In the days when folks made their own fabric, if they wanted a color, it was necessary to dye the fabric. So here are a few of the ways to do it.

Take half pound of black oak bark to every pound of woollen goods, boil 1 hour in water and then take your bark out and put /4 pound of alum for every pound of woolen goods in the bark water, stir it well then put your goods in and work it, always keep it near boiling for ½ hour or more till it suits. This is the easiest receipt I know for a bright yellow it requires Solution of tin or BiChromate of Pottash Cream of Tartar &c I expect the above will answer

Receipt for Black

Take ½ pound Kroom to 6 pounds woollen goods boil it together very good then take it out. Take clear water, boil 3 pounds blue wood in a course bag very good then take the bag out and put the woolen goods in and boil it, take your goods in water before you dry it then it is done.

And to color your Easter eggs:

Remove and save the brown papery skins from onions. Layer these in a kettle with raw eggs. Cover with water and simmer for about ½ hour. Let stand until somewhat cool. Remove eggs and rub with lard. They will be of a dark mahogany color if enough onion skins are used, less will produce a rust color. (Used with permission, from the Boyertown Area Cookbook.)

Dairy News By: Dawn Franck

Here is it...March. I wonder if it will come in like a lion and go out like a lamb. With the current weather forecast, it sure looks like it's going to be rainy and blustery for the first part of the month. And even though spring doesn't seem like it can get here quick enough, the SUN Area Dairy Promotion is already planning our pageant in May. We are putting together a wonderful weekend of events in conjunction with the Middlecreek Valley Antique Association's Spring Show May 17th through the 19th. Additionally, we are recruiting young ladies between the ages of 8 and 23 to serve in the promotion as Dairy Misses, Maids, Ambassadors and a newly crowned Princess. As I was researching what I would write about this month, I found a lot of information that

wasn't correct on the internet. Now, I know there is a very popular commercial on the airwaves about how they can't put something on the internet that isn't true but I have checked it out on SNOPES and yes indeed, there are stories out there that just don't have any truth in them at all. When I was younger, my mom always told me, "Drink your milk, it's good for you". I always

did, for a variety of reasons, but drinking that glass of milk was so much more appealing than the implied option of what would happen if I didn't. But in this confusing world of what should we to put in our bodies and how much of a good thing is too much, I thought I could shed some light on when children should drink milk and how much they should have. First, let's start with whole milk versus low-fat milk. Toddlers who are over 1 year old up to

2 years of age should be drinking whole milk. A toddler needs the fat for their brain and nerve development. After age 2, you can switch them to fat-free or 1 percent milk. While children are still under 12 months old, they should remain on breast milk or formula. Next, how much is enough? Choosemyplate.gov recommends a child that is 2-3 years old

should have 2 cups of milk. 4 to 8 years old should drink 2 ½ servings of milk and everyone

else should have 3 servings of milk every day. What counts as a cup? 8 ounces of low-fat milk or vogurt. 1 ½ ounces of hard cheeses like cheddar, parmesan and swiss, 2 ounces of American cheese or 1 cup of pudding made from fat free or low-fat milk, frozen yogurt or 1 ½ cups of ice So, can you have too much of a good thing? Of course you can. Dairy products are part of a nutritious diet and it's important to make smart choices from every food group. The best way to give your body the balanced nutrition it needs is by eating a variety of nutrient-packed foods

every day such as fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and fat-free or low-fat milk products, lean meats, poultry, fish, beans, eggs, and nuts. My mother is a wonderful cook and has scores of cookbooks that she has acquired throughout her life. Among her most treasured and used are those from the Pennsylvania State Grange. This

is a recipe that has graced our table many times and is absolutely delicious!

Poppy Seed Chicken

- 2 pounds chicken breast 1 ½ cups Ritz cracker crumbs
- 8 ounces SOUR CREAM
- 1 TBSP. poppy seed 1 10 ³/₄ ounce can cream of chicken soup
- ½ stick melted BUTTER

Cook and chunk chicken breasts. Place in a flat 9 x 13 dish. Mix SOUR CREAM and soup to-

gether in a bowl. Pour over chicken. Prepare topping by combining cracker crumbs, poppy seeds and melted butter in a bowl. Sprinkle topping over chicken mixture. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes at 350°F until hot and bubbly. With Easter just around the corner, this is a recipe that my Great Grandmother handed down

to my mother. With 10 children of various ages, money was scarce and Grammy Confer would make candies for her brood from this recipe during the holidays. **Easter Eggs (or Buckeyes)**

Cream together: 8 ounces of CREAM CHEESE and ½ pound of BUTTER. Union County Farm Bureau Celebrates Rural Roads Safety Week

With spring's arrival, warmer temperatures and longer days, farmers are heading to the fields to plant their crop across Pennsylvania. A a result, residents in rural areas will be seeing more tractors and large planting equipment on local roads. The Union county Farm Bureau is encouraging all motorists to be aware of farm equipment as they travel in rural area this spring, and all year long during Rural Roads Safety Week, April 15-21.

