



The Mini-Conference will be held on Sept. 11 and 12 from 8:30 am - 3:30 pm at the Rusty Rail Brewing Company, located at 5 North 8th St.,

Mifflinburg. The conference is open to service providers and community members involved in prison reentry in Union County. There is no cost to attend. Breakfast and Lunch are provided both There will be planned activities and workshops

led by our local agencies and partners, along with a sort of "speed networking" event where people will get a chance to meet others and learn about their work in the county. There will be resource tables set up as well.

Thursday, September 11 features keynote speaker, Yusuf Dahl, who will present, "A Fair Future for All: Housing Discrimination in Reentry" in which he will discuss his journey from incarceration to real estate developer and fair-housing advocate. During the Fair Housing Training participants will learn about Fair Housing laws, how sustainable, fair housing is foundational to successful reentry. The day also includes an interactive reentry simulation to understand the experience of and barriers to successful reentry. President Judge Lori Hackenberg will present welcome remarks. On Friday, September 12, the keynote speaker is

Rick Parson who present, "My Role in Evidence-Based Practices: Why Am I Here?" who will explain how attendees can incorporate evidencebased practices to improve successful outcomes in reentrys. There will also be workshops on Treatment, Mental Health, Housing, Community & Family Engagement in Reentry & Recovery, Victim Services, and more. A speed networking session will help to enhance collaboration. Opening remarks will be given by Judge Jeffrey Rowe and Judge Michael Piecuch.

"Union County is becoming known around the state for our strong collaborations and successful outcomes in our Criminal Justice System. Through strong collaboration and programs like treatment court, mental health court, the Law Enforcement Treatment Initiative, justice bridge housing, families in recovery, victim services, and more, we are moving the needle, helping families stay together, saving taxpayer money, and improving public safety. On Friday August 15th, Andrew Yoder of Middleburg scored the feature win and the Limited Late Model point's title, getting his Clinton County speedway title by 40 points over Ken Duke. Matt Tebbs, who won the feature moved nine points races. The 305-sprints will have a nonhad some good runs late in the season with two secto keep him racing next season. "I was not sure if I wanted to continue racing with the bad luck. We were having but that all went away with the great last part of the season". Noted Fourney. Hoffman broke open a close battle for the championship late in the season beating AY Schilling by 110-points for the title, Fourney was third with Cory Long and Larry knight in the top five. Coach Matt Wenrich knows he has a young talented team with many second year players starting. Hopefully Wenrich believes the old Paterno saying "the best thing about freshmen is they become soph-

'A bigger and stronger Rocco Amato returns as starting QB with more confidence" per Wenrich. Returning wideout Wyatt Teats and TE Jake Beddall will be Rocco's main targets. Confidence and staying healthy will be the main factors in how many games the Seals will win.

Mifflinburg has lofty goals as 20 of 22 starters return this year. The Wildcats easily handled a good Loyalsock team 47-13 in the season opener.

Coach Cody Botts told me "it all starts up front on both offense and defense. We need to control both lines of scrimmage." Mifflinburg rushed for 234 yards on 42 carries and held the Lancers to just 21 yards on 25 carries. That's dominance up front.

Pre-season All-Star QB Chad Martin has a bevy of receivers to spread the field with. Larry Murray and Cheeky Griffith look to improve on their combined 105 catches for over 1300 yards and 18 TD's from last year. Adding Cole Reibsome at TE who had two TD catches last week will have Martin setting school

The defense has stars at every level. Chace Aikey at D-end and Landon Tucker at nose tackle up front. Tucker is an all-state wrestler and that wrestling background lends itself to great defensive line play. Think Aaron Donald, Steve Sefter and Alex Karrass. Freshman Brady Threet slides in at linebacker with Murray and Griffith on the back end.

All this money guarantees they stay an Independent for years to come. When Notre Dame football needs resources, it doesn't go wanting anymore. The only hindrance I see down the road as an In-

dependent is future scheduling. Michigan and USC have already ended their series with ND and the SEC is going to go with nine league games instead of the current eight. That means one less non-league game and ND plays two SEC teams this year.

Teams need seven home games every year for the income. That is why you see Penn State paying to play Nova, FIU and Nevada millions for a home game and PSU not reciprocating. As mentioned before, the answer is money.


