

Petty Still Nascar's Favorite Driver

NASCAR announced this past week that Richard Petty is still the sport's favorite driver, but along with that message came several new ones.

Fans of the future can expect new and more advanced race car technology, younger drivers, and oh yes, fewer seats at NASCAR events.

'We want to be more nimble in what we do from a technology standpoint, be able to quickly react to the emerging technologies that are out there," said NASCAR Senior V.P. Steve O'Donnell. 'We want to be a proving ground. When you look at NASCAR, we feel like no sport is better positioned to really take technology, showcase it in front of some of the toughest conditions that exist in the world, and we think we're poised to do that.'

Changes could be made in race qualifying procedures, although no specifics were discussed in last Monday's news media briefing. Officials plan to make much more pit-road data available to fans, perhaps by monitors or digital displays above pit stalls and through television and cell-phone displays.

O'Donnell said change will also come in the way the sport is officiated and the way fans receive information, both at track and via live television broadcasts.

Some changes will take effect in 2014, and others will be in place for the 2015 season.

O'Donnell said making core changes in the rule book will remove a lot of gray zones. There will be computer-aided drawings, simplifying the objectivity of the rule book.

"NASCAR has been criticized sometimes for being somewhat subjective," he said. "When we look at the rule book in the future, we want to categorize penalties so they're listed out in the rule book. We think it will be much more clearly defined not only for us and our competitors but for the race fans, as well.

We are not trying to put teams in such a box that they can't innovate. That's what our sport was founded on, was innovation, being able to work and find that advantage."

More technology means higher costs for teams. That translates into fewer, small one-car race teams.

For several years NASCAR has sponsored the "Drive for Diversity," a program where young Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, Afro-Americans, and female drivers are brought into the sport.

They have asked the major racing teams to include this young, diversified mix of candidates into their driver lineups. NAS-CAR's stated goal is to embrace the 18-25 age group.

Where does this strategy leave the average, hard-working, middle-age, white male/female race fan?

By the removal of seats, tracks hope to raise the prices and make tickets "be in demand," as they once were.

When 30 per cent of the seats are removed from a track, will the average fan still be able to afford the inflated prices?

NASCAR's message sounds great. It's the typical, shiny, NAS-CAR public relations package. But it might contain some flaws.

Will a sufficient number of young fans that NASCAR is courting be there when the older ones are gone?

The haunting question for me is who's going to fill Richard Petty's shoes?

SPEED TO BECOME FOX SPORTS 1

The SPEED Channel, which has carried the NASCAR truck races, will soon be known as Fox Sports 1.

The channel which previously carried only racing coverage will feature many other sports, in addition to racing.

Fox Sports 1 will make its debut on August 17, 2013. Fox has directly positioned the channel to be a major competitor to ESPN. There will be studio programs including the daily sports news program Fox Sports Live (which will compete directly against ESPN's SportsCenter), Crowd Goes Wild (formerly Rush Hour), a new early-evening program hosted by Regis Philbin, and Fox Football Daily.

Beginning in 2014, Fox Sports 1 will air 26 weeks worth of regular season Major League Baseball games and coverage of select post-season games (the Fox network will air significantly fewer games as a result).

Beginning in 2015, Fox Sports 1 will air select live NASCAR

The Veterans Memorial was the Eagle Scout Community Service Project of Ryan Hoke.

On Saturday, July 6 Ryan Hoke fulfilled his goal and completed his Eagle Scout Project. Hoke created a Veterans Memorial at the Penn Valley Airport in Selinsgrove. The memorial is engraved with the words, "To honor Veterans and their families from our past, present, and future. Your service is forever appreciated." Below the quote are five military insignias and three pieces of artwork. The image on the top of the memorial is a Corsair airplane, a military aircraft used in both World War II and the Korean War. The bottom left image depicts a soldier running with a gun. Hoke selected that image because it is on his grandfather's Korean War plaque. On the bottom right of the monument is the image of "The Praying Soldier." The last inscription reads: "May God Bless America."