"As we travel back roads in spring, we often marvel at nature's beauty and we sometimes forget about potential hazards," said LeVeer Hook, Union county Farm Bureau President. "While a common sight on the roads in springtime, farm tractors, truck, wagons and large pieces of equipment car present a threat to the distracted driver. "When driving on rural roads, motorists

must remain alert for large and often slow-moving equipment." Hook added that a few simple steps can help drivers stay safe when operating vehicles on rural roads:

Don't rush - If you drive on rural roads, chances are good that you will encounter farm equipment at some point on your route. Avoid rushing and allow plenty of time to reach your destination safely. This is especially important while traveling during the months between April and November.

Pass with care - If you feel you must pass the farmer, do so with caution. Be observant of your view of other vehicles that may try to pass. Never pass on curves or hills block your view of oncoming vehicles, you are in a "No Passing Zone" or within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevated structure or tunnel. Also be careful that the farmer is not pulling to the right to make a wide left turn.

Be Patient - farmers are not operating equipment on rural roads to slow you down intentionally - instead farmers are working to provide a safe food supply. Whenever possible, farmers will pull off the road at the first safe opportunity so you can pass.

SMV = Brake Immediately - The orange triangular Slow Moving Vehicle (SMV) emblem warns drivers of a slow vehicle speed. All farm equipment traveling at speeds of 25 miles per hour or less are required to be marked with a SMV emblem. Once you see it, slow down immediately

Remain Visible - Don't assume that the farmer knows that you are driving near his vehicle. While most farmers will check behind them whenever possible, they are concentrating on keeping their equipment on the road and avoiding oncoming traffic. Before you pass, use your car's horn to let the driver know where you are. Farmers may not be able to hear you over their equipment noise.

#Yield to Wide Vehicles - Sometimes farm equipment is wider than travel lanes. If you approach wide equipment and cannot pass safely, stop. Then pull off the road, turn around or back away safely so the equipment can pass you. Watch for pilot or escort cars which help to indicate an oversized vehicle - if you see one, pull off so the vehicle can pass you.

"Many of us feel frustration when we have to slow down behind a tractor, but consider that it only takes six minutes - the equivalent of waiting at two red lights = to slow down to 20 miles per hour when following a tractor for two miles. Use caution and drive safely on rural roads," said President Hook.



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medical assistant by trade, and I am one of the 57%. That is, I am one of ONLY 57% of Oral Cancer Survivors ALIVE five years after receiving the diagnosis. Oral cancer is cancer of the mouth or throat and it has one of the LOWEST survival rates among all cancers. It is also one of the most debilitating. For the 57% who do survive, we are often left disfigured. We have difficulty eating, some have permanent feeding tubes. It is hard for us to speak clearly and there are those who will never speak again. Tracheostomies, airways cut directly into the neck, may be necessary for us to breathe. Oral cancer is

