Theft/Crime by Deception 1:30 p.m. May 12, on Johnson Mill Road, in Buffalo Township. PSP received a report of a fraud. The investigation is ongoing.

The actor accepted \$350 payment to purchase and set up a propane heater for the victim in October 2025. As of this date the victim has not received the item. The investigation remains ongoing.

Crash 7:38 a.m. May 15, on I-80 E. at mile marker 207.0, in White Deer Township. A 2025 Volvo was following a 2026 Ram 2500 in the right lane of I-80. The Volvo made contact with the trailing unit of the Ram 2500. The Ram 2500 proceeded to lose control, striking the guide rail off the right shoulder. The trailing unit continued to jackknife, striking the left side of the Ram 2500. The trailing unit of the Ram 2500 separated the vehicle and continued down I-80 east until its cargo, a third vehicle, came off the trailing unit and overturned into the right lane. No injuries were reported.

Crash 11:25 a.m. May 15, on Westbranch Highway at its intersection with Hafer Road, in Kelly Township. A 2015 Jeep Cherokee was stopped on Hafer Road waiting for the traffic signal to turn green. A 2024 Subaru Crosstrek was traveling south on Westbranch Highway in the right lane at approximately 45 mph. The driver of the Jeep Cherokee related that the light turned green, indicating that they could turn off Hafer Road to travel north on Westbranch Highway. The driver of the Subaru Crosstrek related that the traffic signal on Westbranch Highway never turned to a steady red signal, indicating for them to stop. The Subaru Crosstrek struck the Jeep Cherokee. After impact, both vehicles came to rest. No injuries were reported. There were no witnesses on scene and conflicting interviews with the drivers the at fault driver was unable to be identified.

Two Tracks did Race on Friday, Port Resets its Weikart Memorial Weekend

Clinton County got their racing show in on Friday night, with one heck of a limited late model feature. It had three drivers racing for the win. Andrew Yoder of Middleburg grabbed the early lead in the 25-lap feature and looked like he was heading for a feature win until caution came out to slow his pace down. On the restart, both Cody Lear of Manchester MD and Matt Cochran of Williamsport raced past Yoder and were racing for the feature win. Cochran was right with Lear over the next couple of laps racing side by side, and then another caution would bunch the field, with Yoder back in the mix for the final few laps of the feature. Cody Lear won by 0.029 of a second over Matt Cochran who led a few laps towards the end. Matt had to settle for the close second place run. Yoder was third with a tire going down and Maddox Smith of North Bend, Pa making it a four-car battle over the last few laps. Cody was very happy with the win and said this "I like racing at Clinton County because you get a different track each time we race here. The track slowed down as the night went on and that was to my advantage. We changed everything on the car from warm-ups to the heat race, then the feature, and we did the right thing. The track crew did a great job with the track from the last time we raced here, and we could race all over the track" Stated Cody. With the 2024 late model champion Matt Cochran a very close second and last year's champ Andrew Yoder third. Making his first start of his career was Keith Walls of St. Thomas Pa getting to the track as warm-ups started. He missed warm-ups and only had a heat race to make adjustments for the feature where he drove to a fifth-place finish. "It was our first time ever here and I really like this place. We plan on being back for the rest of the shows this year" Noted Keith.

In other action, Cory Long of Selinsgrove to his third feature win of the season. Marc Bitler was giving chase but had nothing for the fast-running Cory Long. Last week's feature winner AY Schilling was third with Larry Knight and Kyler Stahl in the top five. Mac Wert of Milroy Pa won the 270-micro feature but then things went south for the driver of the #44. Something broke on the front end of the car and he flipped just after the checker flag fell. The car had to be towed to the winner circle with the driver getting check out in the ambulance before his victory speech. Cory Stabley, Mason McAndrew, Jilliam Maurer and Logan Hammaker were fifth, driving from the 16th starting spot in the feature. With the run changes to the four-cylinder class to the SCDRA package a nice field of 26 drivers were on hand for the 18-lap feature, with Jimmy Moyer scored the feature win. It was the second week for the rule changes. Last week 18-drivers were at hand and that grew for the second race. Moyer was followed by Allan Robison, Zak Kline, Matt Weaver and Larry Beachel, last years track champion.

