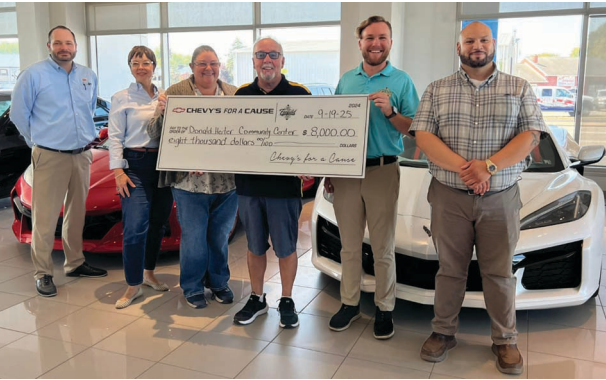

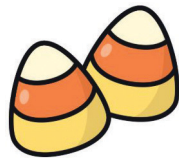

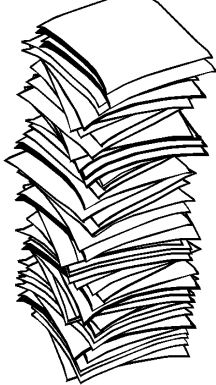

Big Racing Shows at Hagerstown and Lincoln Speedways, Along with a Tune Up Race at Bedford

Last Friday night at Hagerstown it was a comeback of sorts with a two-day show in October like what it used to be for over 25 years until it stopped in the 2011 season. This was a small venue for what it used to be with just Modifieds and super late models in action. For years it was a four-division show of Big and Small Block Modifieds along with super late models and 410-sprints. This show had super late models since a Fall Clash super late model only event on Friday, along with the 358-spec small block Modifieds. The Super late model race went non-stop for 35-laps with Trevor Feathers getting the best of Mason Zeigler, who had the early lead. Zeigler started to fade just past the halfway mark while Feathers got stronger and scored the feature win and the \$6,000 top prize. Zeigler hung on for second with Rick Eckert, Gregg Satterlee and Ross Robinson in the top five. In the 358 Modified feature Danny Bouc scored the feature win over Loudon Reimert, Mike Mancini, Ryan Kruchan and Billy Osmun. Friday night's event drew a field of 31 super late models, 32 358 Modifieds plus 15 Big Block Modifieds and 36 602 crate Modifieds for practice. Saturday the Short Track Super Series Big Block Modifieds took center stage with 36 drivers on hand with Matt Sheppard scored the feature win and the \$5,000 top prize over Alex Yankowski, Anthony Perrogo, Ryan Godwon, and Mike Gular. In the 602 crate Sportsman Modified feature, Joe Toth made up for a bad Friday night with the feature win in the 602 crates over Matthew Laubach, son of long time Modified driver Rick Laubach.Rick Wegner, James Hill and Steve Davis were in the top five. Toth who ran his 358 Modified on Friday night, did not have any luck in his heat race he was involved in an accident, which took time to clean up. His crew worked hard and got his car back out for the heat race, but going into turn two Toth rolled his number nine two times and was out for the remainder of the night. He was not hurt in the accident. 36 Big Block and 40 Sportsman Modifieds were in action on Saturday night.

Saturday at Bedford it was the tune up race for the super late models which will be running a two-day show this weekend. The super late model race had Kyle Hardy led all the way from his front row starting spot but had to deal with Jeff Rine after two late race cautions bunched up the field. Rine gave it his best shot and was beside Hardy in the second turn on the last lap but fell one half car length in stealing the victory from Hardy. For Kyle it was his first victory of the season at Bedford. He is a

