





What Can We Do to Help Counter Bird Declines?





This year's 'State of the Birds' report reveals that the major declines in bird populations reported by Science Journal in 2019 are unfortunately continuing. The 2019 article stated the staggering population loss of 2.9 billion birds in the U.S. and Canada since 1970. Most, though not all, species have continued to decline in the years since.

Separate long-term studies show that many insect species are also in decline. For example, a study published in March 2025 in Science Journal revealed that the population of butterflies in the Lower 48 declined by 22% between 2000 and 2020, and 13 times as many butterfly species declined over that two-decade period than increased.

There are multiple reasons for these declines, including but not limited to mortality from housecats and feral cats (for birds), pesticides, window and vehicle collisions and habitat loss. The good news is that there are actions that homeowners and landowners can take to counter these declines.

Feeding birds alone is not the answer, since the declines are happening as the number of Americans feeding birds has increased. The decline in many insect species likely contributes to the bird declines since the vast majority of our songbirds feed their babies insects, including seed-eating species such as cardinals, juncos, and nuthatches.

eating species such as cardinals, juncos, and nuthatches. Research by entomologist and ecologist Dr. Doug Tallamy, author of 'Bringing Nature Home' and 'Nature's Best Hope', focuses heavily on caterpillars, which are simply the larval stage of butterflies, moths and skippers - all members of the order of insects we call Lepidoptera. The research shows that Lepidoptera larvae are the most important insect food for young birds because they are large and packed with calories, protein and fats. Most are

also soft and easily swallowed.

Bird parents that struggle to find enough Lepidoptera larvae need to travel farther from nests to search for enough food for their family or else feed them less nutritious food, lowering the odds of fledglings surviving to become breeding adults able to keep populations stable.

Most caterpillar larvae are able to digest only one or a very small number of plant species' leaves. The best known example of a Lepidoptera 'specialist' is the Monarch Butterfly larvae, which only eat Milkweed plants. Research by Tallamy and others demonstrates that plants native to a region serve as 'caterpillar food' far betterthan do exotic plants, and also that certain native plant species far outperform other natives as larval plant hosts. The top outperformers or 'keystone' species include oaks, cherries, birches, cottonwoods, willows and maples.

Planting multiple species of keystone plants in our yards and reducing the amount of both mowed lawn and invasive exotic plants are important actions that can help our avian friends.

Oaks are the top keystone plant, serving as larval host for hundreds of Lepidoptera species. Any of our native oaks are good trees to consider if you have the room: White, Pin, Red, Chestnut, Scarlet, Black. Red Oak, Quercus rubra, is known as a fast grower though any oak is of course an investment in the future.

If you don't have space for Black Cherry trees in your yard, why not consider Chokecherry, Prunus virginiana? This small, fast-growing tree that can easily sucker into thickets not only supports hundreds of Lepidoptera species but also yields red cherries in July that serve as a bird magnet. Chokecherry needs at least partial sunlight and can thrive on various soil types.

River Birch, Betula nigra, is another fast-growing keystone tree that's gained interest among landscapers in recent decades, due partly to its multi-colored exfoliating bark. Though it prefers damp soil it will prosper on average soil as long as you water it during dry periods. It usually tops out ≥ 50' in height and produces seeds in the late spring that chickadees and other seed-eating birds eat.

Serviceberries are small trees that are one of the first natives in our region to produce a bounty of fruit in the growing season. After a beautiful albeit brief display of white flowers in April or early May, the fruit ripens in June when catbirds, robins, cedar waxwings and many other species dine on the tasty berries, which many humans also savor. Both Allegheny Serviceberry, Amelanchier laevis, and Downy Serviceberry, Amelanchier arborea, are native to our region and easily grown in full or partial sunlight.

Speeding Up the Bird "Learning Curve"

How many birds can you name? Many people can name only a few --even people who have bird feeders. Today's technology, however, cangreatly accelerate our learning curve.

Perhaps the most accessible resource is the free "Merlin app" from the Cornell Lab of Ornithology(which is close by in Ithaca, NY). This app is crazy easy to use. Download the app onto your phone, press the Merlin icon and then press the green "sound" icon to record the bird call or song that you are hearing. Presto: Merlin identifies the bird for you. You can also take a picture of the bird (press the "photo" button), and Merlin will name the bird.