This week three divisions will be the same with the Pro-Stocks Four Cylinder and 270-Micros sprint they will be joined by the IMCA 305-sprints and the Jr -Sprints making it a five-division show. The following week on Friday June 5th the start of the Appalachian Mountain super late model Speedweek starts at Clinton County for a \$5,000 to win show, with Pro-stocks and Four Cylinders also racing then on Friday June 12, the first of three appearances for the 410 sprint will be on hand. Then Pro-stocks, 270 micros and four-cylinders also in action. The Limited late models, which put on a great show, next scheduled event will not happen until Friday July 24th.

Friday Big Diamond got their show in the books which had the East Coast 360-wingless sprint on hand for their third race of the season. Christian Bruno scored the feature win becoming the third different winner in three races this year. Briggs Danner won at Bridgeport, while Kenny Miller III won at Bedford. Bruno was followed by Steve Dreivicki, Kyle Spence, female driver Olivia Thayer and Stan Ploski II in fifth. In Small Block Modified racing, 18-year-old driver Jax Yohn of Boyertown scored the feature win in only his second start with the division. Yohn scored the feature win over Mike Lisowski, Duane Howard, Loudon Reimert, and Tim Fitzpatrick. The 602-crate sportsman feature went to Dakota Kohler. Big Diamond will be back in action this Friday May 29th with Small Block Modifieds 602 Carte Sportsman, Roadrunners, and Four-Cylinders.

Williams Grove, which was not scheduled to race last Friday, will be back in action with the Joey Allen Tribute race. Joey won the 1987 Grove national open. The race will pay the winner \$8,000 to win, with the PASS 305 sprint also in action. On Saturday, Selinsgrove speedway will be back in action after taking last weekend off. The track will run Super late models Limited late models, PASS 305-sprint and the East Coast 360 wingless sprints for a four-division show starting at 7p.m. After that, they come back with a Thursday night show on June 4th titled the "Kreamer Cup Part One" featuring the 410-sprints and Street stocks. They will also race on Friday with PASS 305- sprints, Limited late models and East Coast 360-wingless sprints. Port Royal had their big weekend which was to have three nights of High-Limit sprint car racing for the Weikart Memorial. That will now be made-up on Saturday and Sunday July 25th and 26th. The Sunday night show will be the Weikart make-up with the winner getting \$100,000 to win. That is if they get the Saturday show first, or the purse will be adjusted for the Sunday event. Next race for Port Royal will be on Saturday June 6th for the Appalachian Speedweek race for the super late models, along with the 410-sprints.

We already mentioned two of the seven Speedweek events for the super late models, the rest of the schedule look like this Sunday June 7th they will race at Potomac Speedway. Then after two nights off they race Wednesday night at Kutztown speedway June 10th, then at Marion Center on Thursday, Bedford speedway on Friday and it all ends at Lincoln speedway on Saturday June 13th. Gregg Satterlee has won the points title the last two seasons and has the most wins in the series with ten. Last year rain knocked out three of the races, with only two drivers winning the other five events. Gregg Satterlee scored wins at Port Royal, Bridgeport and Selinsgrove with Mason Zeigler winning at Path Valley and Bedford. New to this year's schedule is Potomac and Marion Center. Not on the schedule from last year is Bridgeport and Selinsgrove.

The High Limit sprint car series did not get to race this past weekend as Port Royal made the good call to postpone the whole weekend of racing, which we already told you when that will be made-up. Aaron Reutzel, who is leading the points in the series, made a trip to Knoxville speedway on Saturday night to race against the WOO series. He came away with the win followed by Donny Schatz, Rico Abreu, another High Limit driver, David Gravel and JJ Hinkle. Reutzel is on a hot streak with the High Limit series with five feature wins and the last three wins in a row. He leads the points 906 over last year's champ Rico Abreu at 873. Then it's Tanner Thorson 863, Gio Scelzi 846 and Kerry Madsen 775. Reutzel won the last race the series had at Grandview speedway on May 19th with Rico Abreu Chase Dietz, Freddie Rahmer and Brady Bacon in the top five. The next races for the series come on Friday, May 29th at Lawrenceburg in Indiana speedway May 30th at Butler speedway in Michigan and June 1 at Daventport speedway in Iowa.

