Quest, a free cat adoption event, was held at Poe's New & Used Book Store in New Berlin. The successful event included a silent auction and bake sale with many local businesses and individuals contributing items. Several cats found forever homes, money was raised, and people left with a better awareness of what the programs do and how they touch lives.

"The adoption event showcased the importance of the efforts of the Pumpkin Paws and The New Berlin Feral Cat Program to rehome animals so they are not released," says Pilko.

"It was fantastic to see our entire town come together to support a wonderful cause," adds Benjo.

Avian Influenza In Commercial Poultry

Poultry producers and hobbyists should be aware that Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) has been detected in commercial poultry flocks, small/backyard hobby flocks, and in migratory birds in the United States. The USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) has reported 247 H5N1 positive wild birds in nine states on the East coast. In addition, six states have confirmed H5N1 positive commercial and backyard flocks. The most recent HPAI outbreak was confirmed on an egg laying facility in Delaware on February 23, 2022. Flock size has varied between a few birds to several houses on a premises. It is critical that all poultry owners, regardless of flock size, take appropriate biosecurity precautions at this time.

Now is the time to revisit your biosecurity plan. If you do not have a biosecurity plan, it's not too late to start. Preventing the introduction and spread of this devastating disease is essential. While you are working on your biosecurity plan, here are a few key biosecurity practices to implement immediately:

Keep your poultry away from other birds
Immediately clean up feed spills to discourage wild birds on your premises

Limit visitors to only those essential for business. Make sure all visitors follow your biosecurity plan
Wear dedicated footwear and clothing while servicing your poultry to minimize spreading the virus. Sanitize boots, hands, and tools before entering your flock premises

Dream It Be It Conference For High School Women



The "Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls" program for high school girls will be held this year on March 15 at Susquehanna University, right on the heels of International Women's Day (March 8) and Women's History Month.

For the past six years, the local chapter of Soroptimist International (SI) has been sponsoring the "Dream It Be It" conference, which came from SI's vision that women and girls should have the resources and opportunities to reach their full potential and live their dreams.

Participants for the conference are identified through guidance counselors at both public and private high schools in the region.

Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls is a program designed to give high school girls - including all who identify as female - the tools they need to achieve their educational and career goals. The conference aims to reach high-school-aged girls who lack the support or resources to achieve their goals, whether it be through poverty, unstable home lives, teen dating violence, or even teen motherhood. The day's curriculum is designed to help girls identify their career dreams, match their personal values to potential careers, overcome obstacles such as negative self-talk, rebound from setbacks and manage stress.

"This program offers an amazing opportunity to connect young women just starting out with those that have some career experience with the overall goal of helping others see their potential, build confidence, and make their dreams come true, despite any obstacle," said Angela Hummel, owner at Angela Hummel Consulting LLC and co-chair for the event.

One overriding goal of the program is to empower teen girls to pursue and realize their dreams by helping them to break cycles of poverty, domestic violence and abuse.

One unique aspect of the event is the Girls' Advisory Board, which is comprised of past attendees who not only serve on the conference planning committee, but also help to identify barriers to success that young women face today. Locally, they have identified sexual harassment at school and work; negative peer pressure; low self-esteem and significant stress as roadblocks for area young women.

Meryl Czeponis, of Mount Carmel, serves on that board. A former attendee, she is now a freshman at Susquehanna University studying Public Policy with a focus on public administration and nonprofit management.

According to Czeponis, "my time with DIBI introduced me to the idea that being a strong woman did not only mean being a CEO. It encouraged me to find my strengths in everyday tasks, my personal life, and my academic life."

In 2012, Soroptimist International surveyed over 400 girls aged 11-20 from around the world. The results, which helped serve as inspiration for this program, showed that, although girls' access to education and training has improved, many barriers to entry and economic independence still exist, even in the United States. While they are told they can achieve on equal footing as men, girls and women are then confronted with the realities of gender bias and discrimination, wage inequity and stagnation (coupled with increasing tuition and cost of living), harassment in the workplace, and a lack of employer support for family/medical leave.

"Women are uniquely positioned to rise up into leadership roles and provide the new type of leadership required to move forward in a changed workplace. It's never too early to start investing in our future women leaders," said Hummel.

Soroptimist International was founded in 1921 in Oakland, CA. The name means "best for women," and our Motto is "Investing in Dreams." Today, there are around 160,000 members and supporters in 21 countries in the Americas. Soroptimist International of the Americas is one of four federations that make up Soroptimist International, which has clubs in 121 countries throughout the world.

Other local initiatives of SI include is the Live Your Dream Award, which provides grants to women who are pursuing higher education or career development programs while serving as their household's primary financial support, as well as working to raise awareness about and combat domestic violence and human trafficking. They also do Community Outreach efforts to support local needy families.
