It was a beautiful day on Friday, July 18, 2025 for the Lewisburg Art Council's Sidewalk Chalk Festival. Market Street was lined with artists of all ages turning the sidewalks into visual masterpieces.

Participants registered either online or in-person in front of Brushstrokes where you checked in before beginning on your section of sidewalk. All participants received a ticket for a free treat from Paris Bakery & Cafe which was an added bonus to the already fun event. The chalk drawing took place all day long but ended at 6:00 p.m. to prepare for judging.

The winners were announced later that evening, and the works of art were pretty spectacular. Prizes were awarded for the top three creations in five different age groups and provided by Sholley Insurance Agency,

Purity Candy, and Brushstrokes. Additional prizes were given in the categories of "At the Movies" from Campus Theater, "Sweet Treats" from Catherman's Bakery, "Fashion" from Jordanna Adams, and "Local Nature" from Creative Plantscapes.

The 2025 Featured Artist was Beth O'Connell from Selinsgrove, and she created nothing short of a chalk masterpiece with her fancily dressed pets creation which took up four sections of sidewalk. At nearly 4:00 p.m., I spoke with her, and she said that she had been working on her artwork since 10:00 a.m. Her efforts were truly impressive and can be seen above in the large picture.

I recruited my husband and daughter to join me in participating in this event which was a first for all of us. We created a nature scene of a river with a boat on it, a sun, a few trees and clouds and a cabin on the shoreline. We quickly realized that we were running out of certain colors of chalk we were using, and to get those rich colors that I saw in some other's creations, you really need to go over each area heavily with the chalk. It really makes a visual difference. Either way, we enjoyed the experience of it all and will be better prepared for this next year.

The top three winners in the age 6 and under group were Ellis Daniels, Austin Coombe, and Diana Menezes. In the ages 7-9 category, Fletcher Blum earned first place, Eloise Steele took second place, and Ellamarie McLaughlin placed third. In the category for ages 10-13, first place went to Zoey Roush, second place winner was Delaney Farnsworth, and third place went to Hanna Moore. In the category for ages 14-18, Breah Phillips earned first place, Jane Petrin took second place, and Clara Eckhart was the third-place winner. In the ages 19 and up group, Emily Stanley earned first place, Steve Leister won second place, and Sydney deCastro took third place. Willa Blum won for the "Fashion" theme, Ceili Lapp won for the "Local Nature" theme, Luke Fornwalt won for the "Sweet Treats" theme, and Maylyn Abers won for the "At the Movies" theme. Six seals represent the United States Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard and Merchant Marines.

These donations are part of the ongoing efforts of the Union County World War II Honor Roll and Veterans Day Celebration held in Mifflinburg. 

Rep. Rowe Applauds \$1.45 Million Investment in Union County Sewer Infrastructure



Rep. David H. Rowe (R-Snyder/Union/Mifflin/Juniata) recently announced that the Lewisburg Area Joint Sewer Authority has been awarded a \$1.45 million loan to improve the safety and efficiency of its wastewater treatment system.

The funding, awarded through the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST), will be used to replace the facility's existing chlorine gas disinfection system with a modern ultraviolet (UV) disinfection system.

The project includes installation of vertical UV modules in a newly constructed flow channel, while the existing chlorine contact tanks will be retained as flow-through tanks. Additional work includes construction of two new manholes, modifications to an existing manhole, and installation of approximately 120 feet of new sewer line.

"This is a smart investment in both public health and water quality," said Rowe. "By transitioning to UV treatment, we're eliminating any risks associated with hazardous chlorine gas and ensuring cleaner water enter the West Branch Susquehanna River. I'm proud to support infrastructure improvements that protect our families, our workers, and our natural resources."

This project is expected to significantly improve public safety and environmental outcomes for eastern Union County.

SEDA -COG Expand Services with \$750K PHARE Funding

SEDA-Council of Governments (SEDA-COG) has been awarded two grants totaling \$750,000 from the 2024 Pennsylvania Housing Affordability and Rehabilitation Enhancement Fund (PHARE), administered by the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency (PHFA).

The funding will allow SEDA-COG to supplement and broaden its current home rehabilitation services, enabling it to provide more comprehensive assistance to residents.

Despite ongoing efforts, much work remains to ensure safe and energy-efficient housing for residents around the region. PHARE funding plays a vital role in bridging the gap between what is needed and what traditional funding sources can cover.

In the SEDA-COG Weatherization program, home heating issues are identified and resolved for income-qualifying residents. The program improves home safety and reduces energy consumption, which leads to lower heating bills. Prior to receiving the PHARE funding, the program could use only 18% of state weatherization funds to address health and safety initiatives. Now, the program will be able to address more health and safety concerns in homes.

The Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency works to provide affordable homeownership and rental housing options for older adults, low- and moderate-income families, and people with special housing needs. Through its carefully-managed mortgage programs and investments in multifamily housing developments, PHFA also promotes economic development across the state.

With this new investment, SEDA-COG will continue to preserve the region's aging housing stock, improve residents' quality of life, and maintain the overall vitality of local communities.