Lydia Delsite found the medal stand by taking sixth in the triple jump. The Lewisburg girls took fifth place in the 2A team race. D4 had a strong showing with Hughesville and Wellsboro finishing second and third behind D7 Shenango for the team title.

The Mifflinburg quartet of Makayla Fogle, Cadence Yoder, Jazzy Doebler and Makenna Fogle took sixth place in the 4x100, 1 1/2 seconds behind first place Hughesville.

Selinsgrove's Bella Furgison won a silver medal in the shot put. Furgison followed that up by taking her second consecutive state bronze medal in the javelin. The first place winner threw the javelin just 3'1" further than Furgison.

On the boys side, the Lewisburg 4x800 relay unit took third place after finishing seventh last year. Hugh Ikeda Shields, Grayson Barner, Jack Johnson and Justin Nolt secured the bronze medal.

Midd-West's Wyatt Nelson won a fourth place medal in the 800-meter run. Grove's Matthew Stebila finished sixth in the 3A triple-jump with a personal best 46' 5 3/4" jump. Stebila finished seventh in last year's state finals.

Wildcat Chace Aikey was another repeat medalist after taking eighth last year in the discus. Aikey set a school record in the discus with a 152' 2" throw to finish in fifth place. Chase will be continuing his track career at Philadelphia's Holy Family University.

Mifflinburg's successes on the diamonds continued on in D4 games. The 21-0 softball team qualified for states after beating Hughesville 9-6. They played Warrior Run this past Wednesday for the 3A district title. Anna Pachucki and Taylor Stewart both homered that resulted in a three run sixth inning. The homers gave them both 100 career hits. How cool and clutch is that? Brooke Gessner chipped in going 3 for 4 with a triple and 3 runs and 2 RBIs.

The 1 seeded Jersey Shore softball team ended an up and down year for Midd-West with a 19-3 four-inning win in the D4, 4A semi-finals. The Bulldogs Lexi Frey single-handedly tamed the Mustangs by knocking in seven runs on four hits and tossing a four-hitter inside the circle.

I had greater expectations for this Midd-West team at the beginning of the year but lack of consistent play hampered them all year.

The Mifflinburg baseball nine also qualified for the 3A state tournament by defeating two-time defending district champ Mount Carmel 5-1 in the semi-finals. Miff starting pitcher Kaiden Kmett kept the Tornadoes to no more than a passing sprinkle by mixing up his curveball with off-speed stuff and a sneaky fastball to keep them honest.

'The Sprinkles' only had three hits against Kmett who went 6 1/3 innings before reaching his mandated pitch limit. Cole Reibsome came in to get the final two outs after making 'Ozzie-like' plays at shortstop.

This set up the D4 3A title game against Warrior Run. Both teams qualified for states with their semi-final wins. We should have figured the district final score would be 3-1. Both teams split during the regular season by identical scores.

Mifflinburg cousins Larry Murray and Cole Reibsome led the Wildcats to the district title. Murray hit a solo one out homer in the third to start the three-run inning. Mason Schneck added an RBI single and that was all the starting and finishing pitcher Reibsome needed.

It's worth noting that Larry and Cole's grandfather Scott Smith was a pretty decent player back in the day. After 'Rock' graduated from Mansfield University in 1976 he was the school's career leader in doubles, home runs and RBIs. Smith was inducted into the Mansfield Hall of Fame in 2001. Murray and

Reibsome don't get their speed from Smith, though!

Both Selinsgrove LAX teams will be playing for a district title. The Grove girls beat Mifflinburg 13-3. The first sixteen minutes were scoreless until Selinsgrove scored the first five goals. Abby Raymond and Lexi Stoneburg both had hat tricks for the Seals. Grove will be looking for their first district title against Danville.