deadly and crippling. And sadly, the number of cases continues

My name is Pamela. I am a 35-year-old wife, mother of 2, a

"You can get cancer of the TONGUE???" This is usually the initial response when I tell people what type of cancer I had. Yes, you can get cancer of the tongue and for the record, you can get cancer in ANY part of your body. I was 28 when I received my 1st official cancer diagnosis. There is a pop song from a few years ago where the guy sings "I've been spending way too long checking my tongue in the mirror and bending over backwards just to try to see it clearer." That was me. I had intermittent pain in my tongue for months, maybe a year before I discovered the lesion. In fact, I looked at my tongue in the mirror so frequently that on the night I found the lesion, I told myself that if nothing was there this time, I was never looking again. And there it was. After months of looking and having other people look to no avail, there was finally something to see. It was a small white area with a dark "hole" in the center. It hadn't been there when I had last checked about 2-3 weeks before. I immediately scheduled an appointment with an oral surgeon and 2 weeks to the day after I found that spot, my husband and I received the news that I had cancer of the tongue. I had the left lengthwise quarter of my tongue removed surgically and went for radiation treatments five days a week for almost two months. Ten months after I finished radiation, I woke up with a swollen neck and was again told that I had cancer. The tongue cancer had spread to my neck. I underwent another surgery to remove the cancer. After being told that I had a "50/50 chance of keeping it at bay for a year" I sought a 2nd opinion and began chemotherapy and a drug called Erbitux for head and neck cancer. The 2nd surgery combined with the effects of the radiation left me with a leaking hole from my mouth to my neck and a portion of my jawbone was dead. After chemo, I needed hyperbaric oxygen treatments to try and heal the jawbone but it did not help. I then underwent a 14 hour surgery where they removed the dead jawbone and replaced it with part of my fibia, one of the two bones in the lower leg. They took tissue along with the bone from my leg and

closed the hole. That was three and a half years ago. I am not without long-term effects. I am told I speak clearly, though at times it is more of a challenge to do so. Once I was asked if I was from England because the person who asked said I sound like I have an English accent. When I yell or try to talk loudly, I spit. The look on my childrens' faces when I am yelling and accidently spit on them is priceless! I am sensitive to spicy and acidic foods. I have difficulty swallowing and cannot open my mouth very far. Waiters have taken my food because I have it pulled apart and they think something is wrong with it. I have a scar the length of my calf and nerve damage to my leg, my neck, and face. My smile is a little crooked and I have a large, visible scar on my neck. Some people ask about "that nasty scar." I do not mind when they do because it is an opportunity to educate and bring awareness to oral cancer. These are battle scars. They have made me who I am today.

So how did I get lucky enough to be one of the 57%? I don't know. I don't care. I do know I could not have done it without the exceptional support of my family.

Five years and three months after my most recent diagnosis, I am NED. My surgeon recently dared to utter the word "CURED," I prefer NED. NED is "No Evidence of Disease," a term that is the "all clear" for every one of the more than 13 million cancer survivors in the US who long to hear it. Unfortunately, people with my type of cancer very often never get to hear those words or do not get to bask in their glory for long. Just slightly under 50% or very close to HALF of all those diagnosed with Oral Cancer do NOT make it to their 5 year cancerversary. They pass away at some point before they make it to the five year mark after the diagnosis. Sure, we all associate cancer with death, but the truth is that survival rates for most cancers have increased greatly over the years...MOST cancers. The survival rate for Oral Cancer is one of the LOWEST survival rates and has not changed in over 30 years. Why? What it is about oral cancer that makes it so deadly?

Oral Cancer is deadly because it is often not discovered until it is in its later stages. The reason for this is that it may go unnoticed until it becomes larger and starts to spread. I was lucky because my tongue hurt, at times a lot, so I kept checking my tongue in the mirror. Make sure that your dentist does an oral cancer screening at your regular check up. ASK them if they do this. If they tell you it is not necessary, especially if you are a nonsmoker and/or a younger person, tell them you would like them to do it anyway or find a dentist who will do it. It only takes about two minutes to have an oral cancer screening. Your dentist will look at and feel your mouth and neck. Historically, oral cancer was caused by smoking, chewing tobacco, and drinking alcohol. That is changing. The rate of diagnosis continues to RISE despite the use of tobacco declining. HPV, the virus that causes cervical cancer, is on course to cause more cases of oral cancer than cervical cancer by 2020. This is affecting young people and nonsmokers. If your dentist tells you that you do not need to worry because you are young or a nonsmoker, tell them otherwise. If you have children, ask your physician about HPV vaccinations for them. This vaccine is recommended for both females and males, starting at about age 12.

Signs of oral cancer include red and/or white patches in the soft tissues of the mouth, a sore that lasts for more than two weeks, persistent hoarseness, pain or numbness in the oral region (remember, oral cancer can be and is often painless in the early stages which is why regular oral screening is so important), a lump or thickening in the mouth or neck, difficulty moving the tongue or jaw, difficulty swallowing, a sensation that something is stuck in your throat, or pain in only one ear. If you are experiencing any of these symptoms, you need to have it checked by a dentist or physician. Any problems that you are experiencing that last more than 2 weeks need to be checked out. If the problem persists, seek another opinion!

