Bock dag (Baking Day) continued

After the bread had its final raising, the bread baskets were carried out to the oven and placed on shelves on both sides of the oven front extension to which the pies would also be brought

Then the housewife, with the bread peel laid on the edge of the lower right hand shelf on the left side, unfolded the cloth covering the dough in the basket, dumped the basket upside down on the peel, took the basket off, picked off the cloth, dropped it in the basket and set it aside. Then she took the peel by its long handle, extended it into the oven to the exact place she wanted the bread to bake and suddenly jerked the peel out from under it and the dough flopped right down on the brick hearth. This she would follow with all the other loaves.

If it had happened in cleaning the oven she had missed a few tiny pieces of charcoal, the dough would drop right down on them, and they would be baked into the bottom of the loaf. No harm was done. They were all sterilized with fire and were easily picked out later with the point of a knife.

After removing the baked loaves, she brushed the bottom in order to remove any possible ashes, and rubbed the top with the fatty side of a bacon skin in order to keep the crust softer. The bread and pies were then carried into the cellar. Pie fillings varied with the season of the year. In early spring

there was rhubarb, lemon, green and ripe currents and gooseberries; later sweet and sour cherries, raspberries, blackberries huckleberries, elderberries; also green tomato, apple and sour pears. To ground cherry pies, she added a bit of lemon, and flavored the grated-apple custards with rum. Winter was the time for schnitz (dried apple) and mince pies Some were baked with a top crust, others with strips of swee

dough. The sweet strips were cut with a corrugated bone doughwheel and tasted as delicious as they looked. She also baked egg, lemon and cocoanut custards. Before she put the top crus on the pie, she always wetted the outside edge of the lower crus by dipping her finger into a cup of water, so that the top would adhere well to the lower on account of leaking when baking. After the edges were well pressed down with the thumb, she

would set the pie in her left palm and with a table knife in her right hand, she would shear the extended edge off even with the outer edge of the plate, while revolving it with the fingers of her

Then with strokes of the palm of her right hand, she raised the outer edge vertical all around. And with the thumb and first finger of her right hand, she would pinch a rope edge all around while revolving it in the palm of her left. (To be continued nex

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla.—Jimmie Johnson won Saturday night's Sprint Cup race in a green-white-checkered finish. He became the first driver to sweep both NASCAR events at Daytona in one season, since Bobby Allison in 1982.

On the way to his fourth win of the season, Johnson led 94 laps of the 161-lap race.

"I had a great horse," said Johnson. "It was an amazing car all night. Been in some very close battles at the end and have surged by to win. But from a laps led standpoint, this has to be the most dominant performance we've had on a plate track.'

As Johnson neared the finish line, two multi-car accidents happened behind him. The second, third and fourth-place cars were

"I didn't get as good a restart as I wanted," said second-place finisher, Tony Stewart. "But I think it kind of worked to our favor. It got Clint (Bowyer) a little bit ahead of me and it got Kevin (Harvick) a little bit ahead of Jimmie (Johnson). That let Jimmie and me both tuck down to those two guys and get going. Kurt Busch gave us a really good push from behind there and that got us back to getting Jimmie the shove he needed. It got us far enough ahead to where we could worry about racing him.

The second-place finish was Stewart's fourth top-five finish this season, and vaulted him six spots to 10th in the championship

"It was definitely a good points night," Stewart said. "If you can't win, you always want to run second. With these things being as crazy as they are, you're pretty happy if you can end up with a top-two, because normally if you leave here in the top-two, you've got a straight race car too.'

Kevin Harvick was third, but it was a bittersweet finish for him. "Yeah, we didn't win," he said. "That was our expectation coming here. I'm kind of disappointed just for the fact that I felt like we were in the right position.'

Are you on a tight budget?

Is it a struggle to find money for a NASCAR race weekend? If the answer is yes, you are in trouble.

Ticket prices at 13 different tracks are going up.

Daytona Speedway announced earlier in the year they would be removing some spectator seats. Last week in a teleconference call to Wall Street bond analysts, John Saunders, Pres. of International Speedway Corporation, which owns Daytona Speedway and 12 other tracks said, "Too many empty seats are keeping the lid on ticket prices. We're looking at removing more seats at all

Saunders admission of empty seats was an acknowledgement that "the NASCAR Experience" is losing steam.

From my own experience of attending races, I can tell there are more empty seats now than four or five years ago. Taking out or covering up some seats might make it appear to the television

audience that the track is full of fans, but would it help those fans

'Removing seats also would enhance the race experience for the remaining spectators and help encourage patrons to return,"

Exactly what does that mean? Will there be additional entertainment of some type? Does it mean each individual seat will be widened and padded? If there are fewer fans, will there be shorter bathroom lines? What about concession prices? Fewer people means less beer and hot dogs will be sold, so those prices

If you can buy into Saunders' statement, stay away from men in white coats from the "funny farm."