The Grove boys also ended Mifflinburg's season with a 19-3 win. Twin brothers Quinton and Graham Davis had a huge part in the romp. They both scored four goals each and Ben Bucher had three goals. They faced Bellefonte this week for their third straight district title.

The NBA and NHL playoffs have lived up to the hype thus far and the excitement should continue to grow as we enter the finals next week.

I guaranteed before the NBA season started that a team that passed the '40 before 20' rule would win the title. You win forty games before losing your twentieth is the rule. Only four teams since 1979 have won an NBA championship not being in the 40 before 20 club.

This year's members were the OKC Thunder, San Antonio Spurs and Detroit Pistons. I'm pretty confident that the winner of the Thunder/Spurs western conference finals will beat the New York Knicks in the finals.

Cleveland blew a twenty-two point lead with 7:49 to play in the game. They also had four timeouts left and they would have lost two of them after the game clock went below three minutes. Atkinson never called a timeout to stop the Knicks momentum and give his players a breather.

New York went on a 44 to 11 run in a 115-104 OT win. The Cavs had a 99.9% win probability with just under eight minutes to play. There's an old saying when you go home after a loss like that. "You empty your pockets by putting your change and wallet on your dresser and you better not have any timeouts still in your pocket."

This was just the latest chapter in the city of Cleveland's failures as a sports town. The Browns have the worst record in the NFL for this century. They have won just 34% of their games in twenty-five years, far behind the Raiders and Jaguars at 39%.

Cleveland fans are among the most passionate fans in the NFL despite their team being moved to Baltimore in the middle of the night in 1995. The Dog Pound continues to believe in their beloved Browns. It's like burning your tongue on a hot piece of pizza and then taking another bite immediately after.

Cleveland has been cursed more than celebrated over the years. LeBron James returned to his home state and delivered the city's first major championship in fifty-two years in 2016.

The Cleveland Indians lost the 1997 World Series in extra innings of Game 7 to the Florida Marlins. The star power on that team was second to none. That roster included Jim Thome, Omar Vizquel, Matt Williams, David Justice, Manny Ramirez, Sandy Alomar Jr. and Orel Hershiser... most of them in their prime.

Cleveland doesn't have a hockey team but if they did, I would watch them in the playoffs. I don't care who

wins the Stanley Cup now that my Pens are out of it. That doesn't mean I won't watch all the games where I can't name two players on any one of the four teams left.

There is not a more exciting playoff than the quest for a Stanley Cup. The Sabre's/Canadians series in the previous round was edge of your seat viewing. The fact it went to overtime in Game 7 was incredible.

The MLB season has been good as well but there remains an elephant in the room. The current collective bargaining agreement expires 12/01/2026. Negotiations have just started this week and it could be a prolonged battle between the owners and the player association.

The biggest issue is the owners want a salary cap like every other professional sports league has and the players want to be able to make as much money as possible. It amazes me what players are making in the salary-capped NBA and NFL.

The other issue is the revenue disparity between big market and small market teams. This mostly revolves around local television deals which fluctuate greatly from a New York team to Pittsburgh.

The player's association would also like to see a minimum salary floor where owners must spend a certain amount on players each year and not profit by pocketing profits through revenue sharing.

I find it interesting that the small market San Diego Padres were just sold for \$3.9B. They have a really good team and are clearly prospering with a small market team. The Padres are only a game and a half behind the big spending LA Dodgers. San Diego along with Buffalo are the only cities in America that had at least two professional sports teams and no titles.

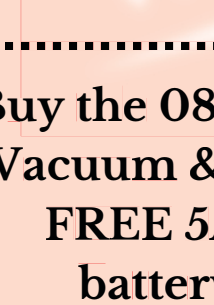

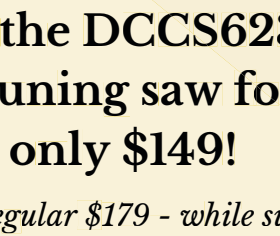

Gifts in Action: Photojournalism Students Benefit from New Cameras

In the past few years Photojournalism has become a very popular class at the Lewisburg Area High School. This class is responsible for the production of the school yearbook which requires hundreds of photos to document the many academic, arts and athletic activities that students participate in throughout the school year. With many students in the course, the demand for the school's four DSLR cameras is very high leading many students to have to wait to use a camera and possibly miss an opportunity to photograph an event or activity.