The app also logs all this information on your phone for your later reviewand continued learning. Because mastering bird calls/songs is always challenging, repeatedly listening to a bird call/songdramatically accelerates the learning process. The McCauley Library, which houses all the Merlin information, has grown to over 67 million photos and nearly 2.5 million audio recordings. (A caveat about this app is that it is not totally accurate, but it is nonetheless a tremendous aid. Download the bird pack for your region [e.g., US Northeast] to increase the accuracy.).

The National Audubon Society also has a free, userfriendly appwhich offers great pictures of birds and tons of other information about a bird's habitat, size, migration patterns, etc. I often use both sites in tandem. This Audubon app requires that you input the name of a bird in which you are interested, but with the Merlin app, all you need is the bird's call/song, sonot knowing a bird's name isn't a barrier.

I continue to be amazed that people who regularly feed birds don't know the names (and other important information) about these feeder birds. Can you identify all the birds at your feeders? Do you know whether you are seeing a song sparrow, a female house finch or a curious field sparrow, since allthree somewhat resemble each other?

Another great way to accelerate learning about birds at your feeders is to join Project FeederWatch (feederwatch.org), also created by the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology. You count the numbers of all species at your feeder for short (or long) periods of time November-April and then enter your data online. This is a great family activity! You can also noticeand record which birds fight with other birds -and who wins. A bonus is that you and your family also become "citizen scientists", adding to important global knowledge about birds.

One of our Lycoming County Audubon chapter's bird experts, Bobby Brown, has also just launched a great resource which identifies which birds are likely migratingthrough our area during specific months. This tool is a video series on the LycoBirds YouTube channel: Bird ID Through the Year. The intro video for the series is at https://youtu.be/ VA5z7cvu6aU.

Today you can find websites for many birdingrelated activities. For example, on Dbird.org, you can quickly report bird-window collisions to help scientists across the country understand and prevent bird mortality. Over a billion birds die annually in the US from collisions with windows. Surprisingly, 99% of such collisions occur at residential and lowrise buildings—not high-rise buildings as we might assume. Learn online about what you can do at your home to help decrease such bird collisions with your house windows and sliding glass doors.

Birding is only one of a handful of activities where the whole family can be involved in learning -while simultaneously inhaling the great outdoors, perhaps our greatest local resource. The ice impediments are almost gone! Get out there!





Pennsylvania Ranked Number One in the Country in Prosecuting Medicaid Fraud

Department of Health and Human Services, Pennsylvania is number one nationally in the number of Medicaid fraud charges filed against bad actors, and third overall in convictions secured. This success is only possible because of the hard work of the dedicated staff at the Department of Human Services (DHS), which operates a comprehensive fraud prevention and detection system to preserve Medicaid resources for people who need it and helps to reclaim taxpayer funds.

This work plays a central role in making referrals to law enforcement that allow potential fraud to be prosecuted. "As DHS builds bridges to health and stability for eligible Pennsylvanians through Medicaid and our other supportive programs, we must be sure that taxpayer dollars are being used as intended and be vigilant in protecting these critical resources," said DHS Secretary Dr. Val Arkoosh."DHS staff closely monitor our programs using a variety of tools to quickly identify potential fraud and abuse. This work is the basis for legal action taken by our partners at the Pennsylvania Office of Attorney General, and I am proud of our contribution to making Pennsylvania a national leader in prosecuting bad actors and protecting these essential programs for Pennsylvanians.'

To weed out fraud, DHS staff verify each applicant's information against 12 data bases to ensure proper income eligibility during application and renewal. Applications or cases that are flagged for potential misinformation are referred to the Office of State Inspector General for further investigation. In State Fiscal Year 2023-24, the OSIG investigated more than 19,000 applications for public assistance benefits - the vast majority of which came from DHS' referrals.