one-time winner of this coming weekend Keystone Cup event; Spike Moore was third with Matt Csoner and 21st starting Trevor feathers fifth. This Friday the track will run two semi-features of 25-laps to help set up the starting field for the big \$25,000 to win Saturday night 60-0lapper. In last year event, Max Blair and Mason Zeigler, who Friday night Preliminary races with Zeigler scoring the 60-lap feature win over Max Blair, Kyle Hardy, Dylan Yoder and Jeff Rine. Last year's event drew a field of 41 drivers for the annual event that will close out the season at Bedford Speedway. So far this year's feature winners have been Jeff Rine and Mason Zeigler with two wins each, Bryan Bernheisel, Tim McCreadie a WOO series win, Jakob Piper, Matt Cosner, Tyler Ritchey, and Hardy. In the Laurel Highlands 305-sprint feature event Kolby Weaver scored his first ever feature win over Jarrett Cavelet Kolby's brother Kasey Weaver and Braden Varner. Laurel Highland completes their season with John Walp has the series champion John also won the track championship at Clinton County. This weekend's super late model event is part of the Fall Clash series with Trevor Feathers having three wins with Mason Zeigler with two wins, and Dave Hess in a show-up points event only feature win.

Saturday night at Lincoln Speedway a lot was up for grabs with double features for the 410 and 358-sprints. The regular feature for the 410 sprint was a special event going 50-[laps with \$15,000 to win, with tight points battles in both divisions. Freddie Rahmer scored the make-up 25 lap feature from the September 27th rain out. Rahmer, JJ Loss, Kyle Moody, Cameron Smith and Gerard McIntyre in the top five. Rahmer gained some points, but Troy Wagaman Jr was still the points leader. In the 50-lap special Cameron Smith scored the big win his second 410-sprint car win of the season with Wagaman second, Danny Dietrich, Freddie Rahmer and Tyler Ross in the top five. The fifth-place finish Rahmer won the points title over Try Wagaman Jr by five points in the final event. Rahmer scored five overall feature wins in the season and scored his fifth Lincoln speedway track title. Wagaman Jr had three wins along with Anthony Macri, Danny Dietrich and Cameron Smith with two wins. Single wins went to Chase Dietz, Matt Campbell,

Buddy Kofoid in the WOO series race, TJ Stutts, Brandon Rahmer, Aaron Bollinger and Ashton Torgerson. In the 358 sprint double features Dylan Norris won the make-up feature over Scott Foshier, Frankie Herr, Cody Fletcher, and Bo Gordon the second feature went to Cameron Merriman over Cole Small, Brayden Mickley, Andy Best and June Siegel. This also had a tight point battle and in the end six-time feature winner Dylan Norris scored the 358 sprint car title his second track title this season he also won the Williams Grove track title. Norris won the track title by 130 points over Jayden Wolf, who scored one feature win, also winning a 358-sprinnt feature at Lincoln were Frankie Herr, Nash Ely, Brayden Mickley, Kyle Spence, Aiden Har and Cameron Merriman.

The High Limit national touring series wrapped up their season last weekend with Rico Abreu scoring the feature in the series last two races. Rico won the series mid-week points title along with the regular season points tile for the High Limit series, the first national title ever for Rico. Brad Sweet last year's champion and a five-time WOO series champion announced that will retire from full time race but will continue to work with the high Limits series. Also announced after 50-years of racing late model Jim Bernheisel is hanging up his helmet but will still be around the sport with his business and other venues.

This Saturday night BAPS Motor speedway will run a special for the 410-sprints along with the wingless sportsman, the 410-sprint will be running at the speedway for the eight time this season with four wins going to Danny Dietrich. Single wins have gone to Ashton Torgenson, Troy Wagaman and Anthony Macri. On the National scene Devin Moran, with his fourth-place finish at Eldora last Saturday won the Lucas Oil super late model series points title the first for him. Also, during the weekend action at Eldora, the steel block late models were in action with some local driver making the feature field, with close to 70-drivers on hand. Dillan Stake placed seventh, Tyler Bare was tenth, Tayler Farling 15th and Lane Snook was 20th.

Shed Roof Timber Frame Pavilion components in-clude:8×8 Posts, 6×12 Headers with 45° Bevel,4×8 Raft-ers with custom scroll-cut rafter tails that mirror the ar-chitectural style of the park’s nearby structures, 6×8 and 4×8 Arched Angle Braces, Pre-Cut Mortise & Tenon Joinery, secured with a combination of metal fasteners and traditional oak pegs, 2×6 Tongue & Groove Ceiling Finish and Finished with Tamko Lifetime Architectural Shingles and Outlast Q8 Log Oil to preserve the wood.