To alleviate this problem teacher Emaleigh Greb applied to The Green Dragon Foundation for funding to obtain new mirrorless cameras for her class. Financial support was provided from The Miles McKennan Foreman Memorial Endowment at The Green Dragon Foundation. Miles, a student who passed away in 2014, had a strong passion and talent for photography. This funding gave students access to five new state-of-the-art mirrorless cameras in addition to the older cameras.

Ms. Greb thanked the Foundation saying, "Coming into this year, we only had four cameras and 30 students to split them between. With the GDF gift, students were able to use a camera and take pictures whenever they wanted. There was no more swapping cameras outside of class or being unable to take pictures of events because we did not have enough cameras. I was also able to give multiple lessons on the types of cameras, allowing further insight into the differences between a DSLR and a mirrorless. Increased access has allowed students to flourish and become confident photographers."

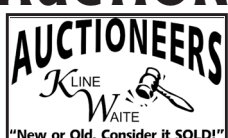

Approximately 145 people gathered in celebration of the sport of bowling and to honor the new inductees into the Central PA USBC Hall of Fame on Saturday, May 2, 2026 at the Silver Moon Banquet Hall. Michelle Houtz, Raymond "Skip" Bryner, Jr. and Kevin Woodruff acted as MCs for the evening.

Congratulations to Class of 2026 Central PA USBC Hall of Fame inductees- Karen Nogle, and posthumously to the families of Curtis Englehart and Wayne Roush. Each inductee or their family received a citation from Rep. David Rowe (R-85), a certificate from Central PA USBC, and a clock/plaque from Central PA USBC. Rep. Michael Bender presented the citation on behalf of Rep. Rowe and Rep. Borowitz.

2026 Hall of Fame inductee, Karen Nogle, bowled in the junior leagues at Super Bowl 522. She bowled with fellow inductee Wayne Roush in YABA and tournaments. After graduation, she moved to the adult leagues, bowling Monday and Wednesday nights at Mifflinburg.

After marriage, Karen and Mark bowled on Sunday nights with his parents, Ginny and Ray. They bowled at Super Bowl 522 in leagues, making lifelong friends in Snyder County. Karen also bowled in leagues at Faxton Lanes, Williamsport and Midway Lanes in Danville.

Traveling to State and National tournaments are fun adventures for Karen. She has been to 16 National tournaments from El Paso to Niagara Falls. It has never been just about the prize money; it's more about the experiences, the places to explore, and the memories made with friends and family. "She's having a party!"

In 2022, Karen and her team set a new Best Bowl house record for Women's High Team Game and High Team Series- all bowled on lanes 1 & 2. Karen rolled a 714 that night. Her highest average was 190 in the Wednesday Nite Owl League at John Wilcox Lanes, where she also recorded her personal high game of 274. She has had three 700 series and has been an Association member for more than 40 years.

Her Pap, Dayton Walls Sr., was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1986. Since then, several family members have followed: Aunt Marty Girvin (1998), her mom Jean Walls (2014), Aunt Kay Kiester (2022), and Aunt Dot Leitzel (2024) as well as "Mom" Zimmerman and "Aunt" Peach Gehr. Karen is honored to join them with her induction into the CPBA Bowling Hall of Fame.

Congratulations, Karen Nogle on becoming the newest member of the Central PA USBC Hall of Fame! Bowling continues to bring entertainment and fun to her life.

2026 Hall of Fame inductee Curtis Englehart grew up in a bowling family. He began bowling at the young age of 9 and continued throughout his life. Following graduation, Curt worked at East End Auto Sales in Mifflinburg, working on cars and doing auto body. Later, he worked at B-Z Motors and he also began working part-time at Mifflinburg Lanes. He moved to full-time at the Mifflinburg Lanes until the lanes

closed in 2008.