"As Attorney General, combating Medicaid fraud was a critical priority, and it is gratifying to know that this work has safeguarded Pennsylvanians while holding criminals accountable," said State Inspector General Michelle Henry. "As Inspector General, I am proud to continue this mission in partnership with DHS. In addition to extensive verifications of people applying for benefits, DHS's Bureau of Program Integrity (BPI) works to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse by monitoring and verifying proper use of the program by Pennsylvanians with Medicaid coverage and by providers offering care and services

BPI's staff work to ensure proper use of pubfunds through a multifaceted approach, including:Providing education and technical assistance to help providers operate in line with state and federal Medicaid program requirements. Medicaid is a payor of last resort, so BPI staff review Medicaid cases to determine whether other payment sources like commercial or employer-sponsored insurance or Medicare are more appropriate options for payment of Medicaid claims and works with these

organizations to recover payments. For the 2023-24 State Fiscal Year, this work resulted in nearly \$500 million in fund recovery or cost avoidances. Taking action against providers

who violate program requirements or are identified to be on a federal Do Not Pay List. In the 2023-24 State Fiscal year, 325 providers were terminated from the Medicaid program for cause, leading to \$33.7 million in savings to the Medicaid program. Leveraging Fraud Capture technology – an AI-driven system that analyzes Medicaid program data to identify potential outliers for further investigation and additional follow-up by BPI staff.

When this work results in cases of suspected Medicaid fraud, staff from the Bureau of Program Integrity make referrals, as appropriate, to other state and federal entities for further action. This work includes referring suspected fraud to the Office of Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Control Section, who then uses BPI's work and investigation to take additional steps to pursue criminal action against people who may be abusing the Medicaid program

Governor Shapiro Stands Up for Pennsylvania Farmers, Appeals USDA's Unlawful Decision to Cancel Local Food Purchasing Assistance Program

Recently, Governor Josh Shapiro announced his Administration is appealing the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) unlawful termination of the Local Food Purchasing Assistance (LFPA) Program, which provides funds to Pennsylvania's farmers who supply local food banks with fresh produce. The Governor has directed Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) Secretary Russell Redding to immediately challenge USDA's abrupt and irrational decision to cancel Pennsylvania's \$13 million contract for the LFPA program – which supports 189 Pennsylvania farms and 14 food banks across the Commonwealth.

"Pennsylvania farmers do the noble work of putting food on our table – and for the last three years, they have been paid to provide fresh, local food to food banks across our Commonwealth as part of a successful federal initiative," said Governor Shapiro. "But earlier this month, we received notice from the U.S. Department of Agriculture that the Trump Administration had decided to cancel our agreement. As a result of this unlawful action, 189 Pennsylvania farms will lose a critical source of revenue – and 14 food banks across the Commonwealth will lose access to local, fresh food. I've directed Secretary Redding to immediately appeal the USDA's decision to unlawfully terminate this agreement and demand that the federal government honor their obligations under the agreement we signed just four

Governor Shapiro is committed to protecting Pennsylvania's agricultural and food systems. If the USDA does not reverse its decision, the state is prepared to pursue further legal action to safeguard vital revenue streams for farmers and ensure uninterrupted food access for residents.

Pennsylvania is one of the only states in the nation that uses the LFPA Program to exclusively support in-state farmers, ensuring federal dollars stay in our Commonwealth and go directly to the Pennsylvania farmers. At a time when food banks are seeing record-high demand due to high costs and our farmers are facing some of the toughest market conditions in decades — we need to be supporting Pennsylvania

farmers, not making it harder for them to get by. The USDA's abrupt termination of its contract with PDA,

which was signed in December 2024, has left 14 food banks all across the Commonwealth facing severe financial gaps For example, at the Central PA Food Bank, the unlawful termination of this program will mean a loss of \$120,000 per month for the food bank — equal to 500,000 fewer meals provided to hungry Pennsylvanians every month. These cuts affect both hunger relief efforts and the farmers who supply food banks with fresh, Pennsylvania-grown produce, dairy, and protein.

The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank serves 27 counties distributing millions of pounds of food each year. Serving more than 253,000 people each month, the food bank partners with more than 1,130 local agencies to distribute millions of pounds of food annually.

Governor Shapiro will continue to take action to protect vital markets for our farmers and support the work they do to put food on Pennsylvanians' tables. Governor Shapiro's 2025-26 budget proposal increases support by \$4 million to PASS and \$4 million to the State Food Purchase Program (SFPP), crucial programs that connect low-income Pennsylvanians with healthy, local food. These increases would bring the total funding for these programs to \$34.6 million. The Governor is also championing initiatives that reduce food insecurity by tackling its root causes, including raising the minimum wage and cutting costs for Pennsylvanians.