A race fan would have to suffer from delusions if he/she believe ticket prices, and all associated costs of attending races aren't go-

It isn't just track prices, but transportation and lodging as well. With the cost of a race weekend escalating, it doesn't bode well Tracks really shouldn't consider raising ticket prices, because

they receive most of their revenue from television. The TV contract is set up where tracks get 65 per cent; teams-25 per cent, and Although ISC is controlled by the France family, it is separate

from NASCAR. About 35 per cent of the stock in ISC is owned by the France family and the remainder is owned by sharehold-ISC is working to replace the current Daytona complex with a

development called "Daytona Live!" which will include a movie theater, restaurants, and hotel. The Daytona renovation also includes reducing the track's seat-

ing capacity from 146,000, down to 100,000. In addition to Daytona, ISC owns: Auto Club Speedway, Chicagoland, Darlington, Homestead-Miami, Kansas, Martinsville Michigan, Phoenix, Richmond, Talladega, Watkins Glen, and



Synod Celebrates 25th Anniversary; Bishop Re-Elected

The 26th Annual Assembly of the Upper Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) was held at Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove, PA, on June 14 and 15, 2013. The theme this year was "Woven Together in Christ" and celebrated the synod's 25th anniversary. The assembly was a time to celebrate the work of the synod since its birth in 1988.

Bishop Robert L. Driesen led the proceedings and was re-elected as bishop of the synod for a six-year term beginning September 1, 2013. Driesen was elected with 178 votes to 88 votes for Rev. Daniel May, pastor of Holy Spirit Lutheran Church, Turbotville, on the fifth ballot. During his annual report, Driesen gave a look back at the last 25 years and how life has changed in that time period.

Approximately 350 lay persons and clergy who are members of congregations of the synod attended plenary sessions, workshops, and worship during the two-day event. During both days, workshops were held over the lunch period and were themed around topics to help "equip the saints." The workshops provided practical information that attendees could use in their own congregations. Dr. Rick Carlson, the Glatfelter Professor of Biblical Studies at the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg was the Bible Study leader. The assembly also heard greetings from President L. Jay Lemons from Susquehanna

The ELCA Churchwide Representative was the Rev. Linda Norman. Treasurer of the ELCA. Norman shared greetings from the churchwide office and showed a video featuring greetings from Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson. In addition, Pastor Stephen Herr of Gettysburg brought greetings from the ELCA Church Council.

In assembly business, voting members adopted a memorial in support for Peacemaking with Justice in Israel & Palestine. The assembly adopted a 2014 Budget of just under \$1.1 million, as well as Salary, Housing, and Health Benefit Guidelines for ordained ministers and As-

Elected as Vice President for a four-year term was Karla Bohmbach of St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Shamokin Dam. Carol A. Waltz of Messiah Lutheran Church, South Williamsport, was elected as synod secretary. Elected to Synod Council for three-year terms were the following: Edward Coup of Christ, Milton; Samuel Leister of St. Stephens, Licking Creek; The Rev. Amanda Range of the Salem Parish, Selinsgrove; The Rev. Jeffrey Bohan of St. Luke, Bloomsburg; Christy Zeigler of St. Luke, Sunbury; Sandra Olson of Siloa, Morris Run; and Courtney Schrey of Botschaft, Grubbs, Mt. Pleasant Mills (Young Adult Member). The assembly elected John Fulkroad (St. Stephen's, Licking Creek), The Rev. Lisa Schuster (Trinity, McClure), George Groff (Trinity, Sunbury), and The Rev. James Rill (United, Sunbury) to the Committee on Discipline. The Rev. Paul Kampa (St. John, Belleville), The Rev. Matthew Schuster (Messiah, Troxelville), and The Rev. Theodore Cockley (St. Luke, Williamsport), Frank Bardó (St. John, Jersey Shore), and Jeffrey Mitchell (St. Paul Erdley's, Middleburg) were elected to the Consultation Committee. Elected to a four-year term on the Board of Directors of Susquehanna University was The Rev. Dr. Lois Martin, St. Matthew, Shamokin Dam,

On Friday morning, Bishop Driesen installed the Camp Mount Luther 2013 Summer Ministry Team for their work on behalf of the synod. That morning's Eucharist was a celebration of the synod's 25th anniversary and the 50th anniversary of Camp Mount Luther, which also takes place this year. Chad Hershberger, Executive Director of the camp, gave an update later Friday afternoon about the golden anniversary and some of the special events happening to commemorate that milestone. Bishop Emeritus A. Donald Main was the preacher for the Friday Morning Eucharist. Two in-gathering offerings were received for Camp Mount Luther and

Zion (Arbogasts) Lutheran Church, Mount Pleasant Mills. The collection for the camp was for their Birthday Candle Project, raising funds to retire the debt of their Evergreen Center Dining and Activities Building. The assembly gave just over \$2,000 to that cause. The assembly gave \$1,600 to Zion (Arbogasts) to help with recovery after a fire at their church. In addition, almost \$6,200 was raised, mostly in quarters, to send to ELCA World Hunger as part of their "good gifts" program. This program provides livestock and tools to help families escape for the good the cycle of poverty and hunger.

Congregational Milestones celebrated during the assembly included Christ's United Lutheran Church, Millmont (50th anniversary), and Christ Lutheran Church, Milton (125th anniversary). Three individuals were recognized for their own milestones in 1988, including one who was baptized, one who was confirmed, and one pastor who was ordained that year. Six pastors were installed as conference deans and those pastors celebrating significant ordination anniversaries were recognized.

gional Bishop Christian Schmidt from the Ansbach-Würzburg Kirchenkreis in Germany spoke to the assembly and introduced a delegation from Bavaria. 


ANNUAL DUCK DERBY HELD AT PENNS CREEK ADULT RE-