During that his time at the lanes, he made a lot of friends, and enjoyed helping to coach those who wanted to enjoy the sport and improve their bowling skills. He had the opportunity to prepare and oil the lanes for PBA Regional events and met some of the greatest bowlers in history.

After the closure of Mifflinburg Lanes, Curt worked for his friend, Andy Neuer, at Imperial Lanes. He did for a few years before deciding to turn his hobby and lifelong knowledge of auto body into a full-time business. It was Curt's attention to detail that made him extremely talented at his profession.

While bowling in the West End Merchants League, his team won three consecutive league championships in 1990, 1991, and 1992. Curt was part of the championship team in 1989 with Boop's Livestock in the Buffalo Valley League. Curt participated in multiple PA State Bowling Tournaments as well as local tournaments including the 700 Club Sweepers. He had a career high game of 299, numerous high 700 series and held over a 200 average.

All of Curt's kids grew up learning the sport and went on to become very successful bowlers themselves. Although Curt passed away in 2013, his legacy and the family tradition continue full circle as two of his grandsons now bowl at Best Bowl on Saturday mornings.

Curtis Englehart was inducted posthumously into the Central PA-USBC Hall of Fame. His award was accepted by his family.

2026 Hall of Fame inductee, Wayne Roush, began his bowling career at the age of 12 and quickly fell in love with the sport. Over the next 43 years, he spent countless nights at the lanes, bowling multiple times each week alongside many great friends and family members. Wayne joined the Thursday Night Men's Early League, where he would remain a dedicated member for the next 38 years.

Wayne received many awards throughout his bowling career. His highest average was 223, in the Monday Night Men's Early League in 2008. Over the years, he bowled an incredible 18 perfect games and recorded a high series of 826.

Wayne was named Bowler of the Year five times. The first four honors came in four consecutive seasons from 2001-2005. His final Bowler of the Year honor came during the 2024-25 season, which was sadly cut six weeks short. He also held the league's high average four times from 2001-2005.

Wayne was part of the four Thursday Night Men's Early League championship teams, winning titles in the 1995-96, 1997-98, 2006-07, and 2024-25 seasons. His team won the 2024-25 league championship shortly after his passing.

One of Wayne's proudest moments was having the High Game Award named after his father. He went on to win that award at least eight times. He also loved bowling in the yearly Pro-Am events with the kids. Wayne's love for bowling shined especially bright when it came to younger bowlers. He was always eager to help coach youth bowlers while proudly watching his own children compete.

Wayne passed away unexpectedly on March 6, 2025. There is no doubt that he would have been deeply honored to accept this recognition. Congratulations to Wayne "Bubba" Roush on his induction into the Central PA-USBC Bowling Association Hall of Fame.

By this time, we only had about a month of school left. I was looking forward to summer vacation and a break from the new boy/girl dynamics I had been experiencing at school. Just as things at school were returning to normal, yesterday, when I returned from recess there was an envelope on my desk and it was pink. I stuck it in my math book because I was taking it home to do homework for tomorrow. As soon as I got home, I opened it and yes, it was an invitation to C's birthday party on Friday night, next week. I waited til mom got home and showed her the invite, she looked at me and said, "You're definitely going." I immediately felt my stress level rise as I had never been to a girl's birthday party before. My sister's, but that's not the same.

I filled out the RSVP, I didn't even know what the heck that was, but I gave it to C the next day at school. She seemed very pleased to know that I was going to be at her party. I didn't tell any of the guys that I was invited to her birthday party because I was pretty sure they weren't invited. Island rats were not in the social structure of town girls, but apparently, there was room for one exception.

Over the weekend, my sisters found out I was invited to a girl's birthday party and they were sure I needed their help: had I ever kissed a girl—what kind of question was that(!?!), there would be kissing games; Did I know how to dance? Now my sister Linda was an excellent dancer but dancing with my sister was awkward. She did teach me some basics so I didn't look like a complete jerk! They did make me listen to music so I at least knew who some of the current singers were, like Elvis, Buddy Holly, Little Richard, Everly Brothers, Paul Anka, Jerry Lee Lewis, along with several others. My sisters meant well, they told me about things young girls care about. In my sister Linda's words, "No one is going to ask you if the May suckers are running."