The Dedication Ceremony was held at 11 am and included a Veterans Color Guard and a 21 gun salute, as well as several politicians and local clergy taking part in the event. Boy Scout Troop 441 of Kratzerville, Civil Air Patrol Squadron 522, Penn Valley Airport Authority, Joint Honor Guard American Legion Post 25 and VFW Post 6631, Rev. Chuck Melton, Rev. Evan Ryder, and Kathy Bartol also contributed to this special moment.

The idea for the project was sparked for Hoke over the past three years while Boy Scout Troop 441 of Kratzerville parked cars at the Penn Valley Airport for their annual Air Show. Hoke explained, "At the Air Show I saw many Veterans and their families and I was immediately inspired to create a Veterans memorial in honor of them for my Eagle Scout Project." He then went to the airport for his 8th grade Career Day and proposed his idea to airport manager, Jim Taylor.

When Ryan proposed the idea to the Airport Authority,' reports Charlie Benner of the Penn Valley Airport Authority "the decision was unanimous, unanimous, unanimous!" Benner continued, "We felt it was important because for the past several years we have tried to bring back the old military planes-for both veterans and for their families. The veterans could bring their children and grandchildren to see a glimpse into their ser-vice to the country through those planes." Benner concluded, "This could not have been a better way to honor those veterans!


The project took approximately six months to complete. Many tasks were undertaken to successfully complete the project. Hoke had to find a boulder supplier and an engraver, raise money through donation requests and VFW/American Legion presentations, coordinate delivery dates and work days, send out thank-you notes to all donors, and make payments to material distributors. Due to the generosity of the community, Hoke was able to expand on his project and include a 20 ft. flagpole stone bench, lighting, concrete bases for the memorial and the flagpole, and extra river-rock to complete the landscaping. Additional funds not needed for the project will be donated to the Wounded Warrior Project (www.woundedwarriorproject.org). Hoke was

assisted by his father and Jim Taylor, manager of the airport.

Prior to the Dedication Ceremony, Zartman Construction donated a lift to put the memorial, an engraved 4.5 ton mountain stone boulder, into place by the main terminal. The unveiling of the memorial was held during the Dedication Ceremony.

"The boulder was 5 tons when I first saw it at Gustin's Stone Supply in Lakewood, PA. After engraving the boulder weighed 4.5 tons," said Hoke.

Public Pension System: Pennsylvania's Titanic

The problem with government debt is that at some point the creditors will expect to get paid, and when they demand payment, Pennsylvania's taxpayers are on the hook. Pennsylvania's two public pension systems, the State Employees' Retirement System (SERS) and the Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS), are currently \$47 billion un-derfunded. For perspective, the 2013-14 Commonwealth General Fund budget is \$28 billion. It is undeniable that this liability is unacceptable.

The very nature of a system that allows for politicians to make alterations for political gain is reason enough to fix the system. Allowing for a system that relies on an annual 7.5 percent investment return in order to remain solvent is foolish and an irresponsible gamble with taxpayers' money. Ultimately, if that 7.5 percent return is not realized, the people handed the bill are again, the taxpayers.

Special interests are saying that the retirement system for public employees should not be structured in the same fashion that the taxpayers in the private sector fund their retirement. For some reason, some lobbyists, unions and special interests feel that those who derive their paycheck from the taxpayers deserve a retirement system that is vastly different from those who ultimately fund the public system.

Over the past several decades, businesses, including those in this area, have converted their retirement plans to defined contribution plans. Private industry is not able to pass the unpredictable costs of defined benefit retirement plans to their customers, while the public system in Pennsyl-

vania is able to pass costs onto the taxpayers through increased taxes. While some say let Act 120 work, Act 120 is itself, although billed as pension reform when signed into law a few years ago, is a political ploy meant to push the responsibility past another election cycle, not to address the root cause of the crisis. Nothing in Act 120 relieves the taxpayer from guaranteeing the system if an indefinite 7.5 percent annual rate of return is not realized.

The system is fundamentally broken. Enrolling future employees into