This thoughtful engineering made it possible to raise the structure efficiently in days while still delivering a handcrafted look and feel. As Dave Hoffman noted, “The pavilion was easy to assemble thanks to Timberhaven’s precise pre-cutting and labeling. The kiln-dried timbers made the material lighter and easier to handle on site while maintaining strength and quality.”

The new Milton Train Car Timber Frame Pavilion now stands proudly in Milton’s park alongside other shed-roof styled structures, including one that shelters the park’s welcome and history signs and another that once shaded guests waiting to board the train. Together, they create a cohesive and charming setting that honors the town’s past while providing new life to a historic piece of the story.

Thanks to the teamwork between Timberhaven, Log & Timber Solutions, and the City of Milton, the Milton Train Car Pavilion is more than a shelter — it’s a symbol of community pride, craftsmanship, and preservation.

On the other hand, Mifflinburg (14-4) padded their stat sheets by beating also-runs in field hockey... Warrior Run and Danville. In the 8-0 win over Warrior Run Kira Shoemaker had her fourth hat trick of the year and Lainey Miller had two goals. In the 10-0 shutout of Danville, Shoemaker had four goals and Brooke Gessner and Maize Sauder had two goals each.

All four of our boys soccer teams are playing for a district championship. In 2A #1 Lewisburg and #2 Midd-West earned first round byes and will play yet to be determined foes this Saturday. In 3A #2 Selinsgrove will play #3 Mifflinburg this Saturday at 4pm at Shik. I can't wait for that possible Dragon/Mustang repeat of last year's district final.

Lewisburg stayed undefeated by shutting out Crestwood 9-0 to end their very successful regular season. Viktor Permyashkin had two goals and three assists. Isaac Ayers added two goals and an assist and Keegan Crosby contributed a goal and two assists.

Selinsgrove boys soccer split two 1-0 games, losing to Benton (15-1-1) and beating Warrior Run on Keir Rodger's first career goal. Midd-West (15-2-1) dominated an undefeated Montoursville 5-1. Wyatt Nelson, Evan Devine and Gabe Romig all had a goal and assist in helping the Mustangs hand the Warriors their first loss.

Girls soccer playoffs in 3A has the Grove girls #2 seed playing #3 Milton at Midd-West on Saturday. In the 2A bracket #6 Midd-West hosted #11 North Penn Mansfield and #9 Lewisburg played at #8 Bloom this past Tuesday.

All the first and second place finishers at districts in soccer and field hockey move on to the PIAA state championships.

Lewisburg's girls volleyball (9-8) swept Lourdes Regional 3-0 as Claire Chandler recorded her 500th career assist. Chandler finished the match with 19 assists, 9 aces and 2 kills. Virginia Morini led the Dragons with 7 kills, 4 digs and 2 aces.

The Selinsgrove girls wrapped up the inaugural season of volleyball this past Tuesday by playing Montoursville. Better years lie ahead for this team.

Mifflinburg senior golfer Kamdon Eicher shot a three over par 75 on the Penn State White course in the first round of the state golf championship. The two leaders shot a 68 and 69. Eicher's 75 has him in 11th place with one more round to play. Teammates Wilson Abram posted an 87 and Cub Dietrich carded an 88.

It's very difficult to stay in games when you haven't scored and the opposition has put up 27, 35 and 49 points on you by halftime. That was the theme in last week's high school games for three of our schools. The good news is our local elevens could win three games this week.

Mifflinburg overmatched Midd-West with speed outside and strength upfront. The Cats Larry Murray had six catches for 288 yards and five touchdowns. Murray scored on receptions of 53, 61, 45, 51 and 75 yards. It's amazing what happens when you get these stellar athletes that Mifflinburg has the ball in open spaces.

The front line on both sides of the ball dominated the game for Mifflinburg. Miff QB's Chad Martin and freshman Brennan Snyder combined to go 12 for 12. Freshman running back Dylan Catherman scored two times on his three carries. Throw out the records when Miff plays rival Lewisburg this week. The Green Dragons always seem to have the mental edge when playing the Wildcats on the football field.