Agriculture is a cornerstone of Pennsylvania's economy with over 53,000 farms generating \$132.5 billion annually and supporting 600,000 jobs. Governor Shapiro's Economic Development Strategy places agriculture at the forefront, recognizing it as essential to the Commonwealth's growth. Since taking office, he has prioritized funding to strengthen the industry and enhance Pennsylvania's national agricultural reputation. The Governor's investments, including the creation of the nation's first Agricultural Innovation Grant and the revival of the Fresh Food Financing Initiative, are key to ensuring a stable, sustainable food system in Pennsylvania and supporting Pennsylvania's farmers.

Consumers Alert: Utility Scam Calls Spoofing PUC Phone Number

HARRISBURG – The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC) today issued a consumer alert warning about a scam involving telephone calls that falsely claim to be from the PUC – using the phone number of the Commission's Philadelphia office as the caller ID.

The PUC has received more than 70 calls today alone from concerned consumers who say they received suspicious phone calls appearing callers are fraudulently using the PUC's phone number in their caller ID – a practice known as sure them into making payments.

another utility has reported a request to switch the consumer to a different utility or energy

If the consumer questions the switch, the scammers claim to have a voice recording of the consumer authorizing it.

The caller then falsely states that the only way to cancel the switch and remain with the pa.gov. utility is to pay a cancellation fee immediately or face termination of service.

Important Reminder: The PUC does not make call 1-877-FTC-HELP. direct calls to consumers to demand payment, confirm supplier switches, or threaten termina- numbers.

The PÛC has reported this incident to law enforcement and is reaching out to utilities across the state to alert them about these potential scam calls and to gather any relevant information they may have from their customer service teams or fraud prevention units.

Do not pay unknown callers or provide them with personal information such utility account information, bank account details, credit card, driver license, date of birth, social security number, or address information.

Never trust caller ID alone. Scammers can to come from the Commission. These scam spoof legitimate phone numbers to make the call appear credible.

Contact your utility or supplier directly us-"spoofing" - to mislead consumers and pres- ing the phone number on your bill if you have questions about your account or a potential switch.

Be aware that utilities may contact custom-The callers claim to be representatives of the ers by phone if a bill is seriously overdue, but these calls are usually part of a broader series of written and electronic notices about a delinquent account or possible termination. If you're unsure whether a call is legitimate, always contact your utility's official customer service hotline.

Yaw: Senate ERE Committee Oks Bills Addressing Stream Maintenance, Offering Protections for Landowners

HARRISBURG - The Senate Environmental Resources and Energy Committee approved a slate of bills today addressing stream maintenance and offering better protections for landowners, according to Chairman Gene Yaw (R-23).

Senate Bill 403 would allow for local government organizations to apply for a permit for continuing maintenance for a period of at least 10 years for the streams within their jurisdiction. Senate Bill 404 would create a program that allows counties to opt-in to address hazards within their streams by allowing for emergency maintenance permits in consultation with their county conservation district.

"Proper stream maintenance protects people, land and infrastructure from flood damage," Yaw said. "The need is immediate, and our local officials are in the best position to manage and maintain our streams. Eliminating unnecessary bureaucratic barriers and red tape can help prevent more widespread damage and destruc-

Last year, nearly every county in Yaw's district was impacted by severe flooding from Tropical Storm Debby. The overwhelming message, he said, was the need to be able to get in the streams to clean them. Currently, doing so requires a permit from Pennsylvania's Department of Environmental Protection, a process that is lengthy, tedious and inefficient, according to Yaw.


Yaw noted both measures are supported by the Pennsylvania Association of Conservation Districts.

The committee also advanced two measures offering better protections for landowners.

Senate Bill 109 (Laughlin) - Sets a \$250 cap on 'groin" fees imposed on private property owners.

Senate Bill 349 (Yaw) – Establishes decommissioning and financial requirements for solar generation projects, ensuring landowners won't bear the burden of dismantling solar facilities once they cease operation.