Friday, C asked me if I knew where she lived. I assured her I did and I would be there. "Seven to ten, right?" She nodded her head. Friday night, 7:00 p.m., I'm at the front door at C's house, a gift for her and a small gift for C's mom; my mom called it a hostess gift. I knocked on the door and it opened immediately. C stood there and she looked beautiful, quite honestly, and at that moment I didn't care if the May suckers were running or not!

As I walked in, I greeted C with a "Happy Birthday" as her mom thanked me for her gift and showed me to the door to their basement rec room. When I walked in, I was the only island rat. At first it was a little strange because the girls hung together and the boys stood around talking baseball. Drivers, Put the Phone Away or Pay a Fine

Effective this June, drivers convicted under Paul Miller's Law will pay a fine.

Harrisburg, PA – The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) and Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) are reminding Pennsylvanians to put down the phone while driving or they will be forced to pay a fine starting June 5, 2026. In 2024, Governor Josh Shapiro signed Paul Miller's Law, which prohibits the use of hand-held devices while driving, even while stopped temporarily due to traffic, a red light, or other delays. Drivers can still use their phones to alert authorities in the event of an emergency and use hands-free technology to make phone calls, use a GPS, and listen to music.

Beginning June 5, 2026, drivers convicted of using a hand-held device while driving will pay a \$50 fine, plus court costs and other fees. Pennsylvania also enforces a texting-while-driving ban that prohibits drivers from using mobile devices to send, read, or write text-based communications while their vehicle is in motion. Additionally, depending on the circumstances, drivers who violate Paul Miller's Law or the texting-while-driving ban may also be convicted of Homicide by Vehicle or Aggravated Assault by Vehicle, and given increased sentences.

"Your choices behind the wheel can change lives forever," said PennDOT Secretary Mike Carroll. "Distracted driving is not only dangerous, but also illegal. This National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, we are asking all drivers to commit to putting the phone away while driving."

"As the warning period for Paul Miller's Law concludes, troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers using handheld devices behind the wheel," said Pennsylvania State Police Acting Commissioner Lieutenant Colonel George L. Bivens. "Distracted driving is dangerous and significantly increases the risk of crashes. Just a moment of inattention can lead to life-altering consequences. The PSP urges all motorists to put their phones down, stay focused, and help keep Pennsylvania's roadways safe."

The law is named for Paul Miller Jr., who was tragically killed in a crash with a tractor trailer in 2010 in Monroe County as the result of a distracted driver who reached for their phone while driving. Since Paul's death, Eileen Miller - Paul's mother - has become a national advocate for stronger laws to curb distracted driving. "Nearly 15 years ago, two Dunmore state troopers knocked on my door to tell me that my son was killed," said Miller. "My son did everything right - he was killed by someone else's unsafe choices behind the wheel. This law is for every family in Pennsylvania that doesn't have to experience two state troopers knocking on their door to tell them that their loved one was killed by distracted driving."

According to PennDOT data, in 2024 there were 9,950 crashes involving a distracted driver, resulting in more than 6,000 injuries and 49 fatalities. Distracted driving crash data is believed to be underreported due to many drivers' reluctance to admit to being distracted at the time of a crash.

If you are the driver, follow these steps for a safe drive:

- If you are expecting a text message or need to send one that can't wait, pull over and park your car in a safe location before using your device.
- Ask a passenger to be your "designated texter." Allow them to access your phone to respond to calls or messages.
- Do not engage in social media scrolling or messaging while driving.
- Cell phone use is habit-forming. Struggling to not text and drive? Activate your phone's "Do Not Disturb" feature, silence notifications, or put your phone in a location that is inaccessible until you arrive at your destination.
- Cell phone use is not the only distraction while driving. Anything that takes your attention away from driving,

your eyes off the road, or your hands off the wheel is a distraction. Driver behavior is the leading factor in 83% of the approximately 1,100 fatal crashes that occur annually on Pennsylvania roadways. These behaviors include driving distracted, impaired, aggressive, and others.