Montoursville (7-2) jumped out to a 27-0 lead over Lewisburg (2-7) in the first half, basically putting the game on ice. The Warriors had a well balanced attack on offense and turned their season around after losing 35-7 to Mifflinburg five weeks ago.

Lewisburg's Nick Coleman ran the ball very well for 167 yards on 17 carries and one TD. Montoursville found it important to work on their kicking game by adding a field goal in the closing seconds.

Selinsgrove (1-8) also got behind early in the first half 35-0 and ended up being shutout 56-0 to powerful Berwick. Grove has faced a gauntlet closing out their year. When you face three teams that are still undefeated this late in the schedule is not fair to anyone. Hollidaysburg, Shamokin and Berwick all stand at 9 and 0 right now. Selinsgrove has a shot for their second win as they end the season hosting Danville.

I did predict a Toronto/LA World Series before the end of the MLB regular season. I was pulling for a Philly/Mariner Series but the two best teams from each league will play in this year's World Series. With the Dodgers starting pitchers, a tough batting lineup 1 to 9 and the best player in baseball that does both, they will win the Series in five games. Did you know that these two teams went a combined 1-5 this year at PNC Park against the Pirates?

Last week at this same time I felt very good that Penn State was going to go big on their next coach to replace James Franklin. I no longer feel that and Penn State Athletic Director Pat Craft is going to regret firing Franklin.

Never before have so many big-time football schools gotten rid of their head coaches in the middle of the season with more to come after the season ends. Along with Penn State... UCLA, Arkansas, Florida, VA Tech and OK State are all looking for new coaches. Auburn, LSU and FL State could soon join these schools.

There's a couple reasons for so many mid-season firings of college head coaches. The early signing period for high school recruits was moved up to early December. The transfer portal has a single 15 day window from January 2-16, 2026, eliminating the previous spring window. There is an exception for players on teams in the playoffs and if there's a coaching change. Schools want to try and get their new coach in place to take advantage of these date changes.

What all this means is Penn State is no longer the best destination for the established coaches or the up and coming coaches at a smaller school. Even more so if those last three schools mentioned above are looking to hire. You have to think that Craft already had Franklin's replacement when he fired him. All signs point to Nebraska coach Matt Rhule and that would be a mistake.

Rhule is Franklin 2.0 without the top 5 recruiting classes James had lined up over the next two years. Most of the 4 and 5 star recruits have pulled their verbal commitment to Penn State. Franklin may convince some of those decommits to go with him wherever he is coaching next year... Florida? He will also take some Nittany Lions with him through the portal. There are going to be some lean years ahead if Craft gets this wrong. Did I mention Rhule's record is 0-18 against top 10 teams?

Actual NBA and college basketball games join all the other sports currently being played this week. My wife Stacy is very excited that there's another sport to watch! The Bucknell men's basketball team is predicted to finish 5th by the coaches in the Patriot league with Navy picked to win the league title.

No Kings Protests in Lewisburg and Sunbury

On Saturday, October 18 No Kings Protests in Lewisburg and Sunbury joined their voices with peaceful protests across the nation and even overseas in opposition to President Donald Trump's actions.

One banner read "No Thrones, No Crowns, No Kings!" The group organizing the No Kings Rally in Lewisburg, Indivisible, stated on their notice, "In America, we don't put up with would-be kings.

"Our peaceful movement is only getting bigger and stronger. "NO KINGS" is more than just a slogan—it's the foundation our nation was built upon. Born in the streets, carried by millions in chants and on posters, it echoes from city blocks to rural town squares, uniting people across this country to fight dictatorship together.

The president thinks his rule is absolute. But in America, we don't have kings, and we won't back down against chaos, corruption, and cruelty. Grow our movement and join us.

"A core principle behind all No Kings events is a commitment to nonviolent action. We expect all participants to seek to de-escalate any potential confrontation with those who disagree with our values and to act lawfully at these events. Weapons of any kind, including those legally permitted, should not be brought to events."