Oral Cancer can and does happen to anyone at anytime. Make informed choices about your lifestyle. Tobacco and HPV are KILLERS. Early detection SAVES LIVES. Oral cancer has a much higher survival rate (as high as 80-90%) when discovered

I share my story openly because my mission is to help to save lives and offer hope. When you are lucky enough to be on the surviving side of almost 50/50 odds, you want to help change those odds for the better for everyone. And I want people who may hear the words "you have cancer" to realize that when the odds are not great, there is still HOPE. Awhile back I was at the post office and the woman helping me recognized my name. She asked me if I had had cancer and I told her I did. She said, "My daughter told me about you. You're a miracle!" Maybe I am. Looking back, it's probably at least partially true. I have been to

Over 220 attended the 2013 Dairy Day held at the Country Cupboard, Lewisburg, Pa. Virginia "Ginny" Ishler dairy complex manager at Penn State covers Strategies to Improve a Dairy Farm's Cash Flow.

Area Agri businesses and Penn State teamed together for the 2013 Dairy Day held at the Country Cupboard in Lewisburg, Pa. Over 220 people at-

tended the meeting on Thursday March 7th.

Scott Crandell from Ritter Feeds Inc is the dairy day coordinator. "Each year we have area Agri Businesses come in and display their products and services. This year we had over 27 businesses participate. We then provide speakers that specialize in topics that are important to our clients business" The meeting is sponsored by Ritter Feeds Inc, Ag Choice Farm Credit, Penns Valley Vet Clinic, Susquehanna Valley Veterinary and Sunbury Animal Hospital.

One of the main speakers was Virginia "Ginny" Ishler from Penn State. Her topic was titled "Cropping and Nutritional Strategies to Improve a Dairy Farm's Cash Flow."

Ginny gave an overview on what is covered at workshops that she and her team have presented for individuals throughout Pennsylvania. Ritter Feeds Inc and Penn State will help coordi-

The program will focus on learning how adjustments to cropping strategies can turn a farm with a cash flow deficit into one that has cash surplus exceeding \$300,000. Participants will examine records of a real farm, looking at how adjustments to cropping strategies and the resulting ration program turned the farm operation around. Often when feeding programs are evaluated and changes made

to reduce feed costs for lactating cows, the reduction is not enough to improve the margin between milk income and feed costs. The solution involves examining the big picture, from feed inventory, feed quality, cropping strategies and different ration approaches to optimize the use of home-raised feeds. Participants will record key information from various crop-

ping strategies to study how each change impacts the cash flow plan. Summary data from farms that have completed a cash flow plan and income over feed cost analysis will be presented to show the areas impacting dairy farm profitability. Presenters will be Penn State Extension Dairy Team members Tim Beck, Rob Goodling, Rebecca White and Virginia Ishler. Ginny and her Penn State team along with Ritter Feeds Inc will be offering workshops where individuals can meet with

Community volunteers associated with the Buffalo Creek Watershed Alliance, of the Merrill W. Linn Land and Waterways Conservancy, are dedicated to increasing people's understanding and use of Buffalo Creek, a watershed that occupies 40 percent of Union

After exploring the legal and insurance ramifications of increasing and formalizing access to the creek, the group saw the development of a water trail brochure on Buffalo Creek as the next logical step.

The brochure includes maps of Buffalo Creek as well as information about its natural and human history. The Buffalo Creek Watershed Alliance (BCWA) contacted landowners next to the creek for access points. Approved access points illustrated in the brochure are at Cowan, Mazeppa, the Dale Engle Walker House property on Strawbridge Road and St.

George Street in Lewisburg. BCWA was funded for a matching grant of \$500 by the Susquehanna Greenway Partnership. To accept the \$500 BCŴA was asked to apply to the state Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) for a state approved water trail. The attempt was futile as the BCWA request was denied because the creek was too small to meet all the state requirements. Nonetheless, DCNR approved the \$500 match. This brochure project was

financed in part by a grant from the Community Conservation Partnerships Program, Environmental Stewardship Fund, under the administration of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, Bureau of Recreation and Conservation. This project was awarded through the Susquehanna Greenway Mini-Grant program. To learn more about the Susquehanna Greenway Partnership, visit www. susquehannagreenway.org. The brochures will be dis-

tributed to some 20 different outdoor and tourism agencies throughout Union County. BCWA and Canoe Susquehanna (888-524-7692) have organized four kayak trips down Buffalo Creek this spring as part of the Caring for Communities celebration.