One participant noted, the event was "widely attended in support of defending our democracy. There were lots of people of all ages, from kids to seniors, musicians, dogs, costumes, signs, flag waving people all protesting Donald Trump and peacefully standing up for our freedom of speech. At one moment, everyone sang the National Anthem together; it was so moving."

On October 18, local Sunbury, PA residents came together with millions of Americans across the country in a nationwide day of nonviolent protest at the second No Kings Day of Action. The No Kings Rally in Sunbury had around 300 people in attendance and was held from 11 am- 1 pm in Cameron Park. The Community Zone joined Action Together NEPA in Sunbury. The speakers included Rabbi Nina Mandel, Colleen Franciscus, Penn Garvin and Lynn Palermo. The host for the morning was Rob Barkley from Action Together NEPA.

"This is bigger than political disagreement. The administration has defied our courts, deported American citizens, disappeared people off the streets, and slashed our services — all while orchestrating a massive giveaway to their billionaire allies," said Action Together NEPA Community Organizer Rob Barkley. "Enough is enough. For anyone who thinks they've gone too far, this movement is for you."

According to Cindy Peltier, "While we did have a small group of counter protesters, there were no skirmishes and we both respected the action of each other. Democracy in action provides a forum for both sides to speak out and that is exactly what took place."

On June 14, more than five million people across all 50 states joined No Kings in the largest single-day protest yet against President Trump's authoritarianism. The October 18 day of action is the next step in this growing movement, channeling that energy into yet another coordinated, peaceful mobilization.

Gov. Josh Shapiro posted on Facebook to acknowledge peaceful demonstrators who gathered in protest of President Trump and his administration. "Almost 250 years ago, patriots in Philadelphia declared independence from a King.

"Today, thousands of people in Pennsylvania and across the country, from all walks of life, peacefully took up that fight for the fundamental freedoms this nation was built on.

"The American story is a work in progress — and the darkness coming out of DC right now is a testament to that. To everyone who protested peacefully in the streets: thank you for bringing the light and doing the work. I'm going to keep fighting — and I know you will too."

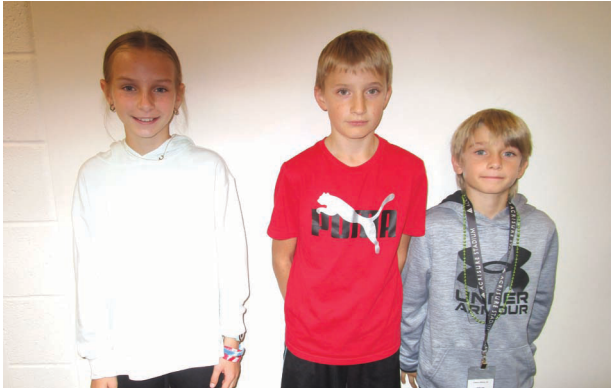

A labor, community, and political organizer for more than 20 years, Aaron has founded, grown, and led coalitions in Philadelphia that saved multiple community schools from closure, passed citywide earned sick-day legislation, and severed the city's multi-billion-dollar contract with Wells Fargo bank for racist predatory lending practices. League of Women Voters of Lewisburg Area Reaffirms Nonpartisan Mission Amid Rising Disinformation

More than 50 members of the League of Women Voters of the Lewisburg Area gathered last week to hear from Amy Widestrom, executive director of the League of Women Voters of Pennsylvania, who warned that this fall's judicial retention election is being clouded by false advertising and billionaire-funded disinformation.

Widestrom was the keynote speaker at a full membership meeting of the LWVLA at Buffalo Lutheran Village.

"The League of Women Voters of Pennsylvania never tells people who to vote for or how to vote," Widestrom said. "Our mission is to ensure that every voter has access to trusted, nonpartisan information so they can make up their own mind. As Pennsylvanians prepare to vote, we urge everyone to rely on credible sources, not on mailers or ads funded by special interests and billionaires. Together, we can see past the noise, reject disinformation, and protect our courts — and our democracy — from those who seek to distort them for their own gain."

Widestrom's remarks followed the League's statewide press conference denouncing a coordinated disinformation campaign targeting the upcoming State Supreme Court retention election. The League has released a toolkit to help local League chapters share accurate information and guide voters to credible resources like Vote411.org.

At the Lewisburg meeting, Dawn Maneval, LWVLA board member, briefed attendees on voter education initiatives from the PA State League in which local members can participate. The gathering also included Nancy Neuman, Lewisburg resident and former president of the League of Women Voters of the United States, who joined members in reaffirming the League's century-long mission to empower voters and defend democracy.

"The League of Women Voters is nonpartisan — we don't endorse parties or candidates — but that doesn't mean we aren't political," said Widestrom. "We take positions on issues, but only after careful study and agreement among members at the local, state, and national levels. The League works with everyone to advance fair representation and informed participation."

Now in its 105th year, the League of Women Voters continues to grow, with more than 10,000 new members nationwide this year joining its efforts to strengthen democracy and voter confidence.

Due to Federal Shutdown, November SNAP Payments Will Not be Made to Nearly Two Million Pennsylvanians

Unless Congress takes immediate action, SNAP payments will not be issued for November. Pennsylvanians who need immediate food assistance can call 211 or visit www.pa211.org to find local food banks and other food assistance programs.

Harrisburg, PA – Earlier this month, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) notified Pennsylvania that it will be unable to fully fund November SNAP benefits because of the federal shutdown. That means that without the White House and/or the Republican-controlled Congress taking immediate action to reopen the federal government, November Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) payments will not be made to Pennsylvanians. The Commonwealth cannot backfill these costs.

“Republicans’ failure to pass a federal budget in Washington, D.C. is having a direct impact on our Commonwealth and now, this federal shutdown is threatening critical food assistance for two million Pennsylvanians who rely on SNAP to feed themselves and their families,” said Governor Josh Shapiro. “In July, Republicans in Congress voted to knock 310,000 Pennsylvanians off Medicaid and 144,000 off SNAP, all in order to give a tax cut for people who don’t need it. Now, Republicans are once again threatening vital support for Pennsylvania families and children – it’s time for them to pass a federal budget and end this shutdown.”

“Inaction from Republicans in Congress threatens more than just access to health care for Pennsylvanians who rely on tax credits to purchase health insurance -- it now disrupts life-sustaining food assistance and other critical programs and further endangers health and wellbeing for Pennsylvanians who rely on these programs and services,” said Human Services Secretary Dr. Val Arkoosh. “I urge Republicans in Congress to recognize the serious consequences impacting local economies, small businesses, and the health and safety of people in Pennsylvania and nationally. This shutdown is jeopardizing access to health insurance and dis-

rupting these critical services, and I urge our leadership in the U.S. House and Senate to come together for a solution that protects people most at risk.”

On October 10, USDA notified states that it will be unable to fully fund November SNAP benefits because of the federal shutdown. Since its inception in 1964, the federal government has fully funded SNAP, distributing more than \$366 million every month to Pennsylvania. At this time, however, no SNAP benefits will be issued until a budget or continuing resolution is passed by Congress.

Despite the ongoing shutdown, SNAP recipients with unspent funds on their EBT cards will still be able to use these funds. SNAP benefits do not expire at the end of each month and are able to be spent for a calendar year. DHS strongly encourages SNAP recipients to keep their card locked with the ConnectEBT app or website to protect their benefits when the card is not in use.

DHS will continue to process applications for SNAP and other benefits during the shutdown. Recipients should continue to report case changes, submit any semi-annual reviews or renewals they receive during this period, and update their cases for the new federal work reporting requirements that start November 1to not risk an interruption of their benefits in the future.

For immediate needs during the shutdown, Pennsylvanians can use PA Navigate pa-navigate.org/ to help find food and other resources. Local help is also available by calling 211 or visiting www.pa211.org. Pennsylvanians can also visit www.feedingpa.org to find local food banks and other food assistance programs.

Pennsylvanians who are able to assist their local food banks, food pantries, and other helping organizations are encouraged to support however they can as these organizations continue to experience high demand.
